Too bad.

At the Parmer County level, I want to congratulate Jerry Stover and Randy Geries for the fine races they ran, even though they lost.

Stover attempted a near-impossible feat - a write-in candidate winning against

## Traffic pattern changed around Texico Schools

The Texico City Council Tuesday approved a request by Texico Schools to alter the traffic pattern around the schools to improve safety.

It will go into effect when the school system sets up its new barriers, until the remainder of the current school year. Then the City Council will take another look at how it worked out to see if the changes should be permanent.

The changes include:

- Making Katherine Street one way (going east) for the one block on the south side of the Educational Complex Building. It would be from 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. school days.

- Putting a barricade on Griffin Street just north of the high school so that traffic coming from the north must turn off earlier, like into the parking lot north of the Educational Complex Building. It would be from 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. school days.

- The one block stretch of Eunice Street, on the north side of the Educational Complex Building, would continue to be two way. But motorists going west would end up in parking spaces because past outlets would be barricaded.

The schools will maintain the barricades.

In other business, the council:

- Discussed a proposal to increase the cost of cemetery lots. It's recommended that a plot in the older section now cost \$125, up from \$75, and a plot in the newer section cost \$300. Action is expected to be taken at the next council meeting.

Also, the council is checking on the legality of requiring headstones at each plot. The headstones in the newer section would have to be flat, while both kinds would be allowed in the older section.

- Dropped its lawsuit concerning the former Westerner Motel. The city would like to see the ex-motel demolished due to safety hazards. But it learned that a nearby property owner planned to file suit against the ex-motel, and that would allow quicker action on it. So the city dropped its suit.

- Approved an ordinance involving collective bargaining. Texico's employees are now under a pact with the city. The option would have been for Texico's employees to be represented by the state, since all local governmental units must choose one or the other by next spring.

- Increased water main tap-in fees. They are: 3/4 inch main, up from \$75 to \$250; 1 inch main, up from \$150 to \$350, and 2 inch main, up from \$250 to \$700. This is for new customers. The city took action when it learned that they were losing money under the old rates.

Still on tap are proposed higher rates for water and sewer fees. Councilman Ronnie Warmuth recommendation that reserve funds be set up for both water and sewer funds was approved. The new rate structure will be studied further before the new rates are announced.

- Heard councilman Oran Jay Autrey report that a Clovis man has donated 6 dumpsters to the Texico

For that special feat, Via earned the first place cash prize of \$10.

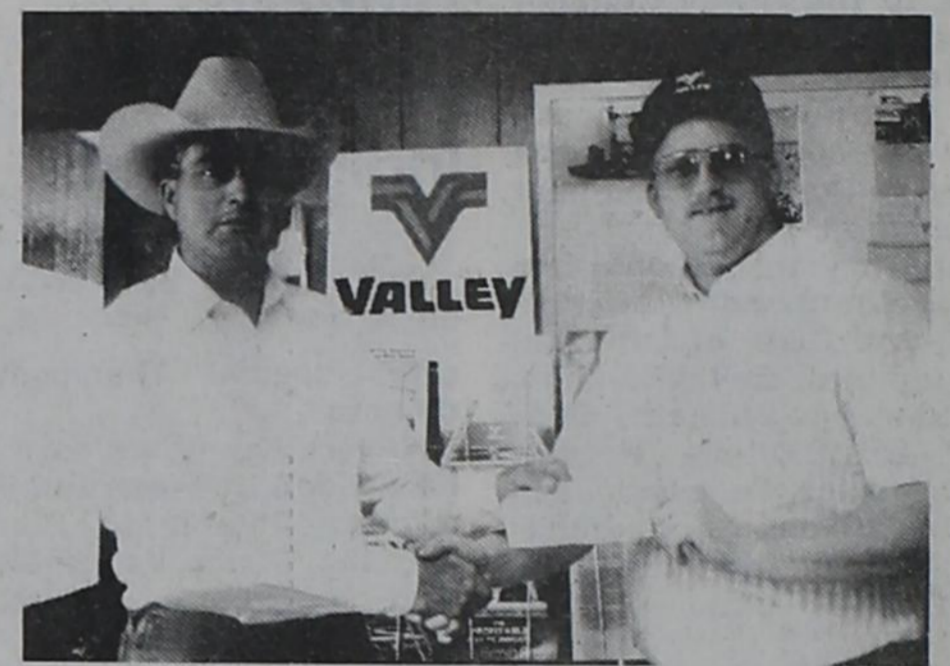

**Texico Schools approve personnel changes**

The Texico School Board Tuesday accepted the resignation of Evelyn Warmuth as a Chapter I aide, and made several other personnel changes.

