A dance will follow the game in gym No. 2. It will be sponsored by the Junior Class parents.

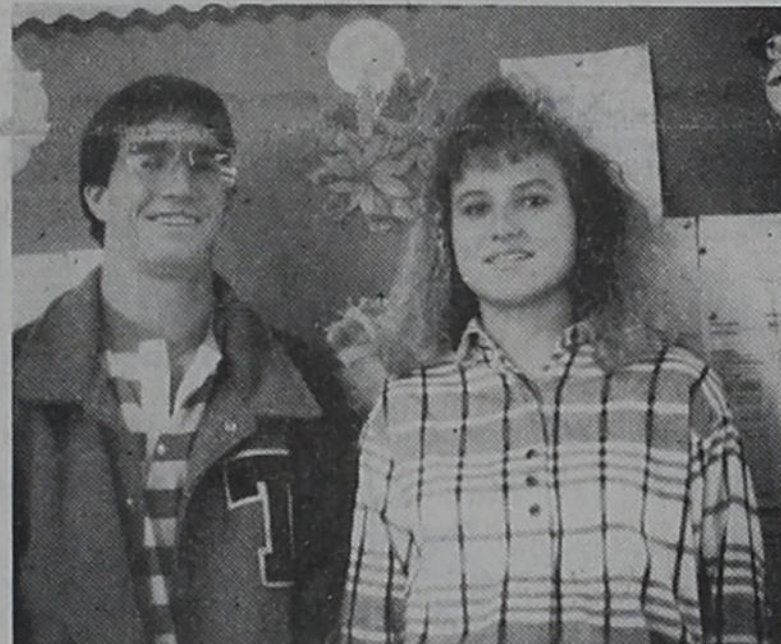
Texico alternates its Homecoming each year between the football and basketball seasons.

