Health Management Center established

A health management center has been set up at the United Drugs of Farwell building, pharmacist Steve Breckenridge has announced.

"It has been created to inform folks here about medications, diseases and health issues. By using it, folks will receive information needed to maintain their health, and cut down health care cost," he said.

The following services are available:

- Drug monitoring information: When and how long to take medications, why taking medications, side effects and drug - food interactions, and specific diseases.

- Over the counter recommendations: which product to use for specific conditions and which product to avoid when an existing condition is present, pregnancy - fertility tests, and OTC - prescription drug interactions.

- Monitoring health parameters: height and weight (free), blood pressure (free),

and blood sugar (\$3 fee).

- Health seminars: on a regular basis, timely and informative topics will be presented. For example, a story is elsewhere in today's newspaper on come-and-go seminars for the problem of lice.

Recipe of Week

Butter cookies
 1/2 c. sugar
 1 c. butter, softened
 1 egg
 1 Tbs. vanilla
 3 c. sifted Martha White All Purpose Flour
 1/2 tsp. baking powder
 Cream butter and sugar. Add egg and vanilla, blend well. Sift in flour and baking powder. Blend well. Cover and refrigerate about one hour.

Preheat oven to 425 degrees. Roll our dough on lightly floured board or pastry cloth to 1/8" thickness. Cut out with decorative cookie cutters. Place on ungreased baking sheets. Bake 5-7 min-

utes, or until golden brown. Transfer to wire racks to cool. Makes about 25 3" cookies.

Chocolate Dipping Sauce
 1 bag semisweet chocolate chips
 4 Tbs. butter or margarine (1/2 stick)
 1 1/2 oz. paraffin.

Combine ingredients in a double boiler. Stir until melted. Dip cookies or pretzels or fresh fruit into the sauce. Place on waxed paper until the chocolate is hardened.

School lunch program brings in funds

Everyone knows that Farwell Schools provide a nutritious lunch and breakfast on a daily basis.

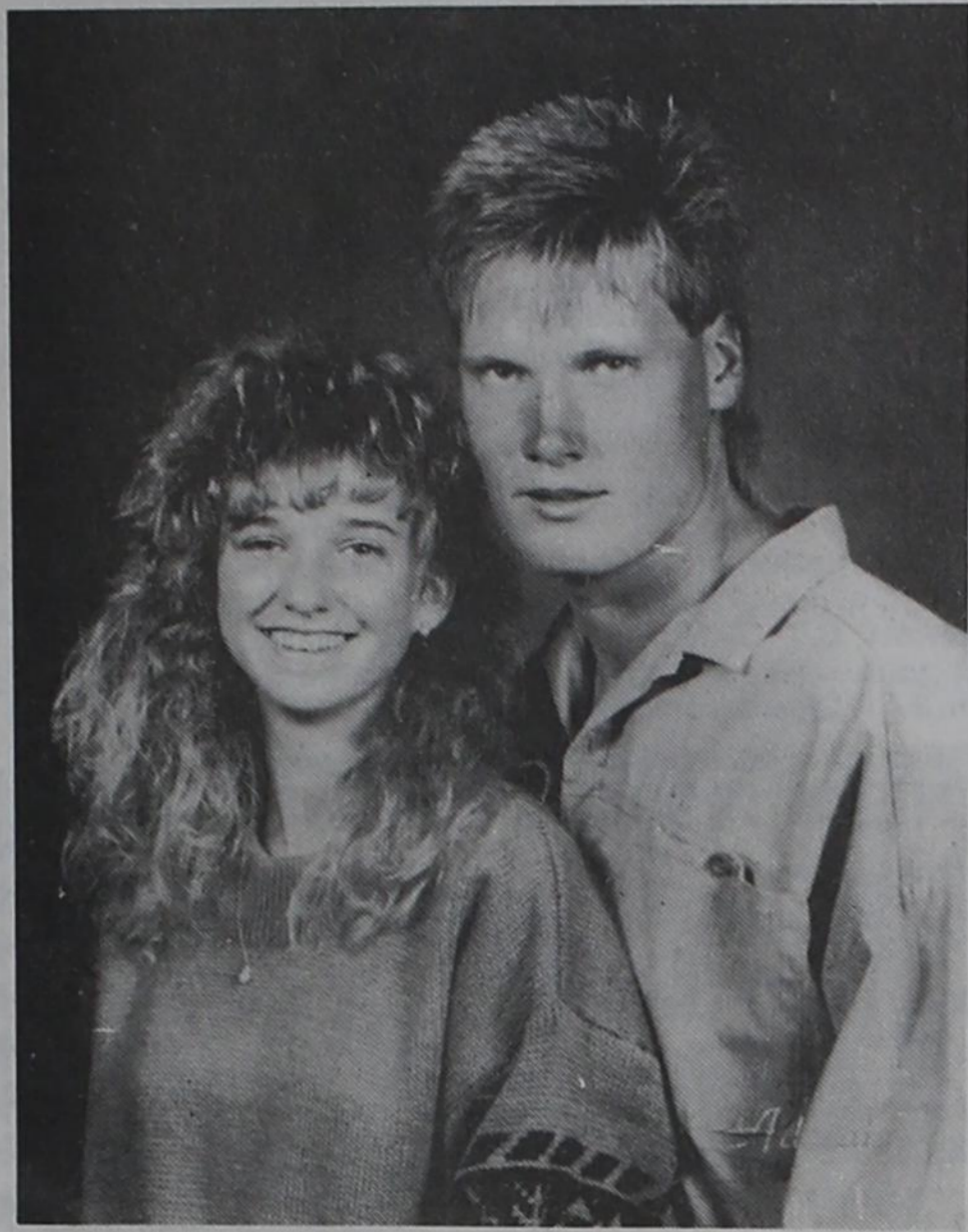
Our cafeteria manager, Linda Moss, does a wonderful job of providing meals that are nutritious, economical and delicious. These meals must meet very rigid guidelines, yet Linda and her crew of ladies make them delicious. They also utilize the few government commodities in such a way that our cafeteria operates very close to a "break-even" basis. Very few school cafeterias can come close to that.

