Border Banter

On Waco

Larry Heacock, pastor at Hamlin Memorial United Methodist Church, wrote about the Waco mess in his pastoral letter last week. I'd like to share it with you:

"The Davidian compound burned down yesterday. What a strange ending to a strange situation. There are many unanswered questions remaining, on both sides of the door. Most of my questions have to do with the involvement of religion in this kind of tragic event.

"Just exactly how as religion involved in this event? Koresh, or whatever his name was, used religion as a means of organizing and controlling his followers. But the system he developed was broader than just religion. It was a sociological system of life that he constructed, around his own personality.

"He eventually isolated the system from the rest of society so that he could be its ultimate master. He only used religion as a controlling factor. He used his followers to satisfy his own appetite for power and self-gratification. Religion was as much as victim as were the 90-plus people.

"His little world had closed in on itself and had no where else to go. He had accomplished his desire for power and self-indulgence. He could not bring himself to give up the game. That would be an admission of error.

"To try to justify his game, he had to self-destruct - to try to become a martyr. There was no where else to take the game. Perhaps the major error of the authorities outside his door was to not take seriously enough his dilemma and the nature of fanaticism.

"His talk of apocalypse and fire was not idle speculation. The concept of apocalypse involves the expectation of destruction of the present age. The theme was born out of frustration of Israel from oppression by foreign powers in the centuries prior to Jesus' day. What it led to was the destruction of Israel, and Koresh. We can see now that when he began to stockpile food and weapons, he headed down the road of self-annihilation.

"The authorities tell us that Koresh claimed to be Jesus, or a prophet. Let it be known that Jesus did not lie. Jesus did not stockpile weapons. Jesus did not resist the authorities with force. Jesus did not indulge himself in power games and pleasures of the flesh. Jesus gave up his life that others might have new life. Koresh gave up his life for himself - to try to save face. Koresh was not Jesus.

"Could the authorities have avoided the fiery holocaust? I doubt it. Koresh was just looking for an excuse to self-destruct. He lured the authorities into giving him one with rumors of abuse of the children inside. If the authorities had not fallen for that one, Koresh would have found some other excuse.

"We have much to learn from this event. One thing is clear - fanaticism can use religion for its purposes, just as it can use politics or militarism. Fanaticism is easier to recognize in militaristic forms such as nazism or neofascism. Let us be wary of fanaticism when it comes in a religious disguises."

I got a letter from Friona State Bank just after last week's paper was published that they didn't have any information of Floyd H. Cummings, the World War II veteran from Friona.

Born in 1917 in Pontiac, Ill., he moved to the Texico area in 1929 with his parents and family. He attend school at Fairfield (a community just south of Texico) through his sophomore year when Fairfield consolidated with Texico, and graduated from THS in 1935. He participated in football, basketball, track and baseball. He was New Mexico FFA state president.

He received a State Farmer Degree and was the first person in New Mexico to receive an American Farmer Degree.

He married Evelyn North on June 16, 1940, and they farmed and raised cattle until 1979. They raised registered milking shorthorn cattle and hampshire hogs. He was chairman of New Mexico ASCS Committee from 1969-1974.

In 1979, he and Evelyn were awarded New Mexico Farm Family of the Year. He was on the Texico School Board 16 years, including being president. He was on the Curry County Fair Board, including being president. He was a member of Farm Bureau and served as Curry County president. He was Texico mayor for several years. He served on the Texico-Farwell Methodist Church Board of Stewards for 12 years when the church was in Texico. He now is a member of Hamlin Memorial United Methodist Church.

He and his wife have raised 6 children - Raymond, Gale, Jeanie, Linda, Lou Ann and Richard. They have 14 grandchildren and 11 great-grandchildren.

Evelyn Warmuth

The Woman of the Year is a very busy person. She has assisted in all Chamber projects for several years, including cleanup days, fund-raisers, the flower boxes along main street and helped design and assemble the Chamber's float for Border Town Days.

