There are 500 folks at a show - and I guarantee they get into it.

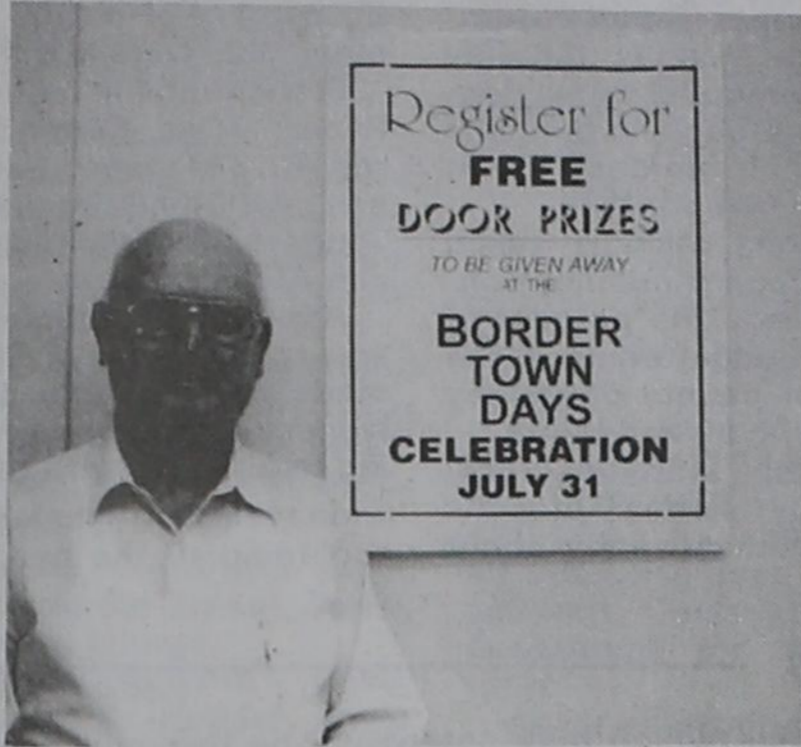

BTD Merchants' Giveaway starts

Bicycle contest registration starts

All area youngsters are reminded that registration starts Monday for the Border Town Days Decorated Bike Contest. Youths must sign up at Texico City Hall.

This year offers a special incentive: Ted Lopez of Tedson Trailers is donating a brand new bike to the winner of "Best of Show" - the bike judged as best decorated regardless of age category.

This year's BTD theme is "Looking to the Future." It's important to follow the theme, since that is a large portion of the judging.

Also, an anonymous donor has provided funds for cash prizes in each category.

And every entrant in the contest will receive a free ticket to ride the CAKE Train. "Everything is ready at Texico City Hall for registration," says Rhonda Qualls, who is in charge of the bike contest.

The registration deadline is 3 p.m. Friday, July 19.

Mrs. Qualls said that youths planning to enter the decorated bike contest in the parade need to register, giving their name and age, to be eligible for the cash prizes and free train tickets.

No motorized bikes are allowed in the contest. All riders must bring their decorated bikes to Anderson Street (between Texico City Hall and the flea market - across the street from Citizens Bank) at 9:45 a.m. Texas time, and line up for judging there on July 31.

The street will be blocked off so that there will be no vehicular traffic.

"You must be on time or you will not be judged," said Mrs. Qualls.

"Contestants need to be sure to stick to the theme, (Looking to the Future) if they're going to be counted," said Mrs. Qualls. The judges will really be looking for adherence to theme this year.

Other rules are:
- All participants ride in the parade and must continue to Farwell City Park, and then park their bikes in the park area. A bicycle rack will be provided in back of the Farwell First Baptist Church.
- You must be present at the park to receive your cash prize and free train tickets.

