I want to give credit to Farwell High Principal Larry Gregory for personally seeing to it that the Farwell High

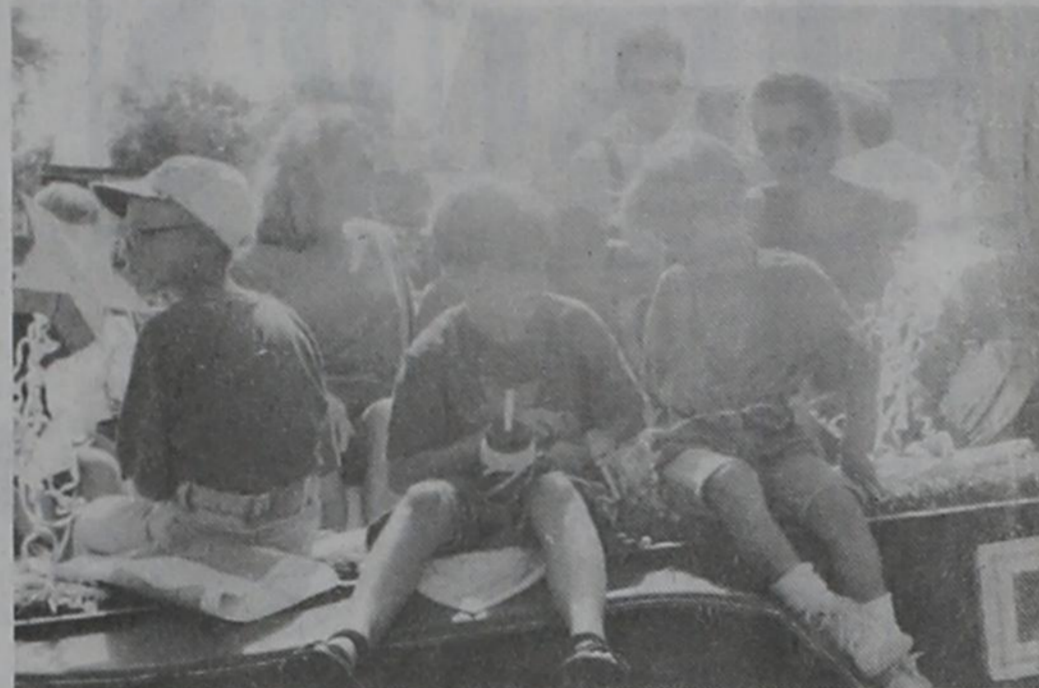

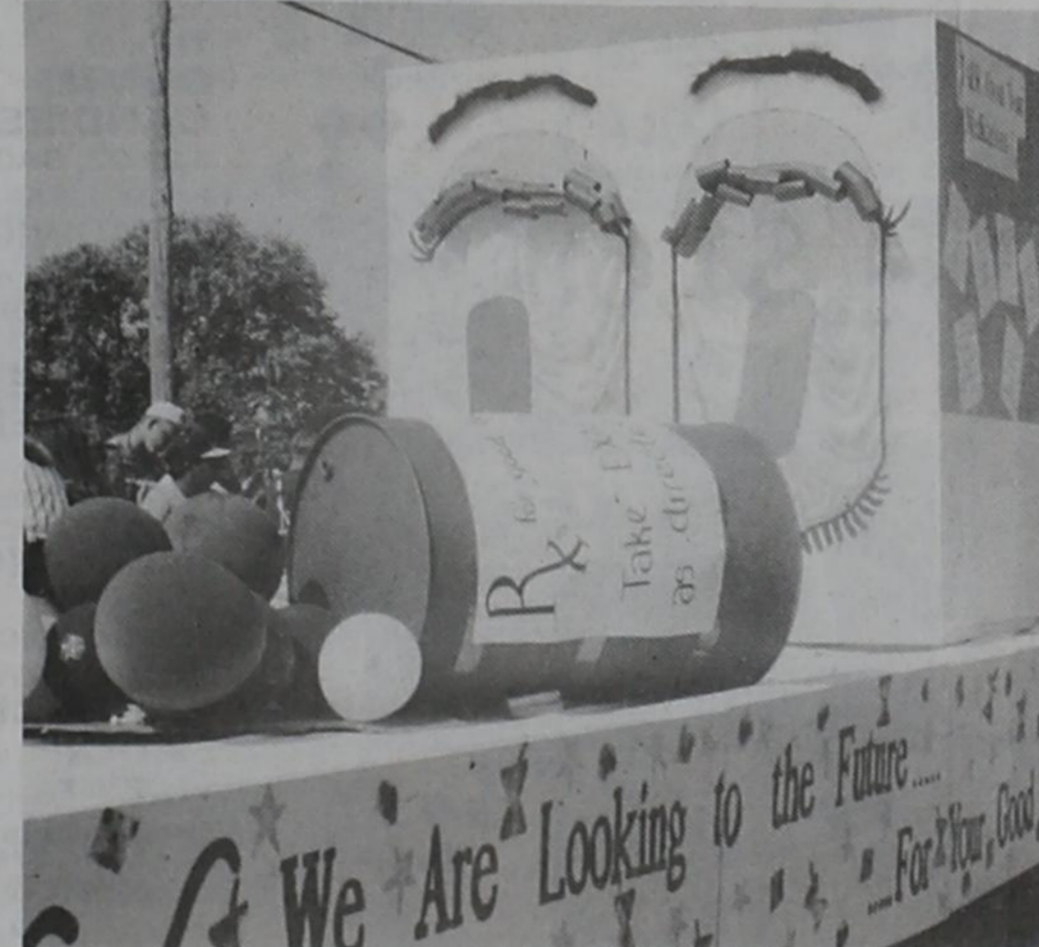

LaRue explains why he resigned

Texico Mayor Doyal LaRue has explained why he resigned unexpectedly last month, with several months left on his term. He had served as mayor 3 1/2 years.

What had led up to his resignation were confrontations he had been having with at least one city councilmen during executive sessions.

The council has been calling more and more executive sessions, from which the public is excluded, the past several months.

Executive sessions can be legally called for personnel, land acquisition and litigation.

What capped these confrontations was a special session called by the council late last month.

The State Line Tribune normally staffs all Texico City Council meetings. But no reporter was present at this special session because the Tribune wasn't informed of it.

All that is legally needed by the city council to have a special session is for the posting of a notice on the front door of City Hall.

Here's apparently what happened at this special session:

LaRue, who has been vigorously working on the city's water quality problems for the past two years, recommended that the city accept an offer from the state: the city would receive a \$40,000 state grant for one air stripper, and a \$40,000 no-interest state loan to be repaid over eight years for a second air stripper.

LaRue said the council voted 4-0 to turn down his recommendation. He said the council felt that the state should pay for both air strippers.

Air strippers are needed at the two city water wells to keep down contaminant levels within guidelines. The city's main water well, at KKR Park, was ordered shut down due to contaminants. So the city has had only one functioning well, at Lions Park.

