Lessons to learn from

It was a really enjoyable season watching the Farwell Steers play basketball.

There are some important lessons we can all learn by seeing what occurred with this team.

The first is obvious.

The team started out poorly. They were losing games by 15 to 20 points to teams they were as good as, if not better. They were picked to end up 4th in district.

But the Steers didn't quit. They got better. After being 8-11 in pre-season, they went on a rampage, winning 9 district games in a row. They won a district co-championship. They won the Bi-District title. They became a Cinderella team.

Thus, if you're a player on a team that starts out badly, that doesn't necessarily mean that's how the season will end. You have to stick to it and try to find a method that works for you. You stay with it.

What lesson in life can better be learned? You don't quit.

Another lesson is less obvious, but valid.

Steers' Coach Larry Gregory did something very difficult for a coach to do. He changed his coaching style in mid-season.

Gregory like run - and - gun basketball. He likes his team to get the rebound and roar down the court, taking the fast break at every opportunity.

Well, the Steers started playing that brand of ball at the start of the season. What they got was a huge number of turnovers, more than 40 in a game on occasion. And they were getting beat.

So Gregory had his team slow down its pace. He went to a half court offense. And the day the Steers beat Sudan was their finest hour of the season. Gregory out-coached the Sudan coach.

The lesson here is that if your plans don't work, ask yourselves what alternate plans are available. And, a coach has to set up his plans according to the personnel he has; not try to force the personnel into a mold he wants.

An excellent example of a coach's mistake here is the use of star running back Hershel Walker after the Dallas Cowboys traded him to the Minnesota Vikings.

Walker was supposed to be the key cog in getting the Vikes to the Super Bowl. Walker was most effective as a single tailback when he was in college and the Cowboys.

But at Minnesota, he was put into a two-back offense that the coach preferred. He floundered; the team floundered; and the coach was fired at season's end.

Walker went to Philadelphia. They put in the offense he needed, and Walker had a tremendous year (although the team didn't do well because QB Randall Cunningham had an off-year).

I digress. Back to the Steers.

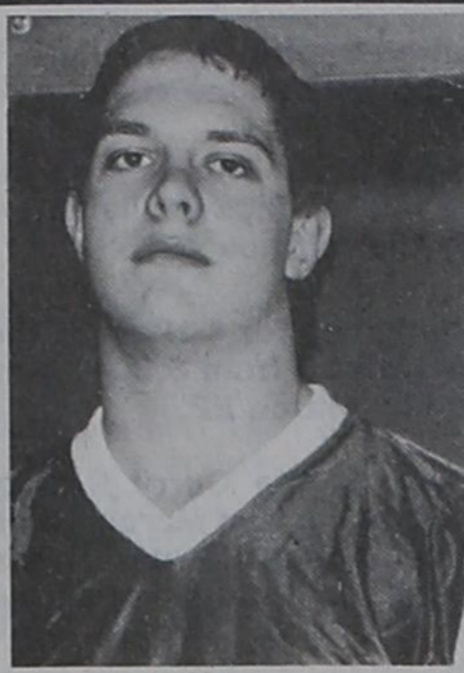
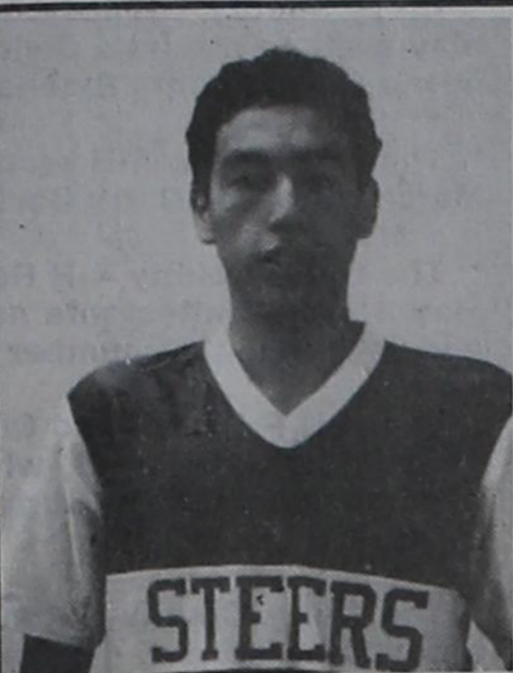
Why did the Steers get better, besides the change in their offense?

