Mary Jones first came to Texico when she was, "just a kid." She and her family lived on a farm at the edge of town.

"It was a lot smaller than it is now, and they've torn down a bunch of old buildings," she said. "There are only a few people who can still remember what the town was like back in those days. Mae Stone is one, and John and Mae Porter who have moved to Roswell are a couple of others. They ran a grocery store in Farwell."

Mrs. Jones married Frank Jones, in Decatur, Texas, in 1933. They were married for 60 years.

The Jones' ran The State Line Camp and Service Station for 18 years. It was a combined cafe, garage, tourist camp and salvage yard.

When her husband got sick, they moved north of Texico where they lived for 26 years. In order to help make ends meet, Mrs. Jones and her twin sister Rose began selling Rainbow Vacuum Cleaners in 1956. She has been selling and servicing them since.

Over the years, painting and crocheting were two hobbies that kept Mrs. Jones from letting life's problems get her down. Her paintings are a special joy to her. "Since Frank died, I only painted about one picture."

Many of these paintings illustrate subjects dear to her heart: Native Americans, the old west, and landscapes. One depicts a cabin her grandfather built in Jackson County, Kentucky. She painted it from a sketch that her cousin sent to her. She never saw the cabin herself, but the painting has great sentimental value to her because it reminded her of her grandfather.

Many of her paintings feature famous Native Americans: Geronimo, Chief Joseph, and Cochise to name a few. Her love of the Native American lore is evident as she speaks of these men. Her nimble mind jumps quickly from tales of the Apache to those of the Seminole to those of the Nez Perce.

Trips to reservations in Gallup, N.M., and to Oklahoma and Colorado have given Mrs. Jones an appreciation of the problems that other people have had. It is clear that she has empathy for the problems of others because she has shared some very difficult times herself.

Friona considers extra charge

A group of Friona residents attended Monday's Parmer County Commissioners' meeting to discuss the possibility that Friona may charge for runs its fire department makes into county areas.

Attending were Clarence Monroe, Paula Wilson, John Taylor, Jim Taylor and Ralph Shirley.

Currently, each of the county's fire departments are subsidized by the county commissioners. None of the departments charge extra for runs into county areas.

The commissioners were told that Friona is looking at charging \$400 a run, although no decisions have been made yet.

Parmer County Treasurer Anne Norton put together a comparison of funds issued to the county's fire department and ambulance services for 1992. In all, the county's fire

Dog packs pose problem

The problem of dangerous stray dogs running amok was discussed at Tuesday's Texico City Council meeting.

"We have lots of strays and it's dangerous to go out at night," said councilwoman Carolyn Burrows. She noted that once she saw 6 large, aggressive dogs in one pack.

She said a neighbor put up a fence around his property to keep his children safe from strays.

It was pointed out that summer is coming and kids will be out more. "And now there are packs of dogs

roaming around," said Mrs. Burrows.

She said the most logical solution was to work with Farwell on the problem, especially since Farwell has an animal pound.

But Mayor Doyal LaRue responded that he has received a cold shoulder from Farwell officials about this.

Mrs. Burrows then said Texico needs to build its own pound if that's the city's only recourse. At a previous meeting, Texico looked into using Clovis' pound but found the cost high - \$50 per

animal, plus the animal would be donated to the shelter.

State law says that the person who catches stray animals must be a certified officer. City Marshal Fry Urioste is the only Texico employee who qualifies in that respect. So far he hasn't been involved in that, but said he would if ordered by the council.

Urioste also warned residents that he would begin handing out citations if they let their animals run loose.

Also, if strays are picked up, it cannot be in the city police cars. State law says that if police cars were used, thorough cleaning would be necessary before any prisoners could be placed in the vehicles.

After beginning a discussion on where to possibly put an animal pound, such as behind City Hall, City Attorney Duane Hamar recommended that the discussion be handled in executive session. This ended the public discussion of the problem and an executive session was called after the open meeting.

