There was a lot of anger expressed at Monday's meeting of the parties involved, and I guess since the problem goes back decades, it's understandable for emotions

to run high. I didn't put in the story elsewhere on this page the charges made, and their responses, because I feel that would simply escalate the situation. And this isn't the time for media irresponsibility.

But it is the time for government responsibility.

The Parmer County Commissioners, although they declined to accept Friona's proposal contract, have made, in my opinion, good faith proposals. Johnny Mars, the Friona area's representative on the county commissioners, has gone the extra mile to try to put together a package to meet Friona's needs.

To reiterate what I wrote last week, if I thought the Parmer County Commissioners were stonewalling, then I wouldn't blame Friona one bit for ending their rural fire protection.

But that's not the case now. And whatever may have happened 20 or 30 years ago needs to be buried. What counts is now. The folks on today's commission and council were not in those posts 30 years ago.

There's a bunch of decent, hard-working folks who live in this county. We're fortunate to have those kinds of people serve on our government

boards. When Friona's City Council meets Monday to decide whether to go ahead with their plans to end rural fire protection in their area, or to meet the county's good faith efforts with good faith efforts of their own, I hope the

Fire protection controversy

Optimism reported

There's optimism that the confrontation between the City of Friona and the Parmer County Commissioners over county payments to Friona for making rural fire calls may soon end. Friona had given Parmer County a deadline of Oct. 1 for the county commissioners to sign Friona's proposed contract, or Friona would not make rural fire calls after Oct. 1. Parmer County Commissioners unanimously rejected that contract in August.

Monday night, the Friona City Council had a scheduled meeting. Due to lack of a quorum, no official business could be conducted. However, Parmer County Judge Bonnie Clayton and County Commissioner Johnny Mars, who represents the Friona area, went to the meeting to present Parmer County's proposal (see adjoining story) and to further discuss conciliation.

Mars reportedly offered extra funds from his county commissioners' budget in addition to the pro-rated funds offered by Parmer County. This extra money might put the total in the ballpark of what was suggested by Friona Mayor Clarence Monroe as meeting Friona's minimum needs at Monday's meeting of the Parmer County Commissioners.

The city council met again Tuesday night, at a special session originally called for other purposes. But the fire protection topic was discussed again with Mars. Also present was Friona Fire Chief Jim Taylor, whose fire department is unsettled at present, with some firemen reportedly prepared to resign if Friona stops making rural fire calls after Oct. 1. Comments reportedly made at Tuesday's session were on

the conciliatory side. The council is expected to decide at its Sept. 20 meeting whether to fulfill its ultimatum to the county about stopping

rural calls.

It was a packed courtroom Monday afternoon as the Parmer County Commissioners met with officials of the five county volunteer fire departments, plus officials of the City of Friona.

After the nearly 5-hour session, the county commissioners decided on how to split up the \$50,000 they had budgeted in 1994 for fire protection (the \$50,000 is double the amount budgeted this year - funds were moved from the right of way

category for this purpose). The commissioners unanimously voted to allot \$5,000 for the Rhea-Hollene Fire Department. The remaining \$45,000 will be pro-rated to the remaining four volunteer fire departments (Friona, Farwell, Lazbuddie and Bovina) based on the percent of total rural fire calls made in 1994. The \$45,000 will be pro- rated in December 1994 based on quarterly reports made by each volunteer fire department chief. The reports will reflect the total rural fire calls made during that year.

Based on the averages for the past three years of actual fire calls, this would roughly translate into about \$19,000 for Friona, \$5,000 for Farwell, \$12,500 for Bovina and \$8,500 for Lazbuddie. It should be pointed out that the calls made in 1994 may or may not be close to the last three years. For example, the new Rhea-Hollene Fire Department likely will take some calls previously handled by Bovina or Friona.

Although Robert White, the county commissioner representing Farwell, voted for the allotment, he was concerned that Farwell was getting a smaller amount since a lot of rural calls Farwell's fire department makes are in Bailey County (Farwell covers the Bailey County portion of the Farwell School District). It was suggested that Farwell seek reimbursement from Bailey County for calls it answers in that

The \$50,000 to be spent includes funds for sending firemen to hazardous material training.

