The Texico Wolverines began their season with a scrimmage Saturday against Bovina.

"We made a bunch of first scrimmage mistakes, but that's why you scrimmage," said coach Bruce Scroggins.

The teams were pretty evenly matched in this event, but "they probably moved the ball on us a little more than we did against them," noted Scroggins.

In a scrimmage the coaches try different players at different positions. Each team plays a set number of offensive and defensive plays. It is primarily a practice. "We get to work out against somebody else's people," said Scroggins.

"We've got to answer some questions offensively, and we have to hone our skills," the coach added. The Wolverines

seemed to play better at the defensive positions Saturday night than they did on offense.

"We don't have a big nucleus of seniors like we did last year, but it's real early to tell."

The Wolverines will use their non-conference games

just to get ready for district play. "We use these games to build. If we don't look good, we have time to change. We've got the potential to be a pretty good ball club," he added.

The Wolverines open their season at Dexter at 7:30 p.m. on Aug. 30.

**Texas vehicle registration complicated**

In September, the simple matter of registering a motor vehicle in Texas will become a little more complicated.

The change is a result of insurance reform enacted by the 72nd Legislature.

Beginning Sept. 1, the owner of a motor vehicle must submit current proof of financial responsibility with an application for initial registration, renewal of registration, or transfer of registration. This new requirement is a must, regardless of whether registration is accomplished in person or by mail.

The most common evidence of financial responsibility is a liability insurance card issued to the policyholder by the insurance company. Examples of other types of acceptable proof include insurance policies and binders, pool coverage documents, and certificates of self-insurance, bond, etc.

The original or a photocopy of the evidence will satisfy the requirement of proof of financial responsibility. All original documentation will be returned.

# Longhorns thrash Meadow in scrimmage, 11-2

The Lazbuddie Longhorns rolled over Meadow in their first scrimmage of the season last weekend, crashing for 11 TDs to Meadows' 2.

"I think Meadow was ranked about 8th or 9th in the state," said Lazbuddie head football coach C. W. Williams.

The Longhorns showed a great deal of depth in this scrimmage with scoring done by several players.

Kirk Jesko scored the first Longhorn TD on a 65 yard pass from Paul Williams. He also scored the second one on a 55 yard run.

Monty Foster scored the third on an 8 yard pass from Paul Williams.

Jesko came back with a 60 yard run to score the Longhorns' fourth TD.

Eric Williams scored on a lateral from Frank Gonzales who caught a pass from Paul Williams. The combination of passes totaled 60 yards gained.

Jesko ran back a 60 yard TD to score the sixth.

Leland Brockman caught a pass from Paul Williams to

score and gain 60 yards.

Terry "TD" Darling scored on a 60 yard pass from Paul Williams.

Luis Gonzales scored the next two Longhorn TD's. One was on a 15 yard run, and the other was on a 60 yard pass from Paul Williams.

The final Longhorn TD was scored by Jesko who ran 10 yards.

The two Meadow TD's were scored by Cody Andrews.

Andrews went to state in track for Meadow his freshman year, but he seemed a bit slower to coach C.W. Williams than he has been in previous years. "He may have gained some weight," the coach postulated.

The Lazbuddie JV also won its scrimmage. They beat Meadow 4-2. Chris Cozbeey scored two Longhorn TD's on runs, and Brett Thomas passed for 2.

The Longhorns are scheduled to scrimmage Follett at Groom Friday (today) at 5:30 p.m.

Follett has only 13 players while Lazbuddie has about 30, so Williams is trying to

arrange to have another team scrimmage the Longhorn JV.

If all goes as planned, the Longhorn varsity will scrimmage Follett for a series of offensive and defensive plays, and the JV will scrimmage

a different team about 6:15 p.m. for a series.

Then the varsity will scrimmage Follett for the second series of plays, and then the JV will return for the second series. This plan is subject to change.

## Recipe of Week

## SPS to give Texas customers credit

SPS has filed with the Public Utility Commission of Texas to credit \$11.3 million to its Texas retail customers for savings in fuel costs.

The proposed credit includes \$10.7 million in actual fuel savings and \$600,000 in interest, based on an annual rate of 11.7 percent.

A Texas residential customer using 1,000 kilowatt hours of electricity a month

would receive a one-time credit of \$11.15.

SPS expects to receive swift approval on the filing, said SPS Group Manager of Rates and Regulation Gerald Diller.

"We hope to be able to apply credit to our customers' October bills," he said. The credit would cover fuel expenses from April 1990 through June 1991.

Retail customers include

residential, commercial and industrial users.

The primary factor which made the savings available to the customers, according to Diller, was lower natural gas prices.

"Gas purchases for power plants made at spot prices have been extremely favorable during the past few months," Diller said. "Even our contract gas prices have been reduced."

Certain low-sulfur coal prices also have been somewhat lower, due to negotia-

tions with suppliers.

Five SPS power plants are fueled by natural gas, two are fueled by clean western coal. However, half the company's capacity is provided by the two coal plants.