After the executive session, the council returned to open meeting and decided to place on next meeting's agenda the seeking of a joint agreement with Clovis on using that city's pound.

Texico discusses highway widening

The widening of the Amarillo Highway in Texas up to the New Mexico state line was discussed at Tuesday's Texico City Council meeting.

Councilman Butch Tharp, who attended the highway department meeting last week in Farwell, reported on it.

Tharp would like to see New Mexico work in conjunction with Texas on the project but this doesn't seem probable. Tharp wants the highway - from its intersection with the Lubbock Highway to the state line - realigned and widened. This would remove some dangerous curves.

But after talking with New Mexico officials, Tharp said nothing is planned at this time but the state is considering widening the intersection area to 5 lanes down the road.

The topic of a traffic light at the highway intersection was brought up. City Attorney Duane Hamar recalled that placement of a traffic signal was placed on the state's 5-year plan some time ago. Tharp said he believes it has been dropped.

Also brought up was the fact that the Amarillo Highway will be closed from the Farwell Cemetery to the state line for up to 2 1/2 months; traffic will be re-routed through Farwell. Asked how this would impact on the Spur Restaurant, the response was that the Spur owners weren't worried because most of their trade is local.

In other business, the council:

- Heard councilwoman Carolyn Burrows complain that it seems more junk is getting into town. She said there are two lots full of junk along Wheeler Avenue.

"I'd like to see if we could get some state money to clean up the main street and use some money to buy lots," she added. She said the lots next to the Welcome Center have been cleaned up.

Mayor Doyal LaRue said state beautification grants are available along these lines. Lewis Cooper, of the Texico Chamber of Commerce, who was present at the meeting, agreed to take a copy of the state grant application and see what might be available to help Texico.

Cooper also said he would bring up the problem of improving the intersection at a Chamber meeting.

- Called an executive session to discuss qualifications for hiring a deputy marshal and the public safety procedure manual. Afterward, the council returned to open session and said that applications, from both certified and non-certified personnel, will be taken for the post.

The deadline for receiving applications is April 13. Interview tests will be given. It's possible the council will pick a deputy marshal at its April 27 meeting.

- Noted that the testing for the contamination at KKR Park is almost complete and a report is expected at the end of April. So far, it looks good that the flow is away from the planned city well near the schools.

- Approved its annual participation in the Metro Drug Task Force.

- Heard Texico Marshal Fry Urioste report on Operation Lifesaver. The Santa Fe Railroad has made a 45-minute film on safety. Urioste is setting up a time with school officials to show it. It also will be shown in Farwell next month.

- Heard Urioste report that the baseball field has been cleaned up and lots of youths are using it.

- Heard councilman Oran Jay Autrey report on the trip the some Texico residents took to Albuquerque last weekend to visit with seriously ill children at the Ronald McDonald House and Casa Esperanza. Participating were Autrey, Rick and Rhonda Qualls, and Mark and Twilla Kos. They visited with about 50 youths. They plan to go back next year.

- Was told that a traffic survey showed a minimum of 4,000 vehicles a day traveling on the highway in front of City Hall.

- Noted that Clean Up Day is April 17.

- Approved an application for state CDBG funds.

- Agreed to advertise for an auditor.

- Approved buying a safe for City Hall, after discussing it in executive session.

This year's wind was blowing from the northeast, which calls for a spring full of good moisture.

Crim said he has been on target about 80 percent of the time, including the last three years in a row.

Commissioners

departments - Friona, Farwell, Bovina, Lazbuddie and Rhea - received \$85,394 from the county commissioners.

This total included a special \$20,000 (which totalled \$21,394 including interest) that had been set aside as matching funds by the Friona and Bovina commissioners. The city of Friona matched that total so it was given to the Friona fire department in January 1992.