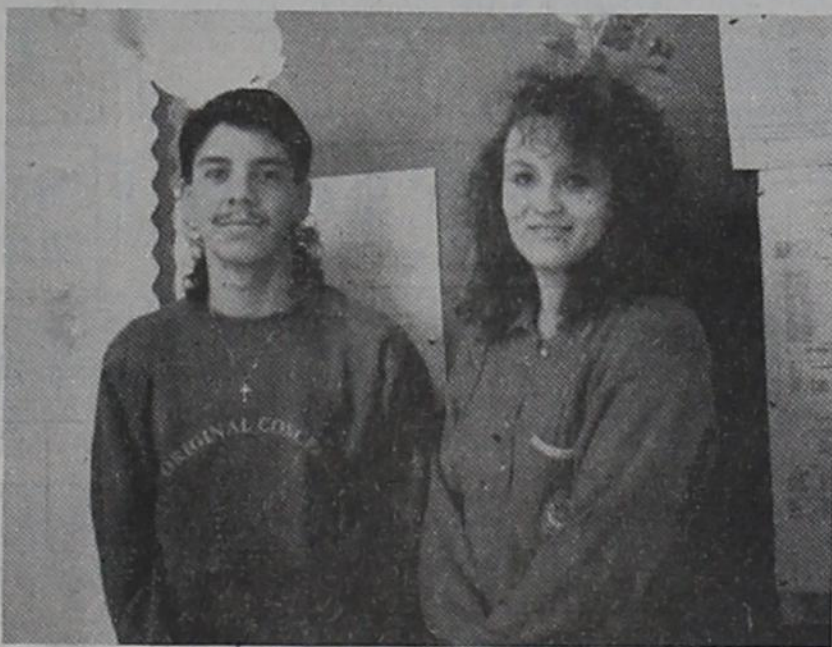

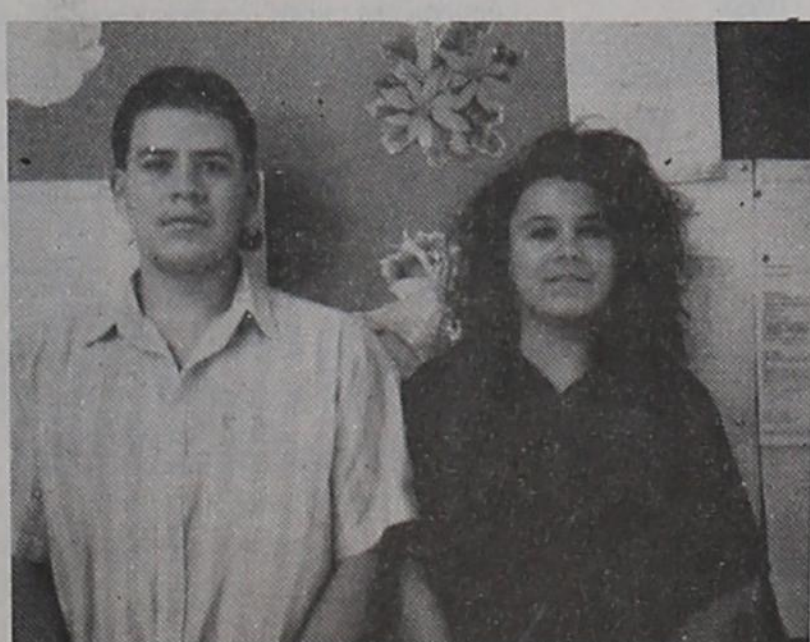

Texico city marshal quits

Texico City Marshal Walt Causey has resigned.

He and his wife left Monday to move to Harris County, Texas, to care for their daughter-in-law while their son is in Saudi Arabia. The Causeys

hope to find employment there.

Causey will seek a job in the law enforcement field, while his wife will try to find a bus driving job.

"I think there should be

more job opportunities in the Houston area," said Causey.

He served as city marshal for over a year.

Texico still has a policeman - Deputy Marshal Fry Urioste.

Texico hikes its water, sewer rates

The Texico City Council Tuesday raised its utility rates, effective in February.

The rates include:
- The charge for a minimum usage of 4,000 gallons for city users increases from \$8.50 a month to \$11 a month.

- The charge for a minimum usage of 4,000 gallons for users outside city limits goes from \$12.80 a month to \$15.30 a month.

- For each of the next 2,000 gallons of water used monthly by either city users or those outside the city limits, the charge will be \$1.15 per 1,000 gallons, up from the current 90-cent charge.

- For each 1,000 gallons used by either city users or those outside the city limits, in excess of 6,000 gallons monthly, the charge will be 75 cents per 1,000 gallons, up from the current 50-cent rate. This would mostly affect Texico Schools.

- The sewer rate will be a minimum \$4.65 a month, up from the current \$4.

The city has cited a deficit in its 1990 water account, costs for more fire plugs and cleaning sludge from the sewer plant, and projected costs for a new well as the key reasons for the hikes.

In other business, the council:
- Formally dropped all plans for annexations outside the city limits.

- Heard Water Supt. Billy Hammit report that six water meters (\$37 each) need to be replaced due to freeze-ups. Mayor Doyal LaRue suggested he check with the Dimmitt officials who use meters with plugs that pop out when it freezes - and are repaired for only \$4 each.

- Scheduled a special meeting at 6:30 p.m. Jan. 15 at City Hall to meet with Roy Weston engineering firm representatives to discuss the approach to solving the water well crisis. Texico currently has only one well operational. Also at this meeting, rules for groups using the Texico community building (its cleanup) will be a topic.

- Denied a request to place a mobile home at 409 Griffin St. City Clerk Treasurer Marie

Christian said she sent out 12 letters to nearby property owners asking if they had any objections to it. She said she received six responses, all objecting.

- Noted that City Marshal Walt Causey had left the community Monday. Otherwise, no action was taken.

- Met in executive session to discuss the possible purchase of more land for the cemetery and for personnel.