LaWana Stone was transferred from the 3-4 year old class to Chapter I. Kate Griffith was hired as a Chapter I aide.

Mrs. Osborne was transferred from the 3-4 year old class to become a speech therapist. Two aides were hired to take over the 3-4 year old class, Bernadette Askew and Diana Grado.

Rhonda Harmon was hired to work with the 3-4 year olds and also as an algebra teacher for one class per day.

Christy Richards was hired to teach elementary special education and one class in the junior high school.

The board also passed a resolution to hold the school board election on Feb. 2. Seats held by Herman Geris and Janice Hamilton are up for re-election.

Those who wish to run for the school board should sign up at the Curry County Clerk's office on Dec. 15 between 9 a.m. - 5 p.m. mst. The final day to withdraw from the race will be Dec. 29. It is also the day to sign up as a write in candidate.

In other business, the board:  
- Voted not to seek matching funds from the state since Texico had already passed a bond issue this year to build an addition to the Junior High and since the 2-mill levy that passed statewide in the Nov. 3 election was voted down by Curry and Roosevelt County residents. "We wanted to try to keep the tax rate as low as possible," said Supt. R. L. Richards.  
- Heard a report that state funds had increased for certain

budgets. There was an increase in funding for transportation because Texico had extended the size of the school bus routes. There was also an increase in funding for the regional education center, RCC6 and also for Chapter II.

- Heard that the state health insurance premiums for teachers and staff had increased 9 percent and the out of pocket expenses for insurance had increased from \$300 to \$1,100. All schools in New Mexico are in this pool.

- Reviewed the new building program and other upgrades that are needed for the buildings. Texico will probably repair the roof on gym II this spring.

- Residents will receive the annual accountability report Monday. It gives the residents a chance to tell the school system their opinions.

- Discussed changes in the honor roll. There will now be a 12 point grading system. There will be an A honor roll and an A - B honor roll.

- Heard that the state may revamp the entire system for state classification processes for athletics and interscholastic events. Texico may adopt a proposal on this issue since it is on the borderline between Class A and Class AA under the current classification system.

- Adopted a special education procedure manual.

- Heard a report from Geris, Paul D. Barnes, Bruce and Byron Mayfield on the fall regional school board meeting that they attended.

- Nominated Texico student Mike Litzelman to serve as a legislative intern in Santa Fe.

- Hired Don Copley to fill the cesspools on school grounds.

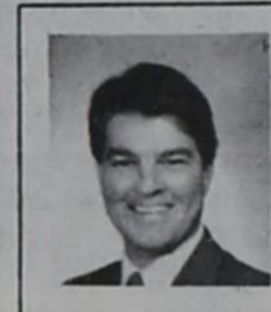

# Steers come from behind to beat Kress

The Farwell Steers ended their season on the upbeat last Friday with a come-from-behind victory over Kress, 25-22, in an away game.

Farwell finished the season at 4-6 - two more wins than they had last year. The Steers were 2-4 in district.

Farwell's district boasted three teams - Sudan, Nazareth and Hart - that were listed among the top 15 teams in the state. These three teams tied for first with 4-1 marks.

Farwell kicked off to open the game, with Brent Harrison tackling the returner at the 28. Farwell recovered a fumble on Kress's first play. Lance Anderson ran for 11. After a penalty, Harrison gained 12. Then Harrison scored a TD on a 15-yard scamper at 10:13. A problem with the snap on the extra point try left the score at 6-0.

Justin Mahaney tackled the returner at the Kress 28. Rob Pomper and Derrick Haseloff had good tackles and Kress punted to the Steer 30. Clint Austin had two runs for a first down, then another for 10 yards. Anderson scored on a 31-yard TD jaunt on a 4th and 1 play at 5:37. The kick by Clay Corn made it 13-0.

Nash Armstrong tackled the returner at the Kress 35. Justin Mahaney recovered the 2nd Kress fumble at the Kress 29. A pass interference call against Kress put the ball at the 15. Anderson ran for 6 and Harrison for 4. Anderson bulled over from the 2 for his 2nd TD at 2:18. The kick failed and Farwell was up 19-0 - still in the first quarter.

Kress started at its 33. Tackles were recorded by Michael Mendoza and Derrick Haseloff, while Shawn Haseloff broke up a pass. Kress completed a pass for 36 yards. Mendoza had another good tackle, and Derrick Haseloff sacked the QB for a 5 yard loss.

Opening the 2nd quarter, Shawn Haseloff broke up another pass on a Kress 4th down play, Farwell starting at its 37. Kress recovered a Farwell fumble but a run failed on 4th and 5, so Farwell regained control at its 30. Farwell was held and punted to the Kress 36. Justin Mahaney and Derrick Haseloff combined on two tackles. Shawn Haseloff intercepted at the Farwell 23.