Before the commissioners' decision, they discussed set amounts for Rhea- Hollene and Lazbuddie, while giving the three city departments X number of dollars per rural call. Those proposals never came up for a vote.

During the discussion, county commissioner Johnny Mars, representing the Friona area, argued the need for Friona to get the larger share of the budgeted funds, pointing out that Friona was taking the lion's share of rural calls and covering a large area of the county.

Even though he also voted for the budget that was accepted, Mars also was concerned that Friona needed to get more reimbursement to avoid a crisis. Earlier in the meeting, county commissioner Raymond McGehee, representing the Lazbuddie area, asked Friona Mayor Clarence Monroe how much money Friona needed to work things out since the commissioners couldn't accept the contract Friona had offered. Monroe responded between \$26,000 and \$36,000, roughly.

Looking at the rough \$19,000 that Friona may get (again, based on 3-year statistics), Mars said he felt the commissioners were still \$5,000 short in getting to an agreement with Friona.

"We're doubling what we gave the fire departments previously," responded county commissioner Tom Ware, representing the Bovina area. "If Friona is unhappy, there's nothing we can do."

The crisis has come about since the City Friona presented the county commissioners with an ultimatum last month, proposing a contract that the commissioners must sign, otherwise Friona would stop making rural fire calls after Oct. 1. The commissioners unanimously rejected that contract.

That proposed contract was discussed at the beginning of the meeting. Monroe argued that half a dozen other Texas counties have similar contracts which their county commissioners have signed.

The commissioners responded they had a problem with a portion of the contract dealing with liability. The commissioners felt that it put liability on the county; Friona city manager Paula Wilson said it didn't.

(A synopsis of the proposed Friona contract is elsewhere in today's paper.)

Also at the start of the meeting, residents voiced their views:

- Ricky Rector, who lives near Friona, asked if the county was legally obligated to provide fire protection. Judge Clayton replied that the Texas code says commissioners' courts "may provide" fire protection.

Rector said that if Friona's fire service ends in the rural area, and a call isn't met, lawsuits were possible.

"This matter needs to get resolved," he told the commissioners.

Several of those games were by very close scores. For example, TCU won by a lone point, New Orleans won in overtime, and the Eagles beat the Packers by 3.


Rules for the 1993 contest are the same as in the past. A person must be at least 12 years of age to enter. Games are divided among high school, college and pro games.

Texico's water lines to cost more money

Texico Mayor Nathan Tharp had more financial bad news for the City Council Tuesday night.

He said there will be an additional expense of between \$17,000 and \$20,000 that the city must pay for the planned water lines connecting the city's water wells - at KKR Park, at Lions Park and the new well being built near the school property.

Due to the contamination problems, water lines are needed to connect these wells.

City Clerk-Treasurer Marie Christian said funds are available to pay for this added expense.

The council didn't act on this new expenditure but is expected to do so at the next

council meeting. Money problems also reared its ugly head when Tharp reported on state plans to upgrade the stretch of Amarillo highway from its intersection with the Lubbock highway to the state line. Texas is 4-laning the Amarillo highway to the state line.

New Mexico is reviewing different plays to connect with Texas' improved highway. One plan calls for 4-laning the New Mexico stretch; another for just renovating the current 2 lanes.

But there may be a stumbling block to this construction. Tharp said the state will only pay for a portion of the storm drainage to be needed if the highway is expanded. And the cost to Texico would be between \$20,000 and \$30,000.

If the city can't come up with that money, the state may go ahead with the highway construction but build a retention pond instead of storm drains.

Also on the subject of this construction, the state may close Hereford Street near the post office.

Also, amateur and non-pro classes will be held Sept. 25 for various categories.



