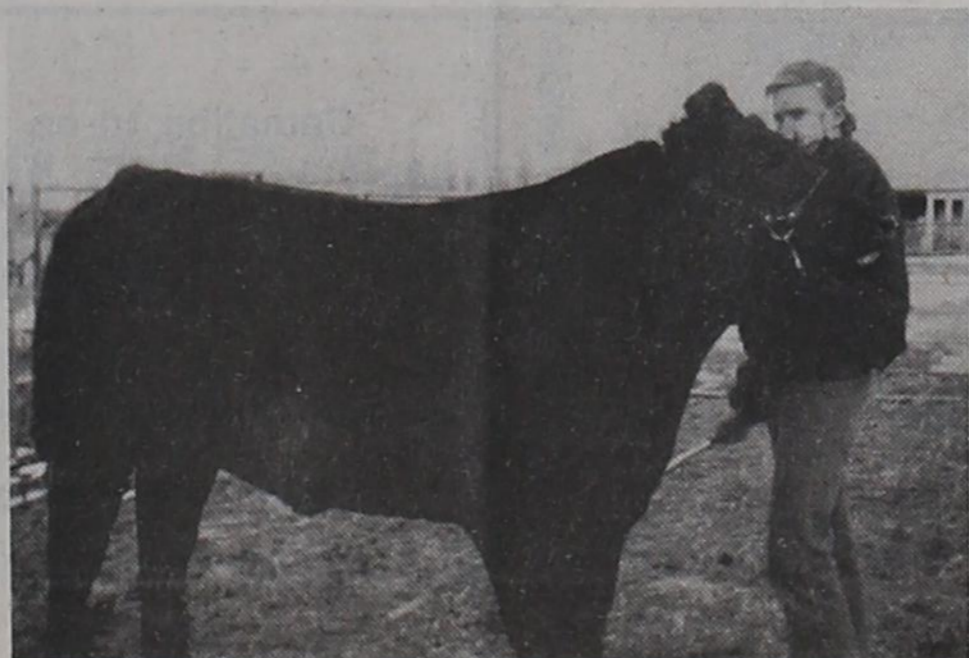

Alternatives to curfew given

A group of interested citizens met Tuesday to seek positive ways to aid the youth in Texico.

Mayor Doyal LaRue said citizens prefer alternatives to the proposed curfew. He asked for possible solutions.

At the close of the evening, the group agreed to meet again at 7 p.m. on Feb. 4 at City Hall for an organizational meeting at which leaders could be chosen.

The special meeting was called in the wake of the apprehension of six Texico youths in connection with vandalism and burglaries in the Twin Cities. Texico's police officers have proposed to the City Council a curfew be approved. The city council hasn't discussed the curfew yet.

During the meeting, a variety of activities were suggested to augment the school, church, 4-H, and other activities that Texico already offers.

Activities suggested were: baseball or softball, a job program, computer program, activities that involve both parents and kids, recycling, program to assist senior citizens like the one that the airbase has, a video arcade, Bingo, movies shown on vcr's, dances.

A variety of opinions were expressed at this meeting by interested citizens. Some comments were:

Juanita Hadley, a Texico teacher, expressed the fact that school gym is open for use by youth of the community quite a bit of the time already. But, it probably would not be open at the times when the community has had the most problems-about midnight to 2 a.m.

She also pointed out that the school already has a myriad of activities, "There is one almost every night," she said.

She said school officials are not sure at this time what effect opening the school buildings to community activities would have on the school activities.

Faculty members have asked "please don't give us another duty," said Mrs. Hadley.

Rhonda Qualls said that she had called Portales, a community which already has a youth program which operates on both city property and on school property, and she was told that the liability insurance is "like \$3 per activity."

Those present began listing some of the activities that are possible to supplement the activities that already exist in the community.

Baseball or softball was the first topic discussed. One resident suggested that churches could sponsor the teams for kids.

City Councilman Oran J. Autrey expressed the opinion that "the Clovis Women's Softball Association will fix our fields if they can use them two night a week."

