Bond issue needs to be supported

I am very proud of the Farwell School Board for the way its vote to seek a bond issue for school improvements.

And I vigorously urge every school district resident to support the bond issue Sept. 22.

Here's why:

I get so sick and tired of seeing poor policy decisions made by state and federal officials because they are designed to do something "now" and turn out to be poor long-range decisions. That's one of the problems in a democracy - too often leaders are penalized if they make decisions that are tough in the short run but are the correct thing for the long range.

What the Farwell School Board has just done is to make the proper long-range decision. And I hope folks in the Farwell district understand that.

A small community revolves around its schools. There is no question that it is in the best interests of Farwell district folks to continually strengthen their school. To do otherwise would be self-harming.

Last year, Texico folks overwhelmingly supported a bond issue to improve their school. That was an excellent decision and Texico residents should feel good about it.

Now it's Farwell's turn. And the issues are simple:

1) *Are more classrooms and better schools needed?*

In my opinion, yes. Due to state and federal mandates involving class sizes, and the importance of placing special education students within the school buildings, there is no question here. The alternative would be to close the school system.

The Farwell pupil population has increased, thus necessitating some of this need. And a larger elementary school library (the old one had been cut back due to a nurse's station being made part of it) plus improved restrooms are vital.

Is a new gym needed?

Again, in my opinion, yes. The question here is simple: Do you build a new gym or spend several hundreds of thousands of dollars renovating the current facility?

Looking long-term, there's no question. It is always wiser to build a new facility than "throw good money after bad."

Oh, yes, the school board might have made a better "political" decision to vote to renovate instead of build a new gym. Instead, they made the right decision.

That's why I wrote at the top of this column that I'm proud of the school board's unanimous decision. If it had been a federal government board, they would have gone the other way - the wrong way.

I fully realize that this is a down year for many Farwell School District residents. But the fact is it will be cheaper to build now, because of low interest rates.

If the board holds up a year, and even though the local economy undoubtedly will be better, it's almost certain that interest rates will be higher. So, it's a savings for local taxpayers to go ahead now.

Because of the excellent work achieved by school Supt. Richard Boothby and the board, the Farwell Schools are in excellent financial shape. They are going ahead with the bond issue without a tax hike. And if state reimbursement to schools stays somewhat similar to the current ratio, no tax hike is foreseen.

An open letter to Farwell School District patrons

Editor's note: This letter to the patrons of the Farwell Independent School District is from the District Educational Improvement Committee.

There appears to be some concern and misunderstanding about the proposed bond issue that is to come before the voters of the Farwell Independent School District on Sept. 22.

Much planning has gone into this project. Our District Educational Improvement Committee, made up of patrons, parents, teachers, support personnel and administrators, met and combined their efforts to address the immediate and future needs of our school. Also last April, the Board of Education appointed a committee of citizens to tour the facilities and make recommendations for needed improvements. Both committees and the board support the recommendations for this building plan.

The proposals for elementary include adding a new library, four classrooms and mandated handicapped restroom facilities. According to Bill Cook's "Strategic Planning for American Schools," information is doubling every 18 months; coupled with the advancement of technology, this makes our elementary school library inadequate. Also, it has been partitioned off to provide space for a nurse's office and sick room and is used during bad weather for recess activities. One classroom is needed to meet a state mandated minimum of 900 square feet for computer labs. The other three rooms are needed to comply with state requirements for class sizes and to provide space for mandated programs such as pre-kindergarten, gifted/talented and English as a Second Language, which now meets in a closet.

For the junior high, proposals also include four classrooms, mandated handicapped restroom facilities, and a commons area. State law requires special education classes to be housed with regular classes, so one room will serve that purpose. Other classrooms will ease overcrowding and allow room for more current teaching techniques. The proposed restroom facilities will serve both the cafeteria and junior high. The proposed commons area will serve the school as a meeting place for large numbers of students for such purposes as standardized testing, tutorials, parent-teacher meetings, and in inclement weather.