Farwell was held again and punted to the Kress 46. Anderson had a good tackle, for a 2-yard loss. Kress punted to the Steer 28. Kress recovered a fumble at the Steer 31.

Kress hit a pass to the Farwell 16, then another for a TD at 2:54. The run for extra points failed and Farwell was up 19-6.

Harrison returned the kick 25 yards to the Farwell 36. Farwell was held and punted to the Kress 35. Pomper recovered a fumble at the Kress 33. Harrison made a fine 24-yard run while reversing his field but time ran out in the half with Farwell deep in Kress territory.

Harrison opened the 3rd quarter with a return of the kick to the Farwell 29. Nash Armstrong, a junior, was now in at quarterback. Ryan Williams, a senior, had quarterbacked the first half.

Anderson ran for 11 and a pass interference call against Kress put the ball at midfield. Armstrong hit Derrick Haseloff with a 22-yard pass at the Kress 28. A pass to Shawn Haseloff gained 3 yards, but a 4th down pass failed.

Kress responded with a 40-yard run to the Farwell 28, with Pomper making the tackle. On 4th and 2, Kress went for it but was stopped short by another Pomper tackle.

On offense, Anderson and Harrison moved the ball about 20 yards before Kress recovered a fumble. Pomper had a tackle for a 3-yard loss. Sean Haseloff broke up a pass. Kress passed on 4th down but it failed and Farwell took over at midfield. Farwell lost a fumble at its 35 as the 3rd quarter ended.

With 11:51 left, Kress scored on a 33-yard run. The pass for extra points worked and it was 19-12.

Anderson returned the kick 25 yards to the Steer 35. Anderson then gained a first down but a penalty stopped Farwell, forcing a punt to the Kress 44. Tackles were recorded by Derrick Haseloff, Armstrong, Harrison and Pomper as Kress moved downfield. On 4th and 8 at the Steer 14, Kress hit a TD pass at 5:55. The run for extra points put Kress up 22-19.

Harrison returned the kick 35 yards to the Farwell 48. Anderson ran for 9. Then Harrison broke loose around end for 31 yards to the Kress 6. Anderson ran off tackle for the 6-yard TD with 3:34 left. The extra point try failed and Farwell

was up 25-22.

Kress started on its 45 with Michael Phillips tackling the returner. Justin Mahaney, Derrick Haseloff and Pomper had tackles. Kress's final hopes ended when Harrison intercepted at the Steer 25 and returned the ball to near midfield. Farwell then ran out the clock.

Coach Rex Cumpston noted: "It was good to finish the season with a win. I felt like we showed some strong character when we got down late in the game and came back to score and win. I was real proud of our football team. Many people didn't realize the severity of our schedule this year. We played 4 playoff teams and the team that lost the coin flip in our district's 3-way tie would probably have won any other district. We had some positive things happen this year to build on for the next year. I would like to thank the community for all of their great support throughout the year."