"There are Little League teams in Clovis that would come over and play here," he added.

LaRue asked that the group try to list all of the proposed youth activities, and not dwell

on anyone activity too long.

Mrs. Qualls noted that "the school already has lots of activities like 4-H and Odyssey of the Mind." But, if her children have one meeting she wouldn't mind helping other children with something like a computer lab during the hour she waits for her children to finish with their activities.

Deputy Marshal Kirk Roberts discussed the importance of the relationship between kids, parents, and others in the community. He wanted to see something added to the community that would help to build positive relationships.

"If somebody said to me, 'We're just going to keep you busy to keep you out of trouble, I'd resent that - especially if I hadn't been in trouble,'" said Roberts.

He noted that before any type of youth group is formed there must be an organization to hold the group together, and there must be goals set for the organization. "What do we want to do in the community?" he asked.

He discussed the importance of working together. "If we start going off in separate ways we'll see them all go drop off and drop off," said Roberts.

Roberts said that he had hoped that there would be a lot more interest in the project. He was disappointed that only two youths attended the meeting. "I'm not sure kids knew they were invited to this meeting," he said.

"I don't think we are going to have a quick fix to this," said LaRue.

"I was envisioning an actual organization that people could get involved in, something like a Youth League," said Roberts.

He suggested that the group might have goals such as: building leadership skills, building community relation skills, building responsibility to the community, and actually working in the community.

Mrs. Qualls said "a lot of these kids don't feel part of the community."

Lewis Cooper said "instead of giving kids everything, we might have something like a job program."

Mrs. Qualls added, "We could have a recycling program."

Texico student Sky Byrum talked about a program that he had participated in previously. "I used to help the elderly, mow lawns and clean up the trash."

Marshal Fry Urioste proposed an idea he had seen in Logan, N.M., which included video arcade games.

Autrey discussed a program he had heard of which had youths paint houses and do things to help the elderly.

LaRue suggested that a variety of different activities could be offered for youth, such as playing chess.

Isidro Ortega of the Knights of Columbus noted that they have several activities. For instance, they are sponsoring a free throw contest at the Texico school Sunday. The group also has Bingo equipment available for use.

The Knights of Columbus also has a mile of highway that they clean up.

He noted that they want to involve the whole community - not just the families of the Knights of Columbus.

Urioste suggested that the youth might be able to remodel one of the abandoned buildings in the community to make it into a youth center with arcade games and a vcr so that the kids could show movies.

Oscar Saenz of Farwell discussed the Knights of Columbus convention that he had attended and the organization has information about AIDS and drug abuse that would be available to help the youth of the community.

LaRue suggested that Saenz work with Urioste and Roberts on this.

Those present discussed the fact that it would be important to involve the youth in activities that they would really enjoy doing.

Student Scott Smith mentioned that in Portales the youth have dances.

Autrey noted that activities that involve the whole family would be good. "If you have Bingo down here, you'll get the whole family."

Cooper said more young adults need to be involved in the planning of any activities that would effect them. He also expressed the opinion that Texico - Farwell is one community. The youth from both communities should be invited. Also, he felt that the civic organizations of each community should be invited.

"If we could only get all the churches in Texico - Farwell and all the civic groups to do one activity per month," said LaRue whistfully. Then he asked everyone to think about the rules and organizational attributes that this proposed group would need, and bring those ideas to the Feb. 4 meeting.

Texico has no 'write-ins'

Tuesday was the day candidates could still get on the Texico municipal election ballot by having their names written in.

None signed up as write-in candidates.

So the three candidates who signed up during the regular sign-up period are unopposed:

- Incumbent councilmen Ronnie Warmuth and Carolyn Burrows.

- George Herington, for the municipal judge's post. He will replace Howard Billingsley, who is retiring.

Bingo approved

A special election was held in Friona Saturday to approve holding Bingo in the city limits for charitable purposes.

Bingo won - by a vote of 123 to 104.

