

Wolverines fall in state tourney to Loving, 107-93

In 100% run and gun action, the Texico Wolverines fell to the Loving Falcons Wednesday night in the opening round of the state playoffs at Albuquerque, 107-93.

Texico, Region B champions, ended their season at 24-4. Loving was Region D runnerup.

The Falcons, defending state Class A champion, opened on fire, racing to an 11-0 lead before Texico took a time-out. The Wolverines got going as Kenny Shaw hit the first of his many driving layups. A bucket by Pepe Gonzales closed the margin to 14-5. A jumper by Shaw made it 14-7 at 4:30 of the first quarter.

After a 3-pointer by Loving, Texico continued its comeback. Jason Pyle notched a 3 pointer, Gonzales a free throw and then Pyle stole the ball. Gonzales hit a layup to close within three points, at 17-14. Shaw stole the ball and hit a layup and then with 2 minutes left in the first period, Pyle put in a rebound bucket to allow Texico to take its only lead of the game, 18-17.

Loving's 3rd 3 pointer of the first period put the Falcons ahead again, for good. But two buckets by Shaw kept Texico

to within 2 points as the quarter closed in Loving's favor, 24-22.

Once again, Texico started the quarter slowly as they could only manage a bucket by Matthew Williams and a free throw by Gonzales as Loving opened up a 37-25 lead at 4:50 of the second period.

Again Texico called a timeout, and again the Wolverines fought back. With 1:40 left, a layup by Shaw pulled Texico to within 8, 43-35. And the half closed with Texico down by 7 - 48-41.

Opening the 3rd quarter, Williams hit a layup after a nice feed from Gonzales to close to within 5, 48-43. But, again, Loving went on a scoring run, lengthening their lead to 60-48 at the midway point in the quarter.

Pyle hit a pair of free throws but drew his 4th foul with 3:21 left in the quarter, forcing him to the bench. But Shaw kept Texico in the game, combatting Loving's baskets with scores of his own, several of which came off nice assists from Gonzales. Texico won the 3rd quarter, 23-22, and went into the final period down by only 6, 70-64.

Pyle returned at the start of the final period but Loving ran off 11 points to Texico's 2, lengthening their margin to 81-66, the widest of the game. And, again, Texico staged another strong comeback. Pyle hit 2 free throws, and Gonzales and Shaw each scored twice, lowering the deficit to 8 points - 83-75.

With 3 minutes left in the game, Texico was down by 10 when Pyle scored a rebound basket and a 3 pointer. Williams drove in for a bucket, added the free throw when he was fouled, and Texico was down 94-86.

With a minute and a half left, Pyle fouled out as Loving went into a semi-stall. Then Gonzales hit a 3 pointer and Gooden scored after he stole the ball. Texico was down by 5, 96-91, with a minute to go. But the Wolverines ran out of steam as Loving outscored them 11-2 in the final minute of play.

Shaw had another high-scoring game for Texico, notching 36 points. Gonzales, strong under the boards and totalling a good number of assists, added 20. Others scoring were Pyle, 16; Williams, 9; Greg Akers and Kelvin Gooden, 6 each.

Good luck, Wolverines!

As this column is being written before the New Mexico state basketball playoffs, it's still undecided how far the Texico Wolverines will go. My guess is all the way.

As I wrote early in the season, I believed Texico had the best starting five of any team in Class A in New Mexico. I haven't changed my opinion - although those Melrose Buffaloes are a tough bunch.

Jason Pyle, Kenny Shaw, Matthew Williams, Kelvin Gooden and Pepe Gonzales complement each other in many ways. I've watched the Wolverines about half a dozen times this year and really enjoy watching the teamwork.

What a year it's been. Williams came close to setting a school scoring record. Then a couple of weeks later, Shaw - a guard who jumps center due to his outstanding vertical leap - did achieve that.

Meanwhile, Pyle "posts up" just beyond the 3 point line and can hit those shots beautifully. Then there's that scabback Gooden who's active on both ends of the court, causing turnovers on defense while contributing a good amount of points on offense.

