## '911' needs ironing out

County and local governments in the Texas Panhandle are faced with the thorny problem of figuring out the best way to implement the enhanced 911 system which will provide speedy emergency service for the entire area.

Once implemented, the system will show the location from which the emergency call originated and directions for finding that location instantly.

The Parmer County Commissioners recently heard from Pamela Nielsen, a representative of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission, about its efforts to provide computer augmented dispatching of emergency vehicles.

The Tribune later contacted PRPC about its plans. According to the Gary Pitner, executive director of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission, the target date for implementing the Enhanced 911 is January 1992, but various systems within the PRPC's area may begin using enhanced 911 at different times.

He said that the fully enhanced system would tap into the data collected by local telephone companies to get the addresses that it needed in rural areas. He noted that counties would not need to have numerical addresses to direct emergency vehicles. It was his opinion that directions such as "turn at the old windmill," would make points readily accessible.

The PRPC would participate in the statewide effort to coordinate the efforts of the postal service, highway departments, telephone companies, and utility companies to come up with a workable rural addressing system so that emergency vehicles could be quickly dispatched. They would meet with elected county and city officials and with representatives of the other organizations to work out a complete system.

Local fire fighters attended the last County Commissioners meeting to try to explain the problems involved in responding to emergency calls in rural areas. Often they are called out in the middle of the night; rural areas are seldom well lighted. Finding locations in the dark is difficult. Emergency personnel must be able to find locations quickly and accurately. Lost time may mean lost lives.

The Panhandle Regional 911 Network will be made up of about 24 counties and 55 cities.

Coordinating the 911 system in Parmer County alone will pose some special problems for the PRPC and for local emergency providers.

In the southern end of Parmer County, service is provided by ENMR, 5 Area Telephone Cooperative, West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative, and GTE.

Farwell and some of the rural areas north of town are serviced from ENMR Telephone Cooperative in New Mexico. Those people who have 481 and 389 telephone exchanges but live in Texas will be in this category. Currently, ENMR emergency calls go to Clovis, but the dispatcher must be aware that they are serviced by emergency providers in

No one filed for either the mayor's post, currently held by Chris Gikas, or the two council seats, currently held by Prentice Mills and Yselta Kittrell.

This means that if a person's name is written in on the May ballot, that person will be elected, if they get the most write-in votes and if they accept the post.

If no write-in votes are received, then the council will fill the vacant posts.

