Anthony to be honored at reception

Friona's Ernest Anthony will be retiring from service Dec. 31 as a County Commissioner after 16 years in office.

A reception will honor him from 3 to 4:30 p.m. Dec. 14 at the county courtroom at the Parmer County Courthouse in Farwell.

"I never dreamed of running at all," Anthony said, looking back on his tenure. "When the old commissioner retired, some of the neighbors and business people asked me to run. They said, 'If you'll run, we'll elect you.' I did and then I ran on my own after that."

Anthony claims that about all he knew about the County Commissioner's work was that they build the roads. He felt qualified for that because "when I was a kid, I built roads with a 6 foot drag and a team of horses. We didn't have much of a road back then."

"Roads are built about the same now as they were back then. Old Charlie Jefferson of Bovina helped me. He told me what to do - 'You just can't pack the roads enough,' he'd tell me.

"We build the roads, and pack them and mow the weeds. And, we blade the roads when it snows."



Over the years Anthony has served with 9 county commissioners and 3 judges: Paul Fortenberry, Porter Roberts and Bonnie Clayton.

When asked if there had been any changes in the operation of the County Commission over the years Anthony replied,"We do about the same things, but there are more regulations on everything."

Here's some background on our pheasants

The ring-necked pheasant was introduced to the Texas Panhandle in 1939. Since that time it has established itself in croplands where grain crops such as corn, grain sorghum and small grains make up a large part of the cropping system. It

has shown a preference for irrigated croplands over dryland cropland with identical cropping systems.

The ring-neck will roam widely to fulfill its needs; however, if adequate food and cover are available throughout the year, it will spend most of it on a square mile or less.

The most critical needs of Panhandle pheasants are: secure nesting cover, overwinter cover and winter and spring travel lanes. Although they must have cover all year long, the two most critical times in the Panhandle area are during the nesting period and the winter months of January, February, March and sometimes April.

Nesting cover is needed from mid - March until about July 1 in the High Plains area. Nesting cover needs to be tall enough to conceal the eggs and the hen when she is incubating. Texas pheasants have shown a preference for wheat stubble, alfalfa haylands, grassed waterways and roadside borrow ditches for nesting cover. Land in the Conservation Reserve Program that borders cropland fields is also seeing increased use as nesting cover. Nesting cover should be at least one acre or more in size for optimum success.

Overwinter cover is also important. Suitable areas of winter cover should occur about every two miles. Winter cover needs to be dense enough to provide protection from high winds, cold, snow, and ice.

The third type of cover needed is travel lanes. Travel lanes are needed for pheasants to travel to and from feeding grounds. Grain lost during harvest supplies more than enough



food for Fanhandle pheasant population, but these grains often go unused because there is no near by travel and escape cover. The most critical time is in March. April and May when hens double their food intake in preparation for egg laying.

The quality of pheasant habitat is directly related to the cropland management practices that affect the pheasant's food supply and cover. Following harvest of grain crops such as grain sorghum, corn soybeans and sunflowers, there is enough waste grain on the land to sustain a pheasant population through the winter, provided the waste grains are left on or near the soil surface and accessible to the birds. Corn and sorghum residues provide excellent winter cover.

Leaving fence rows, tool yards, odd field corners, tailwater pits, and playa lake areas in weedy cover provides excellent winter cover. establishment of low - growing evergreen windbreaks and shelter belts also provides excellent winter cover.

Leaving waterways ungrazed and haylands unmowed during the peak nesting period provides excellent nesting cover.

Proper crop residue management following grain crops, whereby residues and waste grains are left on or near the soil surface, is the single most important agronomic practice that would be beneficial to the Texas pheasant population. Coupled with conservation tillage, these practices would provide ample food and cover through winter months.

Want to help decorate historic Farwell home?

Various groups in Farwell are being asked to help to decorate one of the communities oldest homes.

The historic Hopping - Aldridge house, 710 4th St., was dedicated as a Texas Historic Landmark on May 25, 1986.

