Steers to play 8-man football for Homecoming

It will be a most interesting Homecoming for Farwell High School tonight (Friday) when the Steers host the Melrose Buffaloes at 8.

Fans will see how 8-man football is played.

Two weeks ago, Melrose suffered several injuries in their grid opener, ending up with only 13 players. They asked Farwell to play 8-man football tonight because of their manpower shortage. The Steers agreed Tuesday.

In 8-man football, here's how the offense shapes up: a quarterback, 2 running backs, 2 ends and 3 linemen.

There's another big change for Farwell Homecoming this year.

The annual bonfire Thursday night has been eliminated. Principal Larry Gregory said this is due to concerns of damage to surrounding structures and that the fire department has advised against continuing to hold the fires.

Instead, a new tradition will start, said Gregory. He billed it "The First Historic Episode" and it will be held at 8 p.m. Thursday, Sept. 17, at the football field.

"You've got to be there to find out what it will be" said Gregory.

Otherwise, Homecoming activities stay the same. The

King and Queen will be crowned at the pep rally at 3:05 p.m. today.

Queen candidates are Melinda Landrum, Jill Actkinson, Amanda Johnson, Christie Phillips and April Stout.

King candidates are Jeremy Ortiz, Lance Anderson, Shawn Haseloff, Clint Austin and Derrick Haseloff.

Homecoming activities were under way all week, with dress-updays, decorations and the elections for King and Queen.

Last year's royalty were Brian Johnson and Robin Ray.

The senior class will serve a charcoal broiled steak dinner from 5 to 7 p.m. before the Melrose game at the school cafeteria. Tickets are available at the door or from class members. Tickets cost \$5 for adults and \$3.50 for children.

The meal includes steaks, baked potato, salad, corn, hot rolls, dessert and tea or coffee.

Following the game, there will be a dance at the community center from 10 p.m. - midnight. The music will be provided by Clay Corn and his CD's. Tickets will be \$5 per couple or \$3 per person.

The dance is open to everyone - returning alumni, teachers, students, parents, etc.

Trash problem discussed

The Parmer County Commissioners Monday discussed a problem with its trash disposal sites near Bovina and Friona. Some folks are putting prohibited materials in the bins, such as tires, refrigerators (with freon still in them) and chemical jugs not properly rinsed.

The commissioners discussed monitoring the sites, such as keeping them open only certain hours. No decisions were made.

In other business, the commissioners allowed Friona Schools to use \$14,415 of Friona's interest in the Permanent County School Fund for replacing the schools' cooling and heating system.

The commissioners will let bids for a motor grader for Precinct 3, Farwell, next month.

Planned are classrooms at all three campuses plus a gymnasium.

Patrons will vote at the Farwell Community Center from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Billie Blaine will be the election judge.

Breakdown given on funds for school projects

Editor's note: The Educational District Improvement Committee, composed of Farwell School staff, administrators, patrons and parents, sent this letter to summarize how the proposed bond issue will deal with finances.

The impending Farwell School District \$1.5 million bond issue seeks to improve the quality of school facilities and enhance school climate and pride. Even though the present economy is somewhat down, the School Board made the decision to call for this election now for several reasons.

One is that the district has no indebtedness and is financially sound. Another is that present interest rates are lower than in the last 20 years. In fact, one copy of a Farwell ISD school bond going all the way back to 1923 shows the interest rate to be 6 percent then, which is comparable to rates today. The last bond issue for Farwell Schools was in 1974. The interest rate on those bonds was 5.5 percent. Because of Farwell Schools' good financial standing in the past, we are rated AAA. This means we are eligible for the best interest rate available.

Actual cost of planned school improvements is \$1.865 million. However, \$254,000 is available in fund balance, which is money saved by the school system during the past two years. An additional \$131,000, which may be used only for capital improvements, is in county available funds (the Permanent County School Fund).

Over the last two years, our school board has lowered the effective tax rate by 8.25 cents. If state funding based on equity and mandates remain the same, the present rate is not likely to rise. The Farwell School Board will make a concerted effort to prevent any tax rate increases due to this bond. Even if a slight increase were to be necessary, all taxpayers 65 years or older will have no tax increase on their homestead. The tax rate is frozen for them.