### Lazbuddie School Board

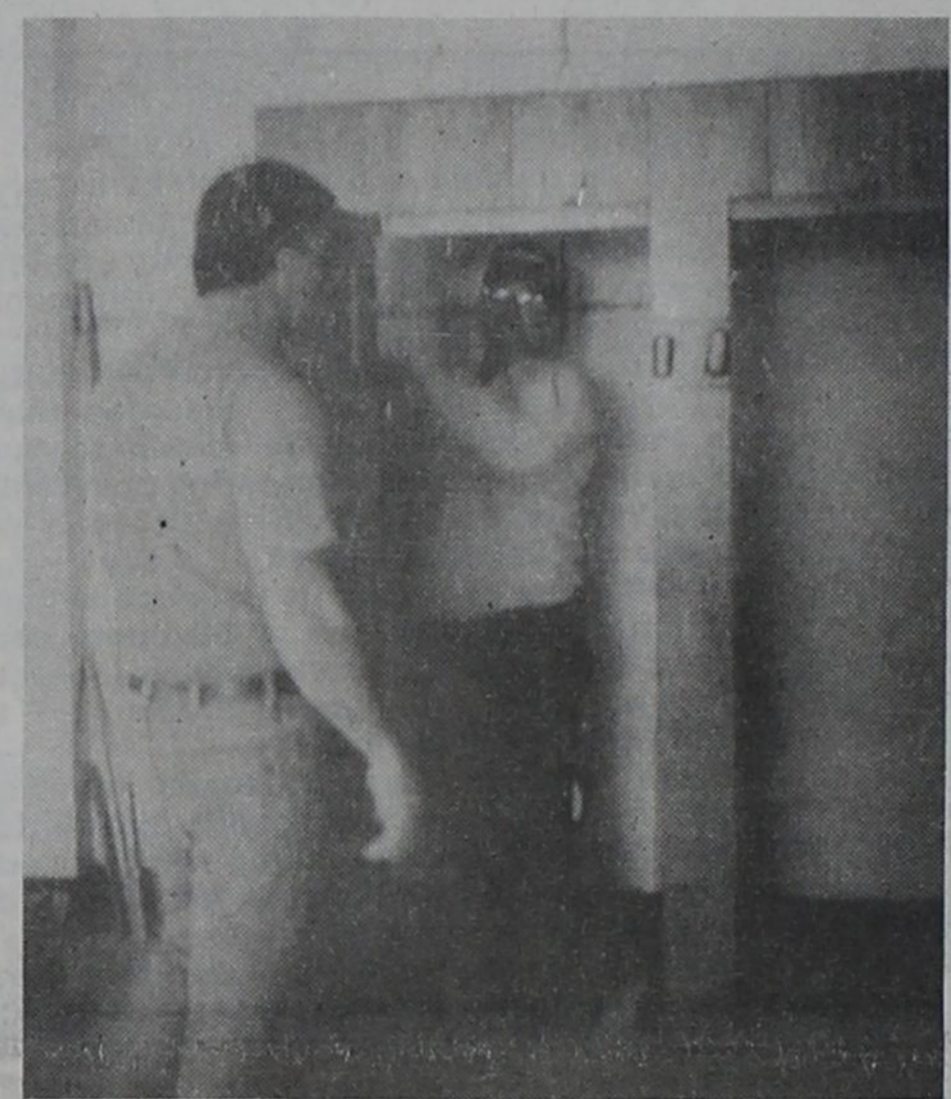
Six people have filed to run for the Lazbuddie School Board:

## Hearing set on 'district'

A step toward creating a new hospital district within Parmer County may be taken Monday.

The Parmer County Commissioners have scheduled a hearing at 3 p.m. at the Parmer County Courthouse to call for an election to create a hospital district for Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona.

If the election - which would take place this summer - is successful, it would encompass all portions of Parmer County not included in the Muleshoe or Farwell hospital districts. Thus, the new district would include Friona, Bovina, Rhea, etc.

The Parmer County Community Hospital board is seeking a levy up to 25 cents per \$100 assessed property value. Legally, the board can seek up to 75 cents but chose not to.

Also, after 1993, sales tax revenues could be used to help the hospital, also. The state cap is at 8 1/4 percent. Thus, the hospital district could have sales taxes within its jurisdiction increased to that level.

However, hospital administrator Phil Langston told the Tribune that hospitals are 4th on the state's priority list when it comes to adding onto sales taxes. Thus, a municipality could, if it chose, increase its own sales taxes to the 8 1/4 percent figure instead.

Langston said his board is seeking the creation of a hospital district to build a stronger financial base and allow the community to invest in the hospital's future. "We need more money for major capital expenses," said

Langston. He cited needs for a new roof, new x-ray machine and for more employee benefits to stay competitive.

Currently, the hospital is served by two physicians - Dr. Robert Alexander and Dr. Tracey Totten. In April, a Canadian doctor, Dr. Natasha Shaw, is expected to begin practicing here.

The hospital board has worked for two years to get Dr. Shaw to come to Friona, said Langston.

The hospital board officers are: Wendell Grissom, president; Dale Schueler, vice president, and Dennis Anthony, secretary - treasurer. The board's newest member is Keith Knight, mayor of Bovina.

## Lack of quorum holds up truck buy

The Farwell City Council had been scheduled to meet March 19 to accept a bid for a new fire truck, but didn't have a quorum.

Attending were councilmen Martin Kube and Gloria Hutchins.