For one thing, you saw the maturing of Eric Delgado. As his confidence grew, so did the team's. Eric is that most unusual of players - he's a point guard and a shooting guard. Coaches drool over having that type of star athlete.

Don't be surprised if Eric, who is a junior now, makes All-State next year.

Eric's drives through the lane not only led to easy layups, but set up his front line for dish-off passes for

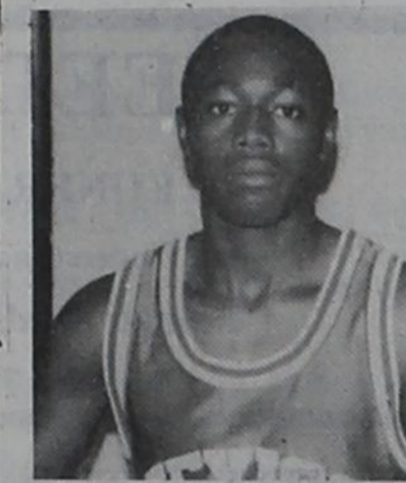

Contamination monitored

The Texico City Council met Tuesday night with two representatives of the state's Environmental Inspection Division to discuss the monitoring wells being put in to find the extent of the contamination under KKR Park.

It's been two years since it was found that unacceptable levels of carbon tetrachloride, a believed carcinogen, was found in the city's water system. The source was the water well at KKR Park.

The city is in the process of buying land near the school to put in a new water well. But it first must await the results of the current study to make sure the new well isn't in the flow from the KKR Park well.

The EID folks are putting in three wells and taking samples from them. Their final report is expected in May. Then, as long as the city's new well isn't in the line of flow, the city can go ahead with building a second well.

Currently, Texico has only one working well, the one at Lions Park.

The EID officials also noted that if the samples taken show that the contaminant is heading toward Farwell, it's likely the EPA will force Farwell to sample its wells.

In other business, the council:

- Discussed the city swimming pool. Councilman Oran Jay Autrey said the repair costs this year will be small, since no major work is expected.

- Noted that the bill in the state House of Representatives put in by state Rep. Earlene Roberts for funds to build a new senior citizen - youth center building is still in committee and appears dead.

So the city will now apply for a Community Development Block Grant for funds for the facility, which would be built at the north end of the city-owned land directly east of KKR Park. The facility, if built, hopefully would be combined with a new city hall down the road, if funds were available for that.

- Heard that city facilities were recently inspected by state safety officials and all were in compliance except the city barns. Mayor Doyal LaRue said a new facility will be needed.

- Heard LaRue appoint councilmen Butch Sharp and Carolyn Burrows to a committee to study the need for testing procedures and a procedure manual before another police officer is hired. They will have a work session soon.

- Heard one citizen ask about the stray dog problem. LaRue replied that the city currently doesn't have arrangements to use another city's pound and has no pound of its own.

time; it is time to do something else," he says. Turner calls his work in special education "very gratifying."

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School project to be bid again

The Farwell School Board Tuesday voted to re-bid its building project.

Bids opened last month came in too high.

The board had sold a \$1.5 million bond issue and figured it could go as high as \$1.8 million on the project - additions to the elementary, junior and senior high schools plus a new 720-seat gym.

Four bids were opened in February and the lowest was for \$2.3 million. The project engineers met with the firm that had the low bid but was unable to get the total down to what Farwell could afford.

So the school board held a work session Tuesday afternoon to discuss the problem. They met with a construction manager, who has just done a job at Springlake - Earth School.

Construction management is another way to build a project. Instead of hiring a construction company, you hire an individual who hires sub-contractors. The individual is on salary, which is normally more cost effective. And the construction manager oversees the work.

The board was told that Springlake - Earth saved \$100,

000 on the cost of its new library by using this method.

The board voted at its Tuesday night meeting to seek bids on the building project again. The specifications will be the same, but this time it will allow for construction managers to bid the project. Bids will be opened April 6.