Farwell moves to purchase new fire truck

The Farwell City Council Tuesday gave city Fire Chief Joel White the go-ahead to seek bids for a new fire truck.

He was authorized to check on both plans to buy a new pumper and also to lease-purchase one.

At the meeting, White said one bid for a lease-purchase plan he had already gotten was for \$116,000.

Parmer County help toward buying the truck was discussed. City Clerk Cynthia Thigpen reported that the county, through commissioner Robert White, gives Farwell \$10,800 a year for its fire department and ambulance service.

Joel White said commissioner White has indicated there are no extra funds available right now toward a new truck.

At a previous meeting, Joel White had been asked to show the areas where po-

tential "dead spots" were - those areas being least accessible to fire hydrants. He presented a map showing four areas:

1. Avenue H between 2nd and 3rd streets.

2. The extreme southwest corner of Farwell.

3. On the north side of the highway near the Sherley-Anderson grain elevator (there is a hydrant on the south side).

4. On the south side of Highway 60 (the Tide Products area).

The council approved spending \$815 for a new hydrant near the grain elevator and asked city employees to report back on costs involved in laying water pipe to improve the other 3 situations.

In other business, Water Supt. Dee Hammit said that one of Farwell's 3 well pumps has quit working. He will check on prices for a small submersible pump to replace it this spring.

The council also:
- Bought a computer package for the city billing's system at \$7,943.

- Approved pay raises of 5 percent for regular city employees (and Teresa Jupe who does janitorial services). The minimum wage for part-time workers will be raised to \$4.25 an hour in April.

- Received two bids for the 1991 city insurance package - from Town & Country, Farwell, for \$11,391.60, and from Henry Insurance, Muleshoe, for \$13,171.25. The Town & Country bid was accepted.

- Heard a request from Mona Hardage to place a mobile home near Farwell Fertilizer. The variance hearing will be Jan. 22. It's not a fire zoned area.

Named to first team offense were: Josh Autrey, running back; Benjy McDaniel, quarterback; Kenny Shaw, end; Hector Orozco, kicker, Rusty Foreman and Dwayne Hamilton, linemen.

Hamilton and Foreman also were first team defensive picks.

On the second team were these Wolverines: McDaniel, Shaw and Orozco in the secondary; Tom Derouin and Josefre Gonzales on the offensive line and Warren Martin at defensive end.

The Texico Wolverines will face a much improved Elida team compared to the last time they played. The teams collide at Texico Homecoming Saturday.

One of Floyd's best players has recently transferred to Elida. Also many of Elida's younger players have matured, and they are winning some games.

On the other hand, Texico should be back up to full strength.

Lawrence Bryant

Rev. Lawrence Bryant Sr., who was the founding pastor of the New Light Baptist Church in Farwell in 1961, died Dec. 20.

The church began in his home. He gave the church its name and pastored for more than 12 years here.

He was born Dec. 2, 1921, in Aberdeen, N.C., to Robert and Dora Bryant.

He served in the U.S. Army. He received a degree in theology from Paul Quinn College, Waco, Texas. He was a carpenter by trade.

He pastored many churches throughout his ministry and was pastor of Mt. Calvary Baptist Church, Hewitt, Texas, at the time of his illness.

He married Gussie Lee Hughes, who preceded him in death. They had six children, David, Diana Brown, Lawrence Jr., Arnetta, Drake and Wilbur.

He later married Dessie Mae Dixon. He had 7 step-children: Lyndell Betts, Faye Reese, Ruthie Foster, Vernon Bland, Patsy Lewis, Linda Young and Johnnie Bland.

He then met and married his surviving spouse, Dorothy Bryant. He left a step-daughter, Mennie Horton.

Also surviving are 4 brothers and 3 sisters, Robert, Oscar, Johnny, Lemuel, Beatrice Norwood, Mary Brown and Doretha Bryant; and 42 grandchildren.

