Jana was a member of the Lazbuddie High School Marching Band two years. She was a twirler two years, and a Band Officer this year.

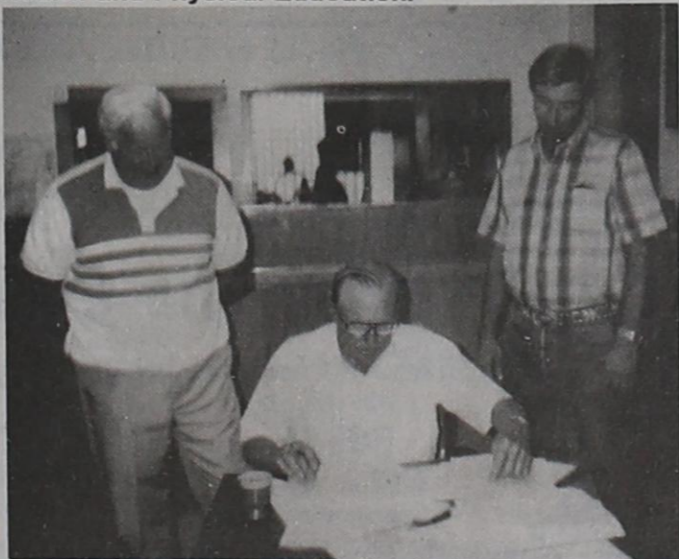

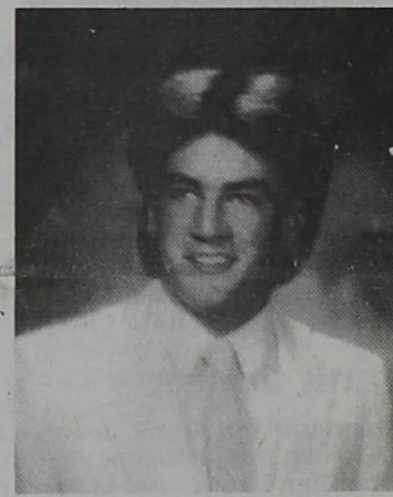

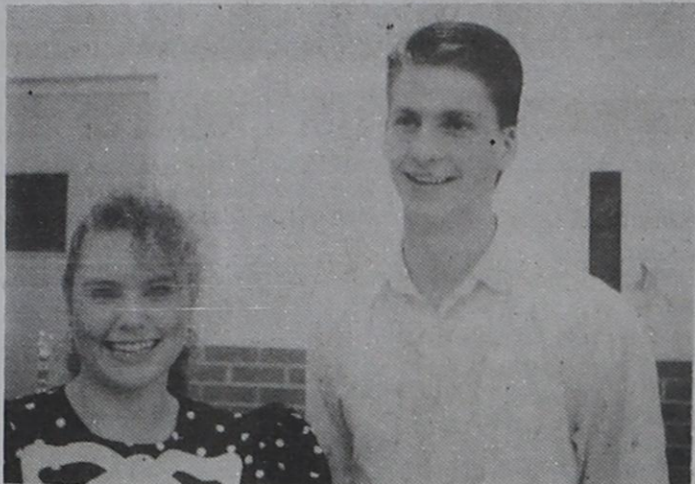

County Court.

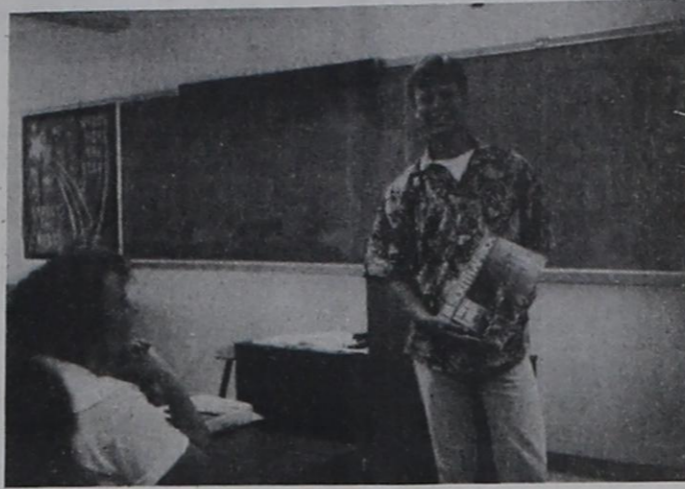
On May 28, Laura Brito, 40, Friona, was charged with DWI by Friona police. The case is pending in County Court.