The meeting was reset for March 26.

At the March 12 council meeting, bids were opened from three companies. The bids were given to fire department officials who were asked to make a recommendation at a specially-called March 19 meeting.

Texas, not by New Mexico.

Callers from parts of Lazbuddie and parts of Lariat are serviced through 5 Area Telephone Cooperative in Muleshoe. They will not be serviced by PRPC. Their emergency service will be coordinated with other communities by a different regional planning commission based in Lubbock.

Information received by county commissioners titled "City of Friona Public Safety Answering Point," indicates that emergency calls in Parmer County will be routed to the Friona Police Department. A secondary answering point will be established at the Parmer County Sheriff's Office. It is anticipated that service will begin in August.

The cost of establishing and operating 911 service within the region is paid through a service fee of 50 cents per local exchange access line. Farwell residents who look at their telephone bill will note that they already pay this 9-1-1 Service Fee as part of their telephone bill.

The Panhandle area will also receive funds from a surcharge on intrastate long distance service which is administered at the state level. This surcharge will be used to help equalize costs for areas that cannot be financed adequately from the local exchange access fee.

According to information given to County Commissioners: "Total plan implementation cost is estimated at \$1,615,360 through January 1992. This includes modification to telephone company facilities, non-recurring costs and 25 months of administration. Based on a 50 cent per access line fee, the network will generate \$882,882 in the two-year implementation period. Therefore, the region will require \$732,478 in equalization funds from the Advisory Commission on State Emergency Communications to establish the Panhandle Regional 911 Network."

In addition to coordinating the efforts of many jurisdictions and collecting the funds, the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission will provide access to resources that may aid in data base development and management as well as proper resources required to rural address the counties.

