


Please vote. It's not only a responsibility. It's also a way of showing your faith in your nation.

Sudderths sell birds via TV

Darren Sudderth of Farwell was featured in an interview on satellite TV televised Oct. 23 and 24.

Sudderth told about his experiences in the ostrich raising business. According to Darren's father, J. B. Sudderth, "The five minute interview was seen by satellite TV viewers all over the U.S., Canada and Mexico."

The interview was part of a preview which was held for a nation- wide video ostrich auction. Darren was also shown in a video segment featuring some three month old birds that he auctioned off.

J.B. said they sold two pairs of three month old birds, and were delighted with the outcome of the auction.

All of the Sudderth family gathered at Darren's home on the day of the auction to watch to see how it would come out. Darren cooked hamburgers on the grill, and everyone stayed close to the TV set to see how the auction would work out.

The Sudderth birds were lots number 72 and 73 in the auction, so the family's excitement built as they watched other lots of birds sell. "All of the birds sold for an average of 20-30% higher than the last auction," said J.B.

When the Sudderth's birds finally reached the auction block, they too brought a good price. "It was a great day, Saturday," said J.B.

Now, all the Sudderths have to do is wait until the buyer comes to pick up the birds.

The Sudderths got into the ostrich and emu business last year. They started small with fences and pens. Later they added a hatchery. Now they are busy building more pens and

They first erected 6 ft. high fences, and then found that they had to go back and cover the top of the chain link fences to protect the bird. By the time the birds were 3 months old their heads reached the top of the fences. J.B. said that fully grown birds tower 3 feet above the chain link fence.

A few other local farmers have gotten into the big bird business. Some have ostriches and others have emus and rheas. Among them are Harlin Obenshain, Kenneth Hall and Doug Rice.

"This is a new type of farming here in Parmer County," said J.B. "It's working fantastic."

Grain sorghum harvest starting

by Bruce Hinrichs Curry County Extension Agent

Harvest is well underway. Cabbage and pumpkins are out of the fields, corn harvest is winding down and grain sorghum harvest is just getting started. Yields are looking good with corn yielding as high as 16,000 plus pounds and dryland sorghum as high as 4000 pounds. Wheat around the county looks good, but is not growing. A good rain would improve wheat conditions.

Many times comments are heard about how much the government gives to agriculture and how much the farmers are helped. Let's look at the 1993 appropriations and where the money goes. The total agriculture appropriated funds for 1993 is 60.5 billion. The farm program receives 9.2 billion or 15 percent. Food programs (food stamps and the women, infants and children programs) receive 39 billion or 65 percent. The remaining is distributed among USDA and

related agencies.

This should help us to understand that commercial agriculture in fact receives only a small portion of the agriculture budget and this is a small investment to insure an availbale, low cost, food supply.

Many homeowners experienced losses of trees this past year due to freeze damage. There are a couple of things that can be done to prevent future loss. Stop watering trees in the fall so that they are encouraged to go into dormancy. Also, don't put any fertilizer in the root zone of the tree after July so it is not rapidly growing in the fall.



Texico to mull rate increases

The Texico City Council Tuesday agreed to discuss at its next meeting the possibility of raising its water and sewer rates.

A legal notice was published in today's Tribune to allow that action.

Texico is looking at raising its current average water from from \$14.28 to over \$20 a month. This is due to repairs needed for the old water main under the highway, and the need to meet new federal mandates on checking water for various chemicals and agents.

Also, the state has told Texico to increase its contingency fund for the sewer plant. Currently, the sewer rate is \$4 a month.

And the council received statistics Tuesday showing it was losing from \$150 to \$400 for every water tap-in allowed. Thus, these rates likely will jump.

In other business, the council:

- Lowered the blood alcohol content for determining DWI from .10 to .08. Clovis took a similar action last month. The request was made by City Marshal Fry Urioste. He had folks from Clovis testify to this need, such as two representatives from Mothers Against Drunk Driving and District Attorney Randy Harris.

Deputy Marshal Kirk Roberts said the number of DWIs have declined because motorists know that Texico is watching for this problem and some of these motorists are avoiding driving through the city.

- Discussed a collective bargaining ordinance for city employees. If an ordinance isn't approved by the city, then in April 1993 the city employees would be organized under state guidelines.

City Clerk Marie Christian, speaking for Texico's city employees, said they prefer that Texico have its own ordinance. Action was tabled.

- Heard councilman Oran Jay Autrey report that the Texico Community Activities Organization wants to start a recycling program and containers are needed. He said a man in Clovis is opening a complete recycling operation.

- Heard Mayor Doyal LaRue report that bids will be let Nov. 17 by state and federal officials for test wells to find the extent of the contamination at KKR Park. LaRue has been lobbying for one of these wells to be drilled where the new city water well is planned. That would save the city \$12,000 in having to drill a test well itself.