Since Farwell has not made any major renovations or additions to the school plant in nearly 20 years, now is the time to update our facilities. Borrowing rates for the bond are extremely low, and our local tax rates have been lowered. Therefore, the time is right to improve present conditions and properly prepare for the educational future of our children.

Olton races past Steers

The Olton Mustangs ran past the Farwell Steers 54-0 last Friday at W.M. Roberts Stadium.

The Steers, 0-2 on the season, host Melrose at 8 p.m. tonight (Friday) for Homecoming.

The Mustangs completely shut down the Steer attack while scoring repeatedly on end runs and through the air.

The game started with Dean Rubio kicking to the Olton 33. Steer tackles were made by Justin Mahaney, Shawn Haseloff, Derrick Haseloff, Lance Anderson and Jeremy Ortiz although Olton moved the ball downfield. Olton scored at 8:25 on a 31-yard pass when the receiver made a one-handed stop, hauling the ball in. The kick made it 7-0.

Farwell was hampered on first offensive series by a holding penalty. The Steers punt failed due to a high snap and a safety was recorded for Olton at 5:52, making it 9-0.

Lupe Garza punted to midfield. Nash Armstrong, Ortiz and Derrick Haseloff had good tackles and Olton was stopped at the Farwell 33. On offense, Brent Harrison ran for 8 and 21 yards. But a pass on 4th and 7 failed and Olton took over at its 38. Olton then scored on a 62-yard TD run at the end of the first quarter. The kick was blocked and Olton led 15-0.

In the second quarter, Farwell was held but kept the ball due to a roughing the kicker penalty. A pass from Ryan Williams to Derrick Haseloff gained 15. Farwell then had to punt to the Olton 15. A quarterback run around end gained 56. Despite tackles by Kade Kent, Derrick Haseloff and Clint Austin, an end run gained a 5-yard TD for Olton at 3:40. The kick made it 22-0.

On offense, Harrison scampered for 12. Farwell punted and Derrick Haseloff recovered a fumble at the Mustang 20. But Farwell fumbled the ball back. Shawn Haseloff then intercepted at the Olton 40 as the half ended.

Opening the 3rd quarter, the Olton kick returned got the ball to the Steer 37 where Clay Corn made the tackle. Olton

scored on a 10-yard run up the middle. The kick made it 29-0 at 6:46.

Farwell began play on its 36. Anderson burst for 11. Garza had an excellent punt to the Olton 5. Tackles were made by Armstrong, Justin Mahaney and Shawn Haseloff but Olton controlled the ball during the rest of the quarter.

At the start of the final stanza, Olton tallied on a 12-yard run at 11:36. The kick was blocked and it was 35-0.

The Steers went for it on 4th and 1 at the Farwell 40 and Anderson made the first down yardage. Olton recovered a fumble at the Steer 44. A 55-yard end run gained another Olton TD at 8:31.

Farwell was held and punted to the Olton 20. Austin had a strong tackle. But Olton scored from the 15 off tackle at 4:34, to up its lead to 48-0.

Farwell had to punt. Rubio had a good tackle. But Olton scored at 1:16 on a 60-yard run. The kick failed.

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Estrada kicks Wolverines past Capitan in overtime

In an exciting overtime game, the Texico Wolverines defeated the Capitan Tigers, 10-7, on a soggy Capitan field last Friday.

Texico, 2-1, plays at Eunice tonight. The first quarter opened with the Wolverines kicking off and Hadley Gilbert making the tackle. Daniel Madrid stopped a 25-yard drive by Capitan while Corey Horner had several excellent tackles. A 15-yard gain by Capitan was cut short by Louie Delgado which left the Tigers on Texico's 11 yard line. Corey Horner held the Tigers on several plays along with the help of Billy Rogers.

With 5:36 left in the first quarter, the Tigers failed on a field goal attempt, which gave the ball to Texico at its 3 yard line. Gilbert ran for 4 but the Wolverines fumbled on the next play, turning the ball over at their 14. Excellent defense from Rogers and Steve Horner was provided, as the first quarter ended, and Capitan couldn't score.