The proposals for high school include a required special education classroom, one other classroom to allow for expansion of academic programs, and a gymnasium with concession and restroom areas. The present gymnasium is the most frequently used common classroom on campus. If it continues to be used at its current rate by the school and community, major renovations must be made immediately. According to BGR Architects, gymnasium renovations would cost approximately one-half million dollars. Even after repairs, we would still have an old facility. As is, the gym is adequate for a practice gym. This gymnasium, with the new one, would permit boys and girls athletics to be scheduled simultaneously, thereby allowing other academic classes to be offered. Having both gyms would also relieve scheduling problems in the junior high and elementary.

Our school is the center of our community, and it reflects the intelligence and integrity of our area. Our present facilities are inadequate, basically because of new state mandates that are passed every year. The last addition to any part of our school was made about 20 years ago. To keep Farwell's students abreast of world changes for the present and the coming century, all these new facilities are definitely needed. We must put our school in the forefront; we must not settle for anything less. The brightest future for Farwell's children in education depends upon passage of this bond issue.

Golden Poets were honored at a Round-Robin and Medal of Honor Presentation ceremony. Each poet who attended was allowed one minute to read all or part of his poem, and it was videotaped for those present.

Some of the videotaped presentations were read on a television series, "Poetryland - The Wonderful World of Poetry," during one of the "Poet's Corner" segments.

The award is a special honor since fewer than four percent of the World of Poetry's worldwide constituency are eligible for a presentation at the conference. In the past this event has had wide media coverage.

Texico looks at capital projects

The Texico City Council Tuesday met with two representative of Eastern Plains Council of Governments - Eva Woods and Danny Beaman - to help plan the city's Infrastructure Capital Improvements Plan, a 3- to 5-year plan for capital and equipment improvements.

Such a plan marks the foundation for the city to seek state grants. A public hearing on the plan will be at 6:30 p.m. Sept. 15 at City Hall, and residents are asked to attend and give input.

Ms. Woods talked about "home funds," money available for building low-income houses. She said the 7-county region that Texico is in will get \$250,000 this year for such units. She also discussed rehabilitation of houses, with up to \$10,000 per unit that might be available.

Ann Cooper will get information needed for seeking state funds, such as the total number of homes in Texico, those that need rehabilitation, etc.

Information also will be gotten from the highway department as to the city roads that need to be curbed and guttered.

Water Supt. Billy Hammitt will make a plat of the city's water main system to show where new mains and/or larger mains are needed.

Councilwoman Carolyn Burrows said area banks are reticent about financing new homes in Texico and asked Mrs. Woods about whether help is available here. Mrs. Woods said there is a first time homebuyers program and that banks are being pressured more to serve their communities.

Beaman asked the council to list their needs for capital and equipment improvements. This was lengthy but included an Olympic size, indoor swimming pool; a City Hall complex; a sub-station for the fire department; curb and gutter the entire city; new equipment for the street and water

