A bit of history

From spouse Judy: Parmer County sure voted different from the rest of the nation on the recent election. Parmer County only had one precinct where Bill Clinton got more votes than George Bush - Precinct 402 at the Friona Fire Station. About 60% of Parmer County voters picked Bush over Clinton.

Ross Perot, who garnered about 17% of the presidential vote nationally, did better than that in some Parmer County polls. Perot took 20% in Pct. 101, Calvary Baptist Church in Friona; 24% in Pct. 203, Rhea; 20% in Pct. 301, Farwell; and 42% in Pct. 303, Ridgelea School, Bovina.

This election underlined the fact that folks in rural areas have mighty different ideas about government than city folks do. Rural voters generally favor less government period. They also favor taxing wages or luxury items rather than land.

Shortly after the Revolutionary War, we tried to have a very weak government under the Articles of Confederation. It lasted nine years, and was not very successful.

During the Revolutionary War, each state had had its own army, and incurred bills because it. Some states were close to being broke. Others had more chances of paying off those bills. Many of them decided to pay off their cash debts by giving grants of land.

General George Washington was richly rewarded for his services to the nation with vast tracts of land way out west in the middle of a vast wasteland known as Ohio. So was his brother-in-law, Fielding Lewis. So were many, many other war heroes. It seemed to be a pretty equitable way to solve a problem.

Before any really workable government was devised, before the land was surveyed, and before the land could be developed into productive farmland, our great war heroes started getting tax bills from their new land.

Washington, Jefferson, and several others worked to remedy the situation. They met in Philadelphia in 1798 to form a stronger government which could enforce a different type of taxing system.

The solution they devised was a government filled with checks and balances. There would be a legislative branch to make the laws, an executive branch to enforce the laws and a judicial branch to judge the constitutionality of the laws.

The legislative branch of the government they devised had two distinct chambers - the Senate to represent the each state, and the House of Representatives to represent the people. By dividing the legislature, the rural landed gentry were represented by the Senate, and the poor land-less masses were represented by the House.

In the early days of this nation most folks lived in rural areas. That changed abruptly in the first 80 years of our nation's existence due mainly to industrialization which enticed folks to flock to cities in droves. In general, each person owned much less real estate. Their battle cry became "one man, one vote."

The power of the rural landowners remained fairly strong for a long time because of the way power was divided between the Sen-

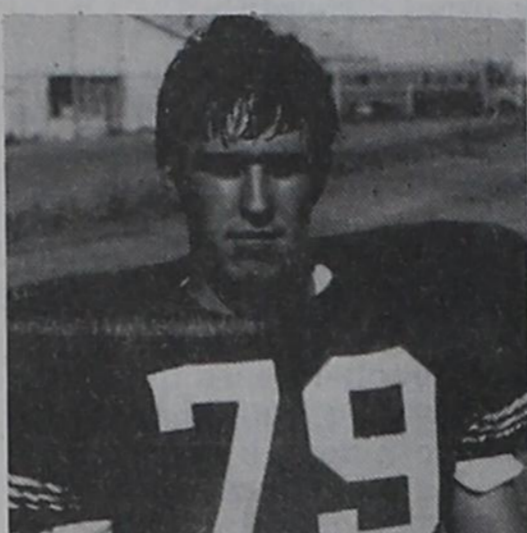

Estimate given for starting police department

Councilman John Carlson gave the Farwell City Council Tuesday a rough estimate on the cost of starting a city police department.

He had checked on equipment needs, the cost of a vehicle, and average salaries. He gave an incomplete first year cost of \$39,815. He estimated another \$2,000 would be needed, also, for items he hadn't thought of yet, such as insurance.

Among the items he checked on were a new car, shotgun, uniforms, radio, TD, ammunition, telephone expense and other accessories.

Carlson is a member of a 3-councilman committee heading the search. The other committee members, Pat Howard and Royce Bethel, weren't at the meeting so Carlson gave the full report.

Councilman Martin Kube said Parmer County sheriff's deputies must buy their own guns.

Ads seeking a police officer will be run in large daily newspapers beginning at the end of November.