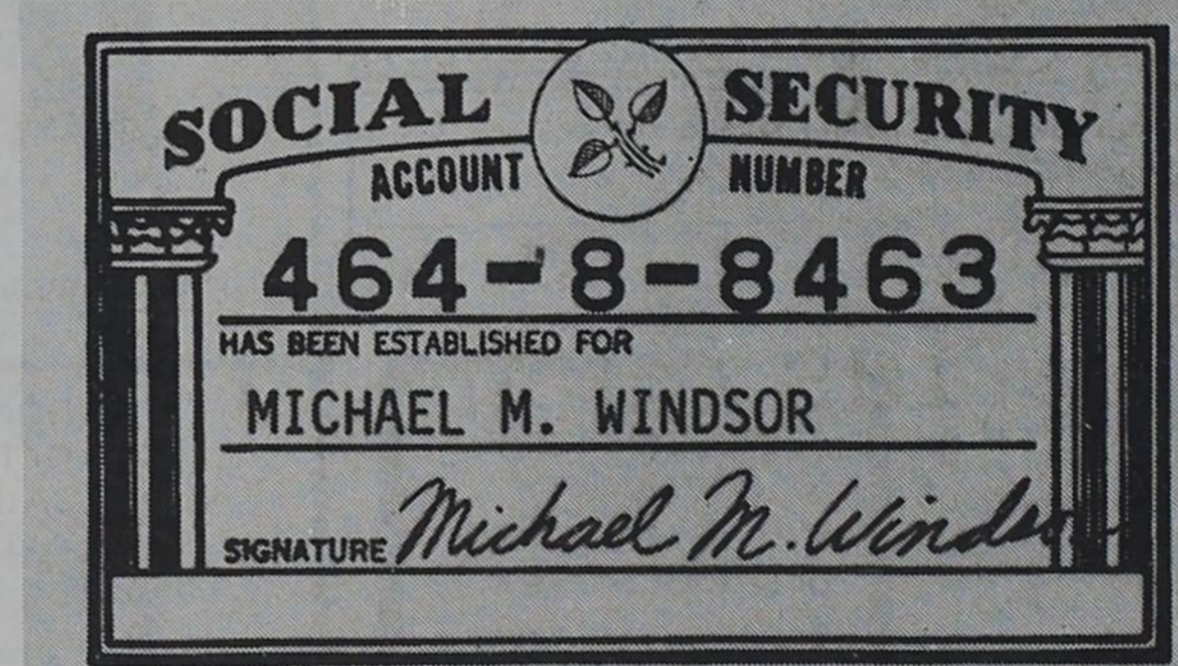

3/4 c. margarine, melted  
1 pkg. (8 oz.) cream cheese, softened  
1 can (14 oz) sweetened condensed milk  
1/2 c. lime juice  
4-5 drops green food coloring  
1 carton (4 oz.) whipped topping  
Combine pretzel crumbs, sugar and margarine in a food processor or mixing bowl; mix well. Press firmly into bottom and up the sides of to the rim of a 9" pie plate; chill. In food processor or mixer, beat cheese until fluffy. Gradually beat in milk, lime juice, and coloring. Beat until smooth. Fold in whipped topping. Pour into prepared crust. Chill approximately one hour until firm.

Note: Unsalted pretzels may be used if a less salty crust is desired. The food processor may be used to make pretzel crumbs.

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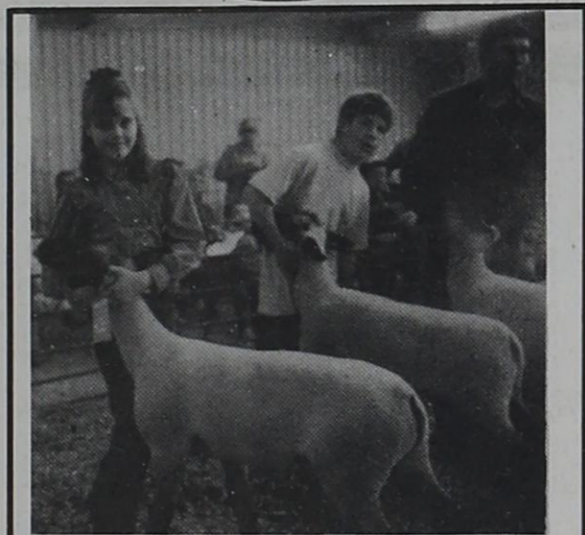

# Water needed

Parmer County producers within High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 need from 2 to 10 inches of water to bring the 5-foot root zone soil profile to field capacity before the start of 1991 spring planting, according to soil moisture survey data released by the Water District and the U.S. Department of Agriculture Conservation Service.

"The annual soil moisture survey results are meant to inform irrigators about general soil moisture availability and deficit conditions across the Water District's 15-county service area," says Wilfred E. "Willie" Crenwelge, USDA-SCS Soil Scientist. "Using this information, irrigators can estimate the amount of water needed during pre-plant irrigation to bring their soil to field capacity without over-irrigating or under irrigating."