The second quarter began with a 27-yard run by Louie Delgado and several gains by Kelvin Gooden before Texico lost another fumble at its 37. Stephen Cloud and Corey Horner executed several good tackles before Texico recovered a Capitan fumble at the Wolverine 14.

Texico was held and punted. On defense, Kelvin Gooden, Rogers and Matthew Williams made good plays. Capitan broke loose for an apparent TD but it was called back due to a clipping penalty and the half ended 0-0.

The third quarter started with the Wolverines on offense but Capitan intercepted as its 21. Once again, Texico showed excellent defense, with a strong tackle by Anthony Garcia. Texico took over and Gooden and Delgado helped move the ball downfield.

Texico had a 3rd and 2 at the Capitan 27 but a holding penalty put them back 10 yards. Delgado then completed a pass to Johnny Salinas on the next play for a 37-yard TD. Luis Estrada kicked the point after for a 7-0 lead halfway through the quarter.

The next four minutes contained 3 fumbles, two by Texico and one by Capitan. But the quarter ended with Texico holding its lead.

At the start of the final period, wet field conditions contributed to another Texico fumble after several good runs by Gooden. Capitan recovered and ran for 42 yards before Delgado made the tackle. After holding the Tigers to 8 yards on their next 4 downs, Texico took over at its 7.

With only 37 seconds left, the Wolverines were 4th and 14 and decided to punt. The punt was blocked in the end zone and the Tigers scored with 33 seconds left. Down 7-6, the Tigers elected to go for a two-point conversion when Texico

was called for illegal motion. But Capitan got called for a delay of game penalty. So Capitan kicked the point after to knot the score.

Texico's Manuel Estrada returned the kickoff to the Tiger 36. Delgado passed to Salinas for a big gain but Salinas coughed up the ball when he was tackled at the Capitan 2 yard line as time expired.

The game went into overtime. Capitan chose to take their four downs from the 10-yard line first. The Wolverine defense held strong.

On offense, Texico's Gooden gained 4 yards on first down but Delgado was sacked on second down for a 1-yard loss. Another gain by Gooden set up a 22-yard Luis Estrada field goal for the game winner.

Individual statistics were: rushing - Gooden, 16 for 109 yards; Salinas, 3 for minus 9; Delgado, 8 for 28; and Gilbert, 2 for 5. Receiving - Salinas, 2 for 98 yards; passing - Delgado, 2 of 6 for 98 yards.

Team statistics were: first downs - Texico 4, Capitan 6; rushing - Texico 132, Capitan 141; passing - Texico 98, Capitan 22; total yards - Texico 230, Capitan 163; punts - Texico 2 for a 15.5 yard average, Capitan 3 for a 36 yard average; fumbles - Texico lost 5 of 6, Capitan lost 1 of 2; penalties - Texico 5 for 34 yards, Capitan 6 for 50.