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

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
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

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

SPECIAL ELECTION **NOVEMBER 2, 1993**

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 9 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Texas Legislature to provide for the issuance of bonds for the state financing of start-up costs for historically underutilized businesses. The amendment provides that the legislature by law may establish a Texas historically underutilized business capital growth and start-up fund. The money in the fund may be used without further appropriation and only for a program established by the legislature to aid in the start-up costs of a historically underutilized business, as defined by the legislature. To carry out the program, the legislature may issue up to \$50 million of general obligation bonds to provide funding. The legislature may require review and approval of the issuance of bonds, the use of the bond proceeds, or of the rules adopted by an agency to govern use of the bond proceeds. Bonds authorized by the amendment constitute a general obligation of the state.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the issuance of \$50 million of general obligation bonds for the recovery and further development of the state's economy and for increasing job opportunities and other benefits for Texas residents through state financing of the start-up costs of historically underutilized businesses."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 86 proposes a constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature, by general law, to exempt from ad valorem taxation all or part of real and personal property used, constructed, acquired, or installed wholly or partly to meet or exceed rules or regulations adopted by any environmental protection agency of the United States, Texas, or a political subdivision of this state for the prevention, monitoring, control, or reduction of air, water, or land pollution. The amendment applies to real and personal property used as a facility, device, or method for the control of air, water, or land pollution that would otherwise be taxable for the first time on or after January 1, 1994. The amendment does not authorize the exemption from ad valorem taxation of real or personal property that was subject to a tax abatement agreement executed before January 1,

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:


"The constitutional amendment to promote the reduction of pollution and to encourage the preservation of jobs by authorizing the exemption from ad valorem taxation of real and personal property used for the control of air, water, or land pollution.'

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 3 proposes a constitutional amendment to clear land titles in which the State of Texas relinquishes and releases any claim of sovereign ownership or title to an undivided one-third interest in and to the lands and minerals within the Shelby, Frazier, and McCormick League (now located in Fort Bend and Austin counties) arising out of the interest in that league originally granted under the Mexican Colonization Law of 1823 to John McCormick on or about July 24, 1824, and subsequently voided by the governing body of Austin's Original Colony on or about December 15, 1830. Title to such interest in the lands and minerals is confirmed to the owners of the remaining interests in such lands and minerals.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the clearing of land titles by the release of a state claim in a fractional interest, arising out of the voiding of an interest under a Mexican land grant, to the owners of certain property in Fort Bend and Austin



ON THE BALLOT Senate Joint Resolution 49 proposes a constitutional amendment that would prohibit a state personal income tax without voter approval and would dedicate the proceeds of any income tax, if enacted, to property tax relief and education. The amendment provides that a general law enacted by the legislature that imposes a tax on the net incomes of natural persons, including a person's share of partnership and unincorporated association income, must provide that the portion of the law imposing the tax not take effect until approved by a majority of the registered voters voting in a statewide referendum held on the question of imposing the tax. The referendum must specify the rate of the tax that will apply

The amendment also provides that a general law enacted by the legislature that increases the rate of the tax, or changes the tax in a manner that results in an increase in the combined income tax liability of all persons subject to the tax, may not take effect until approved by a majority of the registered voters voting in a statewide referendum held on the question of increasing the income tax. The referendum must specify the manner in which the proposed law would increase the combined tax liability of all persons subject to the tax. The legislature may repeal, or amend without increasing, a tax approved by the voters without submitting the amendment or the repeal to the voters. If the legislature repeals a tax approved by the voters, the legislature may only reenact the tax without voter approval if the effective date of the reenactment of the tax is within one year of the effective date of the repeal of the tax. The amendment also provides that, in