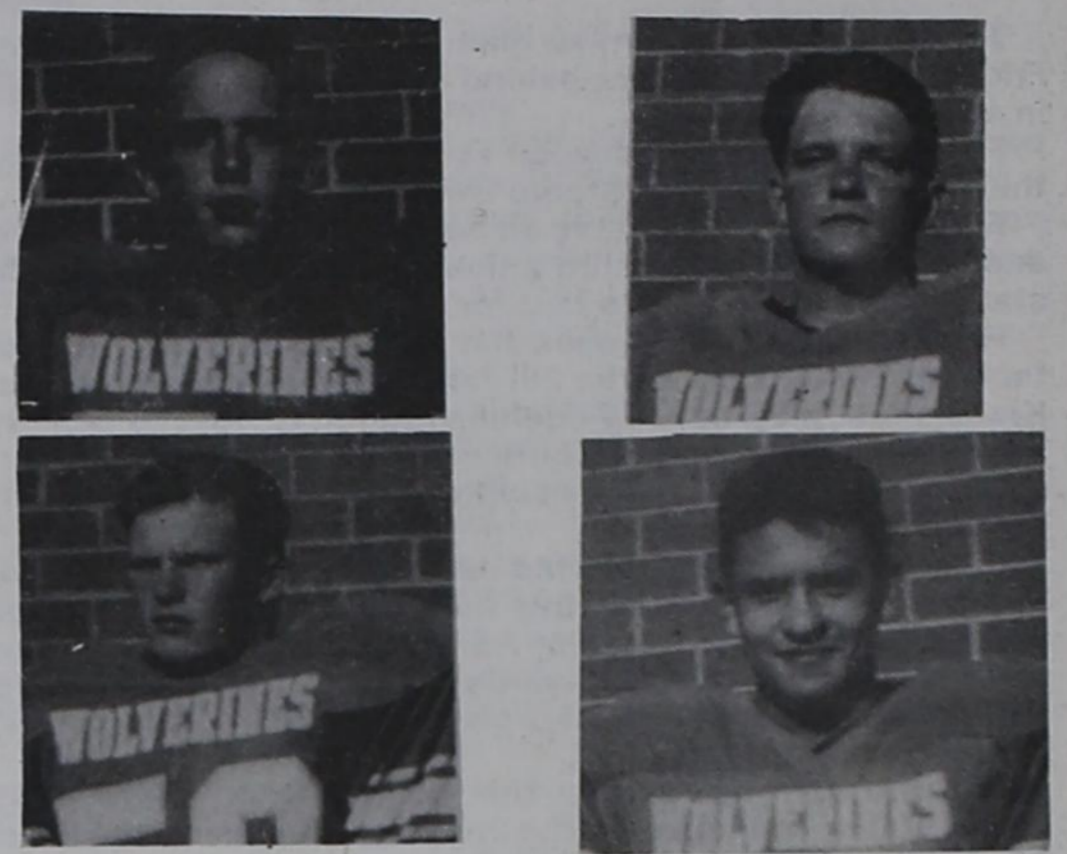

## Accidental discovery may end obesity

WASHINGTON -- Researchers may have discovered a way to end obesity --- by accident!

In a study by a potential cholesterol lowering agent, scientists noted an unusual side effect. Instead of lower cholesterol levels, patients receiving a natural plant colloid lost weight while body weight in a control group remained constant.

The scientists say the mechanism behind the weight loss is not clear, but suggest it is partially due to a decrease in the intestinal absorption of calories. Scientists in another study published in the *British Journal of Nutrition*, found that patients consuming the same colloid lost weight in spite of being instructed not to alter normal eating patterns. Despite this evidence, other scientists may not agree on the weight loss benefits of colloids. Someday, pending further study, there could be universal agreement that colloids are helpful in confronting the problem of obesity.

National Dietary Research, whose research topics have been the subject of articles published in recent medical and nutritional journals, has successfully incorporated a series of colloids into a chewable food tablet called FS-1. When used as directed, FS-1 replaces high calorie fats with lower calorie nutrients, thus providing optimum nutrition with a minimum number of fat calories. According to an article published in the *American Journal of Clinical Nutrition*, consciously limiting the amount of food one consumes is not necessary to lose weight, provided you limit the fat.