In other business, the council:

- Approved the annual audit.
- Scheduled Dec. 1 hearings on two variance requests: one for Lupe Vidaurri to place a trailer at 800 Ave. B; the other for Harlin Obenshain to allow for mobile homes in the 100 block of 8th Street.
- Approved building permits for: Jerry Ellison, Heritage Square Homes; Jesse Cantu, a garage; Vernon Thigpen, a carport extension, and Chase Chisman, a spa room.
- Approved the annual dues of \$102 to the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission.
- Heard Water Supt. Dee Hammit say that Royce Menning has resigned and taken a job with Muleshoe Hospital. Joe Servin, who lives a few miles east of Farwell, was promoted to Royce's post and put on fulltime. No one will be hired. Also, Servin will be allowed to drive the city pickup home on weekends when he is on call.
- Approved finishing the placement of bottom ash in the city's alleys, at a cost of \$4,000.
- Approved a change in the animal ordinance. Now, a one-time \$5 fee will be charged for tags.

Lazbuddie wins opening playoff game

The powerful Lazbuddie Longhorns rolled to an easy win in their first state playoff game last Friday - beating Meadow's Broncos 58-8 at home.

Lazbuddie is now 11-0 on the year. The Longhorns will play Valley for the Regional playoff at Silverton Friday (today) at 7:30 p.m. Tickets are \$2 for students and \$3 for adults.

Silverton is 10-1. Coach Mark Scisson said, "We will have to play a little above our heads if we want to win this one." The winner will go into the state quarter-finals. They will play the winner of the Dell City - Wellman game. As for Meadow, Scisson said, "We played a little flat, but we had enough talent to pull it off."

The Meadow game ended with just over 5 minutes left because of the 45-point rule. Once again, the strong arm of QB Brett Thomas carried the day. He completed 11 of 25 passes for 225 yards and 4 TDs.

The first quarter saw the Longhorns get out to a 20-8 lead. Meadow scored first when Travis Andrews scored on Meadows' first play - a 60-yard TD gallop. He also kicked the points after and Meadow was up 8-zip. After that it was all Lazbuddie. First, Leland Brockman scored on a 58-yard pass from Thomas; the kick failed. Then Dee Martinez scored on a 17-yard pass from Thomas; the kick missed. And Mario Zamora ran over from the 6, followed by a kick by Jon Colby Miller.

The second quarter was more of the same, as Lazbuddie outscored Meadow, 22-0. Miller scored the first 2 TDs - on a 9 yard pass from Thomas and on a 14 yard run. Both were followed by Miller kicks. Then Thomas kept the ball for a 33- yard TD run; the kick missed. At the half, the Longhorns were ahead, 42-8 over Meadow, which was 3-7 coming into the game.

There was only one score in the 3rd quarter - Matt Cozbe scored on a 50-yard pass from Thomas, followed by a Brockman kick.

In the final quarter, Lazbuddie scored 2 points on a safety, followed by a 50-yard TD scamper by Thomas.

The theme of the celebration will be "Boldly tell everyone what God has done for you."

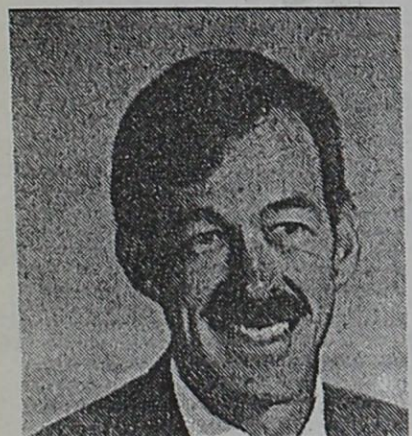
The day will begin with a worship service at 9:30 a.m. and the festivities will continue throughout the day.

The day's activities will continue at 2:30 p.m. with Rev. Hennings speaking on the topic of "Expanding Your Vision".

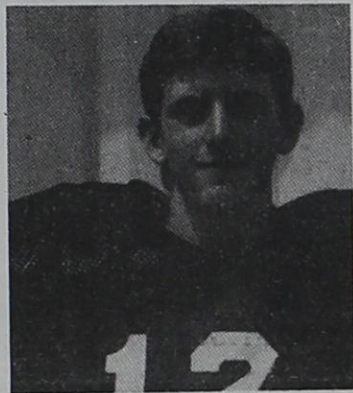
A light supper will then be served at 4 p.m.

pro golf tour the past couple of years without success. But he tried again last month and passed the first stage of the Qualifying Round at Garland, Texas.

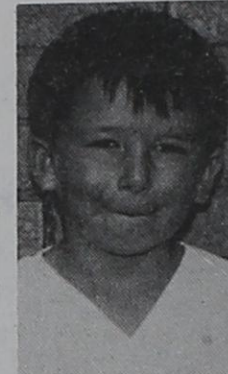
We wish Jeff the best and hope he continues practicing, then succeeding next year at his dream.

