The answer is complicated

Each year there are hundreds of books written for children, but school libraries must limit the number that they purchase - how does the librarian decide which books will be purchased?

The answer is pretty complicated. There are lots and lots of factors that go into the selection of one book over another in a school library.

"We try to buy books that go along with the reading series," said Texico library aide Cary Kittrell. "The book companies send us lists of books that will go with the series." These books extend the vocabulary and lessons that are taught in the textbooks.

"We look for readability. The book can't have very many words that they don't know, but you want some new words to pull the vocabulary up," notes Farwell librarian Marion Hudson. She also noted that illustrations were very important for the books purchased for the youngest children.

"If a teacher comes and asks for things during the year, I keep a list of what they ask for, and look for that. They will probably teach the same things next year," said Farwell library aide Sheree Montgomery.

Mrs. Hudson has been in the library business for many years. She notes that before ordering anything new one of her first tasks is to take an inventory of what the library already has on hand. That limits the chance of duplicating purchases.

"We try to balance the collection. If you see you are short on science, you try to order more of those," said Mrs. Hudson. Once she knows which areas have the greatest need, she tries to fill those needs but still buy some new books and materials for each department.

Each year there are major changes in the curriculum for some subject areas which require more new books than in other areas. The libraries try to augment those areas. Usually these changes occur the year a new series of textbooks is purchased for use in the classroom.

Each year the Farwell school library also tries to purchase one set of encyclopedias and some general reference books so that the reference section remains up to date. State guidelines in Texas require reference sections to be updated every 7 years, but Farwell tries to purchase some new reference books each year so that all of the expense does not occur in one year.

"The state in its wisdom will pull an old book," said Mrs. Hudson. Some old books, she explained, really need to be replaced but others are proverbial favorites that do not change from year to year.

"Babe Ruth is one of the most popular books," said Mrs. Montgomery. Some books which were written more than 30 years ago - such as the *Nancy Drew* and *Hardy Boys* mysteries remain ever popular.

Mrs. Hudson has been told by library experts that buying new copies of old favorites periodically helps to boost circulation - the children like to see pretty new covers on their old favorites.

Mrs. Hudson also tries very hard to keep a good selection of classics on hand for the college bound students. "I have a list that I ask the library science kids read - it contains classics and new young adult books. I want to keep as many of these on the shelf as we can. I also keep lists of recommended books from other schools," she notes.

Books that have won major writing awards such as the Newberry Award or the Pulitzer Prize are often chosen over less critically acclaimed books, but not always. Some of the prize winning books contain language or situations that

It was interesting when I saw this article on Page 1 of the Feb. 20 issue of "USA Today." It was headlined "Middle class 'pulling apart' to rich, poor."

You folks know that I wrote several columns last fall about the upcoming problem of a two-tier economic system in the U.S. and the fact that it's the underlying problem for many issues facing us today.

Well, when I wrote those

columns I was hypothesizing. So it felt good to see that research shows my conclusions are just.

The "USA Today" article said the U.S. Census Bureau has found that the middle class fell from 71.2 percent of the population in 1969 to 63.3 percent in 1989.

Census Bureau stats also said the proportion of poor people earning less than \$18,576 rose from 17.9 percent to 22.1 percent in the same period, and the proportion of wealthy people making more than \$74,303 annually rose from 10.9 percent to 14.7 percent.

Those are dramatic figures but I bet the past 2 years has seen a much sharper change,

also.

Other conclusions from the Census Bureau noted that the young are getting poorer, and the elderly richer; that the ranks of rich and poor are growing about 4 percent a year; that folks at the bottom end of the economic scale are losing ground from year to year; and that education pays off - the better the diploma, the more financial earnings.

As I've written, this major underlying problem won't be understood by Congress for several more years. By the late 1990s, I expect the middle class total to be under 50 percent - and that's when the problem will hit the fan.

The U.S. tax base rests on a prosperous middle class.