the first year in which an income tax is imposed, and during the first year of any increase in the tax, not less than twothirds of all net revenues from the tax shall be used to reduce the rate of ad valorem maintenance and operation taxes levied for the support of primary and secondary education. In subsequent years, not less than two-thirds of all net revenues of the tax shall be used to continue such ad valorem tax relief. The net revenues of the tax remaining after the dedication of money for reduction of ad valorem maintenance and operation taxes shall be used for support of education. The maximum rate at which a school district may impose ad valorem maintenance and operation taxes is reduced by an amount equal to one cent per \$100 valuation for each one cent per \$100 valuation that the school district's ad valorem maintenance and operation tax is reduced by the minimum amount of money dedicated under the amendment, provided that a school district may subsequently increase the maximum ad valorem maintenance and operation tax rate if the increased maximum rate is approved by a majority of the voters of the school district voting at an election called and held for that purpose. The portions of the amendment relating to dedicating tax revenues to reduce the rate of ad valorem maintenance and operation taxes apply on or after the first January 1 after the date on which an income tax takes effect, except that if the income tax begins to apply on a January 1, the amendment applies to ad valorem maintenance and operation taxes levied on or after that date.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment prohibiting a personal income tax without voter approval and, if an income tax is enacted, dedicating the revenue to education and limiting the rate of local school taxes."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 18 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the legislature to prescribe the qualifications of sheriffs. Currently, the constitution authorizes the legislature to prescribe the duties, perquisites, and fees of office, but not the qualifications for the office of sheriff.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to prescribe the qualifications of sheriffs.'

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 21 proposes a constitutional amendment that would abolish the office of county surveyor in Jackson County. The amendment also provides for the powers, duties, and functions of the county surveyor to be transferred to the county officer designated by the commissioners court.

The proposed amendment will appear

on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment abolishing the office of county surveyor in

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

Jackson County."

House Joint Resolution 57 proposes a constitutional amendment that repeals article XII, section 6, of the Texas Constitution, which currently provides that no corporation shall issue stock or bonds except for money paid, labor done, or property actually received, and that all fictitious increase of stock or indebtedness shall be void.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

> "The constitutional amendment repealing certain restrictions on the ability of corporations to raise capital."

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 22 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the commissioners court of McLennan County to call an election to abolish the office of county surveyor. The office of county surveyor will be abolished if a majority of the qualified voters of McLennan County voting on the question favor the abolition. If the office of county surveyor is abolished, the amendment requires the maps, field notes, and other records in the custody of the county surveyor to be transferred to the county clerk of McLennan County. After abolition, the amendment also grants the commissioners court of McLennan County the authority to employ or contract with a qualified person to perform any of the functions that would have been performed by the county surveyor if the office had not been abolished.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to abolish the office of county surveyor in McLennan County."

PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 19 proposes an amendment to article VIII, section 13 of the Texas Constitution that would modify the provisions for the redemption of real property sold at a tax sale. The amendment deletes current language in article VIII, section 13 that allows the legislature to provide for the sale of property without trial to pay for delinquent taxes. It also states that the deed to the new owner vests a good and perfect title subject only to redemption as set out in this amendment or impeachment for fraud. Language is added limiting application of the current two-year redemption period to former owners of residence homesteads and land designated for agricultural use sold for unpaid taxes. When property is sold as the result of a suit to enforce collection of unpaid taxes, the amendment would allow the legislature to limit redemption to property used as a residence homestead or designated for agricultural use at the time the suit was filed. The amendment creates a second type of redemption for former owners of real property when property is neither a residence homestead, nor designated for agricultural use. These owners would have a six-month period in which to redeem their property by paying the amount of money paid for the property, including the Tax Deed Recording Fee, all taxes, penalties, interest, and costs paid plus an amount not exceeding 25 percent of the aggregate total. The amendment applies to redemption of properties sold at a tax sale for which the purchaser's deed is filed on or after January 1, 1994. For redemption of properties sold at a tax sale for which the purchaser's deed was filed before January 1, 1994, the former law is applicable and remains in effect.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to modify the provisions for the redemption of real property sold at a tax