Mac Heald, current owner, has finished extensive renovations, and has asked local groups to help him prepare an authentic turn- of -the- century prairie Christmas.

The 2-story gray prairie gothic building was built about 1915 -1917 for R. C. "Coke" Hopping, who was sheriff of Parmer County from 1910-1918. In 1918 the house was sold to James and Minnie Aldridge. Aldridge succeeded Hopping as sheriff in 1919.

Their two sons, Sam and John Aldridge, grew up in the house. Later John married Lillian Orr and they couple moved into the Aldridge home along with James and Minnie Aldridge, John and Lillian Aldridge raised their two daughters, Mary Bell Aldridge Washington and Nancy Aldridge Mehler, in their home.

The home was sold to Heald in 1981. He began the renovation process at that time, and asked to have the building designated as an historic landmark. It was dedicated in 1986 as an historic building. Since that time he has gradually worked on decorating the building.

This year Heald asked friends to help him decorate the house in the style it might have been decorated in for a turn - of -the - century Christmas here on the prairie. There will be candy canes and strings of popcorn or cranberries for the tree.

New radio system installed for our area

Field crews of Deaf Smith Rural Electric Cooperative will now have clear communication with their Hereford headquarters, and with one another when working in Parmer County or elsewhere in the cooperative's service area, thanks to an ultra-high-band radio system.

The system was sold, designed and installed by WT

WT Services technicians did a whirlwind job of installing radio units in REC services vehicles. They installed 25 mobile radios on Nov. 9 and 10. Ralph Bell, Freddie Flores and Gary Parker of the Hereford WT Services radio shop, were joined by Carlos Elizarraraz of the WT Services Amarillo radio shop in performing installations at Deaf Smith REC headquarters.

Much of the backbone of the new REC radio system was put in place last summer and this fall.

Deaf Smith REC's old radio system lacked sufficient range to reach throughout its 4,600 square mile service area, which includes Deaf Smith, Castro, Parmer and Oldham counties.

Because Deaf Smith REC crews must service 3.780 miles of line, much of it in remote locations, good, audible communication is essential.

Fran Kaluznick of WT Services, Inc. met with Steve Louder and Dick Montgomery of Deaf Smith REC to discuss the REC's radio needs. Ms. Kaluznick proposed replacing the aging REC system with a 450 MHZ repeater- equipped system and Deaf Smith REC later approved the proposed system.

WT Services put in place a radio system which includes a license for two 450-470 MHZ repeater pairs. WT Services

remotes were also wired into the system. Using the Hereford


office remotes, individuals in the local office will be able to talk to anyone in the field and hear both sides of the conversation.

Kaluznick says that the ultra- high- band radio system will provide uniform radio coverage throughout Deaf Smith REC's service area, and will greatly decrease system noise, which was a problem on the old system.

The system will allow office remotes to hear both sides of a main dispatch to mobile communications, allow portables to operate the main dispatch, and allow all mobile units to hear main dispatch. All repeaters and base stations are also equipped with a battery backup, in case of power outages.

"REC's old radio system was subject to a lot of "skip" and the noise level was terrible. Radio messages should be much more legible over this new system," says Kaluznick.

WT Services will also provide service on the radio units purchased by Deaf Smith REC, and will be on 24- hour call for servicing fixed equipment in the system, such as repeaters and base stations.







Lazbuddie falls in state semi-finals

The curtain rang down Saturday on another successful season for the Lazbuddie Longhorns.

Lazbuddie again made it to the state semi-finals in 6-Man football before falling to their nemesis Fort Hancock, 84-49, at Monahans.

The Longhorns finished with a 13-1 mark. Fort Hancock has won 70 games in a row and is 13-0 this year.

But aided by turnovers, Fort Hancock scored three times in the same quarter, on runs of 2 and 4 yards and a 26 yard pass. The Mustangs were up 22-8 at the top.

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
