So far, so good

it pleases me to say that I am very happy with the military aspects of the Gulf War thus far. In fact, it thrills me to see a prepared plan go into effect: first attacking rear communications and support, later going after the front line troops - as apparently is being accomplished as I write this.

That is exactly the correct way to do this militarily. And as I wrote last week, we need to continue bombing away until a goodly portion of the Iraqi vehicles and troops have been destroyed. Only then should ground troops be committed. If it takes 2 or 3 more months, fine.

I would like to see a flanking movement whereby the Allied ground troops aim straight for the Republican Guards, bypassing the troops on the Kuwaiti - Saudi Arabia border. Once the Guards are routed, the Iraqi army would fall like a house of cards. They are not ready to defend from an attack from the north.

And I hope we send a contingent toward Baghdad to find Saddam Hussein. He needs to answer for his treatment of POWs. After he is properly tried in a court of law, he should be hung.

So, from a military perspective, the Allies are in great shape.

But it's the political war that I'm more concerned about. Saddam has set himself up as the leader of the Arab masses. With his charisma. he has the ability to set the region aflame. Thus, it should be a high priority to destroy his armed forces and wreak havoc in his nation. He must not be allowed to emerge from this war as a political "victor."

We're not seeing that political part of it. We're not seeing on TV the rioting in Egypt, Malaysia, Algeria, Sudan, Jordan, etc., on behalf of Saddam. Right now he is a hero to many.

If the war ends and he still maintains that position, then it might only be a matter of time before a nuclear war breaks out in the Middle East with Iraq and Israel as protagonists.

I feel sorry for the simplistic minds of the folks who are marching for "peace" throughout the world. They don't have the ability to understand what a powder keg the Middle East is and how "peace" is not a quick fix. It would only be a prelude for catastrophy.

Once this war is over, the United State must push hard for a solution to the Palestinian problem. If the U.S. doesn't take the initiative. then an Arab state will.

I believe it's only a matter of time until Israel isn't the only nation in the Middle East with nuclear weapons. I believe that Arab states will be more open to recognizing the state of Israel (as Egypt and the PLO already have) if the Palestinians have a homeland.

I would like to see the West Bank, or at least a portion of it, be given to the Palestinians.

President Bush - who I believe has acted most admirably throughout the Gulf Crisis and War - has talked about a "New World Order."

The Gulf War gives him the opportunity to use it as a wedge to achieve more sta-

bility in the Middle East. In a nutshell, this war can lead to a most important peace. I'm afraid the alternative is the unthinkable. I just hope Bush can act courageously and forget the usual politics involved when the

U.S. deals with Israel. Am I being too idealistic?

Will it become 'Farwell, N.M.'?

Sen. John Morrow, D-Capulin, got the New Mexico State Senate to pass a "memorial" last week asking that the Texas - New Mexico border be redrawn.

The senate unanimously asked the state's attorney general's office to either negotiate a re-establishment of the state line or payment for more than 600,000 acres of land - including Farwell,

A memorial is an expression of the Legislature's sentiment and has no legal weight.

Frances Kube has a copy of "The Flamboyant Judge -James D. Hamlin" by J. Evetts Haley and Curry Holden, which gives an historical perspective to the boundary line controversy.

An excerpt is printed below:

"In 1846 when the Republic of Texas entered the Federal Union, the State retained title to all of its public domain. A surveyor by the name of John H. Clark was appointed by the Federal Government to survey and mark the boundary line between the State of Texas and the Territory of

New Mexico. "This survey started at the extreme northwest corner of the Panhandle of Texas and extended south for some 200 miles, and was supposed to follow the 103rd meridian. In making his survey, Clark veered slightly west from the true line as he proceeded south, until there was a strip about 3 1/2 miles wide at Texico.

"However, for 50 years the Clark survey was regarded as the true boundary line between the two states and vested interests in Texas had been based on the acceptance of the Clark survey as the true boundary line.

"In fact, when the State of Texas laid off what was known as the three million Capitol Reservation grant, and subsequently conveyed it by patent to the Capitol Freehold Land and Investment Company, Ltd., the Clark survey from its beginning at the northwest corner of the Panhandle, for 160 miles south, was accepted as part of the western boundary of the Capitol Reservation tract. Years later it was discovered that the survey was in error, and there was a good deal of talk about Texas having feloniously acquired a strip of land which really belonged to New Mexico.

"I went to Washington several times in an attempt to get a bill through Congress validating the Clark survey as a true and accepted boundary between Texas and the territory of New Mexico, but was invariably frustrated by Bull Andrews who was thendelegate to Congress from the Territory of New Mexico.