She's a member of the Texico First Baptist Church choir and assists with Vacation Bible School. She has been a Chapter 1 aide with Texico Schools and was instrumental in starting Secret Pals, as well as being chairman of special school activities. She has been a cheerleader sponsor. Currently, she's a substitute teacher at Texico and keeps the score book for Texico basketball games and been a catcher at home track meets. She has served on the Border Town Days' queen's committee. 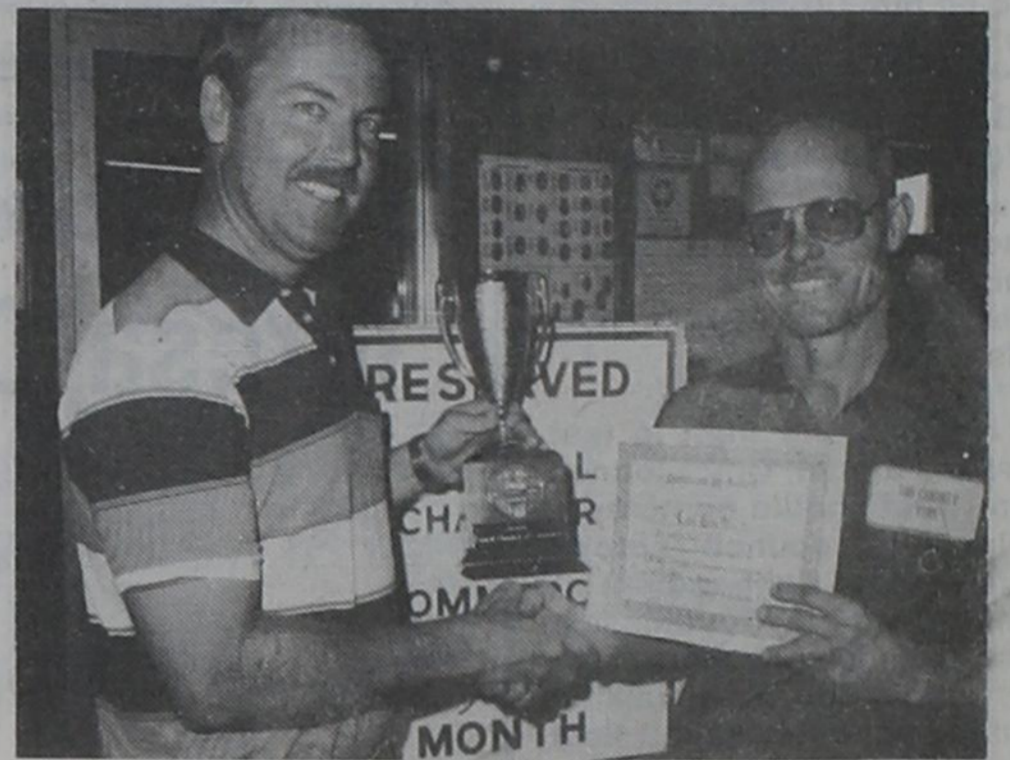
The council has to formally confirm McGaa's appointment in open meeting May 10.

Texans go to the polls Saturday

Texas polls will be open from 7 a.m. - 7 p.m. on May 1.

The ballot features three amendments to the Texas State Constitution to fund education.

Also, voters will fill an unexpired U.S. senatorial term vacated when Lloyd Bentsen became U.S. Secretary of the Treasury. Gov. Ann Richards appointed Bob Krueger to the post.

Krueger, a Democrat, and Kay Bailey Hutchison, a Republican, are considered the favorites among 24 candidates for the senatorial post.

The following local races will be on the local election ballots:

Farwell City Council

Three candidates vie for the two City Council posts - Jerry Stover and incumbents Royce Bethel and John Carlson.

Mayor Chris Gikas is unopposed for election.

Farwell School Board

There will be two positions on the ballot.

The posts are sought by Teresa Ancira and incumbents Charles Christian and David Norton.

Lazbuddie School Board

There are three posts on the ballot, currently held by

Robert Gallman, Lloyd Bradshaw, and Tommy Sinclair.

The three incumbents, plus Larry Jesko and Steve Foster have filed.

Farwell Hospital District

Five positions will be on the ballot for the Farwell Hospital District.

Incumbents Mike Ratke, Rick Sullivan, Jack Allen Kirkland, and Jerry Monk filed, as did Annette Black. Thus, all five will be elected.

Texico picks new police deputy

The Texico City Council heard Mayor Doyal LaRue announce Monday that Gilbert Holguin, 30, of Clovis, would be the new city deputy marshal.

The post has been vacant since the resignation in February of Kirk Roberts. Seventeen applications for the post had been received by the council.

Holguin will begin his duties in early May. He is attempting to find a house to live in Texico.

Holguin served 8 1/2 years on the Clovis Police Department. Prior to that, he was a police officer in Deming, N.M.