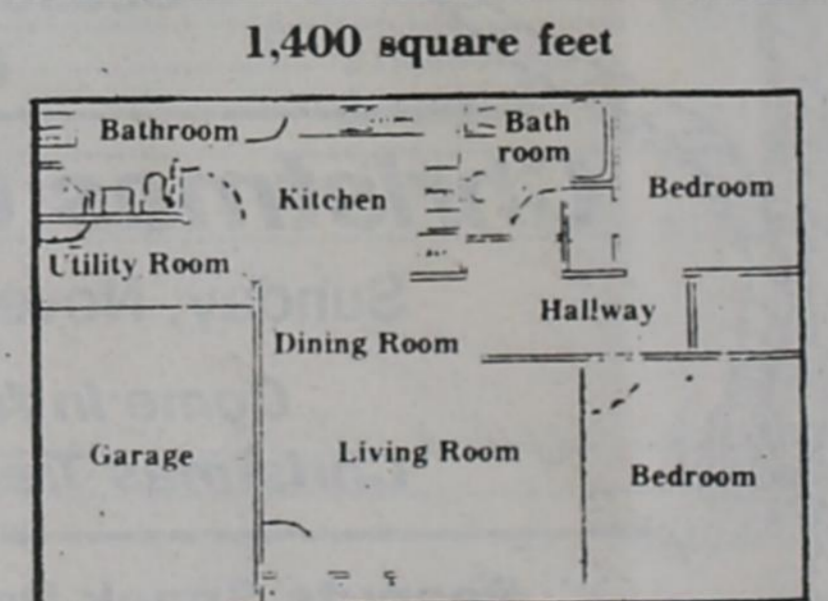

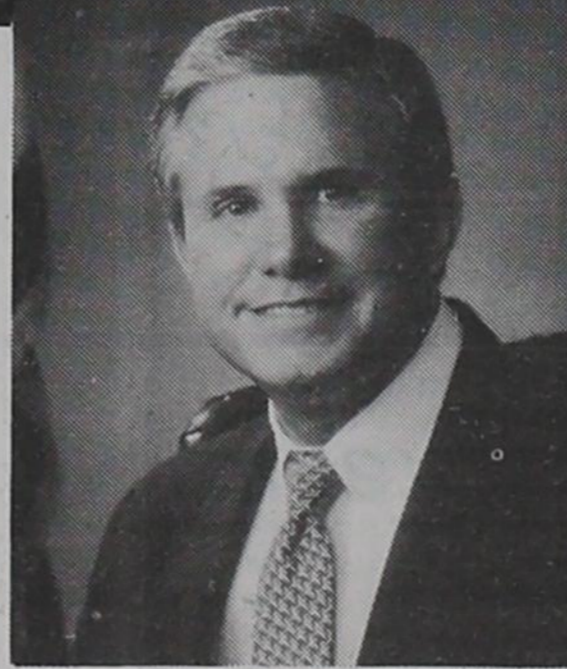

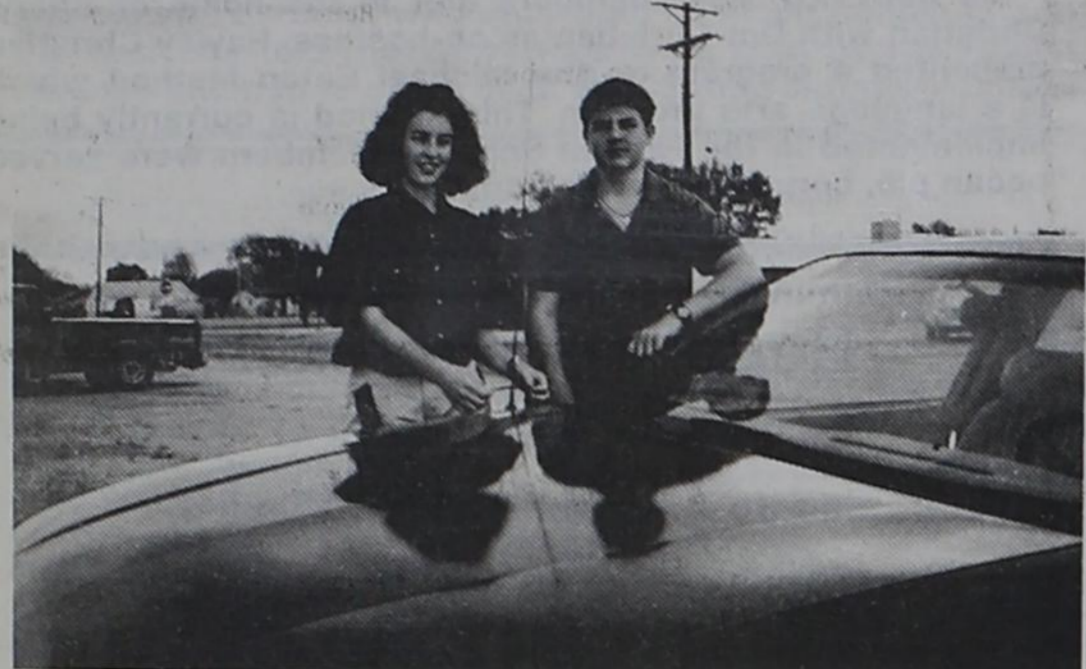

## Telephone companies worked together to get evidence

The West Texas Rural Telephone Co-op Connection recently ran an article about the way that West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative and other telephone companies including: U.S. West, GTE, Southwestern Bell and Five Area Telephone Cooperative helped to gather evidence that led to the arrest of three suspects in a series of bomb threats against the Excel Corporation in Friona.

The companies set up a phone trace that led to the arrests of three Clovis men on charges of making terroristic threats, a Class A misdemeanor punishable by \$2,000 fine plus a year in the county jail, in connection with a bomb threat phoned in Oct. 6 to the Excel plant.

The three suspects have pled not guilty to the charges, and are awaiting trial in Parmer County.

Eight threats had been received by the plant during an 18-month period. On each occasion, Excel officials ordered all employees out of the plant until it was determined that no bomb existed.

The telephone companies assisted with a telephone trace. They also provided telephone records that helped to trace the Oct. 6 call to a house in Clovis. While the call tracing effort originated with West Texas Rural Telephone, other phone companies were called in when it became apparent after a time that the calls were originating from outside of the immediate Friona area.

According to Jim Steiert of West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative, there was a lot of work done by the companies to get this information. Each time a phone trace is requested, there are legal formalities and paper work to be done in order to open the records.

The Parmer County Sheriff's department worked with all of the local telephone companies to gather evidence. "They all checked," sheriff Rex Williams. "West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative found it was a long distance call. Southwestern Bell couldn't find the calls from their records, but we found the call on US West."

