



These seats are currently held by board president Herman Geries and Janice Hamilton.


Geries, a veteran of more than 16 years on the board, said he will not seek reelection.



* Parmer, Curry and Bailey counties - \$11.50 a year. Elsewhere - \$19.50 a

year.

And, 9-month subscriptions for kids in school - \$15.50 a year.

For the first time since April 1989, we are increasing our advertising rates. I think it was pretty good to keep our rates stable for almost

four years, but, as I said, higher costs eventually get their way.

Here's what they will be, effective Jan. 1, 1993:

* Local display ads - our open rate will be \$2.60 per column inch. Special rates are given to advertisers who run on a regular basis.

* National display ads - our open rate will be \$3.10 per column inch, out of which the Tribune will pay appropriate agency commissions.

Legal ads - 16¢a word will be charged for the first insertion, and 13¢thereafter.

* Classified ads - a minimum of \$4 per insertion will be charged if paid in cash; if billed, it will be \$5.50. Classified display ads will cost \$3 per column inch.

Inserts - 4-page tab, \$98; 6-page tab, \$113; 8page tab, \$136; 12-page tab, \$149; 16-page tab, \$166.

Frankly, as a conservative person, I'm not happy about rate hikes. Especially when the extra revenue to be produced will go toward paying higher bills.

Although nominal inflation has been kept in check somewhat the past four years, that hasn't been the case with some taxes and insurances. Add to that higher printing and mailing costs, and you have a squeeze put on small businesses like mine.



Furious Steer comeback fall short against Mules


A furious comeback by the Farwell Steers Tuesday night against Muleshoe just fell short as the Mules won 63-60 at Muleshoe.



Southwestern Festival Foods program held

The following recipes are from the SPS Southwestern Festive Foods 1992 cookbook:

Guilt Free Snack Chips

1 pkg. (10 oz.) flour tortillas

1/4 c. low - calorie Italian salad dressing Garlic salt or salt - free herb and spice blend

Preheat oven to 325 degrees. Cut each tortilla into eighths. Spread on a baking sheet lightly sprayed with cooking spray. Using a pastry brush, brush salad dressing over the tops of tortilla chips. Sprinkle with garlic salt or herb blend. Bake 10 to 12 minutes or until lightly browned. Cool completely before storing in airtight container. Makes about 7 cups of chips. Nutrient value per 1/7; 129 calories (23 % from fats), 3 g. fat, .5 mg. cholesterol, 352 mg. sodium.

Crunchy Cheese Ball

1 pkg. (3 oz.) dry chicken - flavored ramen noodle soup 2 pkgs. (8 oz. ea.) cream cheese

1 c. sour cream

1/2 c. dry roasted shelled sunflower seeds

4 green onions, chopped

1/3 c. dried parsley flakes or chopped parsley

In a food processor fitted with a steel knife blade, process noodles, cream cheese, sour cream, sunflower seeds, green onions, until well blended. Divide mixture into half, and shape each into a ball. Roll in parsley. Wrap in plastic wrap and refrigerate. Serve with crackers or bread. Makes 16 servings.

Note: to cut down on calories use light cream cheese and low fat sour cream.

Quick and Easy Beer Bread

1/2 c. butter

3 c. self - rising flour

2 Tbs. sugar

1 can (12 oz.) beer

Mix butter and pour enough into a 9x5 inch loaf pan to coat the bottom. In a large bowl, mix together flour, sugar and beer. Spoon dough into loaf pan. Pour remaining butter over the top. Bake at 350 degrees for 50 to 60 minutes or until bread is a light golden color. Let stand 10 minutes. Makes 16 servings.



Longhorns roar from behind to whip Dell City

Last Friday, the Lazbuddie Longhorns won their state quarter-final game over Dell City, 65-49, after a furious comeback.

Now Lazbuddie, 13-0, faces its old nemesis, Fort Hancock, 12-0, in the state semi-finals. The game will be played at Loboes Stadium in Monahans at 3 p.m. Saturday.

Fort Hancock has turned back the Longhorns the past two years, so Lazbuddie will be out for revenge.

Against Dell City, Lazbuddie had to overcome a 22-point disadvantage. But the Longhorns rode the strong arm of QB Brett Thomas, who hit 22 of 34 passes for 292 yards.

The first period was action packed, as Dell City roared out to a 35-19 lead. After the Cougars scored on a 4-yard pass, Thomas hit Matt Cozbey with a 53-yard TD pass. Leland Brockman threw the extra point pass to Cozbey. Then it was Dell City's time to score, this time on a 70-yard kickoff return. Lazbuddie responded, with Cozbey scoring again, this time on a 10-yard pass from Thomas; the kick failed.

The Cougars scored twice more, on passes of 16 and 44 yards. Lazbuddie tallied when Job Colby Miller hit paydirt on an 11-yard pass from Thomas; the pass for extra point failed. Then Dell City finished the first quarter scoring on a 5-yard TD pass.

The second quarter began on a sour note when the Cougars picked up a fumble at the Longhorn 29, and took it in. But the Longhorns didn't cave in, but picked up the tempo, scoring three more times in the quarter.

Brockman got things going with an 81-yard kickoff return; the kick failed. Minutes later, Brockman scored on a 19yard pass from Thomas, followed by a Brockman kick for 2

Pumper bought

The Texico City Council Nov. 24 voted to buy a new Class A Pumper for the volunteer fire department. No city funds are involved.

Fire Chief Lewis Cooper said the department had opened bids the previous week, ranging from \$117,297 to \$148,750. Cooper recommended a truck to be built by Smeal, in Nebraska, which offered a bid through AAA Fire Protection, Clovis, of \$124,173

Cooper said the AAA bid was the second lowest, and the final figure will be about \$1,000 less due to items to be deducted. This was the bid accepted by the city council. It will be delivered between 240 and 300 days. The department will be able to pre-pay the truck, resulting in an extra savings of \$1,600.

Cooper said the lowest bid had more than 20 exemptions to Texico's specificiations.

In other business, the council:

Heard Matt Meeks report on the need to buy new equipment to keep up with federal water inspection mandates which go into effect next July.

He said a chlorine emergency repair kit which costs \$1,100 is needed. The council tabled this.

Meeks said the equipment needed to sample chemicals in the water costs about \$1,000. The state, however, can also do this sampling for the city - but the cost appears about the same. This also will tabled.

Heard Cooper, cemetery board president, report that when spring comes, weeds will need to be gotten rid of and grass sown there.

- Formally approved two ordinances, one lowering the blood alcohol level for motorists convicted of DWI, and the other for raising water main tap-in fees.

The council also is looking at increasing its water and sewer rates, but wants to discuss it with city attorney Duane Hamar first. Hamar wasn't at the meeting.


The game quieted down for the Cougars in the second half, as they were held scoreless by the Lazbuddie tenacious defense. But Lazbuddie kept its offense in high gear.