Wolverine Band to march

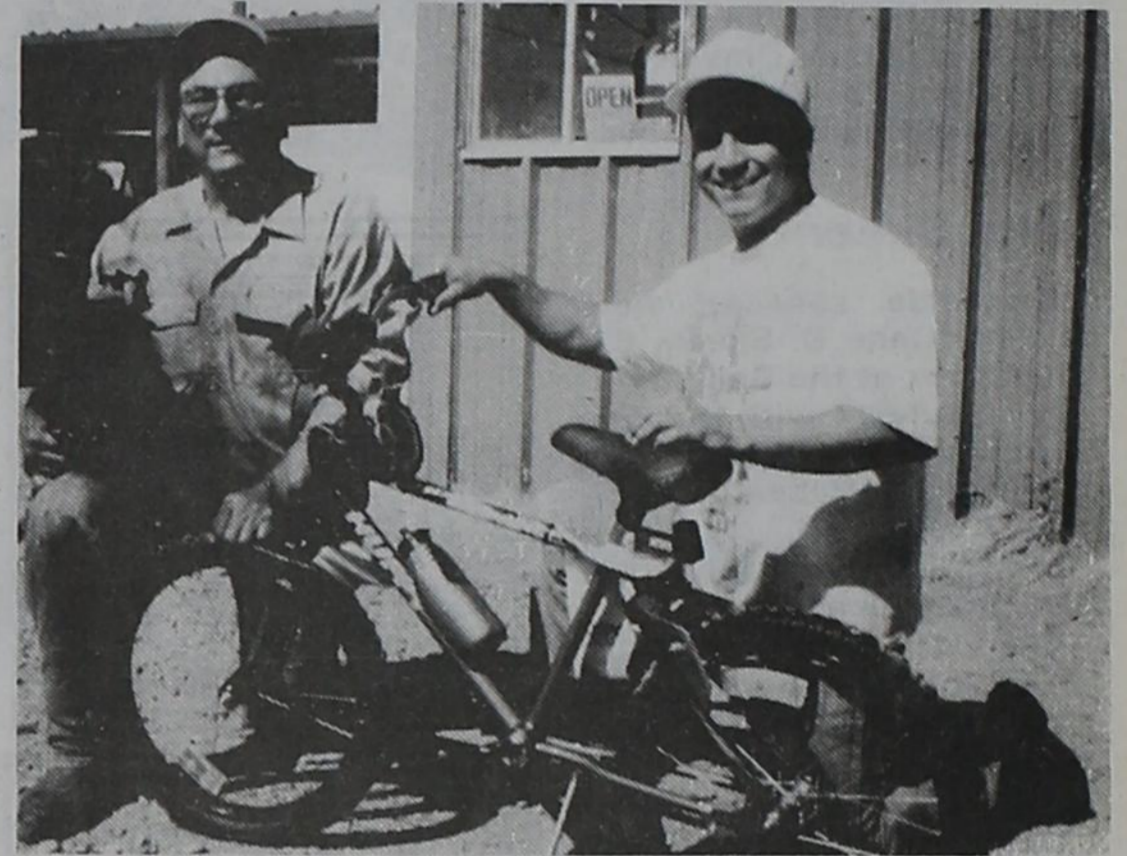
The Texico Wolverine Band members will again march in the Border Town Days parade July 31, school board director Robert Simmons said.

'The tar baby of all issues'

State Sen. Teel Bivins visited Farwell Tuesday to discuss the major bills passed in the last legislative session. He called it "one of the most productive sessions."

Budget was one of Bivins' prime concerns because he was on the finance committee. "This is the first time in 10 years that we passed a budget within our means with no tax increase on the people of Texas. The Legislature heard the anger and frustration of the people out there," said Bivins.

Bivins referred to school finance issues as "the black cloud that loomed over all our heads," and the "tar baby of all issues." He told the group that the best he could say about the bill that passed the Legislature was that it kept the schools open and it kept out school consolidation.

The common thread which ran through the letters written by his constituents was, "Keep our schools from closing." He said that had gotten more mail on this issue than on any other issue since he has been in the state Legislature.