Excel plant records show that a threatening call was made at 9:21 p.m. on Oct. 6, and records of two different telephone companies confirm the timing of the call.

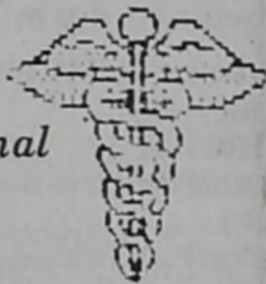

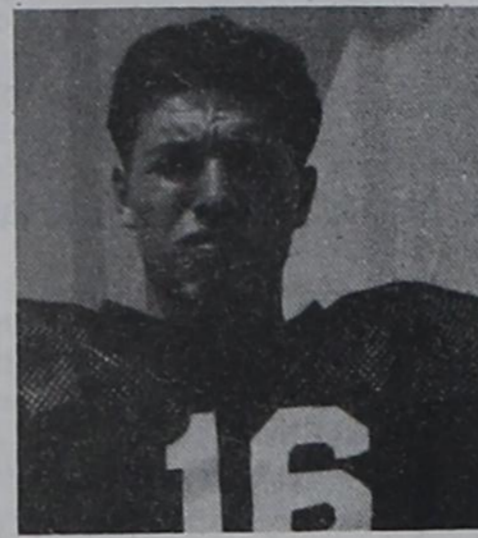
The second quarter was much of the same, with Lazbuddie outscoring Cotton Center 27-7 when play was called.

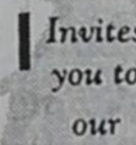

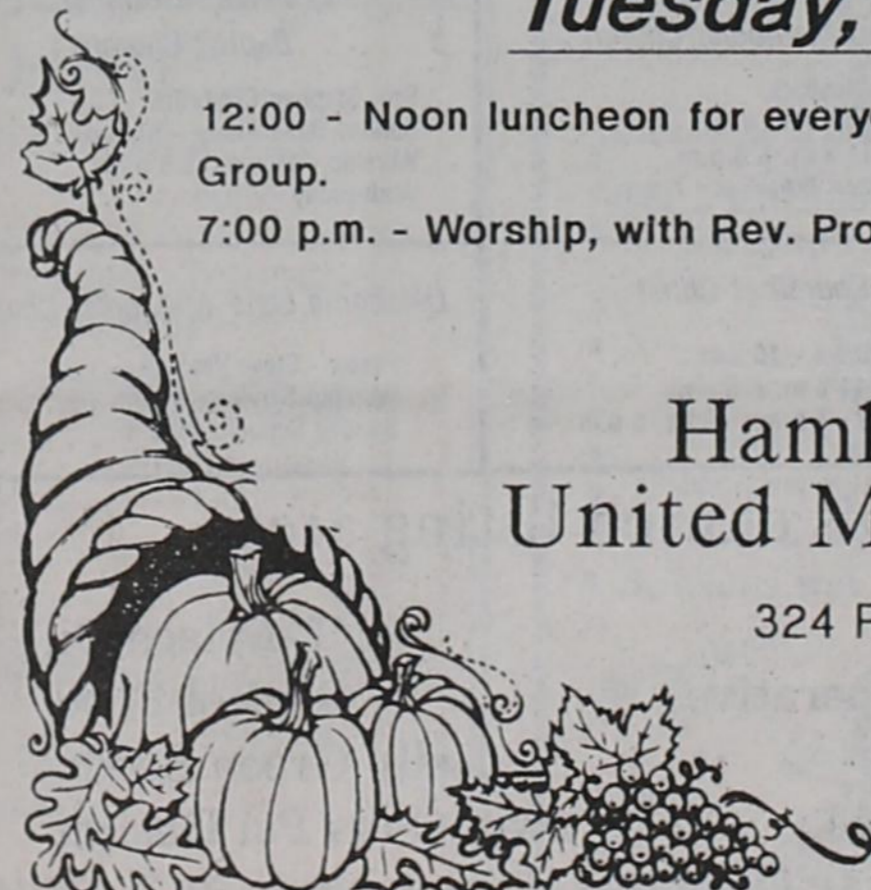

# At the Khyber Pass

*Editor's note: Will Anderson, a Farwell resident, is in the U.S. Navy and is stationed at the U.S. Embassy in Islamabad, Pakistan. He has written some articles from life there for the Tribune.*

*"When you're wounded and left on Afghanistan's plains,  
An' the women come out to cut up what remains,  
Jest roll to your rifle and blow out your brains,  
An' go to your Gawd like a soldier."*

Rudyard Kipling, Barrack-Room Ballads (1892)

With the cut-off of lethal and non-lethal aid to Pakistan which has been mandated by Congress, the USA is still attempting to maintain some type of relationship with Pakistan.