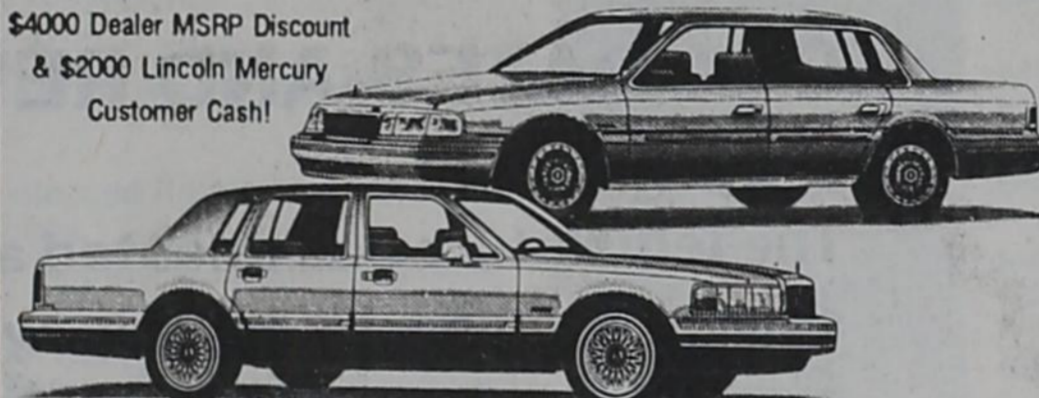

Recipe of Week

Stuffed Zucchini

salt and pepper
1 pkg. prepared stuffing mix
1 lb. lean ground beef
1 egg
1/4 c. Parmesan cheese
1/2 c. canned tomato sauce

Scoop soft, seedy center from zucchini half; discard. Brush the zucchini with oil. Poke in several places with a fork. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Set aside.
Brown the meat in a skillet. Add tomato sauce. Remove from heat.

Prepare the packaged stuffing mix according to the package. Mix the meat, egg, and the breadcrumb stuffing together.

Mound the mixture into the zucchini. Place zucchini in a baking pan with about 1/2 inch water. Bake, uncovered in a 325 degree oven for about 1 hour, until the zucchini is tender. Sprinkle with Parmesan cheese.

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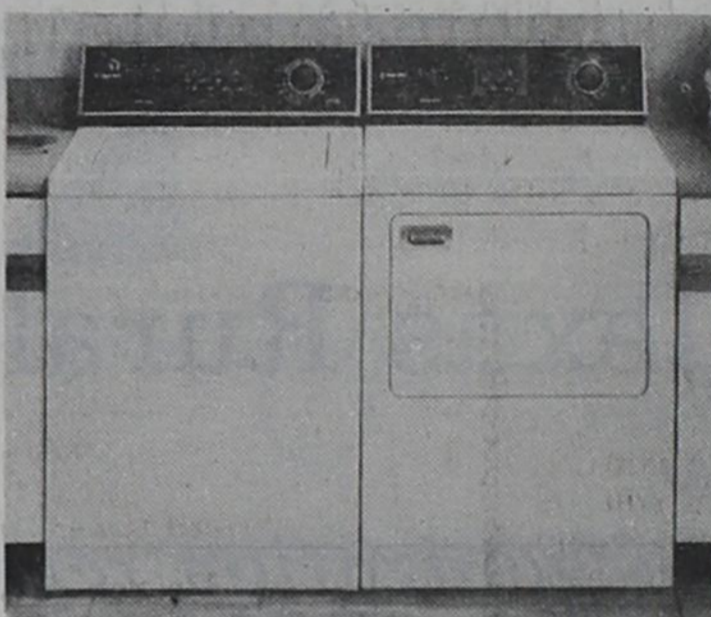
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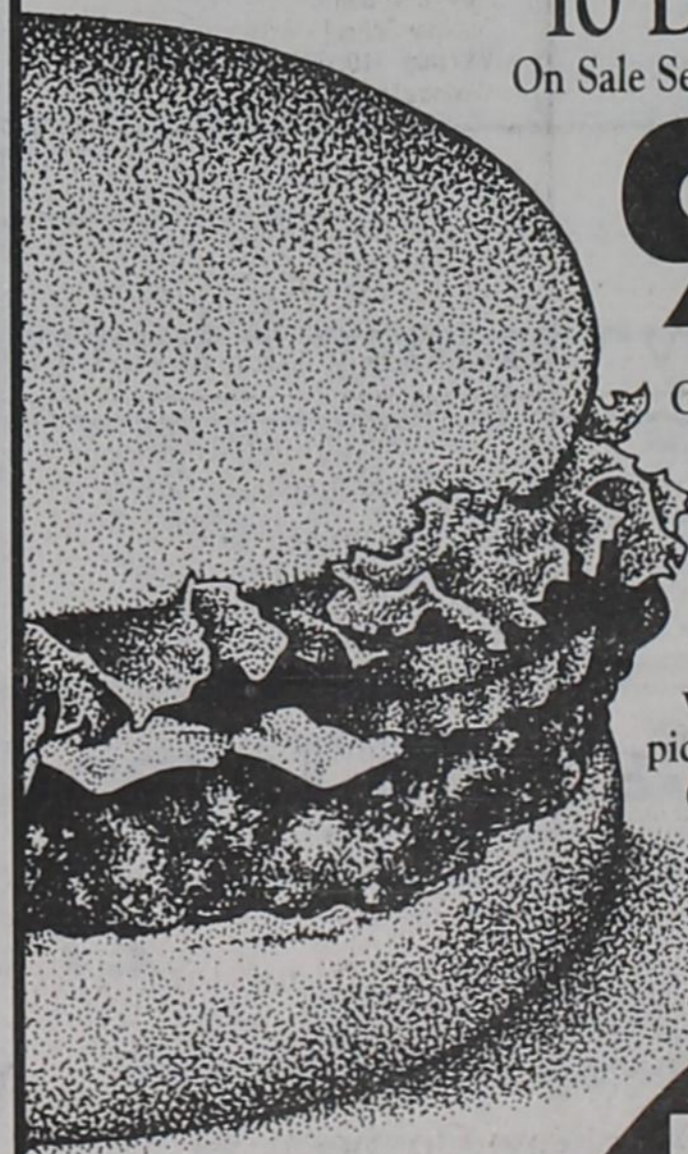