Each January, each department received a \$4,000 subsidy. Also, Friona got \$9,600 subsidy for its ambulance service, while Farwell, Bovina and Lazbuddie ambulance services got \$4,800 each. Rhea, the county's newest fire department, doesn't have an ambulance service.

Last August, each of the 5 departments received extra subsidies from the commissioners:

- Friona got \$4,000 from the Friona commissioner (Ernest Anthony).
- Farwell got \$1,000 from the Farwell commissioner

(Robert White).

- Bovina got \$4,000 from the Bovina commissioner (Tom Ware).

- Lazbuddie got \$4,000 from the Lazbuddie commissioner (Raymond McGehee).

- Rhea got \$2,000 from the Bovina commissioner (Ware).

In addition, the county annually gives the Friona dispatcher who handles the 911 emergency calls an extra \$5,000.

Judge Clayton put together these totals because some folks may not realize what the full totals are that the commissioners spend on the fire departments.

In other business, the commissioners voted to renovate the fire floor of the county courthouse. New windows will be installed, exposed wires will be concealed and offices will be renovated.

The Friona folks attending brought statistics to back up their case. These statistics showed the following fire calls made by the Friona fire department:

- 1990 - 74 total calls, including 57 rural.
- 1991 - 62 total calls, including 58 rural.
- 1992 - 54 total calls, including 38 rural.
- 1993 - 13 total calls, including 12 rural.

Thus, according to the Friona statistics, of 203 total calls, 165 were made in the county - 82 percent.

The Friona folks also brought statistics saying that \$68,675 was spent last year, including training, supplies, rescue equipment, air-pacs, tires, gasoline, insurance, liability insurance, worker's compensation, truck payments and vehicle maintenance. This figure doesn't include vehicle and equipment depreciation or water taken from the city to the rural fires.

"Spending on schools has doubled over the last 10 years. Will this \$2.4 billion scheme last for 10 more years or will we have to raise taxes in 2 years, 5 years... How much is enough?"

Here's the information that Bill asked us to print; it was sent to him by "Texans Against Robin Hood Taxes":

Gov. Ann Richards is asking voters to approve on May 1 a constitutional amendment known as the "Robin Hood Amendment," to authorize a statewide property tax to fund public education. This amendment would give the Texas Legislature the authority to impose addi-

tional County Education District taxes on top of the existing property taxes Texans are now paying.

During the next six weeks, Gov. Richards will try to persuade Texas voters that if we don't vote yet on "Robin Hood," the schools will close. What they won't tell you is that this new version of "Robin Hood" taxes - we called it "Robin Hood II" - will raise our property taxes by more than \$1 billion a year while doing nothing to improve the quality and accountability of education in Texas. The hard truth is that the "Robin Hood" amendment is potentially the largest tax increase in the history of Texas.

But we don't have to roll over and play dead. There

are several sound alternatives to the "Robin Hood" amendment.

For example, what happened to all that lottery money that was supposed to fund education in Texas? Instead of supporting our school children, Gov. Richards used the lottery proceeds to give pay raises to state employees. Since a disproportionate percentage of poor people play the lottery, why not dedicate those funds to the poorer school districts? If we did that, the net revenues would provide us with virtually all of the \$400 million Gov. Richards claims she

needs for the poorer districts. It doesn't make sense (and isn't fair) to penalize the successful school districts by raising their local property taxes and shipping these funds elsewhere.

Liles also sent a copy of a column written by William Murchison that is entitled "Income tax is the goal in school scare."

Murchison also blasts the proposed amendment, saying passage would help pave the way to a state income tax.

Murchison writes that Texans are being hit with scare tactics from the politicians, who say that unless the amendment passes the courts

will close many schools.

Murchison notes:
"May I ask who's going to close the Texas public schools? The courts? That ole dog won't hunt. Imagine the voters' gratitude to the elected jurist who tells Texas parents their kids can't go to school. What about teachers, who contract for a year's work? Judges are going to void these contracts? Equally to the point, if the amendment fails, the Legislature can pass something else; maybe, for once, something that makes sense. It might help to restructure the schools or, better yet, institute a voucher plan."

