Goodbye, MTV; hello, Fox

Gordon Smith, manager of TCA Cable TV which services Texico - Farwell, said the company won't offer MTV after June 30 due to objections over the channel's content.

"We have received complaints from customers about the channel, increasing over the last year," he said. "During recent contract renewal talks with MTV, we expressed concern over these complaints to them and asked that we be allowed to offer their service only to customers who wished to view it. However, MTV refused to allow us to offer the channel on a customer by customer basis."

Also at issue, said Smith, was MTV's refusal to include assurances about the channel's product quality in its contract. "When MTV came on the scene in 1981, the

channel had programming that was suitable for most viewers and thus could appropriately be distributed to all basic customers.

"However, by contract renewal time three years ago, the videos had become more explicit and our company asked for a product quality clause that would allow us to drop the service if its programming did not conform with community standards. MTV would not agree to this. We allowed the service to remain and now we get complaints over MTV content almost daily. Since the contract was again up for renewal, we had to make the difficult decision about offering MTV in light of their refusal to assure quality content now or for any future contract period."

On July 1, KCIT-Amarillo will begin appearing on Cable Channel 36. It's a broadcast affiliate of the Fox Network.

Higher gross receipt taxes

Texico looks for more revenue

The Texico City Council Tuesday began discussions on the possibility of raising the city's gross receipts tax.

Councilman Oran Jay Autrey recently attended a government workshop where he learned that Texico's rates

were the lowest around. Texico's is at 5.25%, while other nearby small cities its size are at 5.8% and 5.9%. Clovis is at 6%.

Tax hikes can go into effect either July 1 or Jan. 1. It takes about 4 months for the process to be followed. So if Texico votes a hike, it probably would go into Jan. 1.

If their is objection by local businesses to a rate hike, a referendum would be called for.

In other business, the council:

- Approved a contact with the Little League Association to provide water and electricity at the baseball fields for summer play.

- Heard Autrey note that the highway department has swept the highway in Texico "but what about the weeds?" The council will ask the highway personnel to cut down weeds; the city had been told that city employees are not to work on state highway property.

- Decided to seek someone to haul away the trash at the former city landfill that was collected in last year's cleanup drive.

- Received one bid for the city attorney's contract, from incumbent Duane Hamar. The contract is for 5 years. The monthly retainer increases from \$250 a month to \$350 a month.

- Heard councilman Ronnie Warmuth report he is checking on a new computer system for the city. For 5 work stations, he estimates the cost at around \$7,000 to \$8,000. He will continue checking on prices.

- Heard Hamar report he is checking on state moneys to help fund a second police officer's position. Once his questions are answered and a job description developed, the city plans to hire a second officer.

- Discussed a water drainage problem with Sheila Hall and Phil Black, who own properties along Turner Street near Craig. A nearby filled in ditch was blamed as the culprit. If the property owners can't work out the problem, the city will get involved.

- Hired Matt Meeks, Texico, as the new maintenance man.

- Scheduled a study session for mid-July to discuss personnel policy. City employees are invited.

Commissioners discuss work release program

The possibility of beginning a work release program for jail inmates was discussed by the Parmer County Commissioners Monday.

In such a program, some inmates would be allowed to go to their regular jobs during the day, but return to the county jail immediately afterward to spend the night in jail.

The inmate would pay the county for room and board. In nearby counties, rates are around \$50 a week.

A presentation was made by County Attorney Charles Aycock. No decision was made

as this is in the preliminary stages.

