Farwell utility rate to go up

The Farwell City Council plans to raise its utility rate. The council Tuesday proposed an ordinance that would raise garbage rates from \$4.50 to \$8 a month for residential users, and from \$5.50 to \$9 for commercial users. The action was taken after it was shown that the water and sanitation budget was running over \$12,000 in the red for the year. The new rates will go into effect as soon as legally possible. Overall, the city's budget is in the black but, due to regulations, the city can't continue to transfer money from the general fund to cover the water and sanitation fund deficit.

The council had a spirited discussion on an upcoming burning issue: trash. The latest word Farwell has received is that after Aug. 30, open burning will no longer be allowed. There may be another utility rate increase at that time. And due to tighter federal standards, by 1992 cities such as Farwell likely will be out of the landfill business. It was noted that burning of fields already is outlawed, but the law hasn't been enforced yet. One person suggested that in a few years many small cities will be forced to incorporate due to the costs of garbage collection. The council discussed Farmer County's recent action (see story elsewhere in today's paper) on having trash hauled away. It appears the cost for the city may be prohibitive. City water Supt. Dee Hammitt reported on upcoming U.S. Environmental Protection Agency crackdowns. "Small towns don't believe it's coming," he said. EPA officials were in Farwell this month to check its landfill. They found concrete illegally there (concrete must be buried at least six feet due to problems with rats building nests). Much of the concrete was placed there when the city's current curbs and gutters were built. So Farwell hired Sharp Dragline to help clear up the problem at a cost of \$5,200. A great deal more work needs to be done. The city may buy a used tractor from Tharp for \$7,000. Mayor Chris Gikas is going to an area mayor's meeting next week and will talk with area government officials about landfills and trash collections. It was noted that 14 county residents outside the city limits have been getting free trash collection for years. These are residents on city water lines. Letters will be sent them saying they must pay for trash pickup if they want that service. In other business, the council:

- Approved a permit for a fence around the Kerry Ford home.

- Approved an addition to the home of Ricky Coleman on Fourth Street.

- Denied the moving of a storage building by Harlin Obenshain to the site just south of the car wash.

- Met with Shandra McIntosh on her request to have a variance for a garage next to her home on Second Street just south of Avenue A. The problem is that they want it made of wood and the block is in a fire zone. A metal building was suggested to her. But the city also will check into whether a variance can be given without raising the city's fire rates.

- Noted that nobody has applied for the municipal judge's post. Persons interested should contact City Hall.

- Heard Mike Pomper, Border Town Days chairman, ask if the city could pick up the tab for the portable toilets used at LTD. Until two years ago, the courthouse was used. After that was declared off limits, Waste Control provided toilets for \$60. They no longer provide that service here and last year the cost was \$147. Pomper was asked to see what the cost will be this year and report back to the council.

Texico plans swimming program

The Texico City Council is looking ahead to summer and its swimming pool program. Persons interested in managing the pool this summer are asked to call Marie Christian at City Hall. So far, LaDonna Cross and DeLores Edwards have put their names on the list. Tuesday, the council asked City Attorney Duane Hamar to draw up a contract for the pool summer program. Information such as the number of persons who use the pool and the pool's profit and loss can be important in seeking state financial grants. Currently, the council has no such information.

\$8,225, and Case Power & Equipment, Amarillo, has three, for \$9,500, \$10,200 and \$10,500. City officials will check the backhoes further before a decision.

- Approved the quarterly municipal report.

- Approved a resolution naming April as Child Abuse Prevention Awareness Month.

- Noted that Mrs. Christian, clerk-treasurer, and Howard Billingsley, municipal judge, will attend the district meeting in Tucumcari next week.

- Heard Chancy report that SPS officials will meet with city officials April 14 to present cost estimates for street lights to be placed on the north side of the highway.

- Reminded residents that the next meeting has been moved up to April 24 because the Chamber of Commerce banquet is on April 25.

- Heard Chancy report that the city has been offered a tar pot at a reasonable price but the equipment doesn't seem big enough to meet the city's needs.

- Voted not to loan out or rent out city equipment, such as the trash hauler, to residents. Hamar reported that if they did allow it, there would be liability insurance problems, also a possible problem due to the franchise agreement with Waste Control, and also that, due to the law, if one person was allowed to use city equipment, then the city would never be able to say no to other city residents.

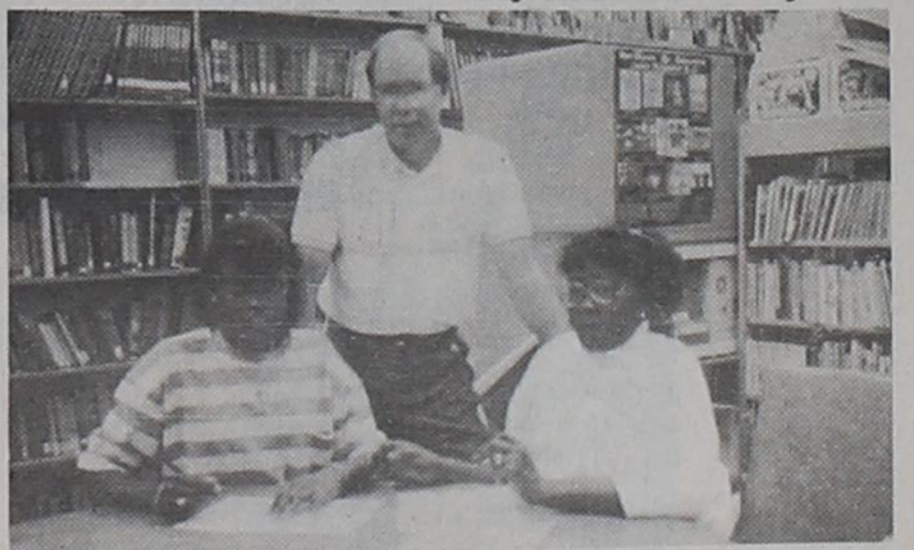
Also, the council plans to have 10 cents of the fee charged persons using the pool come back to the city.