But the player that has really impressed me is Gonzales. He plays the kind of basketball that's a winner - hard-nosed.

He plays center and forward for Texico, depending on the kind of offense being run. It's exciting when he gets the ball and takes off toward the bucket. He has little fear regardless of how much taller the defenders are. And if the shot is missed, I can't think of another player I would want under the basket trying to rebound.

There are a lot of players who play well on one side of the court. In other words, they may be great scorers but play poor defense. Gonzales plays as hard both ways as any player I've seen this year. He's the kind of player others can learn from.

What's really nice is that Gonzales also does well off the court. He's president of the Texico Student Council, enrolled in the school's advanced classes and is active in the new community Activities organization. He's a leader.

I predict a successful future for Mr. Gonzales.

Texico cemetery to be upgraded

The Texico City Council took steps Tuesday toward fixing up the city cemetery. Recently, the city added an area to the cemetery after legal negotiations that took more than a year.

Meeting with the cemetery board - John Hadley, Mae Stone, Paul Skaggs and Mary Jones - the council decided to seek bids on a pipe fence to enclose both portions of the cemetery - the old one and the new addition. It will be 5 feet high and pipe must be at least 2 inches in diameter.

In discussing the fence, it was noted that a chain link fence would cost about \$17,500 while a pipe fence for the same area would cost about \$9,000.

The fence will have 4 10-foot gates (2 20-foot openings, 1 in each cemetery section) and 2 walk-through gates. Texico Marshal Fry Urioste suggested that persons placed on "community service" if they commit crimes can be used to keep the fence painted. Councilwoman Carolyn Burrows suggested a decorative arch be added, too.

Pat Buchanan did extremely well against President Bush in the Tuesday's Texas Republican primary election in Parmer County.

Parmer County totals showed Bush getting 139 votes to Buchanan's 95. Two voters cast uncommitted votes.

No one was elected county GOP chairman. Current chairman Chris Gikas didn't seek re-election. No precinct chairmen were elected for Friona, Bovina or Lazbuddie. Delbert Lingnau was elected precinct chairman for Farwell.

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Herington tops Stafford

Parmer County had two local incumbents seek the Democratic nomination for re-election in Tuesday's Texas primary - one won and one lost.

Incumbent Friona county commissioner Ernest Anthony lost to Johnny Mars by 13 votes - 175 to 162.

Incumbent county tax assessor-collector Doris Herington beat back a stiff challenge from Bob Stafford, 617-450.

At the presidential level, Bill Clinton was a big winner over Paul Tsongas, 627-209.

Stafford has his best total at Pct. 201, EMS Building, Bovina, which he won 142-66. He also won Pct. 303, Ridgelea School, Bovina, 14-10, and Pct. 202, Friona Community Center, 33-31.

Mrs. Herington won all the other precincts. She did best at Pct. 101, Calvary Baptist Church, Friona, 188-100, and Farwell, 152-65.

Wendol Christian was re-elected county chairman with 865 votes.

Elected precinct chairmen were: #101, Martha Hamilton, with 15 write-in votes; #201, Durwood Bell, 182; #202, Danny Kendrick, 58; #203, Jack Patterson, 28; #301, Dutch Quickel, 189; #302, Richard Carpenter, 54; #303, Arlene McCallum; #401, Joyce McGehee, 49; and #402, Danny Black, 42.

Ms. Hamilton and Ms. McCallum are new chairmen.

Surviving are 3 sons, Cecil and Joe Bowery III, both of Pasadena, Texas; and Charles, of Pleasant Hill; 2 daugh-

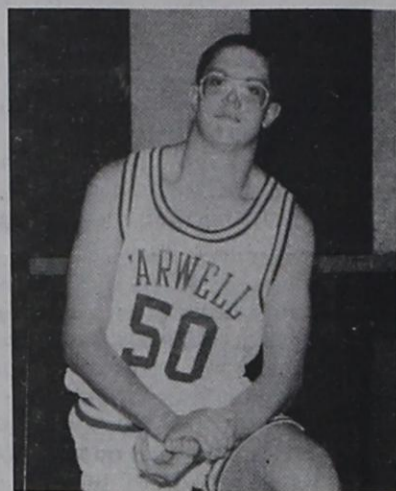

The new plots will need to have deeds, it was stated. Decisions will still be needed on questions like: price of lots, should a fence be placed between the two cemetery areas, should tombstones be up or flat, and should each grave be marked?

