The first day enrollment figures for Farwell include: total, 486 - high school, 126; junior high, 105, and

elementary school, 255. Last year's first day enrollment figures were: 496 total - high school, 127; junior high, 106; elementary school,

Texico's first day enrollment was the same as last -493 students.

Texico Elementary School reported 226 (including prekindergarten) or 217 regular elementary students.

In New Mexico two halftime pre-Kindergarten students are counted as one full time student. The pre-kindergarten enrollment was a little lower than projected.

Texico Junior High reported 123 students, up three from last year. Texico High School reported 144 students, up three from last year.

Lazbuddie's first day enrollment for pre-K through grade 12 is 260 students. There are 82 students in

the high school; 58 in the junior high, and 120 in the elementary.

This is up from 247 in 1990, and but from 264 in 1989.

CED sets tax rate: 72 1/2¢

The Parmer County CED board held a tax hearing Tuesday in Friona to set the CED tax rate at 72 1/2 cents.

The CED money will be collected, divided, and returned back to the 4 county school districts according to a formula set by the state of Texas.

Each school district will also set a tax rate for the local school district. It is expected that the tax rate for the local school district will be much lower than it has been in the past because it is charged in addition to the 72 1/2 cent tax rate charged by the CED.

Texas allows government bodies to hike their tax rates a maximum of 3 percent without any hearings.

This year, the Farwell Hospital District had a rate of .0416 cents (4 cents) per \$100 valuation.

The maximum it can be set without a hearing is .04212 cents; or .0442 cents, with a hearing.

The current tax rate for Parmer County is .3050 cents (30 1/2 cents) per \$100 valuation. That includes .2327 cents for the general fund and .0723 cents for the farm to market road fund.

The maximum it can be set without a hearing is .31178 cents; or .3269 cents with a

hearing. Farwell City's current rate is .2853 cents (28 1/2 cents) per \$100 valuation. The maximum it can be set without a hearing is .2865 cents; or

.3493 cents with a hearing. In addition to that rate, Farwell gets a lot of revenue

from its utility billing. The situation with the school district has to be cleared through the new County Education District.

The allocation of C.E.D. funds is based upon the percent of property wealth within the C.E.D. Friona will receive 48.543 percent; Farwell, 21.932 percent; Lazbuddie, 14.533 percent, and Bovina, 14.99 percent.

The current rate for Farwell Schools is \$1.277 per \$100 valuation. Lazbuddie Schools is at 98 cents per \$100 valuation. Final decisions will be made later this month.



Texas vehicle registration complicated

In September, the simple matter of registering a motor vehicle in Texas will become a little more complicated.

The change is a result of insurance reform enacted by the 72nd Legislature.

Beginning Sept. 1, the owner of a motor vehicle must submit current proof of financial responsibility with an application for initial registration, renewal of registration, or transfer of registration. This new requirement is a must, regardless of whether registration is accomplished in person or by mail.

The most common evidence of financial responsibility is a liability insurance card issued to the policyholder by the insurance company. Examples of other types of acceptable proof include insurance policies and binders, pool coverage documents, and certificates of self-insurance, bond, etc. /

The original or a photocopy of the evidence will satisfy the requirement of proof of financial responsibility. All original documentation will be returned.

There are many of us in this county who were born between 1917-1926, who have had their Social Security payments affected by unfair legislation.



SPS has filed with the **Public Utility Commission of** Texas to credit \$11.3 million to its Texas retail customers for savings in fuel costs.

The proposed credit includes \$10.7 million in actual fuel savings and \$600,000 in interest, based on an annual rate of 11.7 percent.

A Texas residential customer using 1,000 kilowatt hours of electricity a month would receive a one-time credit of \$11.15.

SPS expects to receive swift approval on the filing, said SPS Group Manager of Rates and Regulation Gerald

"We hope to be able to apply credit to our customers' October bills," he said. The credit would cover fuel expenses from April 1990 through June 1991.



NOTICE OF COMPARABLE TAX RATES AND REVENUES

The legislature has enacted a statute on school funding to comply with a court mandate enforcing the state constitution. Under prior statutes (SB 1) the tax rate for last year provides \$ 4751 per student in state and local revenues. Under this statute (SB 351) that same rate now provides \$ 5384 per student in state and local revenues.

State law only requires a minimum tax rate of \$ _.725 for county education districts. State law does not require a school district to adopt additional taxes. Neither does state law require a school district to adopt a tax rate that maximizes the receipt of state funds.

The board of trustees of the FARWELL School District hereby gives notice that it is considering the adoption of a tax rate of 6.55 that will provide \$ 54/3 per student in state and local revenues.

State Sen. Bradley voices concern over legislative redistricting plans

State Sen. Walter Bradley appeared at Tuesday's Texico City Council meeting to voice concern over proposed redistricting plans.

He said some proposals leave Clovis and Texico in one district, while others split Clovis into three districts.

If one of those "split Clovis" plans is adopted, it could mean that Texico's state senator might live as far away as Artesia or Tucumcari.

Bradley urged the council to write to the governor to support a plan keeping Clovis and Texico in one district. Mayor Doyal LaRue indicated his support of Bradley's suggestion.

Bradley also discussed recent legislative actions, noting he had voted against the \$100 million tax hikes. He

Each voter in the county will receive a new voter registration card which will tell him where to vote.

The representative of Daugherty and Associates, the legal counsel on the redistricting of Parmer County, failed to show up at the Lazbuddie or Farwell hearings to review the proposed redistricting.

The redistricting affects all elections for the next 10 years.