Mayor Steve Chancy, along with Eastern Plains Council of Governments Director Lee Tillman were scheduled to go to Albuquerque April 13 to present Texico's requests for state aid for various civic improvements.

In other business at Tuesday's meeting, the council:

- Received three bids for City Hall carpeting, from Walters, \$1,674; Prestige, \$1,449, and House of Carpets, \$1,455. The latter bid was for 11 less square feet. The council approved the Prestige bid.

- Received five bids for a used backhoe. A&G Muffler offered one for \$9,500; Robert Romero has one for

At an earlier board meeting, Farwell PTA representative Joi Oppliger had raised concerns about the playground equipment. She had suggested some improvements. Craig reported Tuesday night that several of these improvements had been made, and then he proposed the new equipment.

In other action, the board:

- Heard a report from Randy Grady that the Farwell asbestos abatement report had been rejected by the state. The school system may be faced with replacing the ceiling

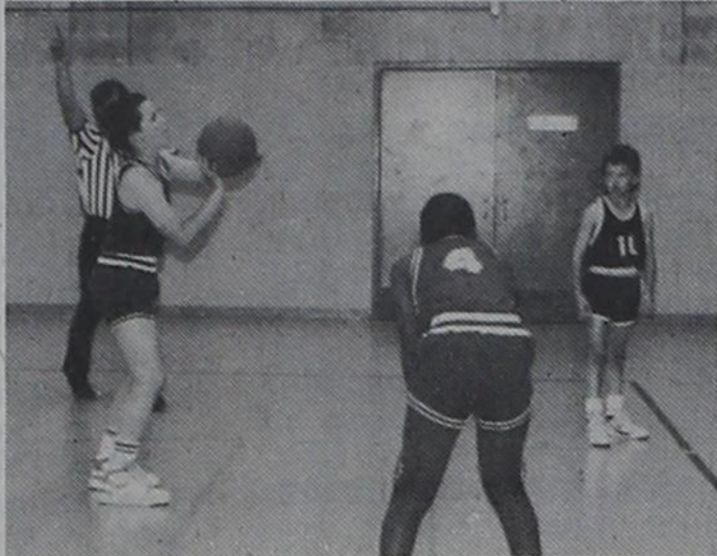

Trash box leased

The Parmer County Commissioners Monday approved plans submitted by Bovina Schools for its share of the county permanent school fund.

Bovina asked for its share - about \$196,000 - to redo its heating system because of asbestos problems. Plans call for the current heating tunnels, which have asbestos, to be sealed up, and new rooftop heating systems to be installed.

With the approval, the county now will give Bovina its share of the fund.

In other business, the commissioners met with a representative of Amarillo Waste Management to discuss trash pickups.

A contract was approved on a trial basis for Waste Management to install a refuse

box on the south edge of Friona - just west of the overpass on a dirt road that ties in with Highway 60.

The county will lease the box for \$145 a month, and will pay Waste Management \$210 for each load of trash hauled from it.

If the project works out, it's likely that the commissioners will place similar boxes at other sites throughout the county.

With the closing of the Lazbuddie dump, commissioner Raymond McGehee said he is looking for a site to place a refuse box in that area.

The commissioners also met with Friona city manager Beelee Goodwin. Goodwin said a new phone system is being installed for the city police department. Since county police use that system, a por-

tion of the cost will be paid by the county.

It also was approved that the county clerk's office be the registrar for births and deaths. Previously, county Justices of the Peace handled it.

Four bids were received for a used sheriff's department vehicle. J.W. Wright, Bovina, bought it for \$2,550. He was the high bidder.

He was chosen from thousands of students who auditioned. The group will have 20 members. They are picked on their basic musical excellence and spiritual commitment.

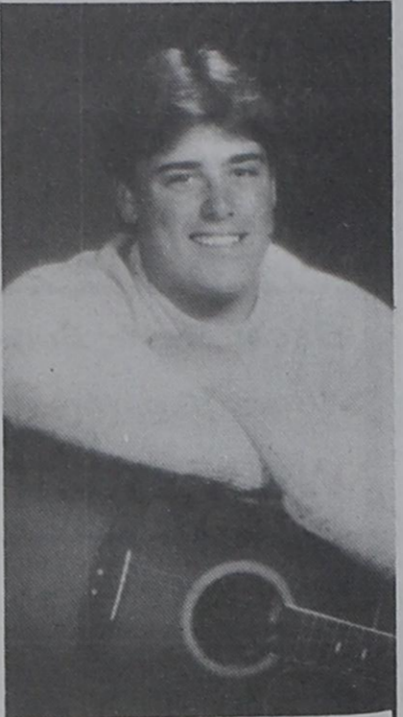
Hutchins has attended McMurry College in Abilene for the past two years, majoring in music education. He will attend West Texas State University in the fall and continue his education in music.