City engineer Bob Lydick will plat the new addition, it was voted. Also, county commissioner Paul Dee Barnes said that the county would help fix up the road leading to the cemetery, it was stated. Mayor Doyal LaRue will ask the state to put a marker on the highway noting the cemetery.

In other business, City Clerk-Treasurer Marie Christian reported an answer is expected this week on whether the city can use part of its state grant of \$125,000 toward engineering expenses for a new well.

The problem is that the funds are earmarked for well construction and the city doesn't have the money to hire an engineer. The city is optimistic the state will allow this. So a special meeting was called for 6:30 p.m. mst Monday at City Hall to move ahead on the well project if the state says yes to its request.

The city wants to dig a new well on school grounds, although official school board approval is still needed. The west side of the school grounds was discussed. A possible problem was noted in that there area already two private wells in the area and the state has guidelines for how close a new well can be built to an existing one.

It was noted that school Supt. R.L. Richards has written Gov. Bruce King complaining that the state has been dragging its feet about Texico's well problem, since only one well is functioning.

The council also: - Heard deputy marshal Kirk Roberts say that the old Westerner Motel has had several doors and windows busted out.

- Agreed to seek bids for the annual audit. - Put off seeking bids to clean up the vacant lot at 501 Wheeler because the city is unsure of having the funds necessary to do the work.

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Wolverines nip Melrose for Regional Championship

The Texico Wolverines claimed the Regional B Championship Saturday at home with a 70-69 win over Melrose. Texico, 24-3, won when Pepe Gonzales hit a short jumper from the lane with 4 seconds left to cap an uphill battle. But Kenny Shaw had 17 points for Texico in the first half to enable the Wolverines to stay in the game. It was the sixth time that Melrose and Texico have played, with the "series" all even at 3-3. Texico won their first match, then lost three in a row, before beating the Buffalos in the district and regional tourney finals. Scoring were: Shaw, 26; Gonzales, 14; Jason Pyle, 13; Kelvin Gooden, 10; Matthew Williams, 5; Louie Delgado and Greg Akers, 1 each. The first quarter saw Texico take an early lead and maintain it, leading 18-15 at its end. But Melrose hit 4 3 pointers in the second quarter to take over the lead. By

halftime, Melrose led 39-34. Only Shaw's driving, slashing layups kept Texico close. The Buffalo defense was tenacious, blocking several Wolverine shots under the basket. Melrose maintained their lead in the third quarter, aided by a pair of 3 point shots. But Shaw scored 6 more points to keep Texico close. And in the final couple of minutes, other Wolverines began connecting, with Gooden adding 6 points. But Melrose increased their margin to 59-52 at the end of this quarter. Then Texico got a break. One of Melrose's best players, Toby Bostwick, fouled out with 7:30 left in the final period. The momentum seemed to change as Texico fought back. A drive by Gonzales closed it to within 6. Then Pyle hit a jumper to make it 4. After Melrose scored with 4 minutes left in the game, Shaw hit a jumper, followed by a layup. Melrose was up by only 2.

After a Melrose bucket, Pyle notched a 3 pointer with 3 minutes left - Texico was down by 1. Less than a minute later, Gonzales scored on layup - after he stole the ball - to give Texico its first lead since early in the second quarter, 68-67. With 1:11 left, Melrose scored. Texico missed a shot but got the ball back when the Melrose guard was called for traveling with 23 seconds left. Texico missed again but fouled Melrose with 14 seconds left. Monty Bostwick's free throw missed (on a 1 and 1) and Texico got its last chance with 11 seconds left. Seven seconds later, Gonzales was the hero.