PROPOSITION NO. 10 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 34 proposes a constitutional amendment that adds a

new section 49-b-2 to article III of the Texas Constitution. This new section provides that, in addition to the general obligation bonds authorized to be issued and sold by the Veterans' Land Board (the "Board") by sections 49-b (\$950 million) and 49-b-1 (\$1.3 billion) of article III, the board may provide for, issue, and sell general obligation bonds of the state in an amount not to exceed \$750 million to provide financing to Texas veterans. \$250 million of the bonds authorized by this new section shall be used to augment the Veterans' Land Fund (the "Land Fund"). The Land Fund shall be used by the Board to purchase lands situated in Texas owned by the United States government, an agency of the United States government, the State of Texas, a political subdivision or agency of the State of Texas, or a person, firm, or corporation. The lands shall be sold to veterans in quantities, on terms, at prices, and at fixed, variable, floating, or other rates of interest determined by the Board. Lands in the Land Fund that are offered for sale to veterans and that are not sold may be sold or resold to the purchasers in quantities, terms, prices, and rates of interest determined by the Board. New section 49-b-2 creates the Vet-

erans' Housing Assistance Fund II (the "Housing Fund II"), and \$500 million of the general obligation bonds authorized by the section shall be used for the Housing Fund II. The Housing Fund II is a separate and distinct fund from the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund (the "Housing Fund") established under section 49-b-1 of article III. Money in the Housing Fund II shall be administered by the Board and shall be used to make home mortgage loans to veterans for housing within this state in quantities, on . or aggravated robbery. The term "sexual terms, and at fixed, variable, floating, or other rates of interest determined by the Board. The principal of, and interest on, the general obligation bonds authorized by this section for the benefit of the Housing Fund II shall be paid out of the money of the Housing Fund II. The principal of, and interest on, the general obligation bonds authorized by section 49-b-1 of article III for the benefit of the Housing Fund shall be paid out of money in the Housing Fund. If there is not enough money in the Land Fund, the Housing Fund, or the Housing Fund II, as the case may be, available to pay the principal of, and interest on, the general obligation bonds authorized by this section or by sections 49-b or 49-b-1 of article III, there is appropriated out of the first money coming into the treasury in each fiscal year an amount that is sufficient to pay the principal of, and interest on, the general obligation bonds that mature or

become due during that fiscal year. If the Board determines that assets from the Land Fund, the Housing Fund, or the Housing Fund II are not required for purposes of the fund, the Board may transfer the assets to another of those funds or use the assets to secure revenue bonds issued by the Board. The revenue bonds shall be special obligations of the Board and payable only from and secured by receipts of the funds, assets transferred from the funds, and other revenues as determined by the Board and shall not constitute indebtedness of the State of Texas or the Board. The Board may issue revenue bonds from time to time, which bonds may not exceed an aggregate principal amount that the Board determines can be fully retired from the receipts of the funds. The revenue bonds shall be sold in forms, denominations, and in installments, and bear a rate or rates

of interest as the Board determines. The general obligation bonds authorized to be issued by the Board by this section or be sections 49-b and 49-b-1 of article III shall be issued and sold in forms and denominations, on terms, at times, in the manner, at places, in installments, and shall bear a rate or rates of interest the Board determines. The bonds shall be incontestable after execution by the Board, approval by the Attorney General of Texas, and delivery to

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing issuance of \$750 million in general obligation bonds to augment the Veterans' Land Fund and the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund and to fund the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund II."

PROPOSITION NO. 11 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 31 proposes a constitutional amendment relating to the duties of trustees of local retirement systems which provide retirement and related disability and death benefits for public officers and employees and that do not belong to a statewide retirement system. The amendment provides that the

board of trustees of such a system shall (1) administer the system of benefits; (2) hold the assets of the system for the exclusive purposes of providing benefits to participants and their beneficiaries and defraying reasonable expenses of administering the system; and (3) select legal counsel and an actuary and adopt sound actuarial assumptions to be used by the

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing that the trustees of a local public pension system must administer the system for the benefit of the system's participants and beneficiaries."