Part of this effort involves consultations between government figures and military leaders of both nations. I was the Coordinating Officer for a recent visit of Lt. Gen. Charles Horner, commander of the U.S. Ninth Air Force. This is also the Air Force component of the U.S. Central Command, and it was Gen. Horner and his staff which directed the bombing campaign of Iraq in last year's war.

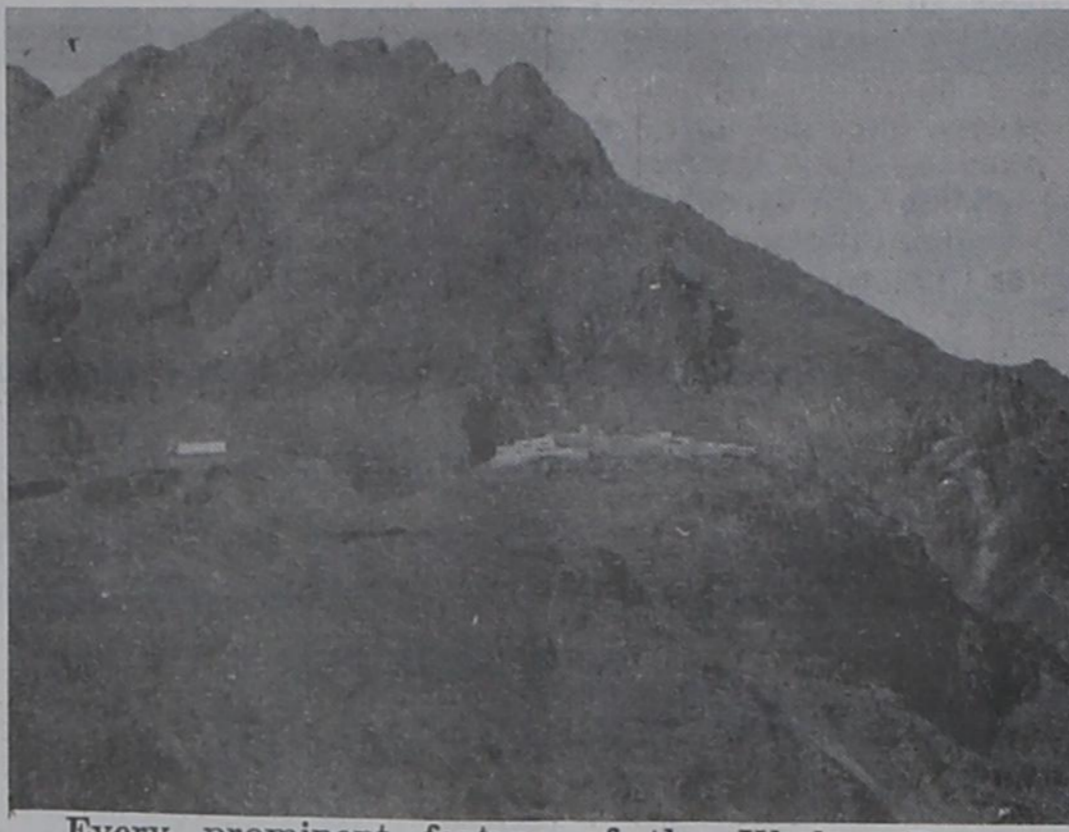
As part of Gen. Horner's tour of Pakistan, we proceeded to Peshawar, the eastern gateway to the Khyber Pass. Peshawar has a history going back over 2000 years as a center of smuggling, drug-running, and arms trading. It continues in these endeavors, and if you are interested in purchasing a rocket launcher or a small cannon, this is the place to look 1st. As a frontier town, it has always been free-wheeling and violent, and the war in Afghanistan has made modern weapons of all descriptions readily available. As you approach the Khyber Pass, every man over the age of 12 carries an AK-47.

We proceeded through the Khyber Pass to the Afghanistan border by a convoy of Frontier Corps soldiers. The Pass is the bottleneck through which many of the ancient trade routes of the Silk Road passed. It is a moonscape of steep canyon walls and bare rock, and each prominent height is crowned with a fortress, or the ruins of a fortress destroyed in a siege at some time in the past.