In other business, the council:

- Approved participating in the DWI area task force.

- Was asked legal questions pertaining to an abandoned house at 610 State St. by Ken Chappell, of Lubbock, whose late father was Johnny Chappell. Chappell said he is the executor of the estate. City Attorney Duane Hamar suggested to Chappell that he seek legal advice from an attorney to answer the questions he had.

- Heard councilman Ronnie Warmuth say he had received a complaint about pit bulls and junked cards at a home on Florence. Marshal Fry Urioste said he would write citations since the dogs have become a nuisance.

- Tabled a vote on whether to buy \$4,000 worth of shop wiring mandated by the federal government. The city is tight on funds right now.

- Approved buying new pager - radios for the police department, less trade-in.

- Had planned to discuss a school request to put chain link fencing across some alleys but Supt. R.L. Richards didn't appear. Informally, city officials said they couldn't close access to alleys.

- Received a list of surplus equipment from the water and sewer department.

Councilman Butch Tharp will study it and recommend minimums before the list is put out to bid.

- Approved a variance request to place two mobile homes at 622 State St. Fourteen letters had been sent to nearby property owners. Four were returned, all in favor.

- Was told by councilman Oran Jay Autrey that Clovis is preparing the paperwork to have their building inspection department be used by Texico. Currently, Texico must use the state inspectors but would prefer Clovis'.

- Had placed on the agenda a problem with junked cars being placed on the Freeman lot next to Town & Country. It was taken off the agenda and possibly discussed in executive session.

County employs Bonham

The Parmer County Commissioners voted Monday to contract with Richard Bonham, of Bovina, as the county's emergency management coordinator.

Bonham had been handling the post on a volunteer basis. He will be paid \$400 per month. The post is mandated by the state.

His job includes filing reports required by the state, and to coordinate efforts in case of disasters, especially in outlying areas.

In other business, the commissioners voted \$4,000 to the Farwell Chamber of Commerce for its Parmer County Veterans Memorial. The funds had been pledged six months ago - \$1,000 from each commissioner.

The commissioners will have a special meeting at 11:45 a.m. May 3 to canvass the election results.

Letter To The Editor

Mr. Editor:

I want to comment on the "Letter to the Editor" in the publication dated April 23, 1993, purported to have been signed by Paula Wilson, City Manager; Clarence Monroe, Mayor, and the City Council of Friona, Texas.

I found it odd and not so amusing that a person reported to be intelligent and having the capabilities to be a City Manager would make comments such as contained in her letter. She rambles on and on about how mistreated the City of Friona is by having to fight fires not within their city limits. She goes on to say that the County of Parmer should pay their fair share in fighting these fires, then continues griping about the meager (her term) \$4,000.00 the city gets from the county to offset expenses incurred while fighting the fires.

The most profound statement in the letter was she felt that since the county residents (her term again) pay their taxes to the county and not the City of Friona it was the moral and legal responsibility of Parmer County to provide them fire protection, not the city.

Some questions to Ms. Wilson:

1. How much does these so-called country residents contribute to the overall economy of the City of Friona? I would dare to say in the hundreds of thousands of dollars. Just look around your fine city and see how many businesses rely on these country residents for a living. I believe that your fire chief has a well pump service. The last time I checked, this type of business did a considerable amount of business with country residents. By the way, folks you call country residents are basically called farmers where I live. If it wasn't for those farmers pouring in thousands of dollars into your city, there wouldn't be a need for a City Manager. Besides that, there wouldn't be enough money to pay one.

2. It has been reported in the written media and by people that were present during the Parmer County Commissioners' meeting, one of your comments was that your city government was thinking about charging Parmer County \$400.00 per fire call to country residents' homes or

property. Isn't that commonly known as extortion? In other words, PAY UP OR BURN! I know that your mayor and at least one councilman are farmers. I guess that if their barn or equipment catches on fire and their own fire department doesn't respond to help, it will be all right because someone did not pay you \$400.00.

3. Have you, Ms. Wilson, really looked at the financial records regarding monies issued to Fire and Ambulance Departments in Parmer County by the commissioners for the year ending 12-31-92? The records I checked from the County Treasurer's office indicated that a total of \$85,394.83 had been issued to all departments within Parmer County. Of that amount, the City of Friona received \$43,994.83 - over half the total amount distributed. Now, if these figures are incorrect than I stand corrected. This is the information I got via the Treasurer's office. As the saying goes, "men may lie about facts, but facts don't lie about men."