Estrada cited

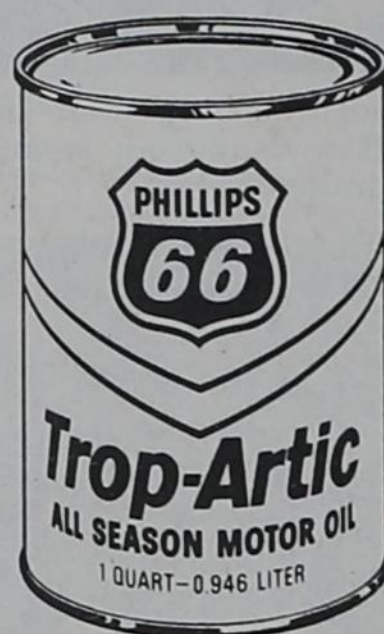

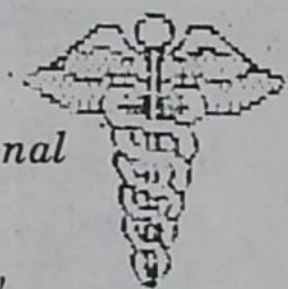

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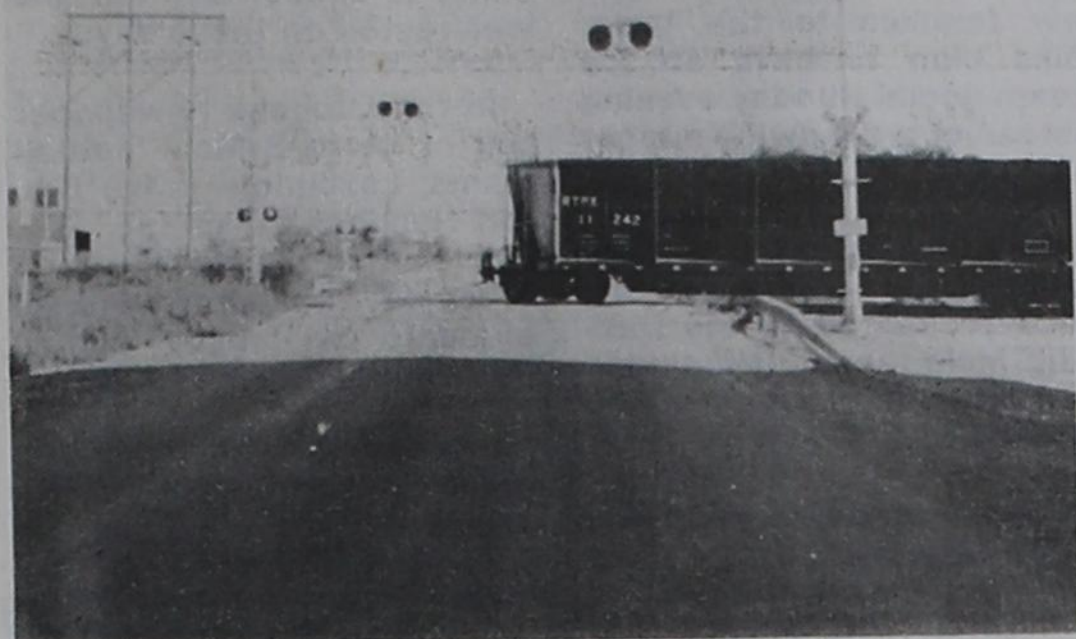
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No more blockages

Farwell School Board keeps tax rate the same

The Farwell School Board Tuesday set an effective tax rate of 39 cents per \$100 evaluation.

This rate is a 10 cent reduction over last year's tax rate because the w County Education District also taxes residents now - and they raised their rate 10 cents. The end result, said Supt. Richard Boothby, is to keep the tax rate the same as last year.

In other business, the board:

- Approved a budget of \$2,704,801.81.
- Approved spending \$120,762 to pay for the windows that were replaced in the elementary school last year.
- Was told the school system has received a check for \$36,971 to pay for hail damage to the roofs of buildings in June. They plan to prepare specifications for roof repair soon so that the repairs may be made.
- Heard school counselor Carol Sullivan report on the academic excellence indicator system for grades 3, 5, 7, 9 and 11. Complete results will be published in next week's Tribune. Overall, Boothby summed up the results: "We have scored extremely well."
- Heard a presentation by teachers Mona Merritt, Kay Ray and Robin Gregory on the Michael Eaton writing program being implemented in the school system.
- Heard Boothby reports that Farwell now has 520 students. He encourages folks to vote on the bonds for the new building project that is planned.

'River' ruling overturned

The Texas Farm Bureau News reports that a ruling by the Texas Water Commission seizing regulatory control of the Edwards Aquifer has been overturned in State District Court, and has been termed a victory for private property owners in Texas.

Texas Farm Bureau President S.M. True is quoted as saying, "The Texas Water Commission's actions are illegal. We've always felt the Commission didn't have the authority to regulate underground water."

Texas Water Commission, declared TWC rules classifying Edwards as an underground river - making it subject to state regulation - null and void.

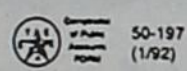

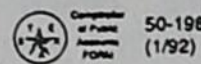

Farwell city tax rate to be raised

The Farwell City Council voted unanimously Tuesday to propose raising the city tax rate 7.99 percent.