The city recently purchased a site near the school for a new water well, which is currently being engineered. A state grant is paying for this well.

The contaminant, carbon tetrachloride, is a carcinogen. It is flowing from under KKR Park from northwest to southeast. LaRue also said citizens should take more interest in their local government.

I'm told that Joe Schell, another famous musician, played at BTD Saturday evening.

Once again, the message for concession stands was loud and clear: we need more groups to sell homemade ice cream.

One booth selling ice cream was sold out at 1:30 p.m., and another at 2 p.m.

Another person I want to give credit to is Richard

Carpenter. He came to see me a couple of months ago about starting a volleyball tournament. Then he went to work to make it a success.

It sure was. He had 10 teams participate, and I thought it worked out well.

Thank you, Richard, for adding to BTD.

The famed identical Medley triplets were at BTD this year - Winnie Nutt, of Clovis; Minnie Fleming, of Clovis; and Bill Medley, of Amarillo.

I again want to thank everyone for buying those \$2 buttons we hawk at BTD. That money allows us to maintain the standards we're up to.

For example, when I came here nine years ago, we

needed 3 portable toilets. But with much larger attendance, we now use five so folks don't have to stand in line. And that costs more.

And we use a better public address system so that the music and messages can be heard throughout the park. And that's expensive.

Those are just a couple of examples of why we sell the buttons. And I believe that all that BTD entertainment for just \$2 is a darned good deal.