In closing, I say that you owe the "country residents" (farmers) an apology. Talk about moral responsibility. After the amount of money spent in Friona by farmers in your area, I would think you would be more than happy to assist them in any way possible. It is evident you are cooking (no pun intended) the goose that lays the golden egg.

I thank the Lord above that we on the City Council in Farwell don't look upon our area farmers as a liability. If they need our help, we will try to be there - and we don't charge them \$400.00.

away much of the local control of schools that we have left. It is one great step toward socialism. Since the fall of the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, it is beyond my comprehension why our great nation chooses to follow socialistic practices that have proved to be destructive in other countries. This country was built by people with individual initiative under a free enterprise system of government and not by people waiting around for government to do something for them.

More consolidation of schools is not a good alternative to the amendments. With some exceptions, small schools have less crime and bad behavior among students, more discipline, less percentage of dropouts and a higher rate of students who start and finish college. Some say that large schools can be operated cheaper than small ones. This I doubt but if so they are trading quality for a little money.

It would be much more preferable for the State to make up the difference in money to satisfy the courts than to take money from one district and give it to another.

The Federal government could help schools more by getting clear out of the picture. So far, its greatest accomplishments have been to raise taxes and require teachers to fill out great numbers of forms when they should be teaching.

The national debt is more than four trillion dollars, besides more than that amount in guarantees, and I expect the state would be in a comparable position were it not for our state constitution. It is time to realize that spending money the government does not have is not the answer to our problems.

The answer is for local, state and federal governments to cut waste to the bone and do away with many programs that are not essential, and to cut taxes so that individuals and business have the incentive to build a stronger and more prosperous Nation.

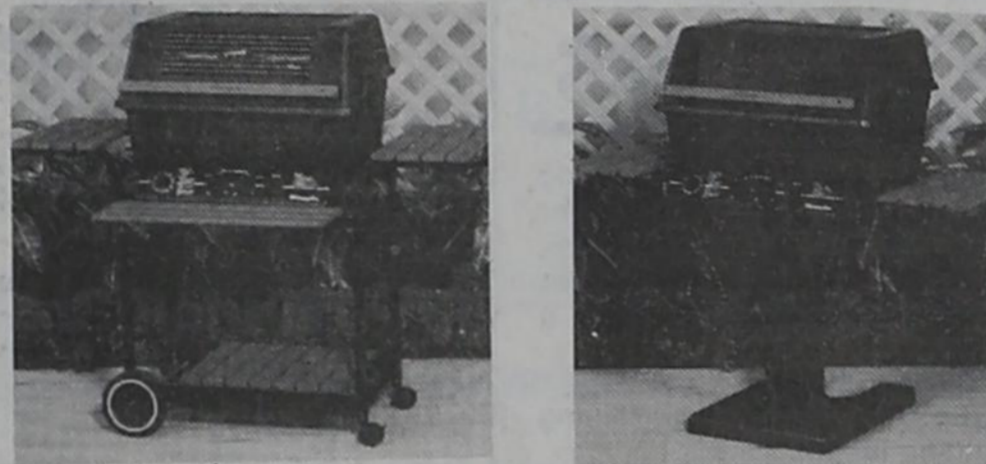

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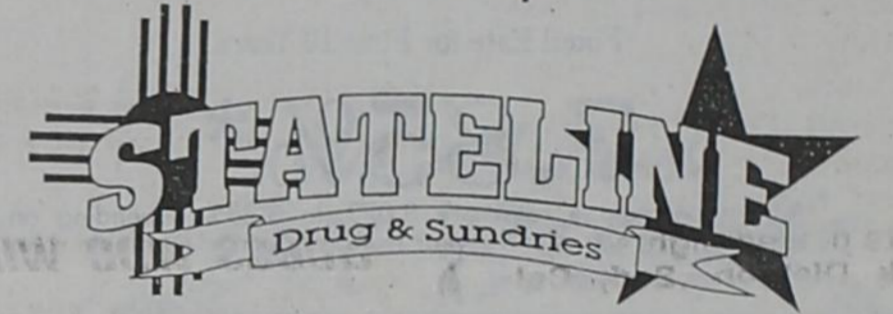