The Friona VFW plans to hold Bingo games to provide folks with local entertainment, and also to get funds for charitable work.

Farwell TAAS test results listed

Farwell School Counselor Carol Sullivan presented the results of the TAAS test to the Farwell School Board on Jan. 14. The TAAS test is the examination that students must pass before they can graduate in the state of Texas.

The exit level of the test will be given again March 31 and April 1 and 2 so that those students who need to pass the test may try again. In the meantime, those students who fail a portion of the exit level of the exam are being tutored by Patsy Camp and Vicki Haseloff.

Farwell High School students who took the examination did better in reading than they did in any other part of the test. Math was the second strongest area for 9th graders and 12th graders. Eleventh graders led the high school in writing.

Writing was the strongest area for 7th and 9th grade students. Math was the strongest area for 3rd grade students.

Below are the results for the students from Farwell who took the TAAS:

12th Grade - 6 students tested, writing 67% passed; reading, 100% passed; math, 83%.

11th Grade - 25 students tested, writing, 80% passed; reading, 88% passed; math, 79% passed.

9th Grade - 38 students tested, writing, 65% passed; reading, 76% passed; math, 68% passed.

7th Grade - 26 students tested; writing, 85% passed; reading, 69% passed; math, 80% passed.

5th Grade - 44 students tested; writing, 67% passed; reading, 49% passed; math, 41% passed.

3rd Grade - 36 students tested; writing, 57% passed; reading, 89% passed; math, 94% passed.

In each case, the number of students listed as taking the examination includes all students who took some part of the test.

