ran a grocery store in Farwell."

Over the years, painting and crocheting were two hobbies that kept Mrs. Jones from letting life's problems get her
down. Her paintings are a special joy to her. "Since Frank died, I only painted about one picture.
Many of these paintings illustrate subjects dear to her heart: Native Americans, the old west, and landscapes. One depicts a cabin her grandfather built in Jackson County,
Kentucky. She painted it from a sketch that her cousin sent to her. She never saw the cabin herself, but the painting has great sentimental value to her because it reminded her of her grandfather.
Many of her paintings feature famous Native Americans:
Geronimo, Chief Geronimo, Chief Joseph, and Cochise to name a few. Her
love of the Native American lore is evident as she speaks love of the Native American iore is evident as she speaks
of these men. Her nimble mind jumps quickly from tales of the Apache to those of the Seminole to those of the Nez Perce.