"Andrews had been secretary to Matt Quay, Senator from Pennsylvania, one of the most powerful men in the Senate at that time. Andrews had come to New Mexico for the purpose of exploiting its economic possibilities, had promoted a line of

Valley north to Santa Fe, and was securely entrenched in

political power.

"At that period, during the last year or two of Theodore Roosevelt's administration and the succeeding administration and the succeeding administration of President Taft, the Republican Party controlled not only the executive, but both branches of the legislative arm of the government. It was quite easy for Andrews to frustrate any measure which he thought might injure his political standing.

prescribed that the Clark survey should be validated, but I was never able to get such a bill on the calendar, although I had some rather powerful help from one or two Republican members of Congress and Uncle Joe Cannon, then



was apparent that New Mexico would be admitted to statehood, I suggested to Mr. John V. Farwell, Jr., that he go with me to Washington and see what he could do in bringing about the validation of the Clark survey. Mr. Farwell and President Taft had been classmates in Yale, class of 1880, and were very good friends.

"When he laid the facts before President Taft and submitted the cogent arguments in favor of our contention, the "Reason and common sense President insisted on having the Clark survey accepted as the true boundary and incorporated into the Act granting statehood to New Mexico. So ended this long and wearisome fight to secure a just solution of a very knotty prob-





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

5 Area elects Burch, Sowder

Kirby Burch of Lazbuddie and Mickey Sowder of Needmore were elected to the board of Directors of Five Area Telephone Cooperative Saturday.

Members heard good news at the annual meeting. Capital credits of \$5,658,032 are to be distributed this year.

The ratio of ownership of the company is now 60 percent to members, and 40 percent in long term low interest debt

Five Area paid capital credits from 1984 this year. The normal payback lags 10 years behind the investment by members.

Ten years ago the local equity in the organization was -15

At the same time, the past couple of years have been exciting financially and technologically.

Manager Hubert Kidd talked about the exciting project to replace cables with fiber optic lines which may make some wonderful things possible such as the transmission of immediate medical information to save injured people, cable television for schools which would eliminate the need for some teachers; cable television, and automatic meter

He said Five Area hopes one day to provide cable television to rural customers, but it may take many years to do so.

He also talked about the exciting new technology in cellular telephones. "You carry it around with you. It's very mobile," he said.

Kidd explained why the transmission microwave towers were placed in Needmore, Levelland, Brownfield, and Tahoka. Five Area is too small to carry out such a large project by itself, so it must work in conjunction with several cooperatives in an 11 county area. They have plans for eight towers total.

Five Area is also in the process of transferring to a new computer system. Kidd explained that they must constantly keep up with new technology.

"We can't operate on yesterday's technology for tomorrow," said Kidd.

The computerized control center covers six counties in the Panhandle.

1999 saw many changes for Five Area. They will now have the technology for an enhanced 911 system.

According to Kidd, "Only one county in Texas is better than we are for returning capital gains." But, he warned the new state government will rework the state guidelines for communications. He does not foresee the customers getting as big a piece of the pie in the future.

Kidd stated that some time this year customers will be able to pick their own long distance carrier. Currently "AT&T is our dominant carrier," he said. In the future, subscribers will have the option to pick their carrier.

Following the annual report and election of officers, members enjoyed a drawing for prizes and lunch prepared by the Needmore Community Women's Club.







Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor,

If New Mexico has a problem with their present boundaries, let's go back further than 132 years.

Let's travel back through history to 1830 when the Texans first began the "road to revolution" to win the Texas land.

The land that Texans won at the end of their war for independence with Mexico included land in 6 present-day states. An early map of Texas shows the border to be just west of Santa Fe, N.M., and extended northward through New Mexico, Oklahoma, Colorado, Kansas, and Wyoming. Therefore, Texas was never a part of New Mexico, but New Mexico was a part of Texas.

This land is not only important to us today, but it's also important to the men who fought for it. Davy Crockett, William Travis, and James Bowie were three of the 180 men killed at the Alamo. At Goliad, Santa Anna ordered the execution of 330 Texas prisoners. In over half the battles the Texans fought, they were outnumbered 20 to 1. The cries "Remember the Alamo" and "Remember Goliad" were shouted from the hearts of Texans who fought to win this land from Mexico.

Furthermore, Farwell is located in Parmer County, which was named for Martin Parmer. In 1836, he represented San Augustine in the Constitutional Convention. In addition to this, Farwell is the county seat for Parmer County.

Farwell is also a section of a 3-million acre rectangle land grand in the Panhandle that was given to the Farwell Brothers in exchange for funds to build a state capitol in Austin. This land later became known as the XIT Ranch which makes up much of the history of the Texas Panhandle. Farwell's name, roots, heritage, and dealings evolve around Texas's history.

To New Mexico this is a dispute over 603,435 acres of land. To Texans it's not just a matter of land, but a matter of history and pride.