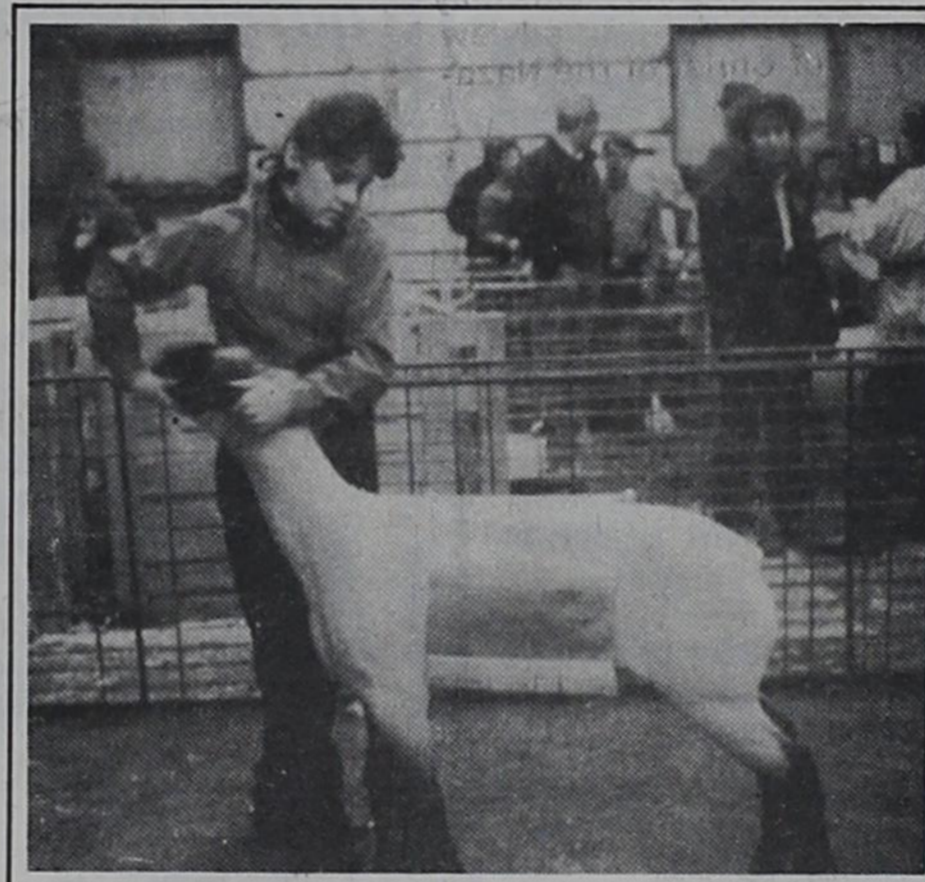

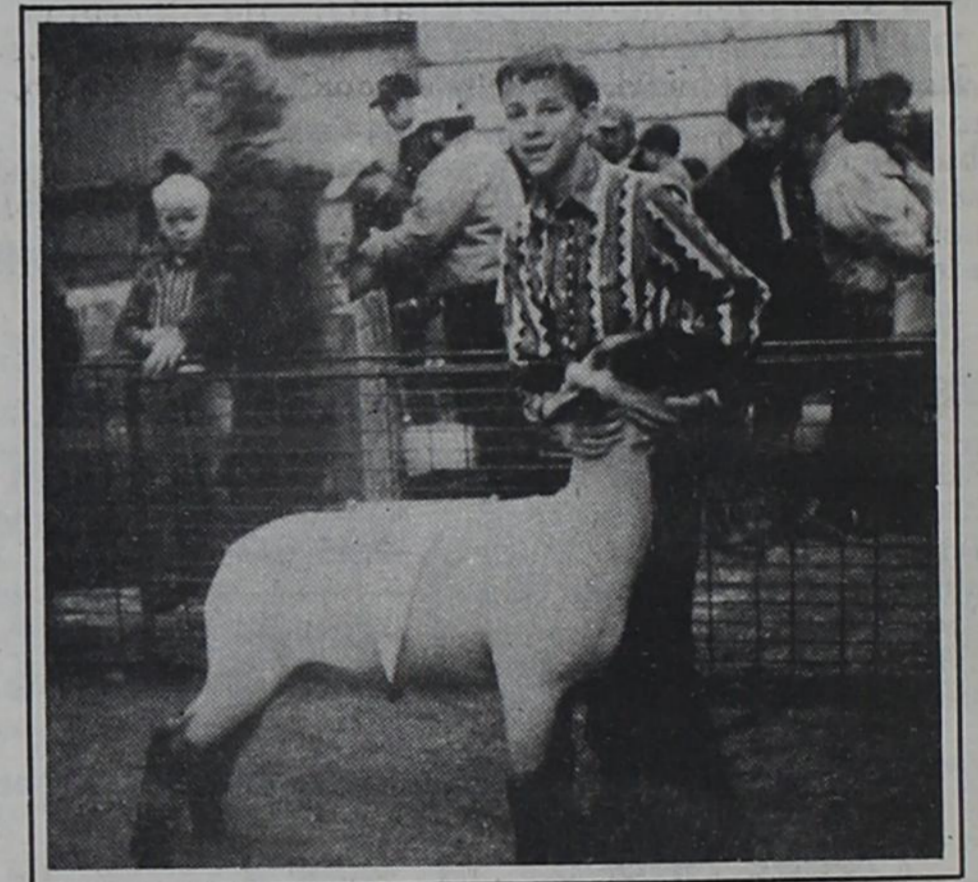

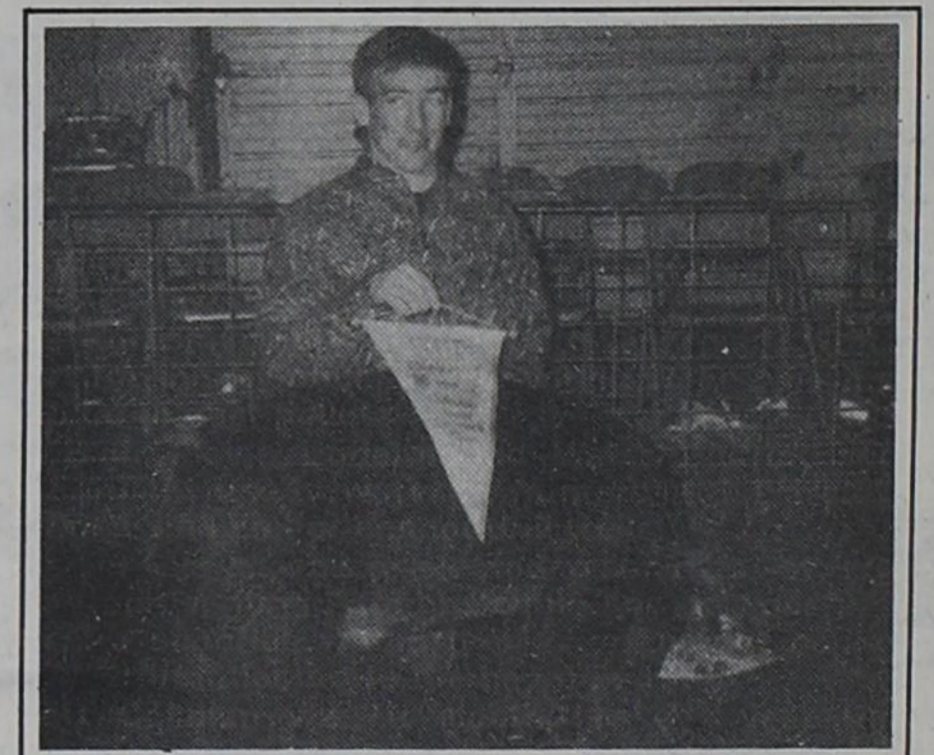

 2 Tbs. margarine or butter