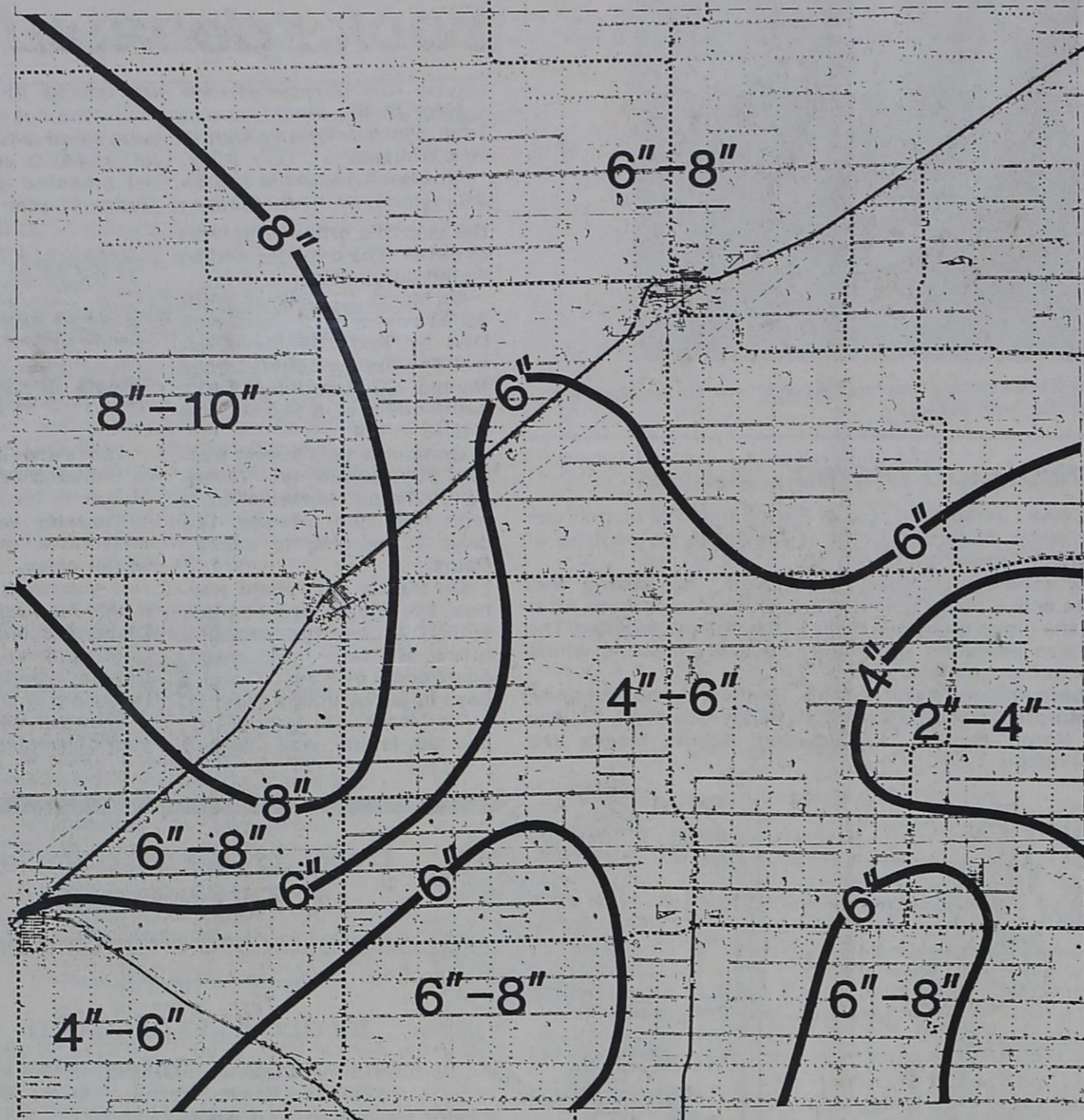
Soil moisture conditions within the Water District were tested from Nov. 12 - Jan. 15 at 249 soil moisture monitoring sites. Soil moisture readings are taken by lowering a neutron probe into a permanently-installed aluminum access tube at each site. These sites are chosen based upon the soil type, the crop produced, and the saturated thickness of the Ogallala Aquifer, which influences water well yields variations. Each soil moisture monitoring site represents typical field conditions near the location.

Pre-plant soil moisture conditions play an important role in determining crop yields. Historical data indicates that above average crop yields are produced in the Texas High Plains area when the root zone of the soil is near field capacity at planting.

Any precipitation received and/or irrigation applied between now and planting season will improve soil moisture conditions and enhance crop yield prospects.

"Producers using conventional tillage practices expose the plow layer to air drying, and as a result, the soil requires additional moisture to overcome the soil moisture deficit. Farmers who use minimum tillage, or no tillage at all, experience less soil moisture loss from the plow layer than farmers who use traditional tillage methods."

Since the soil moisture monitoring survey reflects general soil moisture trends within the District, Crenwelge says it is important for producers to remember that soil moisture deficits can vary from field to field.