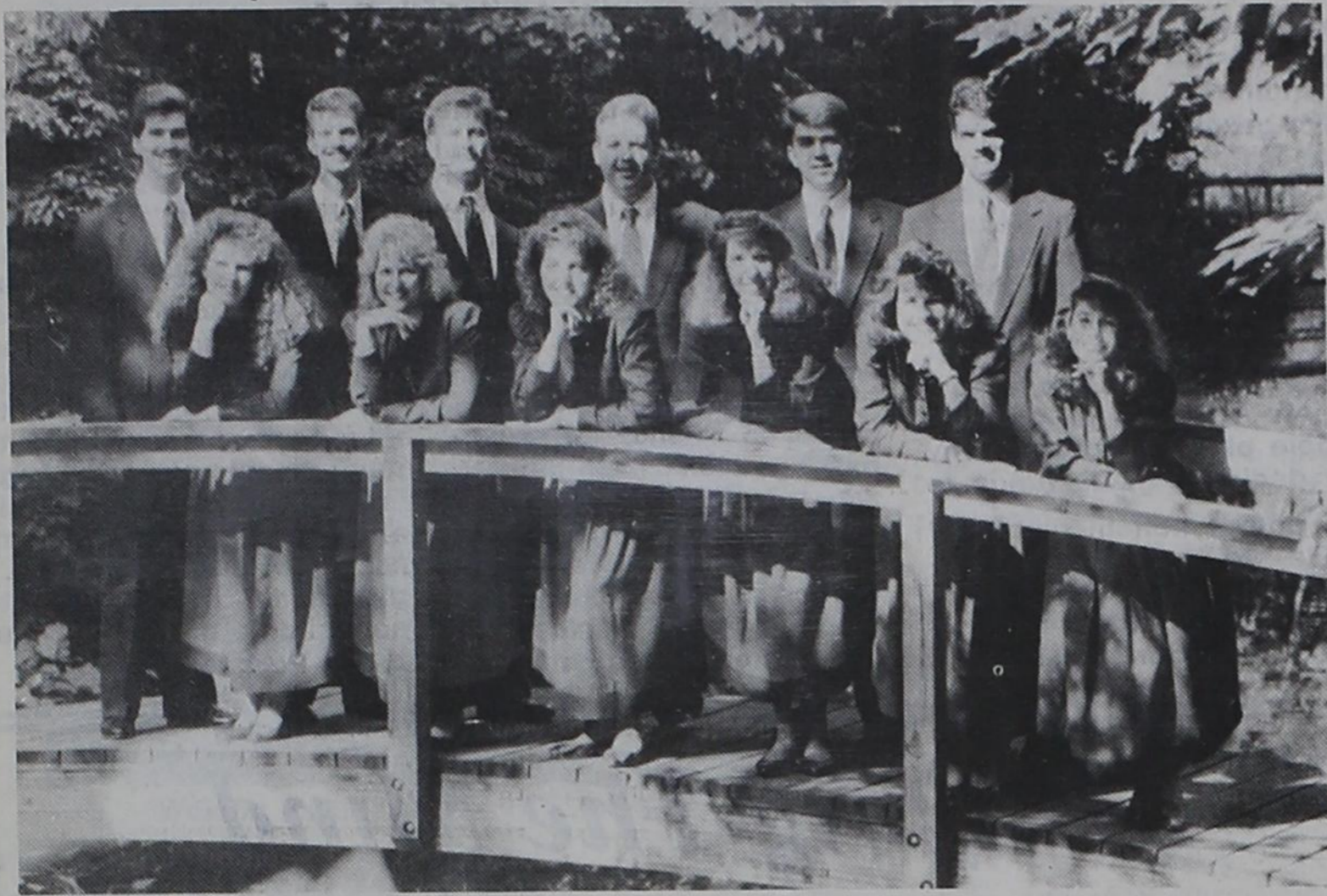

"Life Action Singers"

Life Action Singers plan concert here

A free concert, "The Family: Holding On For Life!" will be presented at 7:30 p.m. April 8 at the Farwell High School auditorium.