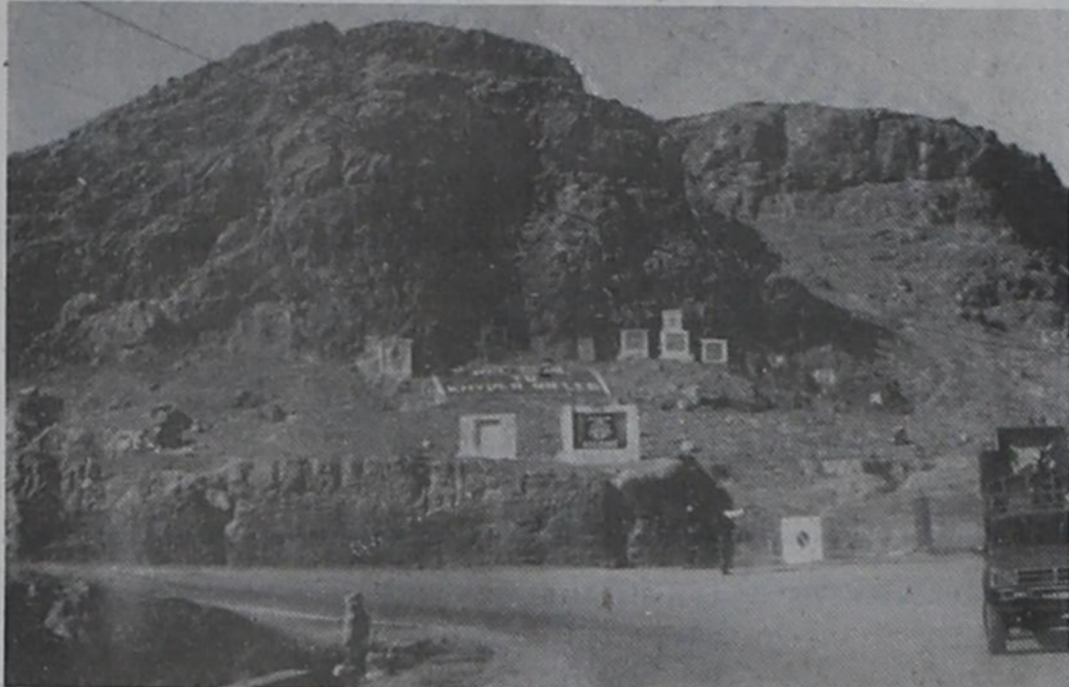
Both sides of the border are inhabited by the Pathan, a savage and fiercely independent tribe who has successfully opposed every invasion in history, including the British in the last century. Every village and each house is a fortress unto itself, as there is no law in this part of the world except family honor and blood feuds. The Afghan and Pakistani governments have never attempted to intrude in these areas, and the authority of the national governments here is more on paper than real.

The walls of the Khyber Pass are chiselled with the symbols of different regiments and armed forces which have passed through or fought here. It was prominent in "The Great Game" of the days of the British Raj, when the agents and soldiers of the Queen fought and killed against the agents of the Russian Czar on this fringe of the two empires.

Convoys of mujahadeen fighters pass through the Khyber Pass constantly these days, as they sensed victory over the Communist regime in Kabul. They were not interested in our convoy, and they continued across the border when we stopped at the last fortress on the Pakistan side of the western end of the Pass. (Even before the current war, the tribes on opposite ends of the Pass have always fought each other.) The Khyber Rifles showed us the border with Afghanistan, and afterwards gave us lunch in the Khyber Rifles Mess, and then convoyed back to Peshawar, and then back to Islamabad.

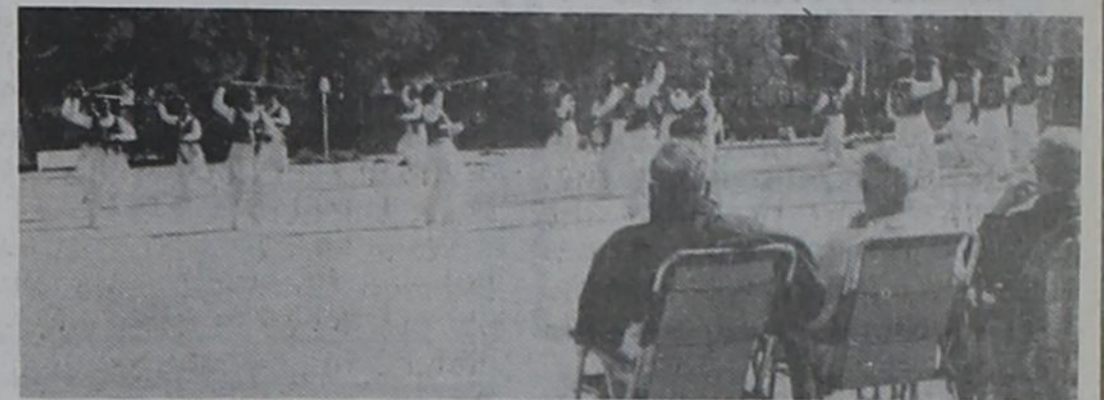
The western end of the Khyber Pass looking out into Afghanistan.