School Supt. Richard Boothby stressed the board doesn't want to give up any quality. And that if a cutback has to be made to get within the financial restraints, then square footage will be cut.

The construction manager who met with the board Tuesday said he believed the current project can be built under construction management without any cutbacks.

Barnes elected board president

At Tuesday's Texico School Board meeting, Paul Dee Barnes was elected board president; Janice Hamilton, vice president; and Bruce Mayfield, secretary.

In other business, the board:

- Swore in new board members Ted Richardson and Janice Hamilton (who was re-elected).

- Renewed the contracts with its three principals.

- Accepted the resignation of elementary school secretary Phyllis Teague. She will be working at Clovis Community College. Becky Bradley was hired as Elementary School secretary.

- Released Diana Gratto from her contract, and Corrine Turner was hired as the teaching aide for the 3-4 year old students.

- Reviewed the progress of the new building project, and voted to add some new parking lots for the school. Trees on the west side of the campus will be cut down on March 12 to provide parking spaces.

Anyone who wants some free firewood may come and cut the trees apart if they contact Dr. R. L. Richards or school custodian Glen Neile so that school officials know who will be working on school grounds.

- Passed a new collective bargaining measure, which will take effect on March 31.

- Adopted the science textbook series suggested by the school book committee composed of parents and teachers.

- Denied a request for bus service made by parents of students who live south of Cockawaddie Road.

- Watched a skit about fetal alcohol syndrome performed by Texico students Carol Servatius, Lori Stanley, and Rachel Noblett who will present it at the New Mexico State FHA meeting in Albuquerque.

- Voted to add a metal roof to the Peyton property. The bid was awarded to Dura Bilt.

- Ordered new cafeteria tables from the same company which had supplied the old ones 20 years ago.

- Discussed the Younger Scholarships, and voted to offer two \$350 per semester scholarships. The board then voted to continue giving two scholarships as long as they do not touch the principle of the Younger funds.

- Reviewed the possibility of changing the school day from a six period day or a seven period day.

- Compared cafeteria charges with state averages. Texico schools are in good shape because there has been a decrease in milk prices.

- Watched a video of some new playground equipment that has been added to the Peyton property.

Commissioners hire Ancira as courthouse custodian

The Parmer County Commissioners Monday chose Mary Ann Ancira, of Farwell, to handle the custodial work at the courthouse of the coming year.

She will be employed at a rate of \$950 a month. She was the lowest of five bids received.

Other bidders were Tony Marquez, Clovis; Thelma Venable, Texico; Debbie Woodson, Farwell, and Joe Dillingham, Friona.

In other business, the commissioner bought a road grader

from West Texas Caterpillar for the Bovina precinct. The only other bidder was Yellowhouse.

Three bids were received for the county depository award. Accepted was Friona State Bank. Other bidders were Muleshoe State Bank, Farwell branch, and 1st Bank of Muleshoe, Bovina branch.

The commissioner re-insured its property, liability and vehicle insurance with the Texas Association of Counties, a self-insurance program that counties use. No bids were needed.

Boyd hired as Steer basketball coach

Doug Boyd was hired as the new boys' varsity basketball coach by the Farwell School Board Tuesday.

Boyd is in his first year at Farwell and has served as JV boys' coach and as an assistant to Larry Gregory, boys' varsity coach.

Gregory became Farwell High principal this year. The school board had planned to hire another person as coach but it didn't work, out and Gregory was asked to coach one more year.

School Supt. Richard Boothby reported all certified staff were re-employed and there have been no official resignations yet.

Filing period to end March 17

Which brings us to yet another lesson to learn from this team. Just because a player isn't that strong at the start of a season doesn't necessarily mean that he won't improve.

As Derrick gained confidence, and felt more comfortable in his position, he became a very strong player. Add veterans like Kade Kent and Ryan Williams, and tough defensive players like Jeremy Ortiz and Brent Harrison, and the Steers turned out to have a very strong team.

Lastly, the team was coachable. You can have the best players in the world, but if they won't play together and fit into the system the coach devises, you can forget it.

But the Steers, in order to win, played some fine defense. Folks who watched Farwell beat Booker at Bi-District would have to admit that Farwell won on its defense, not its offense.