Texico gets trip to Albuquerque

The Texico Wolverines rolled to a 22-2 lead after the first quarter, then coasted to a 78-58 win over Grady in the Regional semi-final last Friday at Texico. The victory put Texico on the way to Albuquerque for the state tourney. Man to man defense and full court pressure caused 12 Grady turnovers in the first quarter. That, in essence, was the game. Meanwhile, Texico showed balanced scoring with four players in double figures: Kenny Shaw, 19; Pepe Gonzales, 15; Jason Pyle and Matthew Williams, 16 each; Kelvin Gooden, 8; Aaron Ketterling and Louie Delgado, 2 each. As noted, the first quarter was all Texico. It was 13-0

before Gady scored a bucket with 2:57 left in the stanza. All five Wolverine starters put points on the board, including a score by Shaw on an alley-oop pass. Interestingly, Grady outscored Texico by 2 points in the second period (17-15) and by 1 point in the third period (13-12). But the first quarter margin was too large to surmount. Grady made a run midway through the 2nd quarter, closing to within 14 points before buckets by Gonzales and Gooden gave Texico more leeway. Gonzales and Shaw led the Texico attack in the third quarter. But again, midway during it Grady scored 6 straight points to pull within 14. Then two buckets by Williams moved the margin back to 18. In the final period, Grady put on full court pressure, closing to within 13, at 60-47 with 3:20 left. At one point, Grady hit 3 3-pointers. But Grady started fouling, and Texico was making its free throws to maintain their lead. With 50 seconds left, Coach Richard Luscombe took out the starters.