PROPOSITION NO. 12 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 23 proposes a constitutional amendment providing that any person accused of a violent or sexual offense committed while under the supervision of a criminal justice agency of this state or a political subdivision of this state for a prior felony may, after a hearing and evidence substantially showing the guilt of the accused, be denied bail pending trial. If the accused is not, however, accorded a trial within 60 days from the time of his incarceration upon the accusation or indictment, the order denying bail shall be set aside unless a continuance is obtained upon the request of the accused. In the amendment, the term "violent offense" means murder, aggravated assault (if a deadly weapon was used or exhibited during the commission of the assault), aggravated kidnapping, offense" means aggravated sexual assault, sexual assault, or indecency with a

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment permitting the denial of bail to certain persons charged with certain violent or sexual offenses committed while under the supervision of a criminal justice agency of the state or a political subdivision of the state.'

PROPOSITION NO. 13 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 13 proposes a

constitutional amendment that amends

article VII, section 17(a), of the Texas Constitution to provide that, of the \$100 million currently appropriated by that section for the use of public institutions of higher education during each fiscal year, those institutions may also utilize this money to pay for acquiring, constructing, or equipping or for major repair or rehabilitation of buildings, facilities, other permanent improvements, or capital equipment used jointly for educational and general activities and for auxiliary enterprises to the extent of their use for educational and general activities. For the five-year period beginning on September 1, 2000, and for each five-year period thereafter, the legislature, during a regular session that is nearest, but preceding, a five-year period may, by a twothirds vote of the membership of each house, increase the amount of the \$100 million constitutional appropriation for the five-year period. The amendment also reflects name changes that have been made to some of the institutions of higher education for which such funding is available. The amendment adds the Texas State Technical College System to those institutions eligible to receive such funding, but limits its allocation of the annual appropriation to 2.2 percent of the total appropriation each fiscal year. The amendment also provides that each governing board authorized to participate in the distribution of money under article III, section 17, may also issue bonds and notes for the purposes of refunding bonds or notes issued under that section or prior law for the purposes of acquiring capital equipment, library books and library materials, paying for acquiring, constructing, or equipping or for major repair or rehabilitation of buildings, facilities, other permanent improvements, or capital equipment used jointly for educational and general activities and for auxiliary enterprises to the extent of their use for educational and general activities. The amendment deletes language in article III, section 17, which authorizes the legislature to designate a single agency to issue such bonds or notes in lieu of the governing bodies, and to transfer to that agency the authority to collect and pledge money to the payment of such bonds and notes as directed by the governing body of each eligible institution. Funds appropriated under article III, section 17, may not be used for the purpose of constructing, equipping, repairing, or rehabilitat-

ing buildings or other permanent im-

provements that are to be used only for student housing, intercollegiate athletics, or auxiliary enterprises.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

PROPOSITION NO. 14 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 45 proposes a constitutional amendment that adds a new subsection (e) to article III, section 49-h, of the Texas Constitution. The new subsection provides that, in addition to the amounts authorized by subsections (a) (\$500 million), (c) (\$400 million), and (d) (\$1.1 billion) of section 49-h, the legislature may authorize the issuance of up to \$1 billion in general obligation bonds and may use the proceeds of the bonds for acquiring, constructing, or equipping new corrections institutions, including youth corrections institutions, and mental health and mental retardation institutions and for major repair or renovation of existing facilities of those corrections and mental health and mental retardation facilities. The amendment also provides that the provisions of subsection (a) of section 49-h, relating to the review and approval of bonds, and the provisions of subsection (b) of section 49-h, relating to the status of the bonds as a general obligation of the state and to the manner in which the principal and interest on the bonds are paid, apply to bonds authorized by this amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of up to \$1 billion in general obligation bonds payable from the general revenues of the state for projects relating to facilities of corrections and mental health and mental retardation institutions."

PROPOSITION NO. 15 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 37 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the county commissioners court of a county to call an election to abolish the office of county surveyor. The office of county surveyor is abolished if a majority of voters of the county voting in the election approve the measure. If the office of county surveyor is abolished, the maps, field notes, and other records of the county surveyor are transferred to the county officer or employee designated by the commissioners court.

