When I talk about supporting local businesses in the Clovis - Twin Cities - -Muleshoe trading area, I realize it's a two-way street.

On one hand, it's so important that we recognize that our futures depend on supporting our friends and neighbors in businesses in our communities. They care about us. The foreign-owned corporations - with their big U.S. flags in front of their enterprises - don't.

The other hand means that local businesses have to reach out. I find that happening now with the downtown Clovis merchants and I want to publicly congratulate them on their efforts.

For example, last month many of the downtown merchants participated in a special Washington's Day celebration with big savings to shoppers. They included There's More to Love, Larry's Hobbies & Crafts, Woody's, Stork Shop, Tankersley's, Ealy Furniture, Baldock's, Russell's, Enchanted Sunmark, Playmates, Queens n Teens, Torrances, McDaniels, Aucutt Paint, Duffy's, Jackman's, All About Sports, Cribbs, C&D Bicycles and LaRue Jewelers.

What we're seeing is that the downtown merchants are organizing, realizing that there is strength through numbers. That is what is needed for downtown not merely to survive, but to grow and get stronger. I'm really proud of what they are doing.

I received a copy of The Downtowner last week and was very impressed by what I read. For example, let's take a look at some of their committees:

- Block leaders to keep open the communications between the project office (Casey Hazelton, project manager, 769-2103) and their area, to help with promotions, to be aware of new businesses joining in, etc.

- Promotion, to help on task forces to work on special promotions.

- Design, to help make downtown more exciting, convenient and beautiful.

- Economic development, to help strengthen downtown businesses and find new firms to fill vacant buildings.

The merchants have worked long-range, too, by planning special promotions every month throughout 1988. The next one will be the March 17 Moonlight Madness Sale watch for it!

The newsletter also named a Business of the Month -Contempo Quilts. It's owned by Lori Wright and there's a strong Twin City connection to this neat shop. For example, her business features handmade items such as shelves and book racks created by Ann and Lewis Cooper. The store also offers books, patterns and supplies for quilting, knitting and crochet.

Currently, 50 businesses have joined Clovis Downtown, Inc. And I'm sure this total will grow as the cohesiveness begins paying off. What we're seeing here is evidence of local businesses reaching out.

Let's reach back.

In the laser disc player, no part of the machinery touches the disc. It is hoped that this will prolong the life of the materials.

"It puts so much more information at our disposal than we could have had with the textbook or with the film library," says Mrs. Stephens.

"Many students are visual learners; textbooks turn them off. But, they learn so much better when they can see something happening before their very eyes," she added.

Some of the film clips on the laser discs feature time lapse photographs of things happening like a bean seed sprouting or a flower opening.

One of the options that Farwell teachers may exercise is to make a computer program to correlate the laser disc images with their lesson plans so that they will automatically know which images on which discs go along with the lessons they are teaching.

"We don't usually buy films," said school Supt. John Grigsby. "We get what we need from the service center, but the laser discs are far superior to films."

"The picture quality is far superior. There is no distortion. We can replay these images very easily. And, films deteriorate so fast. These laser discs should last longer."



Eva Dean Stephens shows the Earth Science Laser Disk which contains thousands of visual images.

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




Erickson has written the only authorized biography of Ace Reid, the creator of "Cowpokes" cartoons.



It is a matter of history as to what Texas Tech has become because of the support of its city and area citizens. We're all overdue to make that same commitment to West Texas State Univer-



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

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
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All-District