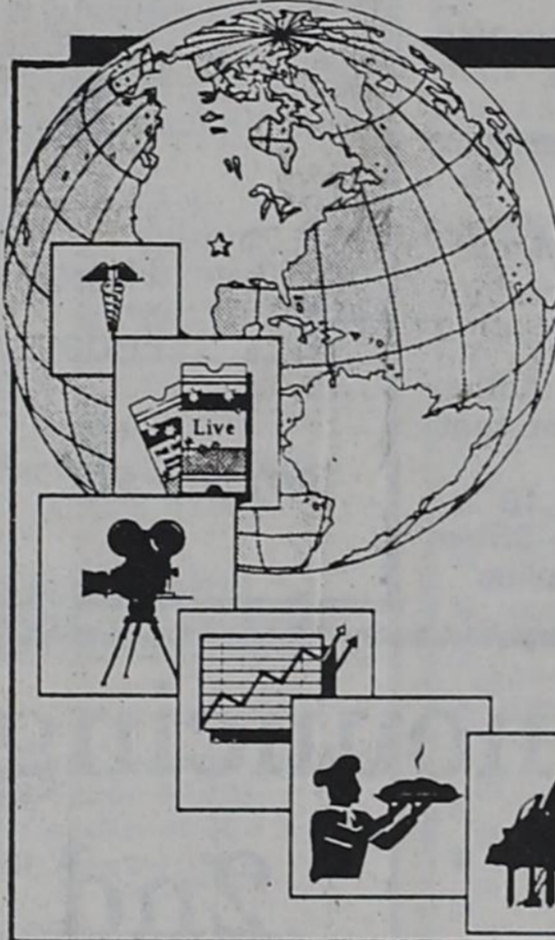

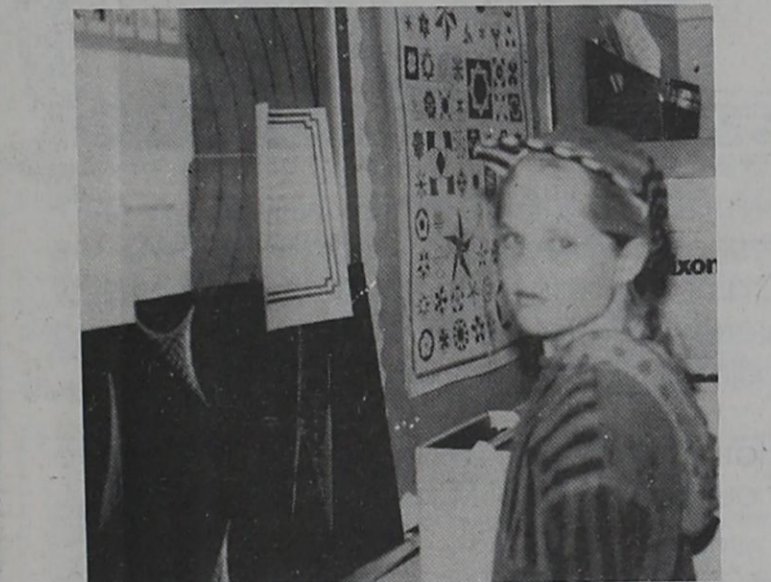

Fixed loan rates fall

Fixed loan rates for the purchase of agricultural land or rural homes fell to 8.20 percent last week, the Federal Land Bank Association said.

The new rate is 2 percent less than the previous fixed rate available for these loan purposes and is the lowest fixed rate FLBAs have offered in several years.

Up to \$50 million is available for loans through this

program which features a 10-year fixed rate after which the borrower can convert to either a variable rate, or select another fixed rate. Loan payments are amortized for up to 40 years.

"On a typical \$65,000 loan, the new rate means a yearly saving of \$1,300 to a home or land buyer," said Michael R. Davis, president of the Farm Credit Bank of Texas.

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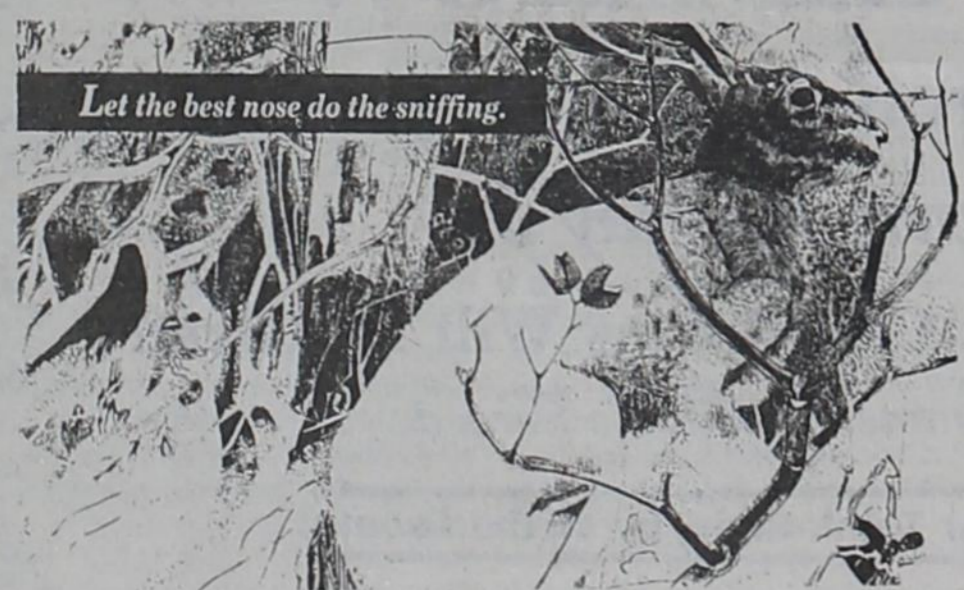

In other business, the commissioners contracted with Potter County for a year to use forensic pathologist Sparks Veasey.