Take that away and guess what? You got it - a major dilemma. If I were a Congressman, I would consider retiring in 1996. After that, it will be crunch time.

Until then, you will see ramifications of the problem, in the form of issues, being focused upon. Health care is a perfect example. If you analyze where the problem is, the main reaction is coming from former middle class folks who are being pushed into the lower class.

The real answer to health care, and the other issues that will be unfolding the next few years, is to help restore the middle class.

But Congress doesn't understand that.

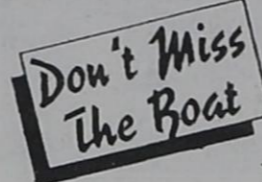

Pharmacist's Corner: Use of IPECAC syrup in poisoning? IPECAC syrup is used in the emergency treatment of certain kinds of poisoning. Only the SYRUP form should be used.

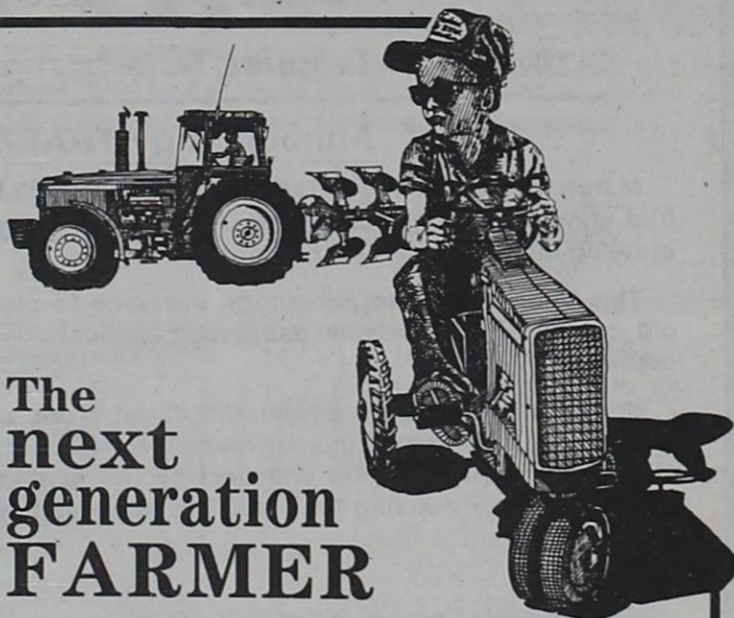

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

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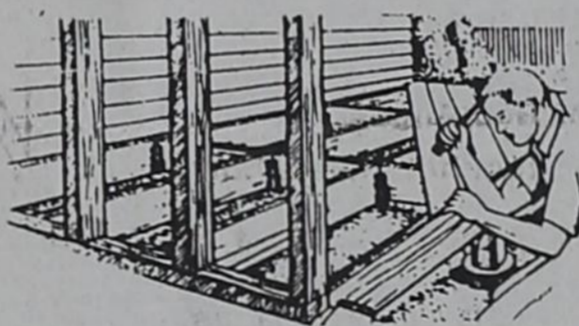
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Lazbuddie falls in state playoff

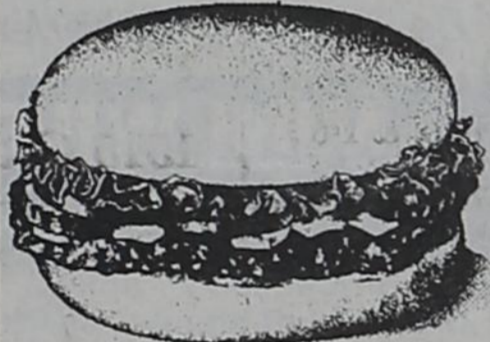
Editor's note; In my column, I called Clinton an alleged adulterer and coward, based on comments being made about him - but also showing they weren't proven.