He will resume his studies at Clovis High School in the fall, and he will return to South Africa in January.

Tailwater pits, modified play basins utilized here

About 1,444 tailwater return pits and 1,289 modified playa basins are being used to capture irrigation tailwater and rainfall runoff for reuse within the 5.5 million acre High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 Service area, according to a recent District inventory.

Deaf Smith County leads the Water District with 451 tailwater return pits, followed by Parmer County with 338 and Castro County with 309.

There are approximately 300 modified playa basins in Floyd County. Castro County follows with 263 modified playas and Parmer County with 186.

Excess irrigation water, or "tailwater," running off the end of a field has been a serious concern of District No. 1 since its creation in 1951. The primary cause of tailwater were furrow runs in

excess of about one - half mile which require large flow rates to literally "push" the water through the furrows.

In the mid- 1960's, the Water District constructed V-notch weirs and placed them in county bar ditches to measure actual tailwater losses. Flood gauges installed in front of the weirs measured the height of the water flowing through the weir. Signs showing the conversion of the inches of water passing through their weirs into gallons per minute were placed beside each installation.

The District's study concluded that as much as 20 percent of the volume of water pumped by an irrigator could be lost as irrigation tailwater. In addition, it was discovered that tailwater waste encouraged soil erosion.

From Clovis:

Foreign exchange student visits

Farwell High School students heard Robin Dauncey, a foreign exchange student from Stutterheim, South Africa, talk about his home land and his experiences visiting in the U.S. near the end of the school year. Dauncey is staying in Clovis with Glen and Cathy Adair. He attends Clovis High School.

Dauncey's home is located in the state of Ciskki in a border area near the independent state of Transkei. His family consists of himself, a brother, 10, and a sister, 17, and his parents. His dad, David Dauncey, is a building contractor.

Dauncey didn't experience much culture shock when he arrived here in the U.S. in January, but there was a immediate physical shock. It was 100 degrees in South Africa when he left home, and it was snowing when he stepped off the plane in the U.S. He likes the weather here most of the time, but "I hate the wind."

He noted that Clovis is more spread out than cities in South Africa. "Over there it's more compact. You use cars a lot more. You have drive-through banks and drive-in restaurants here," he noted.

School is a bit different here than in South Africa. Robin attends a boarding school at home. His normal school day begins with a hymn and a prayer, and he wears a blazer and tie daily.

"We don't have nearly as many electives," he says. "It's more academic." His school does not offer subjects like mass media or drama.

End of the year tests in South African schools are also more arduous than they are here. Tests are spread over 36 hours. They are usually essay exams which contain questions that require proof of mastery of a complicated topic. "You have to use the information you have learned to solve a problem," he notes.

Dauncey demonstrated a keen understanding of the political issues that affect his nation. Unlike American students, who are often accused of being apathetic about government, Dauncey understood the peculiar qualities of South Africa's system.

In his view, South Africa has made several positive changes in the past several years. "It's been at least 10 years that apartheid has been gone. There is no more segregation on beaches," said Dauncey. "What I get on TV here is entirely different than what I see at home," he says. "I've never seen a riot."

Dauncey notes that the differences between people in his nation are usually economic differences rather than social or color differences. "Europeans brought money and a monetary system with them when they came; the Africans were still tribal."

"Some people want the government to just redistribute the money; you can't just distribute wealth."

Dauncey notes that if a multi-millionaire were asked to divide his money between the people of world, it would amount to only a few pennies each. There are attitudes that must change as well for a re- distribution system to work.

"I believe in a free market system. You will always have poor," said Dauncey.