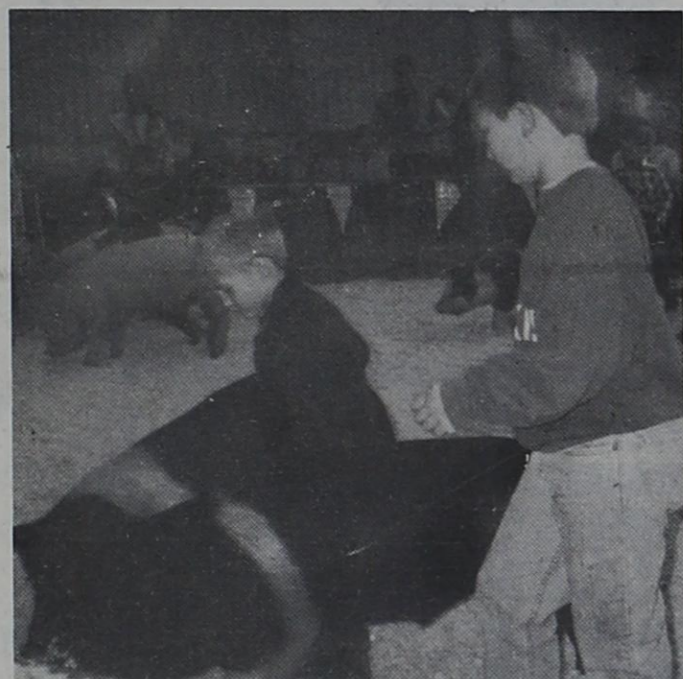

Texico Councilwoman Carolyn Burrows said a state representative has been invited to be present at this meeting.