The program is being sponsored by First Baptist Church of Farwell, Hamlin Memorial United Methodist Church, KIJN Radio and others.

The dramatic celebration of the home, the foundation on which our society is built, is a multi-media production featuring the Life Action Singers and uses specialized lighting effects, 12 computerized projectors covering a 36-foot screen, and more than 2,500 visuals synchronized to the lyrics of music and narration.

A brochure publicizing the concert notes:

"The family is the basic unit of society. No nation can be any stronger than its families. Yet today, we are witnessing an all-out attack on our homes. The statistics on divorce, child abuse, incest, drug abuse, teenage suicide and alcoholism are multiplying at an alarming rate. Even those families that have managed to avoid these hurts, often experience equally painful loneliness, lack of communication, alienation, resentment, selfishness and conflict.

"And because our families are dying, the survival of our nation is at stake. It is not enough to talk about the problem or even to say a few prayers. We must take action - drastic action now before it's too late to repair the damage that has already taken place.

"Widespread change can only come about as families see their need to be reconciled to God and to each other. Every time one family is strengthened or restored, the fabric of our society is strengthened.

"The Family: Holding On For Life" offers hope for hurting homes as well as positive steps of action for making even good homes stronger."

"This multi-media presentation challenges God's people to meet with Him and be genuinely revived, to enable unresolved conflicts and broken relationships to be healed."

FmHA offers rural housing loans

Rural housing loans for very - low and low income applicants are available through the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA).

Home ownership loans may be used to buy, build, improve, repair, rural homes and to provide adequate water and waste disposal systems. Homes may be built on individual tracts or in subdivisions. Funds may also be used to modernize homes - ad improvements such as bathrooms, central heating, modern kitchens and other improvements. Borrowers may buy an existing house and lot or buy a site on which to build a home.

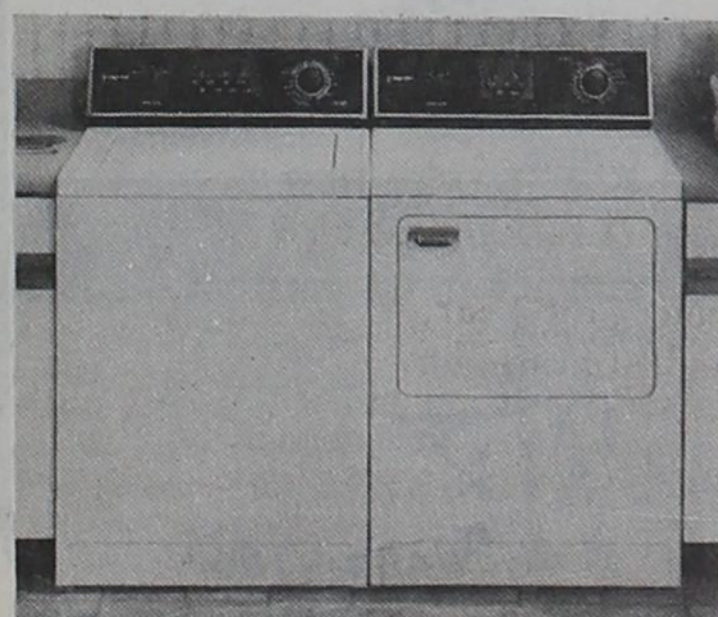
Loans may be made for up to 100 percent of the appraised value of the site and the new home. Interest rates for this type of loan are presently 7.75% with 33 year terms. Monthly payments are subsidized with the amount of the payment dependent on the borrower's annual income. These homes will be modest in size, design, and cost but adequate to meet the family's needs. New homes average about 1050 square feet of living area.