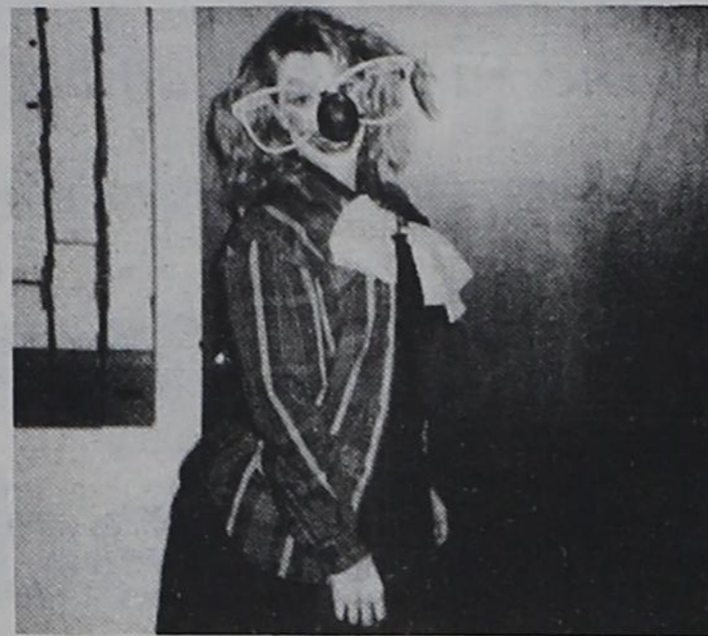

Recipe of Week

Cherry Crisp

- 1/3 c. flour
- 3/4 c. rolled oats
- 1/3 c. margarine
- 2/3 c. sugar
- 16 oz. can pitted sour cherries
- 1 1/2 Tbs. cornstarch
- 1/2 tsp. cinnamon
- 1/8 tsp. nutmeg
- 1 Tbs. lemon juice

Combine the flour and rolled oats. Cut in the margarine until the mixture is crumbly; mix in 1/3 c. of the sugar. Set aside for topping.

Drain cherries reserving the juice. Combine sugar, cornstarch, spices, lemon juice and the cherry juice. Cook over low heat stirring constantly until sauce is thick and clear. Add the cherries. Pour into a greased 8" square baking pan. Sprinkle topping over cherries.

Bake at 375 degrees for 30 minutes.