Texico adopts substance abuse policy

The Texico School Board adopted a new student and employee substance abuse policy Tuesday.

The federally required policy sets forth the conditions under which a student or faculty member may be disciplined if they are found in violation of the regulations.

The board also voted to spend the \$5,000 received from the Energy and Mineral Grant fund for a new set of back thermostats for the high school.

The board adopted the 1991-92 school calendar.

Members took the opportunity to ride in the new school bus which had just arrived.

During the Superintendent's report, the members received an update on legislative issues and items of interest to the board concerning collective bargaining, school insurance, and the new commer-

cial drivers licensing process which will affect the school bus drivers, and a possible property tax hike.

Vandalism

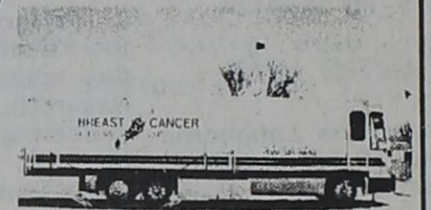

1989 Farwell burglary solved

Parmer County Deputy Sheriff Don Hatley announced this week the arrest of three Portales men in connection with the burglary of the Don Geries home in Farwell June 25, 1989.

Charged by the sheriff's office with burglary of a habitation were Scott Long, 19; Archie Aragon, 19, and Joel Green, 20. All three were indicted by the Parmer County Grand Jury last Friday and are out on bond.

Sheriff's Report

Here is the weekly report from Parmer County Sheriff Rex Williams:

On Jan. 3, Richard Pinkerton, 33, Hereford, was charged by the sheriff's office with indecent exposure. He was fined \$300, court costs and given 30 days in jail probated for six months.

On Jan. 7, Ramiro Ramos, 26, Frona, was charged by the sheriff's office with involuntary manslaughter. This involved a vehicle accident near Hub last November. Bond was set at \$5,000 and the case is pending in district court.

The following indictments were handed down by a Parmer County Grand Jury Jan. 3:

- Diana Lumbrera, murder and capital murder - two charges. (Earlier charges of capital murder had been quashed.)
- Delton Rando, sexually molesting a child.
- Jose Soliz, unauthorized use of a motor vehicle.
- Ramiro Luz Garcia, DWI subsequent offense.
- James Kenneth Wilkerson, DWI, subsequent offense.
- Ernesto Ortiz, DWI, subsequent offense.
- Scott Long, Archie Aragon and Joel Green, burglary of a habitation.
- Ramiro Ramos, involuntary manslaughter.

The break in the case came a couple of months ago. Hatley and Parmer County Sheriff Rex Williams had kept the case open and were continually checking on it.

This included having Hatley routinely check on past offenses with Clovis detectives. In custody at the time in Clovis was Green, who had been charged in a Clovis burglary, said Hatley.

Hatley said Green admitted complicity in the Geries house burglary to the Clovis detectives. Some of the items taken in the burglary were recovered at the home of Long. Also recovered was a shotgun purchased by a man who said he had bought it from Long and Green, said Hatley.