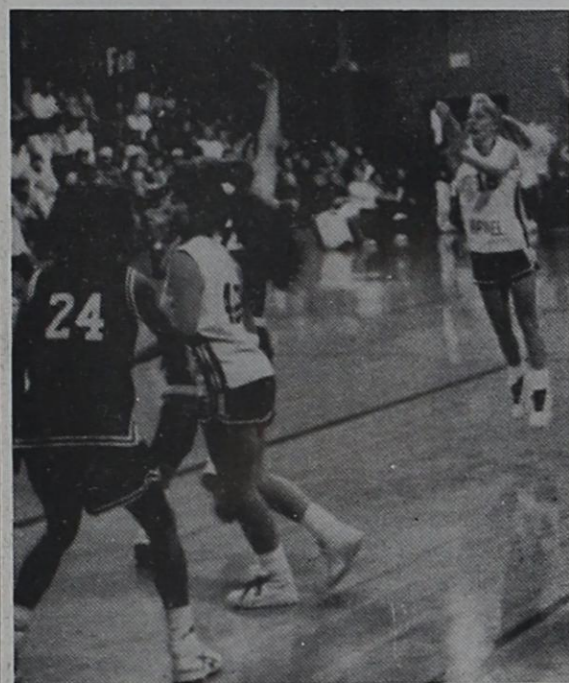

The tree species can be a mixture of conifers, deciduous and shrub species. A mixture of different types provide year round protection and greater aesthetic values.

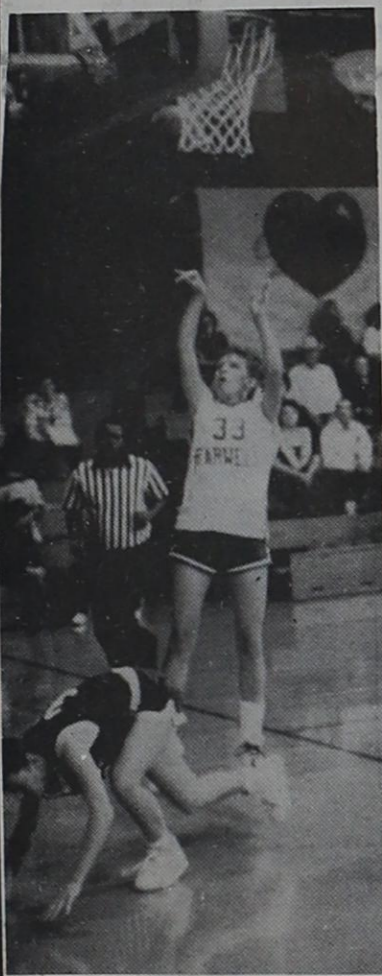

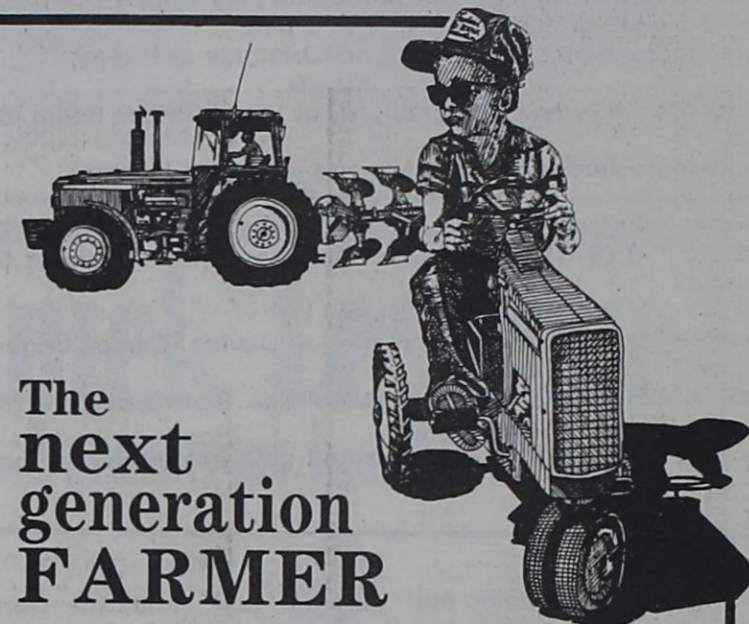

We got married first and then lived together. How quaint can you be? In our time closets were for clothes "not for coming out of." Bunnies were small rabbits, and rabbits were not Volkswagens.

Designer jeans were for scheming girls named Jean or Jeanne and having a meaningful relationship meant getting along with our cousins.

We thought fast food was what you ate during Lent, and outer space was the back of the drive-in theater.