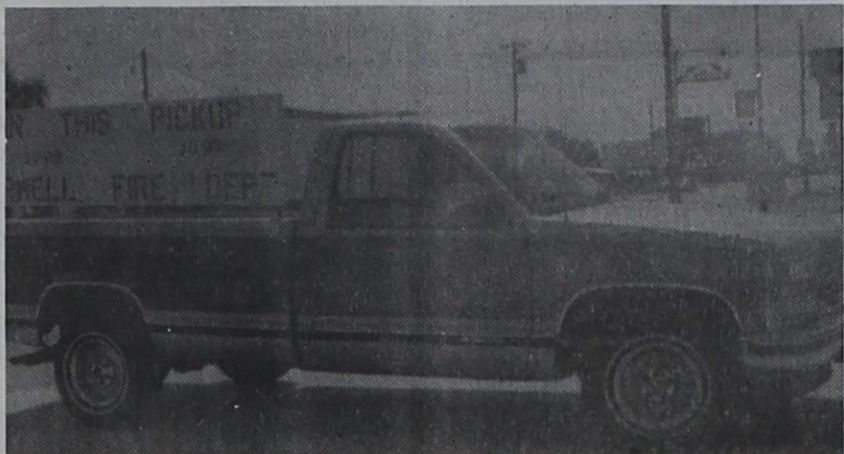

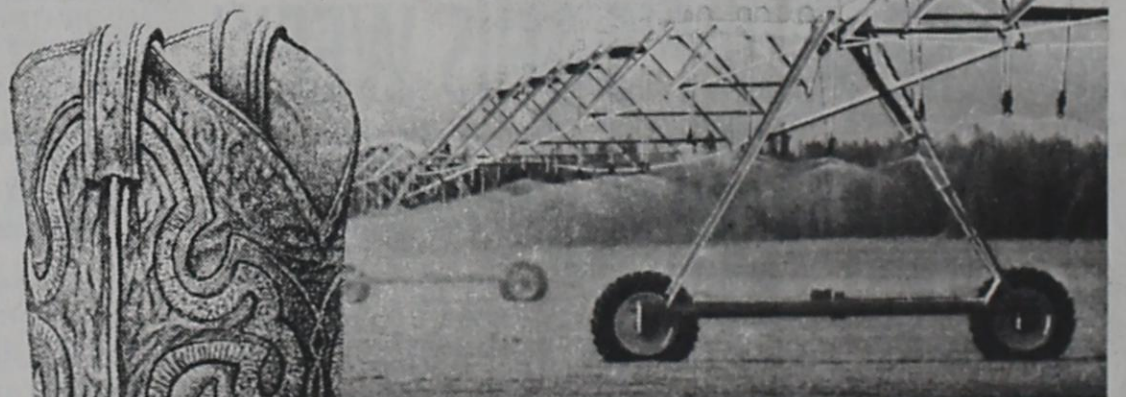

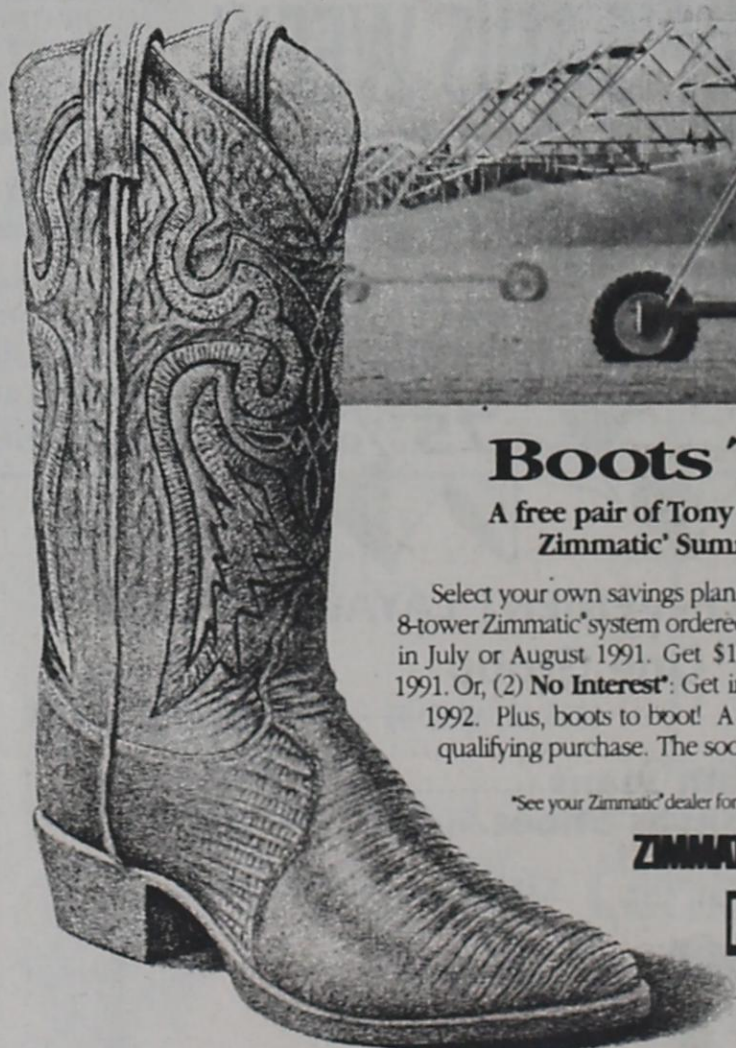

A critical assessment is needed

Once fields of weather damaged cotton are stabilized, it's time to make some tough decisions about re-planting. It comes down to making a critical assessment of what's left, says a cotton specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Two or three days after the damage occurs, take a heavy yardstick and walk through the field, suggests Dr. James Supak, Extension Service cotton agronomist. "Throw the yardstick out ahead of you. Where it lands, look at the plants and make a stand count right there," he says.

"Count only the plants that are going to be obvious survivors. Then make a note of how many are remaining per

foot of row." If there are at least 1.5 or 2 per foot, and there aren't too many long skips, "there's enough stand to leave at this stage of the game," he said.

If the damage was from wind or sand, "look in the terminals and see if there's growth beginning to develop," he said. "If the plant looks limp, don't count it."