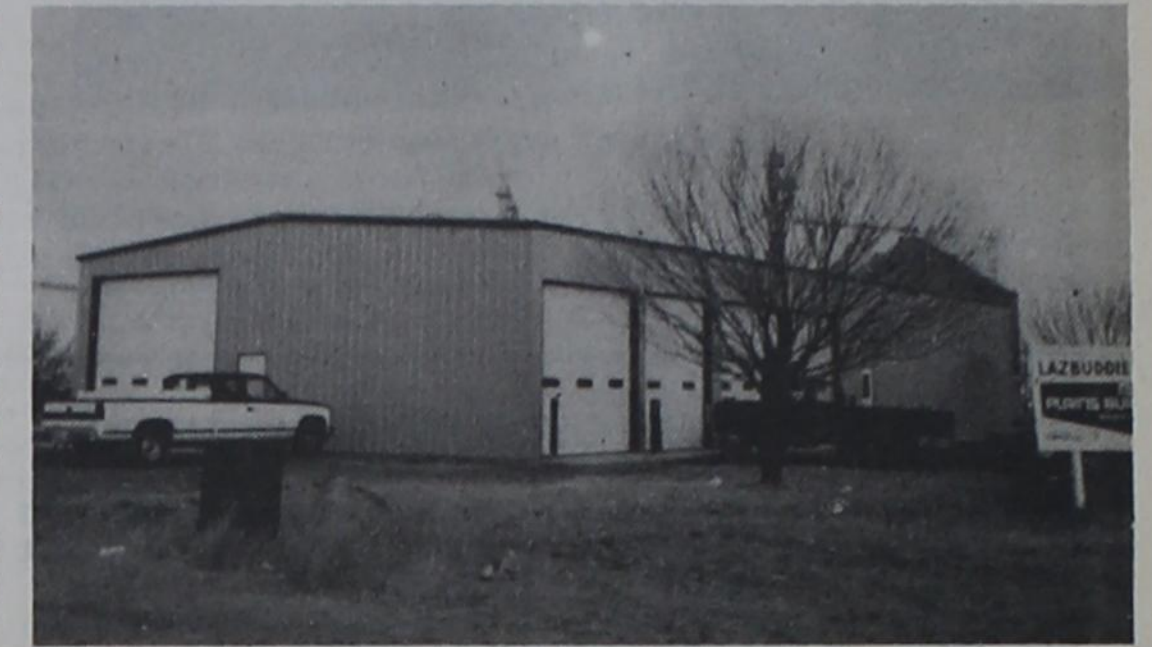

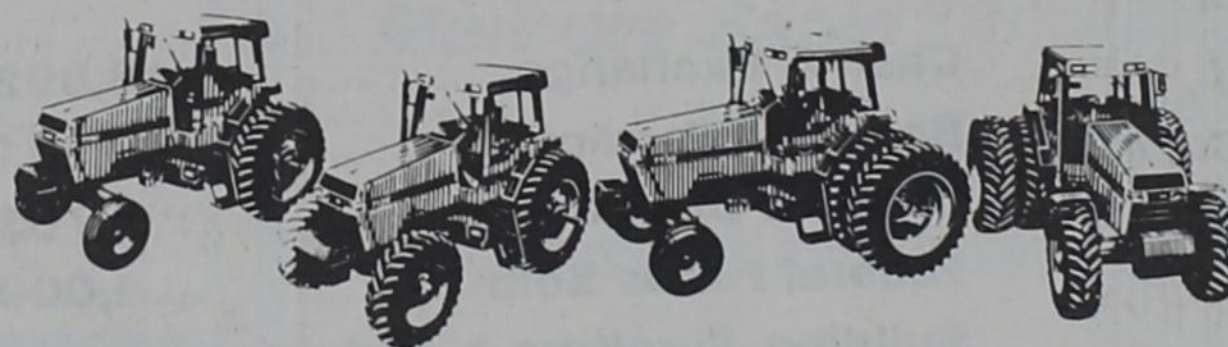

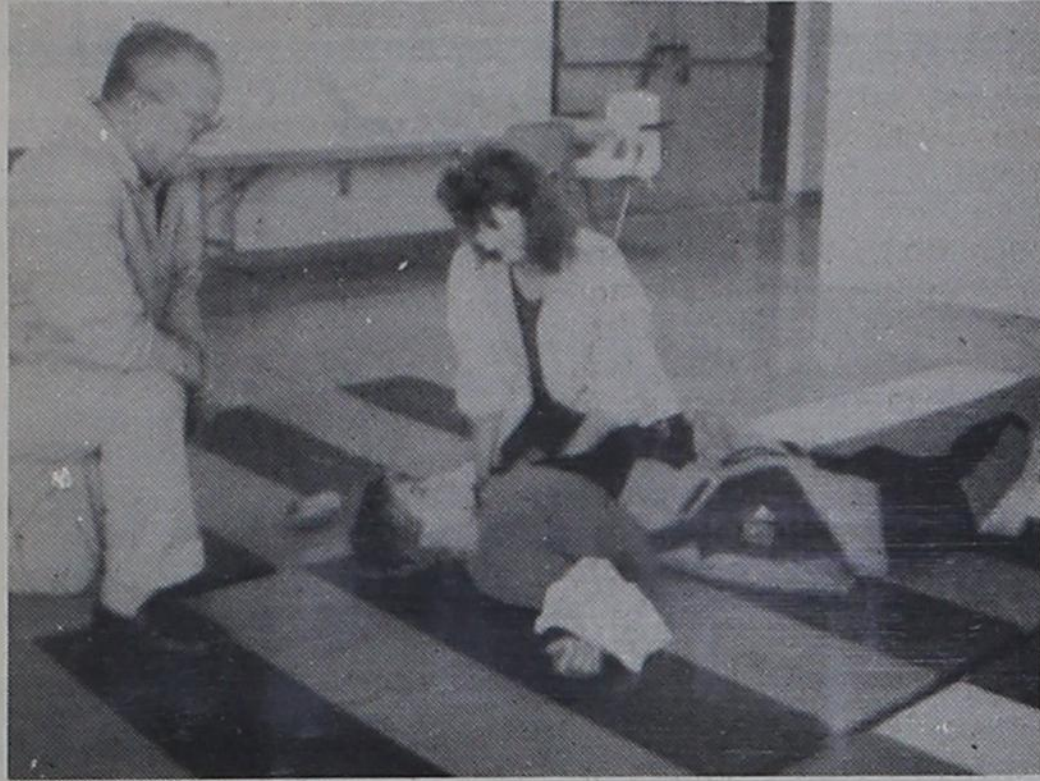

Capital murder charged

Three counts of capital murder were charged against Diana Lumbrera, formerly of Bovina.

On Dec. 18, the three charges of capital murder had been quashed at a hearing in 287th District Court due to a technicality. At that time, they were changed to charges of murder.

Conviction on a charge of capital murder means either life imprisonment or the death sentence. Conviction on a charge of murder means up to life imprisonment.

A jury trial is scheduled Feb. 7.

So at a Parmer County Grand Jury meeting last week, the capital murder charges were again brought, with a correction to remove the technicality (the name of the

Veggie time

Vaughn named Farmer of the Year

The Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District selected of Eric Vaughn as the 1990 Conservation Farmer of the Year.

Vaughn lives in Lazbuddie and farms near Lariat. He started farming in 1977 and has learned much about pro-

ducing high yields, while protecting the soil and improving his farm.

Vaughn protects his soil from erosion by using many conservation methods. First he practices crop rotation which utilizes high residue crops, such as corn, wheat

and haygrazer. In conjunction with these high residue crops he uses chisel plows which disturb the residue very little and leaves most of it on the soil surface. Preserving the residue has advantages other than erosion protection. The

residue on Vaughn's cropland also helps hold moisture, reduce compaction, and puts nutrients back into the soil.

The high residue crops and residue management provide adequate erosion control on all but 160 acres of his farm. On this 160 acres Vaughn has had more erosion problems due to steep slopes and a large drainage area. To correct the problems on this part of the farm he has build a basin terrace, the first terrace in a system of parallel terraces to be completed in 1991,

and a grassed waterway. He has constructed these structures with the assistance of the Soil Conservation Service through the Great Plains Conservation Program.

In addition to Vaughn's soil erosion control efforts, he also manages his water wisely. Vaughn has low pressure center pivot irrigation systems on all his irrigated cropland. These pivots have long drop nozzles which allow for very little water to be lost to evaporation, this also allows the water to be applied in a uniform pattern. Vaughn plants his crops on flat plowed ground under his sprinklers. He then uses a furrow diker in May or June. The furrow diker makes pockets in the soil. These pockets help hold both irrigation and rail water until it can be absorbed.