You don't have to be a star athlete to play good defense. You have to use your brains and understand the team concept - and you can contribute mightily to your team's success even if you don't score a single point.

Well, that's it. As I said, it was a fun, exciting year. And those kids showed a lot of us adults some important lessons in life.

The Texas Department of Transportation has scheduled a pre-construction meeting to discuss widening U.S. 60 from the New Mexico state line to Bovina.

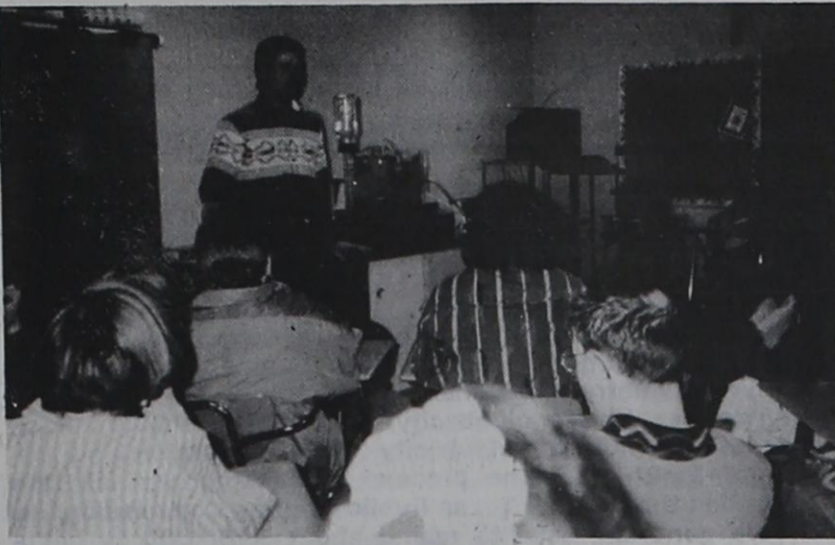
The meeting will be at the Parmer County Courthouse at 9 a.m. on March 16.

Deaf Smith elects Acker, Yosten

Incumbent Anthony V. Acker of Castro County and Gilbert (Nick) Yosten of Deaf Smith County were elected to the board of directors of the Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative at the annual meeting Tuesday. More than 1,500 people attended.

Steve Louder discussed his first year as general manager of the organization. He said Deaf Smith is a strong cooperative which owns 64% equity in its plant and equipment. He attributed the success of the organization to the board's stress on the basic fundamentals of generating a minimum of debt while keeping the rates competitive. He attributed the cooperative's low level of debt to low interest rates, and the fact that Deaf Smith is one of only about 30

cooperatives in the United States which have paid off their REA loans.

He noted that the cooperative has had minimal growth in the last 10 years, but they operated without borrowing. At the same time they maintained an average rate of 6.73 cents per kilowatt hour so that their rates would be in line with other electric cooperatives.

He noted that there has been an increased need for political involvement lately which is causing a major impact upon the industry as a whole. "We are involved in an effort to gain deregulation for electricity," he said. This should reduce the cost of wholesale electricity to the cooperative.

Deaf Smith is in the process of seeking a small rate reduction through the Texas Public Utilities Commission.

"We generally have to spend about \$100,000 to get a rate change through the public utilities commission," Louder explained. If the cooperative was not regulated, members would save money, and the power would be back in the hands of the members of the cooperative.

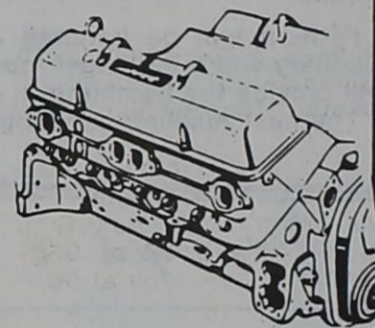

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PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION MAY 1, 1993