A public hearing on the proposal will be held at 6:30 p.m. Sept. 24 at city hall. The vote on setting the tax rate will be held one half hour later. The rate will climb from .2789 cents to .3012 cents. The hike is expected to generate between \$3,000 and \$4,000.

A reason given for the planned hike is that the city is facing at least a \$6,000 cost for covering one of its pits, which has some trash in it. A new state inspector checked the former city dump recently and ordered the entire pit covered. The old state inspector had said a covering wasn't needed. Water Supt. Dee Hammitt will appeal to Austin.

Hammitt also will check with other governmental entities to try and get fill dirt donated. Mayor Chris Gikas said it costs more than \$1 a yard to have dirt hauled in. The other option is for the city to dig another pit and use that pit's dirt to cover the current pit; but that leaves the new-pit open.

The city has until October 1993 to completely close the former landfill.

In discussing where to set the tax rate, city clerk Cynthia Thigpen said a rate of 41 cents (up from .2789 cents) would be needed to generate about \$30,000, which some feel is the amount needed to start a city police department. There was no further discussion of a police officer.

If the council had proposed a tax rate more than 7.99 percent, there would have been a series of public hearings and the opportunity for residents to petition a tax rollback.

On the subject of paying for the landfill work, it was noted that the city has budgeted \$15,000 to put fly ash in more city alleys. They discussed holding off on that expenditure. They then decided to spend \$5,000 in September on the alleys that are in the worst shape, then review the situation before spending the remainder of the money.

In other business, the council:

- Plans to seek bids for city health insurance coverage. Royce Menning is leaving city employment in December and this will leave 3 employees to be covered.

- Changed its meeting times. The council will now meet the 3rd Tuesday of each month at 6:30 p.m., starting in October.

- Approved Mrs. Thigpen going to an election law seminar in Austin in October.

- Heard former mayor Wendol Christian report on a highway department meeting he attended in Muleshoe last month just before resigning. He said the 4-laning of the Amarillo Highway between Farwell and Bovina is running 18 months ahead of schedule with bids to be let early next year. Improving drainage along Ninth Street is also now on the state's agenda, at his request.

- Approved a change in the animal control ordinance. After a child was recently bitten by a dog here, it was found that the ordinance didn't contain the proper language it needed. So the council added "if a person is bitten by any animal capable of transmitting rabies and is not licensed, and the owner can't show proof of vaccination against rabies, then the animal can be confined 2 weeks to check on its health at the expense of the owner."

Gikas also suggested that instead of charging annual licensing fees for pets, a one-time charge be made. No action was taken.

- Heard Hammitt report that the city employee who has been doubling as city dogcatcher is being laid off. He said another city employee has agreed to do the job but just during regular working hours since he lives out of town. The council agreed to ask Doug Landrum, former city employee, if he would take the responsibility.

Texico holds hearing on capital plans

Other than city officials and employees, and Ann Cooper, no Texico residents attended Tuesday's Texico public hearing to help plan the city's Infrastructure Capital Improvements Plan.

Mrs. Cooper had been asked by the city council at the last meeting to get information on local housing in order to seek state grants for rehabilitation and weatherization. She has been working on finding sub-standard houses in town.

The council met with Eva Woods and Lee Tillman, of Eastern Plains Council of Government.

They held a lengthy talk about capital projects, such as a city complex, curbs and gutters, an underground youth center, water main improvements, etc. Buying road equipment on a cooperative basis with other small area towns was mentioned.

They talked about various state grants. One problem

that Texico has in seeking such grants is that plans have to be presented before they can be discussed. And the city doesn't have funds to pay an architect.

Tillman suggested getting an architect to do various plans without charging a fee. Then, if the state gave the city funds for it, that architect, being better acquainted with the plans, might be able to get the bid on the job.

Another suggestion was that Texico get another community's plans for a youth center, for example, then submit those plans for its own center.

Tillman also suggested that Texico might have a referendum vote on prioritizing its capital improvements. Folks could vote for or against a general obligation bond issue.

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