CITY OF TEXICO Ordinance No. 249

An ordinance pertaining to public utilities; prescribing the rates to be charged for water and sewer services; prescribing penalties for violation of certain provisions; and amending prior ordinances in conflict herewith.

Be it ordained by the governing body of the municipality of Texico, New Mexico.

Section 1. Recitals. It is hereby determined by the governing body of the municipality of Texico, New Mexico, that the rates presently being charged for the furnishing of water and sewer services are not sufficient to defray the cost of furnishing and maintaining such services, and that an increase in the rates to be charged to users of such services should be increased. It is further determined that the rates set out in this ordinance are sufficient to defray the cost of operation of the utility services delineated in this ordinance, with no excessive revenues being generated by any such rate increases for transfer to the general revenue account of the city.

Section 2. Water Rates Established. all prior ordinances of the City of Texico, New Mexico, are hereby amended so as to establish the following rate schedule for water users for those customers having access by water supply lines:

Minimum Gallonage	Rate Charge
Required charge monthly for a minimum usage of 4000 gallons for city users (i.e. those users located within the city limits of Texico.)	\$11.00
Required charge monthly for minimum usage of 4000 gallons for non-city users.	\$15.30 per month
For each of the next 2000 gallons of water actually used monthly by either city or non-city users.	One dollar and fifteen cents (\$1.15) per 1000 gallons
For each 1000 gallons used by either the city or non-city users monthly, in excess of 6000 gallons.	Seventy-five cents (.75) per 1000 gallons

Section 3. Bulk Waters Rates, Rules, and Guidelines.

A. No water from the city water supply shall be turned on by any person other than the superintendent of public works or some other person authorized by him to perform this service.

B. In the event any person or entity wishes to obtain water from the city water supply by any means other than the regular service provided hereinabove, such person or entity must obtain prior approval of the city superintendent of public works and meet any requirement of such superintendent to insure proper payment for such services and supply.

C. The rate for such use shall be Ten Dollars (\$10.00) for each 1000 gallons of use, with a minimum fee of \$10.00 for each tap of the water source.

D. Any violation of this Section shall be Punished by a fine not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$500.00 or by imprisonment for not less than 90 days or both, and each occurrence shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 4. Sewer Rates Established. all previous ordinances are amended to establish the following rate schedule for sewer uses:

A minimum user fee of Four and sixty-five/100 dollars (\$4.65) shall be charged. For each outlet exceeding a minimum of four (4), an additional fifteen cents (.15) per outlet shall be added to the minimum fee.

Section 5. Applicability. This ordinance shall apply to all individuals, corporations, or other entities operating in the city limits of Texico, New Mexico, or using the systems described herein.

Section 6. Effective Date. This ordinance is effective on January 16, 1991.

Section 7. Repealer. All ordinances, or parts thereof, that conflict herewith are hereby revoked and this ordinance is substituted.

Passed and adopted by the Council of the City of Texico, New Mexico, unanimously, this the 8th day of January, 1991.

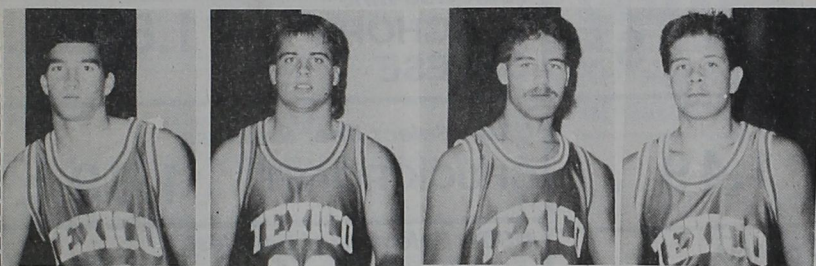