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Section 1 of Senate Joint Resolution 7 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to redistribute among other school districts ad valorem taxes levied and collected by a school district. The amendment would also allow the legislature to create county education districts with the taxable property of existing school districts in one or more counties combined. County education districts may levy, collect, and distribute ad valorem taxes as authorized by general law. The legislature would be allowed to set the rate of the ad valorem tax to be imposed in a school district or county education district or it may authorize the board of trustees of each school district or county education district to set the rate, provided that the rate of county education district ad valorem taxes may not exceed \$1.00 per \$100 valuation of taxable property, unless a higher rate is approved by the voters of the district. The amendment also provides that the amount of ad valorem taxes redistributed among school districts by the legislature and effectively redistributed within a county through county education districts may not exceed 2.75 percent of the sum of the state revenue appropriated for public schools and the revenue from local ad valorem taxes levied and collected for public schools. The term "state revenue" does not include revenue from ad valorem taxes, revenue for the provision of free textbooks, or contributions to a retirement system. Finally, the amendment provides that it does not affect the distribution of the available school fund under article VII, section 5, of the Texas Constitution.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment allowing limited redistribution of ad valorem taxes for schools, authorizing the legislature or local districts to set

a minimum tax rate in county education districts, and placing a cap on the ad valorem tax levied by county education districts."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Section 2 of Senate Joint Resolution 7 proposes a constitutional amendment that would provide that, except for state educational mandates imposed in compliance with the Texas Constitution or federal law, or unless enacted by a vote of at least two-thirds of the members elected to each house of the legislature, a school district may not be required to comply with an obligation requiring expenditure of school district funds unless the obligation is fully funded. The amendment also requires the legislature to provide by law a procedure for determining whether an obligation is fully funded. In the absence of such a procedure, and at the request of a school district's board of trustees, the comptroller of public accounts shall determine whether or not an obligation is fully funded. This amendment applies only to state educational mandates enacted after December 31, 1993.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment exempting a school district from the obligation to comply with unfunded state educational mandates."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 4 proposes an amendment to article VII, section 5(b), of the constitution, which currently authorizes the legislature to provide for using the permanent school fund to guarantee bonds issued by school districts and certain education-related revenue bonds issued by the state. The amendment would repeal the provision authorizing

the use of the permanent school fund to guarantee state revenue bonds, but would permit the legislature to provide by law for the issuance of general obligation bonds or revenue bonds of the state for the purpose of making loans to, or purchasing bonds of, school districts for the purpose of acquisition, construction, or improvement of instructional facilities, including all furnishings. The amendment also provides that the state, pursuant to general law, may forgive the payment of principal and interest on all or part of a loan made to a school district under the amendment to partially finance an instructional facility. The cap of \$750 million on the amount of bonds that could be issued under article VII, section 5(b), as amended, would be retained. The amendment would repeal the current provision of the constitution permitting the legislature to authorize bonds in excess of \$750 million by two-thirds record vote of both houses of the legislature. While any of the general obligation bonds issued under the amendment or any of the interest on those bonds is outstanding and unpaid, there would be appropriated out of the first money coming into the state treasury in each fiscal year, not otherwise appropriated by the constitution, the amount sufficient to pay the principal and interest on the bonds that matured or became due that fiscal year.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of \$750 million in state general obligation or revenue bonds to assist school districts in partially financing facilities, authorizing the state to forgive payments of loans made to a school district for partially financing facilities, and repealing the authorization for \$750 million in state revenue bonds guaranteed by the permanent school fund."