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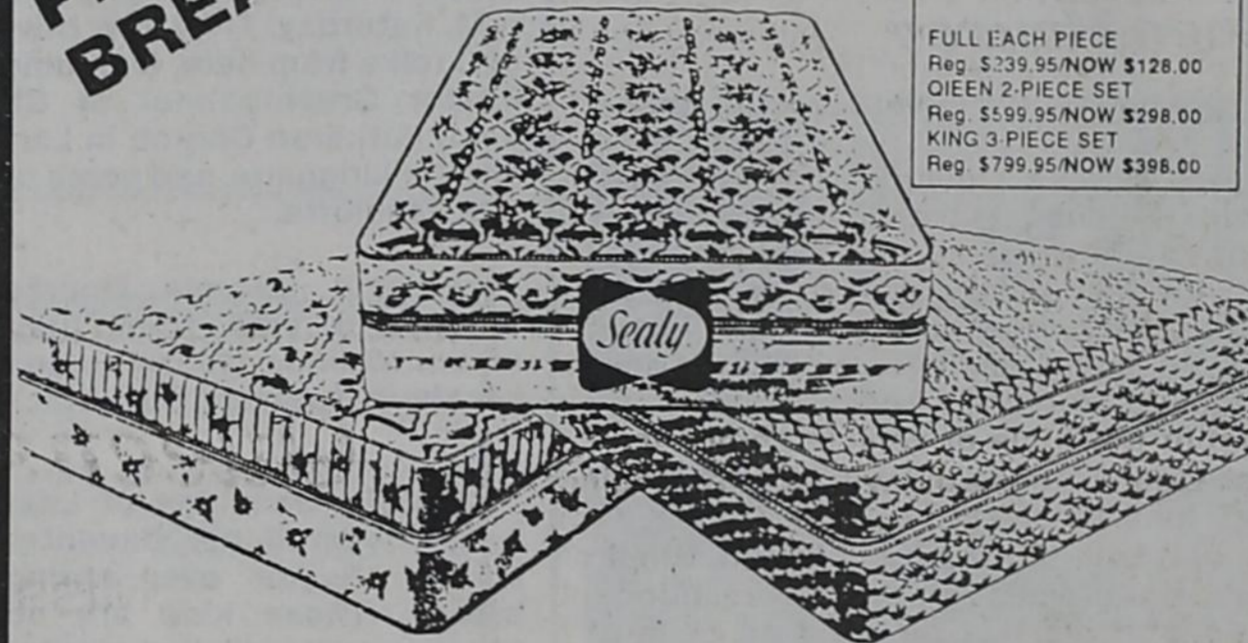