School officials from Farwell, Bovina, and Friona were present to let him know that they did not feel that they would receive enough money for their school systems under the new plan.

"It's hard for me to understand why we have to take a \$127,000 hit," Farwell school Supt. Richard Boothby said. School officials from Friona and Bovina agreed with Boothby that they would be getting far less from the state than they had anticipated.

Bivins replied, "If you have demonstrable, real numbers, I'll go to bat for you." He said he would get personally involved in the appeals process if he was needed.

School enrollment is growing in Texas. "We did the best we could do with what people of Texas said they were willing to pay," said Bivins. He later noted, "Either they are going to pay taxes to the state or locally."

Bivins said this year's Legislature passed regulations which favor business more than they have in the past few years. He cited the new trucking regulations as especially important.

Friona officials seek more county funds for fire dept.

The Parmer County Commissioners Monday formally received a request from Friona city officials seeking financial aid with their fire department budget.

The Friona officials asked that the county commissioners pay the same percent of their fire budget equal to the percent of county calls they make during a year's time.

The last statistics presented by Friona officials showed that currently about

83 percent of its fire department calls were in the county.

Presenting the request were Friona Mayor Clarence Monroe; City Manager Paula Wilson, and City Councilmen Joe Tongate, Tom Randolph, and Jim Atwell.

Although no official action was taken, it was pretty much made clear by the commissioners that they weren't going to go along with the exact Friona request - paying Friona according to the percentage

of its county calls.

The county is in the middle of its current fiscal year and likely won't make any large financial changes now.

However, the commissioners will be starting work within the next two weeks on its budget for the next fiscal year. They will likely look at their allotment of funds to the county's fire departments. Chances are good there will be money increases given.

In other business, the commissioners:

- Received bids for a grid roller for Pct. 4 (Lazbuddie). West Texas Caterpillar submitted the lone bid, which was accepted.

- Renewed its law enforcement liability insurance with Etheridge Spring Insurance Agency, Friona.

The issue which may potentially be the most important for farmers concerns water. For 50 years the State of Texas has regulated underground water, but the Edwards Aquifer decision turned the tables. Now owners control the water under their own property in most instances.

This legislative session completely re-wrote the state penal code and set up a system where criminals will do flat time.



Giveaways

The Texico School Board accepted Texico Elementary School Principal Joel Pate's resignation Tuesday. Pate will teach junior high literature and work with the Chapter I program at Cloudcroft Junior High School.

Quality of lifestyle was a big part of Pate's decision to move. The Pate family is looking forward to moving back to the mountains which they love. Cloudcroft is only about 25 miles from the tiny, rural school where Pate worked before coming here. They will be moving closer to old friends and neighbors. But, this time they will have the advantage of living in a town.

"Cloudcroft's school system is just about exactly the same size as Texico," said Pate. That means that his daughters will have the educational opportunities that they sought when they moved here.

The Pates had moved to this part of New Mexico so that Mrs. Pate could be closer to her mother who had cancer. Now they look forward to returning.

In other business, the board:

- Accepted the resignations of teachers Bruce and K'Dawn Scroggins.
- Made the final payment on the bonded indebtedness for the education complex. Now, the only indebtedness is for the new school additions under construction.
- Agreed to put a metal roof on the Peyton property house, used for home ec.
- Heard that the school maintenance crew blocked in windows on the north side of Gym #2 for energy efficiency.
- Approved the final budget and sent it to Santa Fe for approval.
- Awarded the fire extinguisher bid to AAA, of Clovis.
- Noted that Mrs. Edwards will do diagnostic work next year for Texico Schools.
- Agreed to offer family activity tickets. This means that the immediate family (whether it's just a couple or if they have several other children) of a student involved in football, volleyball or basketball, can buy a ticket for \$60 to get the family into all those games during the school year. Supt. R.L. Richards said he believes this won't hurt revenues but will increase attendance at games.
- Heard Richards say they still need a football coach, English teacher, science teacher, elementary principal, special ed aide and chapter I aide.
- Tentatively set a board meeting for July 23 for hiring personnel.