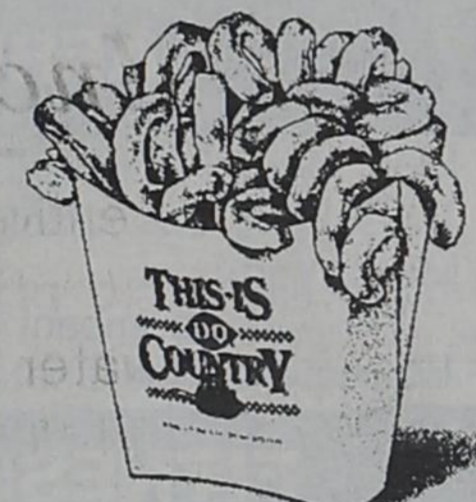
And for those who wondered what I did, I enlisted in the U.S. Army in December 1965 for a three-year stint.

A fish, chicken, and beef dinner will be served and the Speer Family Gospel Group will provide entertainment following the meal.

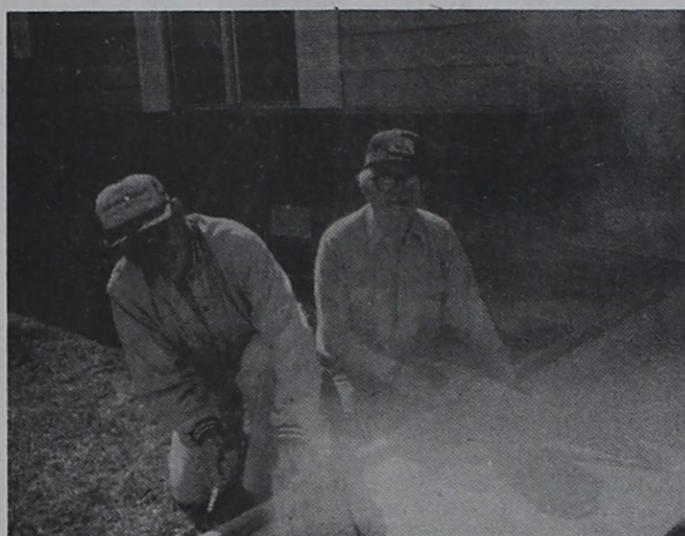
Deaf Smith members will receive capital credits from 1976 and 1977 amounting to one million dollars, and the remaining \$110,766 is a power cost refund.

may be appropriate for adults, but not appropriate for school children.

Mrs. Kittrell pulled a children's book off the "teacher's only" shelf of the Texico Elementary library to illustrate the point: "This is a precious children's book, but it shows complete nudity. They could have at least put a diaper on him," she said. The book had been purchased because it was an award winning book by a famous children's author.

When the school got a copy of the book with its controversial illustration, the staff decided that it might be best to take it out of general circulation. It is available if a teacher wants to simply read the story to the students without showing pictures.

"We don't intentionally buy books that have swearing or adult situations in them," noted Mrs. Hudson. "If a child comes across a questionable book, we remove it from the shelves."

In the high school library the problem is more difficult because many of the books on the recommended reading lists prepared by colleges include swearing, adult situations and they are concerned with moral issues.

Texico High School librarian Billie Cooper mentioned one book by an extremely popular author that was removed from general circulation by the school because of crude language. She noted that if a student really wanted to read that particular book, they might be able to find it at the public library or at a book store. But, the school does not want to encourage the students to read materials that the parents don't approve.

When Texico ordered materials to teach about Aids, for instance, Mrs. Cooper brought the matter up before the school board. "We need a ruling higher than mine," she told them.

Some of the materials that were recommended to the school on this topic wound up on the teacher reference shelf because the school board felt they were "too plain spoken," for general circulation. But, they are still available for use at a teacher's discretion. Teachers may use parts of the book for all their students or approve the materials for use by a mature student when appropriate.

The high school teachers and librarians have to try to match the child with the books that seem appropriate. Luckily, in a small town the librarians often have a good idea of the standards that the children see in their homes and churches, and they have a good idea what will be acceptable.