In Dauncey's opinion, the trade sanctions that the U.S. has exercised against his homeland have hurt the poor more than they have helped them. Things are changing, and "they are starting to reinvest in trade."

This is only one of the more recent changes in his nation. Intermarriage has been legal in South Africa for the past 5-6 years. "There are a lot of mixed marriages," he says. The school Dauncey attends is also racially mixed. "I have a lot of black friends," he notes.

He admits, though, that his nation is still very different from the U.S. According to Dauncey, South Africa has three very important laws. The Population Registration Act requires people to be classified by race. The Group Areas Act designates areas in which whites or blacks may live; there are also some gray areas in the open cities where people may live in mixed communities. The Land Act restricts blacks from purchasing land in white areas and vice versa.

Sorority meets

Recipe of Week

Easy Paella

This recipe is from the Campbells' Soup 75th Anniversary Cookbook

- 1 can (6 1/2 oz.) chopped clams
- 2 Tbs. vegetable oil
- 8 chicken thighs
- 1 large onion, chopped
- 1 1/2 c. regular rice, uncooked
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 2 cans Campbell's condensed chicken broth
- 1/2 tsp. ground turmeric
- 1/2 tsp. pepper

4. Stir in clams, peas, and shrimp. Cover; cook 5 minutes or until shrimp turn pink and opaque. Stir in lemon. Makes 8 servings.

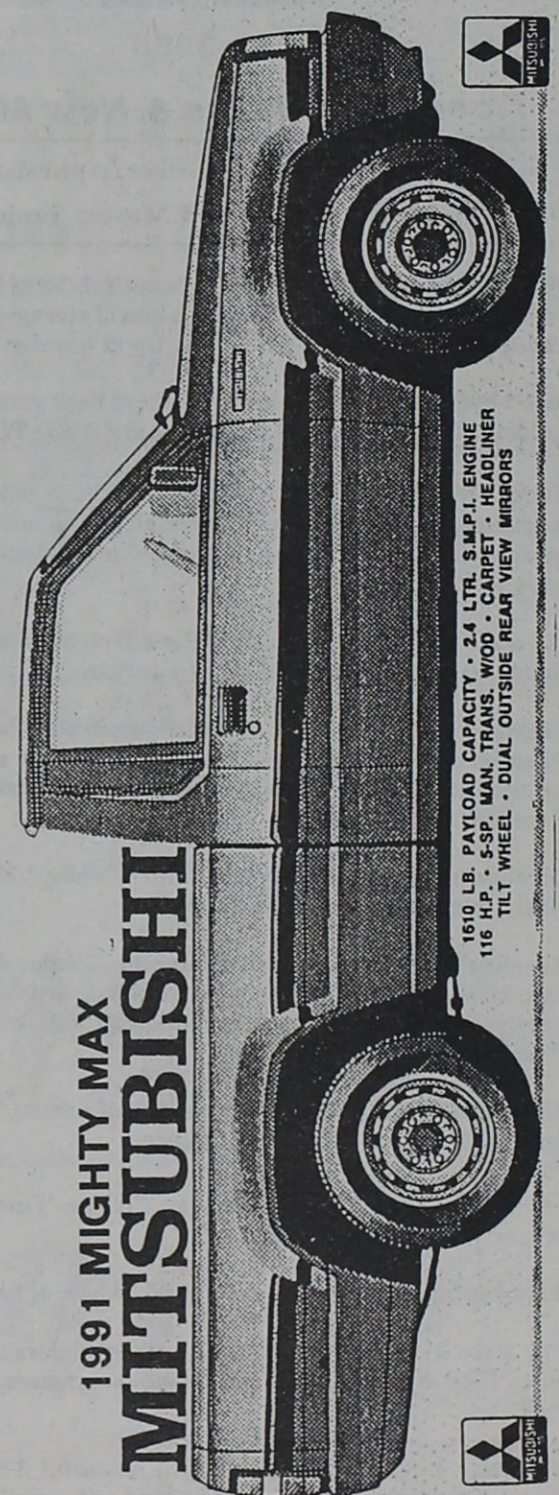