SPS President and Chief Operating Officer Coyt Webb said the company expends significant effort to remain a low-cost producer. "The cost of fuel makes up about half of an electric bill, and our ability to control this cost is very important to our customers," Webb said.

## DQ's Hall re-elected prexy

The Board of Directors of Texas Dairy Queen Operators Council has re-elected Fort Worth businessman William G. Hall president for a third term.

Hall, president and principal owner of CMC Foods, Inc. has been in the Dairy Queen business since 1984 when CMC Foods acquired a group of 24 Dairy Queen stores. Since then, the number of stores has grown to 65 throughout North and West Texas, including Farwell.

Hall was first elected to the board in 1986, and has served as treasurer, as well

as 2 one-year terms as president. He is also a member of the board's Marketing and Steering Committee, the committee that oversees development and production of all TDQOC marketing and advertising programs.




## Cannon AFB 'Day' slated

## NOTICE OF COMPARABLE TAX RATES AND REVENUES

The legislature has enacted a statute on school funding to comply with a court mandate enforcing the state constitution. Under prior statutes (SB 1) the tax rate for last year provides \$ 4751 per student in state and local revenues. Under this statute (SB 351) that same rate now provides \$ 5384 per student in state and local revenues.

State law only requires a minimum tax rate of \$ .725 for county education districts. State law does not require a school district to adopt additional taxes. Neither does state law require a school district to adopt a tax rate that maximizes the receipt of state funds.

# State Sen. Bradley voices concern over legislative redistricting plans

State Sen. Walter Bradley appeared at Tuesday's Texico City Council meeting to voice concern over proposed redistricting plans.

He said some proposals leave Clovis and Texico in one district, while others split Clovis into three districts.

If one of those "split Clovis" plans is adopted, it could mean that Texico's state senator might live as far away as Artesia or Tatum.

Bradley urged the council to write to the governor to support a plan keeping Clovis and Texico in one district. Mayor Doyal LaRue indicated his support of Bradley's suggestion.

Bradley also discussed recent legislative actions, noting he had voted against the \$100 million tax hikes. He

said it added a lot of welfare programs.

Bradley said it was bad for the legislature to raise taxes during a recession.

He also noted a new transportation tax for hauling grain. After the grain is hauled to an original destination, it is then taxed for a second move, such as to a train or different elevator, even if it's contracted for.

Bradley said that in the past decade eastern New Mexico has gained 1.8 percent in population, while the Albuquerque - Santa Fe - Las Cruces corridor has gained 13 percent.

He said Gary Robbins may lose his state representative's district.

Bradley also said some residents have asked him to help with the water well problem in Texico and he got an update from the council.

Councilman Butch Tharp said the grant requests have been submitted state officials, with Texico seeking \$634,000. The maximum grant would be for \$600,000. The consulting engineer is optimistic Texico will get the grant.

LaRue said it would be a good idea to rent a video camera, estimated at \$300, to put in the inoperable Santa Fe water well to see what the problem is.

In other business, the council:

- Heard LaRue announce that Kirk Roberts, of the Bernalillo County sheriff's de-

partment, has been hired as the new Texico deputy marshal, at \$18,500. He will arrive Sept. 9.

LaRue also said the council needs to discuss making Fry Urioste, current acting marshal, a full marshal. It will be on the next meeting agenda.

- Denied a variance request by Juanita Hadley to have a cafe open on her property for school kids. Of the letters

sent out to nearby property owners, 5 were opposed (including Texico Schools), 2 in favor and 1 not returned.

- Discussed buying more fire hydrants.

- Asked city attorney Duane Hamar to write letters to two property owners about the need to cut weeds on their properties - just west of Town & Country, and just east of the flea market.

City rules state that property owners have 10 days to comply. If they don't the city can mow the property and charge \$15 an hour.

Councilman Butch Tharp said he attended last week's Chamber of Commerce meeting and heard complaints about weeds and alleys.

LaRue said the city has been busy with the well problem and put cleanup on

hold. LaRue noted that environmental officials have told the city not to make certain cleanup changes until it ascertains the cause of the KKR well contamination.

- Discussed a possible setback problem for more flea market units to the rear of the current market. Lydick Engineers will be asked to check on it.

## Redistricting meetings conducted

Meetings to discuss redistricting were held throughout Parmer County Wednesday.

The proposed redistricting will allow voting precincts to match county commissioner precincts.

Each voter in the county will receive a new voter registration card which will tell him where to vote.

Few Farwell residents will see any change in their voting places, but folks in Friona, Bovina, and outlying county areas may see a few changes.

The representative of Daugherty and Associates, the legal counsel on the redistricting of Parmer County, failed to show up at the Lazbuddie or Farwell hearings to review the proposed redistricting.

The maps which the firm made were also unavailable. The redistricting affects all elections for the next 10 years.

Attending the Farwell hearing were County Clerk Bonnie Warren, Hugh Moseley, County Judge Bonnie Clayton, County Commissioner Robert White and the Tribune's Judy Pomper.