"With hail damage, we also need to take a look at the amount of stem bruising," Supak said. A cotton plant, especially an older plant that's in the woody stage, generally will survive a pretty severe hailstorm if the plant has any viable buds remaining and there isn't heavy stem bruising below the lowest bud.

"Examine the stem carefully," Supak urged. See if it's been hit by a hailstone, if the bark's been shattered, and if the part below the hit is still in good shape and any buds are left there.

"By now, some of those buds ought to be activating. We ought to see green tissue developing in that axil between where the leaf is, or was, and the stem.

"That kind of plant has a good chance of surviving." The youngest crops were the most sensitive and therefore the hardest hit by storm damage. "They'll require the most critical examination," Supak said.

Trash contract renewed

The city of Texico has used a clause in its agreement with Waste Management of New Mexico to continue their garbage collection for another year, city attorney Duane Hamar said.

Five years ago, the city and Waste Management signed a 5-year pact. It contained a clause allowing for a sixth year if the city desired it, said Hamar.

The contact will need to be re-negotiated before it runs out in September 1992.

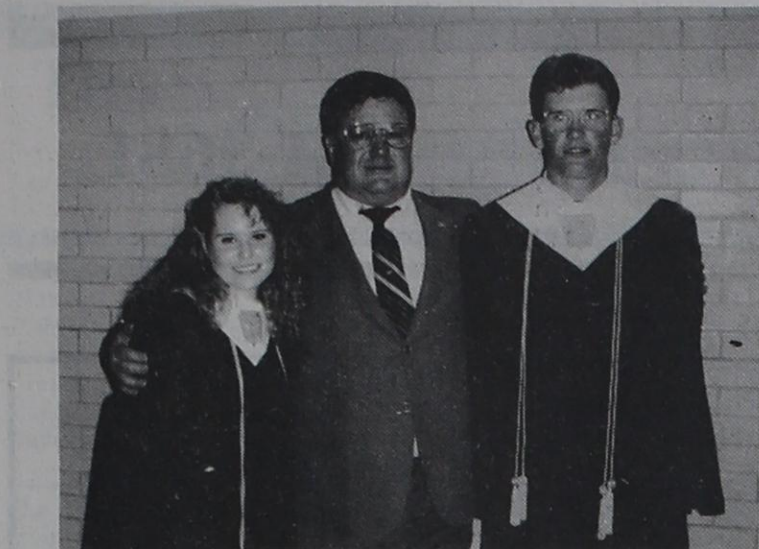