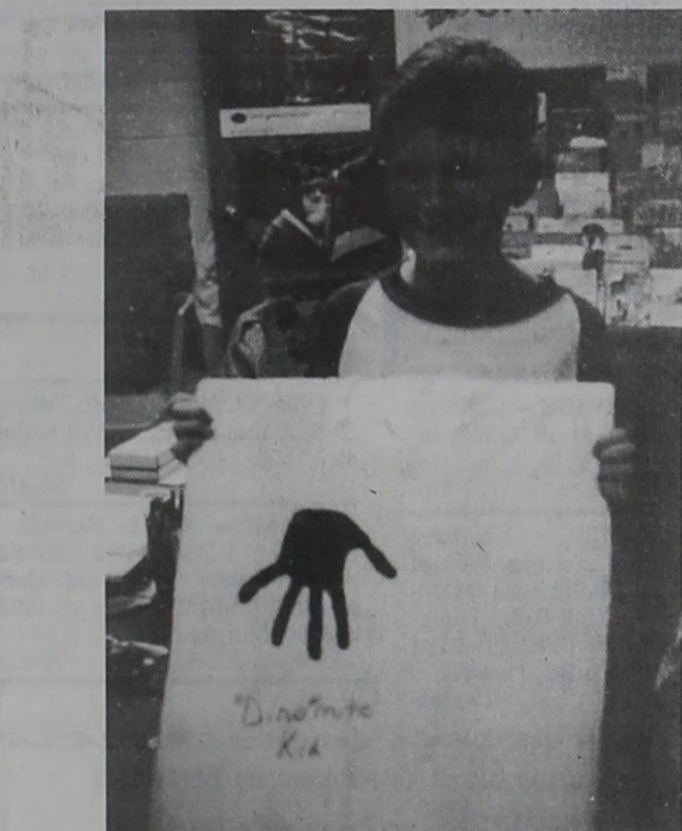

Baugh announces 'collection day' for farmers, ranchers

Brant Baugh, Parmer County Extension Agent for Entomology, reports that farmers and ranchers in Texas may voluntarily dispose of unwanted or unusable agricultural pesti-

cides and chemicals and recycle empty pesticide containers at three sites during March.

There will be no charge and no questions asked at this collection day held on March 22 in Plainview. Sponsors are the Texas Water Commission, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture. Pesticides and rinsed containers will be accepted from 8 a.m. - 3 p.m. at the Ollie Linder Center in Plainview.

The chemicals that will be accepted are herbicides, insecticides, nematocides, fungicides, seed treatments, rodenticides, bactericides, growth regulators, harvest aid chemicals, livestock pesticides and other miscellaneous pesticides or herbicides.

Not accepted will be fertilizers, treated seed, waste oil, petroleum products, paints and solvents, herbicides containing 2,4,5-T or Silvex, pesticides and wood preservatives containing Pentachlorophenol or explosives.

Containers to be recycled must be triple rinsed or high pressure rinsed. Metal and plastic containers only will be accepted.

During the first pesticide collection program in the spring of 1990, more than 27 tons of unwanted pesticides were collected from a 37-county area of West Texas.

All eligible waste chemicals will be examined at the collection sites and then transported to permitted hazardous waste disposal facility.

Some recommended safety practices for moving materials to the waste chemical collection site:

1. Inspect containers. If you suspect that the container will tear or rupture when moved, do not attempt to move it. Notify collection site personnel for assistance.

2. When handling pesticides, wear the protective clothing and equipment - goggles, gloves, respirator- described on product labels.

3. Make sure all pesticides are securely packaged. Transport only containers that are securely closed. Pack

containers that won't close securely inside others that will. 4. Line the storage area of the transport vehicle with plastic sheeting to contain any spillage, simplify cleanup and decontamination.

5. If possible, arrange the pesticides by hazard class - flammable, corrosives, oxidizers, poisons - to prevent mixing of incompatible materials should spillage occur.

6. Make sure all labels are securely attached. Unlabeled containers must be tested before disposal. Your attention to this detail saves these expenses.

7. Brace containers in your vehicle to prevent shifting, which may cause leaks.

8. All containers should be kept dry during transport. If it rains, cover loads in such open vehicles as pick-up trucks.

9. Be careful to keep all fumes from pesticide wastes from entering the vehicle.

10. Make two copies of a list of the pesticides that you are transporting. List the pesticide name, number of containers and hazard class (when known). Include the emergency phone numbers for fire and police assistance. In case of an accident, leave one copy of the list on the driver's seat and take the second with you to phone for help. The list on the

seat will inform emergency units that may arrive when you are away.

11. Drive directly to the pesticide collection program site after you load your vehicle.

12. At the collection site, proceed where directed. If you observe spillage from your vehicle while waiting, get out of your vehicle and move upwind to the designated "safe zone."

13. Drive carefully. You are responsible for any spillage, damage, cleanup and restoration that might occur while you are transporting the wastes, whether the accident is your fault or others. The state and its contractor are not responsible for any spillage that occurs before the waste is accepted at the collection site.