On Sept. 3, it transported a person from 505 7th St. to Clovis Hospital at 8:27 p.m.

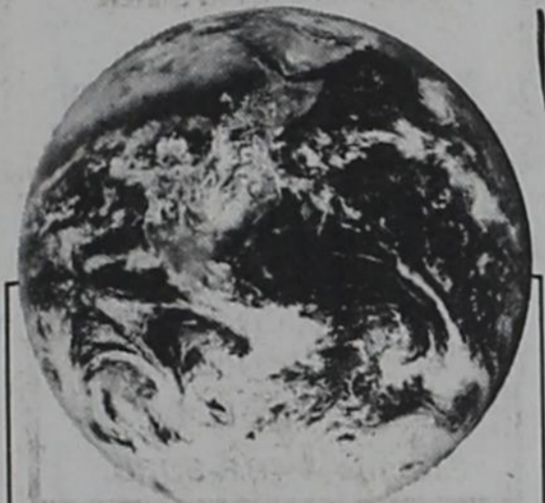

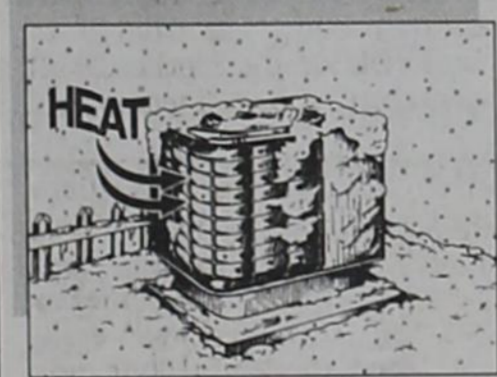

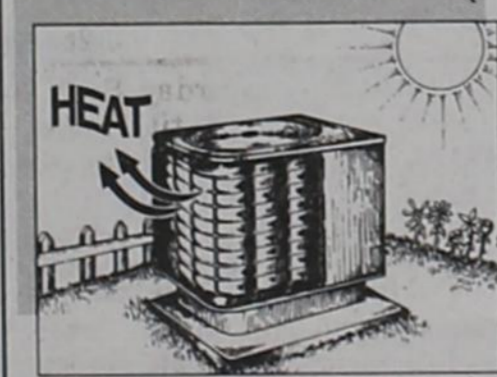