Lazbuddie hikes meal prices

The Lazbuddie School Board Tuesday held a long board meeting to look carefully at the options open to them in preparing the 1993-94 school budget.

"We will be making some major decisions about funding," said school Supt. Phil Warren. He estimated that Lazbuddie will receive about \$60,000 less than anticipated from the state. They may have to reduce expenditures or employees to balance their budget.

One positive financial note is the notification that Lazbuddie will receive a \$30,000 Exemplary School Stipend. The awards is for academic performance, increased test scores, exemplary programs and performance.

The money will be earmarked for certain items approved by the state, but it will help Lazbuddie overcome the \$60,000 shortfall.

To raise more money for the school cafeteria, meal prices were increased. Breakfasts may be purchased at the school for the following prices: pre K - 2nd grade, 90 cents; grades 3-6, 95 cents; grades 7-12, \$1; adults, \$1.40. Lunch prices will be: Pre K - 2nd grade, \$1.35; grades 3-6, \$1.50; grades 7-12, \$1.65; adults, \$2.05.

The school calendar was amended so that six teacher - inservice days could be included. The state approved a waiver so that Lazbuddie teachers can get some special training. Among the topics included are: using technology in the classroom, and learning styles, how teacher personality affects changes in the students, and discipline management.

Texico no longer offers 'slim jim' service

The Texico City Council Tuesday agreed to deputy marshal Gilbert Holguin's request to stop using the city's "slim jim" (which can be used to unlock vehicles) except in emergencies.

Holguin said he has helped 6 or 7 residents open unlocked vehicles in the past two months, but that most police departments, such as Clovis, has gotten away from providing this service.

Holguin said that by the city helping, it (1) takes away business from locksmiths, (2) can cause injury to the vehicle which, in turn, can lead to lawsuits from the vehicle owner, and (3) can be a problem because the person asking the marshal to unlock a vehicle doesn't necessarily mean that the person owns the vehicle.

However, in an emergency, such as when an infant is locked in a vehicle, then Holguin would help.

In other business, the council:

- Approved 3-1 a variance request from Darrell Hampton to put a mobile home at 400 Eunice. Carolyn Burrows was

opposed, saying she opposes such variances in general. Twelve letters were sent to nearby property owners, said city clerk Marie Christian. Three were returned - 2 in favor and 1 opposed.

- Discussed the joint powers agreement with Clovis to allow Clovis building inspectors to do Texico's inspections.

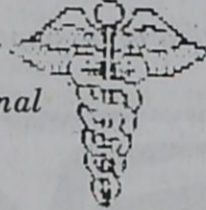

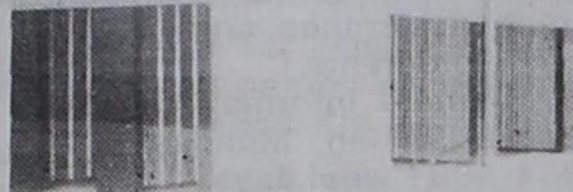

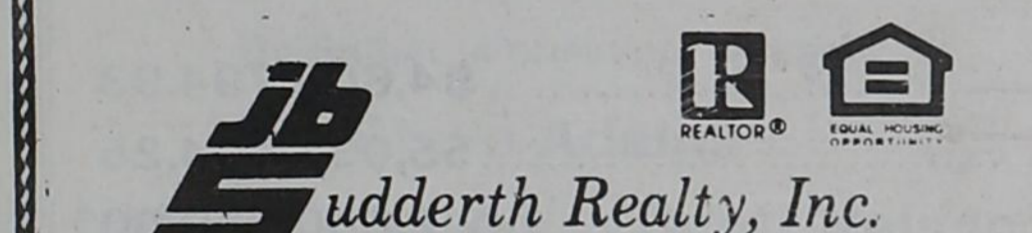
