In quest of Billy

It's not that I'm lazy this week (there's a bunch of good stuff at the end of the column), it's just that I thought this missive from one of my favorite folks, Don McAlavy, would make a neat

In spite of recent findings by forensic experts who have compared with a computer the only known authentic photo of Billy the Kid with 152 other people, including the gentleman known as Brushy Bill Roberts who claimed to be Billy the Kid, that puts old Brushy Bill No. 42 in that comparison, the controversy still rages on.

Judge Bob Hefner, of Hico, Texas, who is Brushy Bill's chief champion and booster, will not likely throw in the towel. He'd rather take the word of bullet-scarred Brushy Bill over a dang computer any

wrote the popular outdoor drama "Billy the Kid", which plays each summer at the Caprock Amphitheater, south of San Jon, N.M. In 1987, our first year with the show, Judge Hefner and I debated the issue of Billy's death at a pre- show confrontation at the amphitheater. I believe I won that debate, as did the audience, showing that reputable men saw Billy dead at Old Fort Sumner. But in Bob Hefner I found a sincere and kindly gentleman, a true Texas if there ever was one. I now call him a friend in spite of our differences.

This past March 1st, Bob Hefner got in his say on the ABC-TV prime time live coverage of the controversy. So did members of the Billy the Kid Outlaw Gang of New Mexico, of which I'm a charter member and now a director. Jenean Grissom, president of the BTKOG, and Joe Bowlin, one of its founders, spoke their piece loud and clear, too, for television land to see.

Six of us connected with my outdoor drama of Billy's life were at the Billy the Kid Outlaw Gang's headquarters at Taiban, N.M., on Feb. 15, 1990, when ABC's camera crew came to shoot scenes for the presentation on national TV. We supplied the music with two leading members of our outdoor drama band, Larry Buchanan, of Floyd, N.M., and Valerie Moss, of Amarillo, and two of our best dancers, Bill Strong of Portales, and Kathy McAlavy, of Clovis.

They were included in the 10-minute presentation that aired. (It was amazing that they shot some 35 hours of footage at Taiban, Fort Sumner, Lincoln, Tucson, and Hico - and then edited all that to just 10 minutes. But they did a pretty good job of it.)

ABC wanted a re-enactment of a photographer shooting a tintype photo that became famous of Billy the Kid. I came up with the camera that was televised and shown on the presentation, with my head beneath the black camera cloth, photographing Billy, played by Fred Fair of Portales, who has played Billy in many of our shoot-outs.

I mentioned to the ABC crew about our outdoor drama about Billy several times, but they were only interested in the controversy - so I lost my chance for some free publicity on national TV. That's the way it goes sometimes.

Well, Don, maybe that ABC crew didn't come through, but the ol' Tribune is always glad to help promote your fine play.

"Billy the Kid" opens June 14 and runs each Thursday, Friday and Saturday through Aug. 18. The play will start at 8 p.m. mst each night - it's been moved up. Also, Cattle



Gator moves a terminal to Farwell

Gator Transportation of Little Rock, Ark., has moved one of its terminals to the old Kemp Lumber Yard on First Street in Farwell.

The trucking company had operated a terminal in Clovis the past few years, but moved here recently.

"Even with the improvements we have to make on this property, the rent is still quite a bit cheaper here than it was in Clovis," said secretary and day dispatcher Sharon Bender. Her husband, Charles, is terminal manager.

Mrs. Bender said she and

be in Farwell. "Everyone is so friendly here. They have all come by to stop and visit."

Gator's Farwell terminal is part of a much larger organization. Truckers from other terminals will stop by the Farwell terminal when they need maintenance or if they are passing through this area.

"We have 10 trucks based here all the time, and we hire about 18 drivers here," said Mrs. Bender. " There are probably about 40 -50 trucks total in the Gator Transportation system, and about 75 drivers all together."

The trucks are the semitrailer trucks that have closed tops. Some are refrigerated.

jack-of-all- trades who can do anything he puts his mind to doing. It will be his job to keep the operation running smoothly, and to maintain the trucks. Son Steve also helps keep things rolling along.