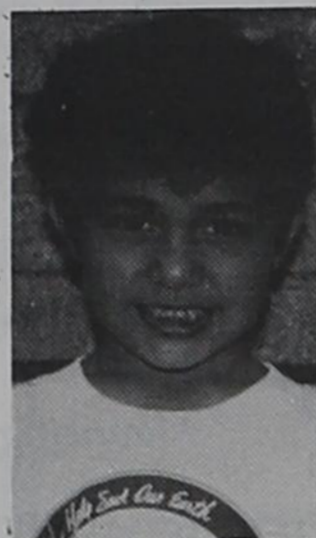

Notice of Rate Change Request And Statement of Intent

Notice is hereby given that Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative, Inc. (the "Utility") intends to decrease rates for electric utility service effective July 6, 1993, or as soon thereafter as may be permitted by law. Based upon a test year ending December 31, 1992, the decrease requested is \$740,000 or 4.465% of actual test year revenues. The changes are applicable to all areas, all customer classes, and all customers served by the Utility.

The Utility proposes to change all rates for Farm and Home, Residential Space Heating, Irrigation, Commercial, Large Power, Industrial, Cotton Gin, and Lighting, including demand, energy, minimum and other charges. The proposed changes are expected to affect the classes as follows: for the 4,416 customers in the farm and home class, the proposed decrease will be \$109,357 or a negative 4.53% change in revenues; for the 147 customers in the residential space heating class, the proposed decrease will be \$7,793 or a negative 3.39% change in revenues; for the 4,060 customers in the irrigation class, the proposed decrease will be \$376,215 or a negative 4.15% change in revenues; for the 774 customers in the commercial class, the proposed decrease will be \$54,019 or a negative 6.17% change in revenues; for the 111 customers in the large power class the proposed decrease will be \$1,413 or a negative 8.11% change in revenues; for the 26 customers in the industrial class, the proposed decrease will be \$95,907 or a negative 3.74% change in revenues; for the 6 customers in the cotton gin class, there will be no change in revenues; and for the 2,888 customers in the lighting class, the proposed decrease will be \$15,296 or a negative 6.11% change in revenues.

The Utility also intends to change its service rules and regulations, including rules relating to obtaining service, line extension and line extension charges, the provision of electric service, service fees, and discontinuance of service.

Information concerning the proposed rate changes, including the proposed revisions of tariff and schedules is available at the General Office of the Utility, located at Highway 60 at Whittier Street, Hereford, Texas 79045-0753. Inquiries should be directed to Mike Veazey.

The Utility is required to give notice of the percentage change in base revenues which is negative 12.087%. The percentage decrease in base revenues is not an indication of how much your bill will change. Rather, it is a measure of the decrease in revenues that will be experienced by the Utility for its own operations, excluding payment of the cost of power purchased by the Utility from its wholesale power suppliers.

On or about May 7, 1993, the Utility will file with the Public Utility Commission of Texas, a Statement of Intent to Change Rates, specifying in detail each proposed change. Requests to intervene must be filed no later than 45 days after the application filing date; Thus, the Utility anticipates the deadline for intervening and objecting to the rate changes will be June 21, 1993. 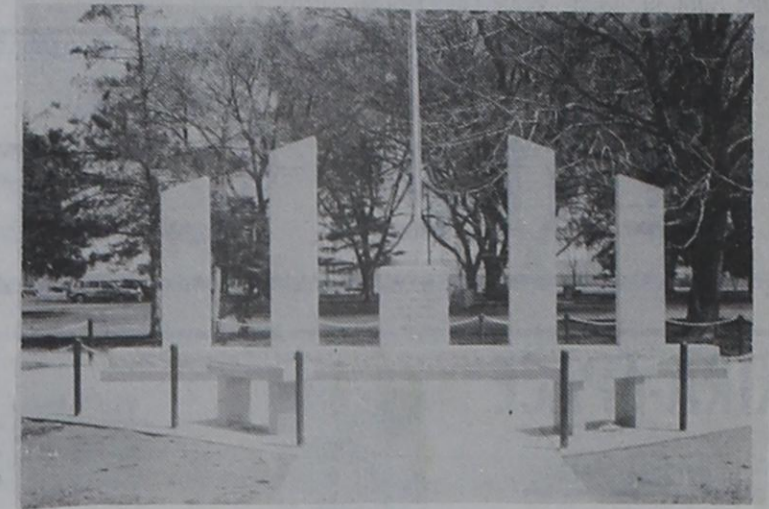

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
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