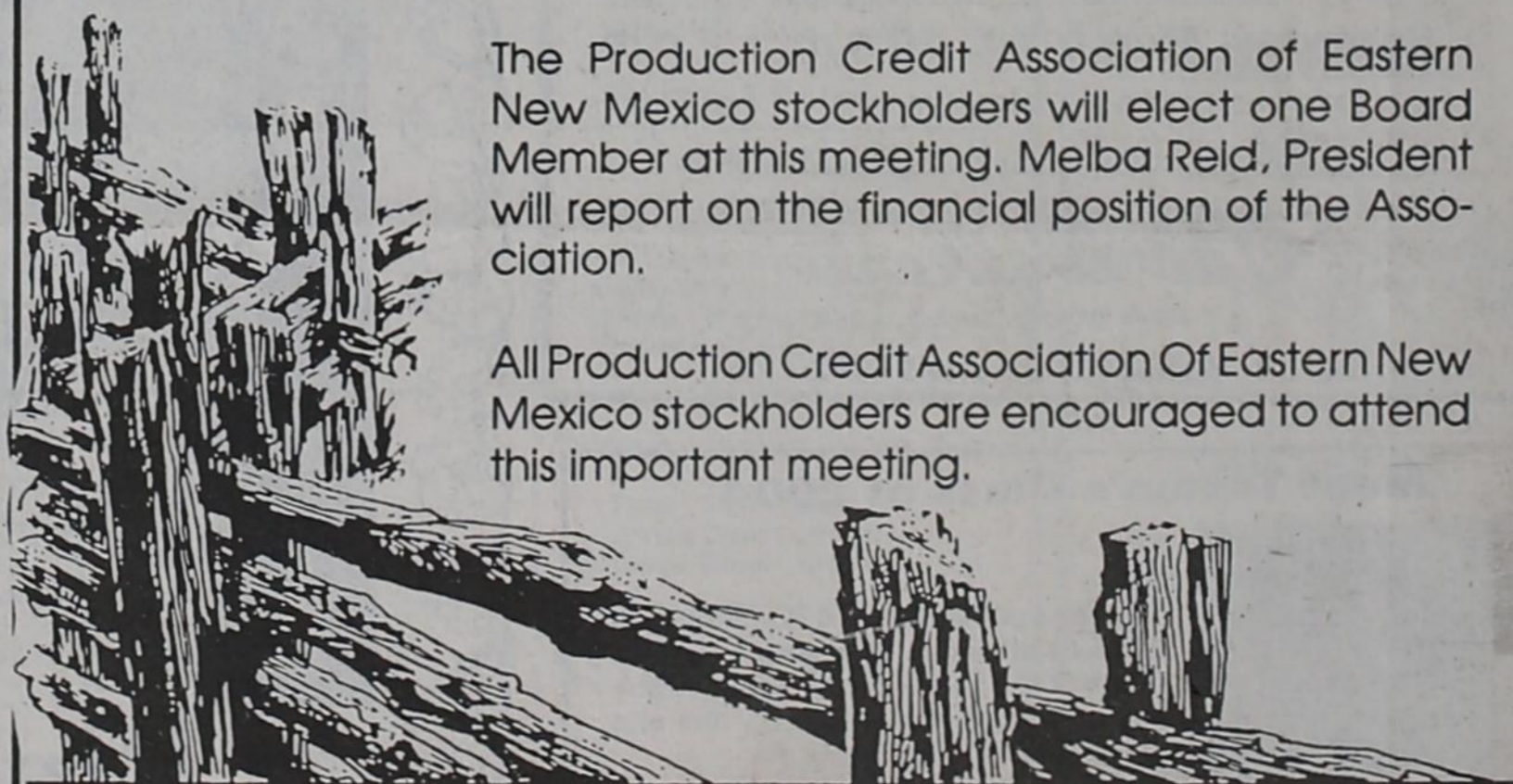

Chevy assists Clovis college

Clovis Community College has received a 1992 Chevrolet Crew Cab Pickup from Chevrolet Motor Division to enhance the school's automotive program and afford the students an opportunity to become familiar with the latest in automotive technology.

"This brings the latest technology right here to Clovis," said Bobby Jack Stewart of Doc Stewart Chevrolet. This is the second year that the Clovis college has received one of these vehicles.

The vehicle that Clovis Community College received this year had been damaged in transit. The body needs repair, but the rest of the vehicle is just the way it came from the factory.

So far, nearly 10,000 new Chevrolet passenger cars and trucks damaged in transit or by flood have been donated to the schools for in-classroom instructional purposes. In the past 20 years educational institutions in most of the 50 states have received donated vehicles for their vocation/education programs.

This program was started in 1972 when Chevrolet started diverting damaged cars and trucks (previously scrapped) to schools for training purposes. In addition to damaged vehicles, engineering test and pilot line vehicles not suitable for sale are included.

The Chevrolet program also includes donations of passenger car and truck engines, transmissions, tools and various major automotive components used for testing or design development. Any secondary public or parochial school, private nonprofit secondary and technical school, and community and/or junior college with a terminal vocational program for automotive service training may qualify for the donation of a vehicle or vehicle component.

The institution must sign a legal affidavit acknowledging they fully understand that the vehicle is to be used in classroom instruction only and cannot be licensed, titled or driven on any road, public or private, nor can any component or components of a donated vehicle be used on or in any vehicle that will be licensed, titled, or driven on any road, public or private. Donation labels are affixed to the vehicles, and Chevrolet advises appropriate agencies that the vehicle has been removed from service and can never again be licensed or titled.

The Service Staffs at Chevrolet's 22 Branch Offices keep a current request list from qualified schools. Once a vehicle is determined to be eligible for donation, the respective Branch Office obtains the necessary documents and approval.