This year, we raised a record \$697, up from \$660 last year. Our button costs are about \$240 - so we netted about \$450.

Thank you, all.

Stephanie Olivarez, who was first runnerup at last year's BTD contest, had a super talent - a dazzling dance, in winning this year's queen contest. She hopes to be a choreographer some day, and I bet she will be great at it. She plans to attend West Texas State and the \$300 scholarship money she won should come in handy.

The queen's contest has become a focal point at BTD, as evidenced by the large crowd that watches it. I was very happy to hear folks cheer as the contestants performed their talents. That was very good.

Folks always ask me how many folks attend BTD. It's really hard to give a good estimate because folks come and go during the day. The best I can give is between 3,000 and 4,000. Seven class reunions helped swell this year's crowd.

A really nice thing happened Sunday morning. There still was some litter left in the park - and some group cleaned it up.

I know that one class reunion held a picnic in the park Sunday afternoon, and I'm guessing they did it.

Health care students visit Farwell Clinic

A team of Community Health Care students from Texas Tech University visited the Farwell Clinic on July 28 to get some practical experience in health care. The students took blood pressure, pulse and blood sugar readings of patients in Dr. Kretzinger's office. They also visited the Farwell Convalescent Center and paid some home health care visits.

"The focus is on prevention," said Teddy L. Langford, who is on the faculty of the Texas Tech University nursing department. She spoke of the importance of diet, exercise, and proper home health practices in preventing many serious diseases, and in improving the quality of life for patients who already have serious problems.

During their visit to the Farwell Convalescent Center, the Community Health Care students observed the way that exercise can help patients to keep as many of their physical and mental faculties functioning as possible. They saw that games and music therapy help the patients to keep their emotional well being which in turn helps their physical well being.

Ms. Langford said that administering immunizations has become a state health care priority. It is very important for everyone to be immunized against the common, yet serious illnesses. All children attending school in the State of Texas must be immunized against several common illnesses.

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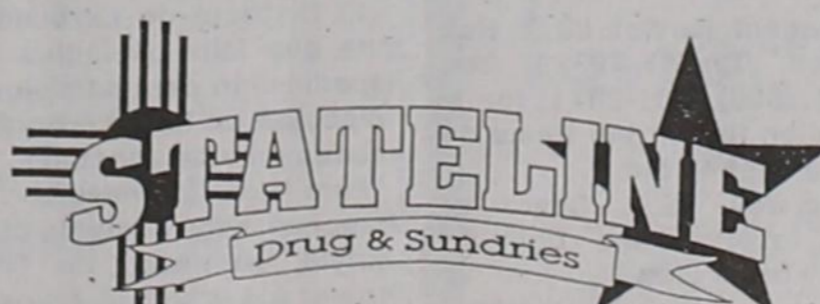

The Chief's Corner

by Roy McGaa

I was talking to a person the other day about a crime and this person said that if they testified, the criminal might get back at them. The courts take a very dim view of anyone who, in any way, tampers with a witness. The following is from the Texas State Penal Code:

Sec. 36.05: Tampering With Witness. (a) A person commits an offense if, with intent to influence a witness, he offers, confers, or agrees to confer any benefit on a witness or prospective witness in an official proceeding or coerces (intimidates) a witness or prospective witness in an official proceeding; (1) to testify falsely; (2) to withhold any testimony, information, document, or thing; (3) to elude legal process summoning him to testify or supply evidence, or (4) to absent himself from an official proceeding to which he has been legally summoned. (b) A witness or prospective witness in an official proceeding commits an offense if he knowingly solicits, accepts or agrees to accept any benefit on the representation or understanding that he will do any of the things specified in Subsection (a) of this section.

Sec. 36.06: Retaliation. (a) A person commits an offense if he intentionally or knowingly harms or threatens to harm another by an unlawful act in retaliation for or on account of the service of another as a public servant, witness, prospective witness, informant, or a person who has reported the occurrence of a crime.

An offense under either of these sections is a felony of the third degree. A third degree felony will buy you 2 to 10 years in the state prison and a possible fine of up to \$10,000. Til next time, have a good day ... Roy

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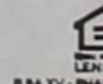
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Farwell band students to practice