Williams, Glover meet with Mexican officials

Bert Williams of Farwell and Jerry Don Glover of Lazbuddie, both members of the Texas Corn Producers Board, recently met with officials of the Mexican government and Mexico's tortilla producer association to begin negotiations for sale of more Texas food grade corn to Mexico.

The following is quoted from the Texas Corn News:

"We carried samples of our food grade corn to Mexico City to illustrate the differences of regular corn (being used in much Mexican tortilla production) and our food grade corn," says Williams. "The head of the tortilla association was enthused about the possibility of obtaining the higher grade of corn for production of better quality tortillas." Conasupo, a Mexican agency, buys all corn and sells it to

tortilla companies. They normally pay at least \$10 cwt. for white corn and sell it for \$1.50 cwt. The difference in the prices is a subsidy Mexico pays to feed its masses of people.

"However, the government is planning to remove the subsidy to a portion of the more affluent population and allow tortilla manufacturers to buy a part of their corn from the free market," says Williams.

"That's where we believe there will be a much larger

market for the higher quality food grade corn we produce on the High Plains."

Williams added that Venezuela is also changing its regulations on imported corn. "That country is lifting its restrictions of corn imports, says Williams, who recently sent food grade corn samples to Venezuela's food processors

"Texas Corn Growers has promoted our high quality corn for 19 years," he says. "We hope our newest efforts also pave the way for more markets."

Recipe of Week

Off the Wall Filets

- 4 beef tenderloin fillets, 1 inch thick, approximately 4-5 oz.
- 1/4 c. extra virgin olive oil
- 2 tbs. Balsamic vinegar 1/2 tsp. seasoned salt
- Borscht Salsa (recipe follows)
- 4 endive or romaine lettuce leaves, outer edges only
- 2 tbs. sour cream
- 4 small whole pickled beets

Combine olive oil, vinegar and salt in an 8" x 8" flat glass dish. Place fillets in mixture, turning to coat. Cover and refrigerate several hours or overnight. Next day prepare Borscht Salsa, set aside. Broil steaks 7-8 inches from heat approximately 15 minutes or to desired doneness, turning once. Place on serving plate, spoon Borscht Salsa on lettuce leaves to side of steak, dollop Borscht Salsa with sour cream, garnish with whole beets.

- 1 tbs. extra virgin olive oil
- 1 tbs. prepared horseradish
- 1/2 tsp. sugar 1/4 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. dill weed
- 2 tbs. chopped walnuts
- Combine all ingredients in a small bowl, chill.

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
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
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
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Bailey County producers can receive training

Bailey County producers will have the opportunity to complete training to meet one of the requirements for obtaining a private applicator license at a program scheduled for March 28 at 8:00 a.m. at the Bailey County Civic Center in Muleshoe, according to Spencer Tanksley, County Extension

To become a licensed private applicator, a producer must attend a Texas Agricultural Extension Service private applicator training program, make a passing score on a Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) private applicator examination and submit an application to TDA along with a required \$50 fee. The TDA private applicator license is valid

Producers holding TDA private applicator certificates dated January 10, 1989, and after, but prior to Jan. 1, 1990, may also continue to buy and use restricted-use and statelimited-use pesticides. However, persons holding private applicator certificates dated Jan. 10, 1989, and after, but prior to Jan. 1, 1990, will be required to become licensed private applicators within 5 years.

The private applicator training program is available to those persons not previously certified and to those previously certified who will be supervising the application of restricted-use and/or state limited use pesticides nd who wish to obtain a TDA private applicate license.

Option 1 - Texas Department of Agriculture personnel will offer testing at the same location beginning at 1:30 p.m. on March 28. Persons who plan to attend the training session and take the TDA test are encouraged to obtain a copy of "Using Pesticides-Private Applicator Manual" from the county Extension office for review and study prior to attending the training session.

Option 2 - Persons attending he training session will be provided with a form which must be presented to TDA when applying to test for a private applicator license. Days that tests are offered at TDA District offices are listed on the reverse of the form along with the addresses and telephone numbers of TDA offices.

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
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

Currently, seven counties (Deaf Smith, Castro, Parmer, Swisher, Bailey, Lamb, and Hale) already have this checkoff system, so the referendum will not be included on their ballots.