FmHA guarantees home ownership loans made to applicants of low or moderate income. Guarantees offer opportunities to families who are unable to afford a commercial loan without a guarantee. These loans may be made for up to 100 percent of the value of the property and are made for terms of 30 years. The interest rate is based on the Federal National Mortgage Association rate with a maximum loan amount in most counties of \$67,500.

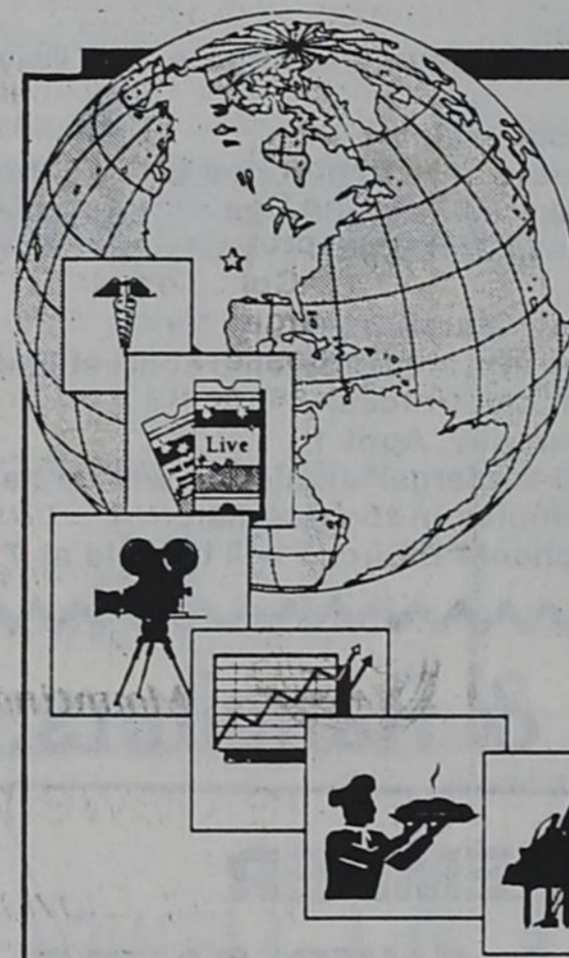

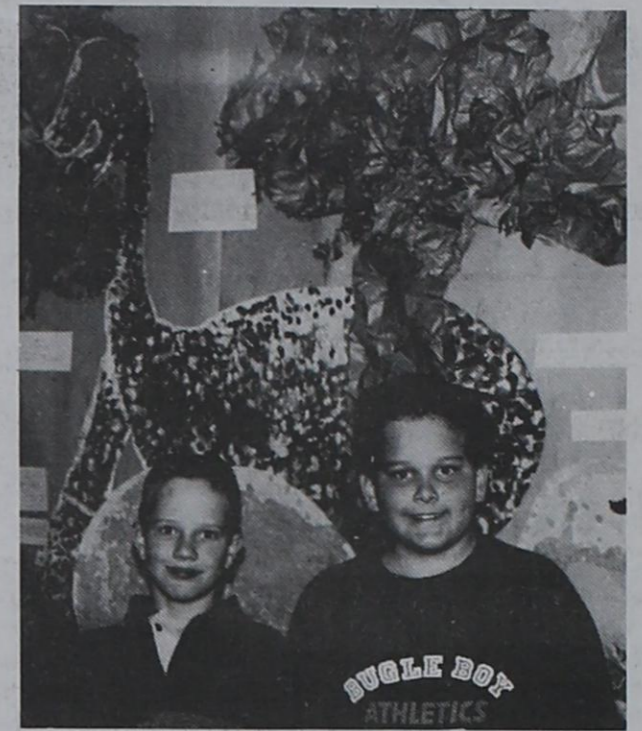