We were before house - husbands, gay rights, computer dating, computer marriages and dual careers. We were before day-care centers, group therapy and nursing homes.

We never heard of FM radio, tape decks, electric typewriters, artificial hearts, word processors, yogurt and guys wearing earrings. For us time - sharing meant togetherness not computers or condominiums: a chip meant a piece of wood; hardware meant hardware, and software wasn't even a word.

In 1940, "made in Japan"

meant junk and the term "making out" referred to how you did on your exam.

Pizza, McDonald's and instant coffee were unheard of.

We hit the scene when there were 5 and 10 cent stores, where you bought things for five and ten cents.

Ice cream cones were bought for a nickel and a dime. For one nickel you could ride a street car, make a phone call, buy a Pepsi or enough stamps to mail one letter and two postcards. You could buy a Chevy coupe for \$600 but who could afford one, a pity too, because gas was 11 cents a gallon.

In our day cigarette smoking was fashionable, grass was mowed, coke was a cold drink and pot was something you cooked in.

Rock music was Grandma's lullaby, and "Aids" were helpers in the principal's office.

We were certainly not before the differences between sex or before sex was discovered, but we were surely before the sex changes; we made do with what we had and we were the last generation that was so dumb as to think you need a husband to have a baby. No wonder we were so confused and there is such a generation gap today.

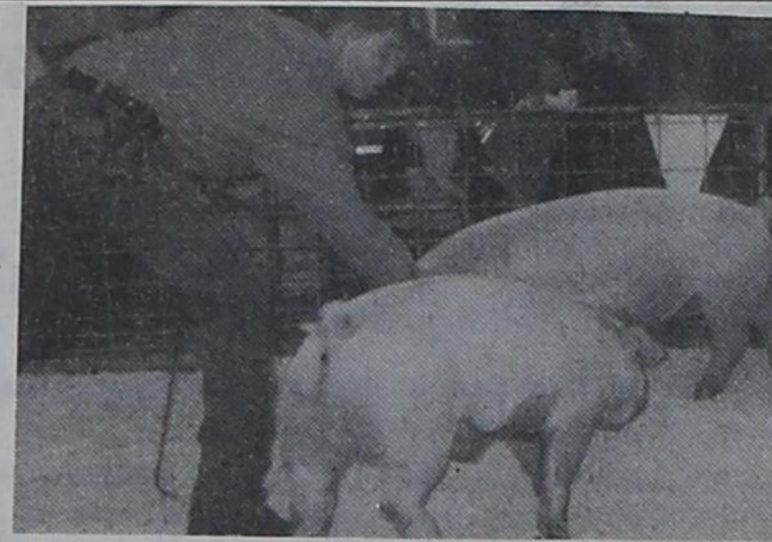

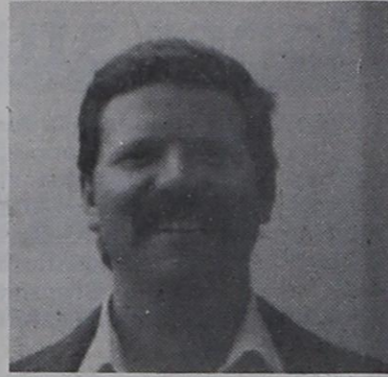


County stock show coming!

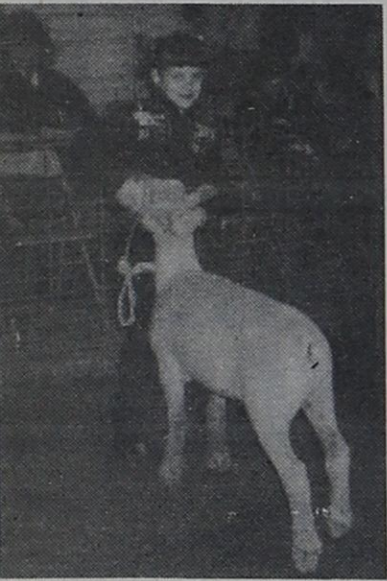