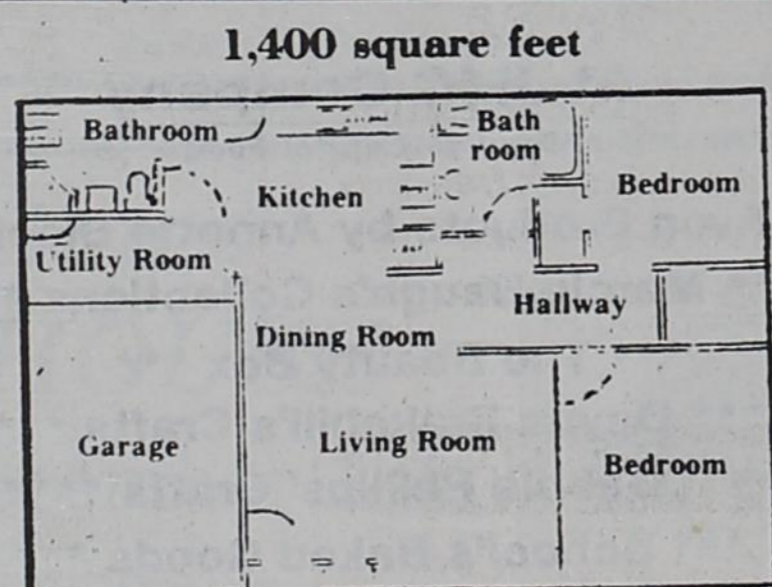

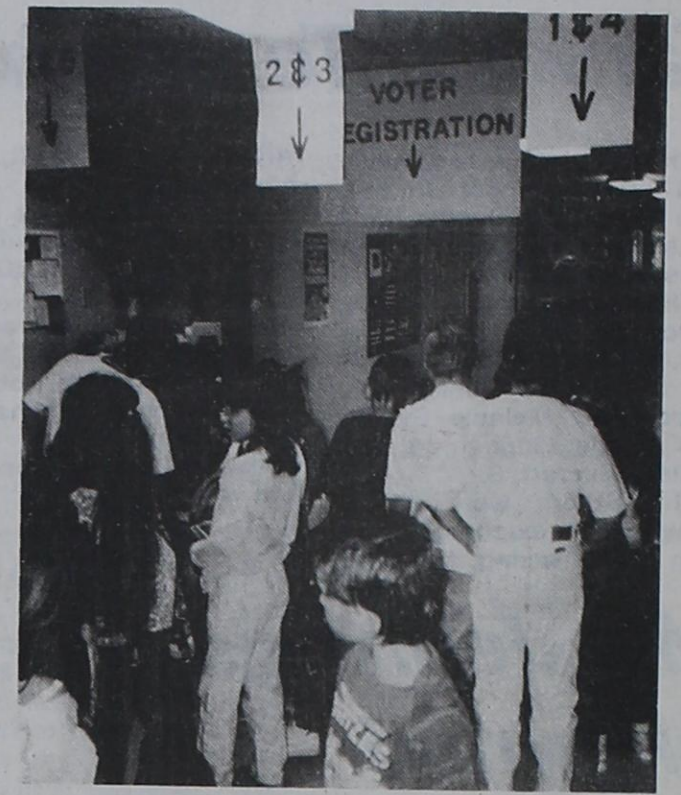

A source of wonder

Speculation about the size of the 1992 crop is close to being over according to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers (PCG). The remarkable performance of the 1992 crop has been a continual source of wonder across the High Plains.

Early expectations for the area crop were dismal at best following the unprecedented destruction of well over half of the areas expected 3.1 million cotton acres in late May and early June. The latest USDA projection is for the High Plains to harvest near 1.39 million acres of cotton.

Initial yield estimates for the remaining acres for the most part reflected the late start much of the cotton had received as well as the fact that the majority is located in areas south of Lubbock. Most cotton in this area is produced under dryland conditions.

"This year's crop has really been a surprise," notes PCG Executive Vice President Donald Johnson. "Early predictions of a crop at or below one million bales have been proven wrong and we are now looking at a crop near 1.5 million bales."

USDA's November estimate for Texas crop reporting districts 1-N and 1-S was raised to 1.51 million bales. Districts 1-N and 1-S account for the majority of the counties served by PCG and are commonly used as an estimate of the area's production.

The increase is entirely due to the better than expected yields being achieved in district 1-S. The November yield estimate for the area was increased 51 pounds to 524 pounds per acre.

"Examples of how far this year's crop has come can be seen in the grades we've been seeing at the classing office," says Johnson.

Through November 5, 108,304 bales have been classed in the Lamesa and Lubbock classing offices. From this total a remarkable 65 percent have graded 31 or better, 67 percent have mike values between 3.5 and 4.9, and 78 percent have an average staple length of 34 or better. He adds that strength is averaging slightly over 28 grams/tex at both offices.

Announcement of the 1993 loan level and the preliminary announcement of the 1993 Acreage Reduction Program (ARP) is good news for cotton producers according to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers.

The announcement, made November 2, ended speculation about USDA's preliminary decision on the ARP which was set at 7.5 percent for 1993. The 1990 Farm Bill requires the Secretary of Agriculture to make the preliminary announcement by November 1. The final ARP percentage will be announced by January 1, 1993.

Also announced was the 1993 loan level at 52.35 cents for the base quality, unchanged from 1992. What has changed for 1993 is how the base quality is described. The change in the description was necessary to reflect the upcoming separation of color and leaf in the USDA grading system.

For the 1993 crop the base quality will be color grade 41, leaf grade 4, staple length 1 and 1/16 inches, micronaire 3.5-3.6 and 4.3-4.9, and strength 24-25 grams/tex.

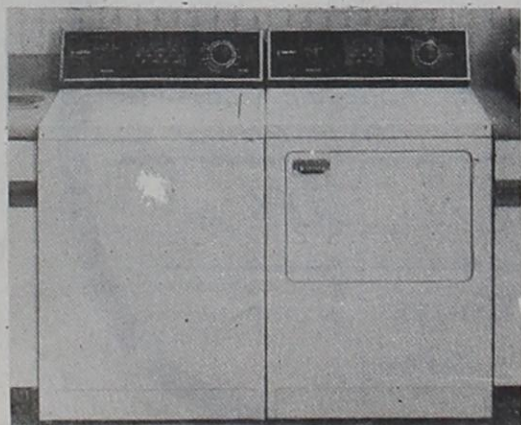