But most people do not know that student participation in the cafeteria lunch program affects the over-all school funding. The district is paid by the federal government for every student who participates in the free and reduced lunch program. This amounts to approximately \$60,000.

But the state of Texas pays an additional allotment to the district, based on the participation in free and reduced lunch program. These monies are to be used for educational purposes because some of these students have special learning needs and cost more to educate. These monies are called Compensatory Funds. In 1988-89, the district received \$89,000 to be used for Compensatory Student Education. That is equal to over 14 cents in taxes.

So, participation in the school lunch program means more to the district than just eating breakfast or lunch. Students can be assured of getting a wholesome meal that is delicious, nutritious and inexpensive. The school benefits from federal dollars which reduce the cost of operating the cafeteria, as well as additional government commodities. And, we receive additional state dollars which are applied to our instructional program.

Rules tightened

Texas has mandated, due to Senate Bills 417 and 1112 that students in state public schools must be in attendance in each and all classes for 80 days of each semester of school.

A student cannot be given credit for a class if he has been in attendance fewer than 80 days in a semester.

If a student fails to be in attendance the required number of days, the student may appeal the denial of credit to a committee established by the Farwell Schools.

The committee will review the reasons for the absenteeism and decide if extenuating circumstances existed. The local board will establish what constitutes "extenuating circumstances" and what alternative ways will be used to allow for make-up work or regaining lost credit due to absences.

This new attendance rule will have far-reaching effects in small schools like Farwell. It does not delineate between UIL days for football, basketball, stock shows, track or any other school related activity.

In Farwell, most students

are involved in more than one activity and many in all activities. If you couple this with illness or a death in the family, it may result in some students facing the committee for attendance.

Taking your child out of school to go skiing, fishing, hunting, visiting relatives, taking off a day early for holidays, or taking a trip to Lubbock or Amarillo to shop, may have a negative effect on the student as attendance is a major factor in whether the student receives credit for the class or not.

Legislature provide even more funds for schools in other instructional areas based on participation in free and reduced lunch programs. Because our participation numbers are lower than other county schools, we have not been eligible for these additional funds. If participation increases in the lunch program the district may become eligible for new allocations, both state and federal.

As a parent, what can you do? Please see that your child eats in the cafeteria regularly, even if you are not eligible for free or reduced lunches. You can't get a better meal for the price. If you are eligible, or think you might be eligible for free or reduced lunches, please be sure to apply and participate in the school lunch program. These dollars add up - and we need every dollar we can to keep our costs down.