The proposed amendment will appear

on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to permit the voters of a county to decide, at an election called by the commissioners court, whether to abolish the office of county surveyor in the

PROPOSITION NO. 16 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 44 proposes an amendment to article III, section 49-i(b) of the Texas Constitution, which currently limits the principal amount of bonds outstanding at one time for the Texas agricultural fund to \$25 million and for the rural microenterprise development fund to \$5 million. The amendment would raise the principal amount limit for the Texas agricultural fund to \$100 million. The amendment would also make the principal amount limit for each fund apply to the total principal amounts of both bonds and notes issued or sold rather than just the principal amounts of bonds outstanding at one time.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing up to a total of \$100 million in bonds and notes to be issued or sold to finance the Texas agricultural fund for providing financial assistance to develop, increase, improve, or expand the production, processing, marketing, or export of crops or products grown or produced primarily in this state by agricultural businesses domiciled in the state."





Farwell is now 0-2 on the season. The Steers play Turpin, Okla., at Dumas at 8 p.m. tonight (Friday).


Farwell received Olton's kickoff and was held after a quarterback sack. Olton took over at the Steer 28 and scored

Rural fire protection-

- Virginia Jennings, who lives in Friona, but operates the Friona airport outside the city limits, noted the need to keep fire protection in the rural areas.

- Monroe said in other counties, fire departments got paid on a straight percentage for each call (as opposed to the set amounts the Parmer County Commissioners had budgeted to each department previously to this year).

Monroe also pointed out that 47 percent of the county's tax values are within the Friona School district and that the Friona area wasn't getting back from the county what the Friona area was sending to the county.

The discussions grew heated several times during the

The county commissioners noted that they felt they had to put a "cap" on how much money could be given the fire departments, i.e., a budgeted total. But Friona officials argued back that they weren't being reimbursed fairly for the amount of calls their department makes.

Judge Clayton asked Wilson what Friona's fire department budget would be if no rural calls were made. She replied that it probably wouldn't go down much due to fixed costs.

"You have the money but don't want to give it to us," Wilson told the commissioners. Ware replied that the commissioners have doubled the amount to be given the five fire departments, from \$25,000 to \$50,000. Wilson later said Friona wouldn't have gotten to the point of issuing an ultimatum if the county had sat down and worked with them.

The point of Parmer County fire departments servicing areas outside the county was discussed. As stated above, it was suggested that reimbursement be sought from neighboring counties. But one fire official noted that Bailey County answered calls for many years in the Lazbuddie area without seeking reimbursement (before the Lazbuddie fire department was organized in the 1980s).

Rural fire calls categorized

Here's two views of the fire calls that have been made in 1990, 1991 and 1992 (although some departments may be using different "calendar years"):

1) The following statistics show the percentage of calls each fire department made to rural addresses. Obviously, all of Lazbuddie's and Rhea-Hollene's calls are "in the county" since they are not cities:

1990 - Bovina, 66 percent of the Bovina Fire Department's calls were made outside its city limits; Farwell, 35 percent;

Friona, 67 percent; Lazbuddie, 100 percent. 1991 - Bovina, 64 percent of the Bovina Fire Department's calls were made outside its city limits; Farwell, 30 percent;

Friona, 68 percent; Lazbuddie, 100 percent. 1992 - Bovina, 73 percent of the Bovina Fire Department's calls were made outside its city limits; Farwell, 50 percent; Friona, 71 percent; Lazbuddie, 100 percent; Rhea-Hollene (in

its first year of operation), 100 percent. 2) The following statistics show the percentage of calls made into the county by each fire department. Each year's totals should add up to about 100 percent:

1990- Of the 98 county calls (outside city limits) made this year, the Bovina Fire Department made 21 percent of them; Farwell, 15 percent; Friona, 43 percent; Lazbuddie, 20

1991 - Of the 97 county calls (outside city limits) made this year, the Bovina Fire Department made 30 percent of them; Farwell, 12 percent; Friona, 41 percent; Lazbuddie, 16

1992 - Of the 139 county calls (outside city limits) made this year, the Bovina Fire Department made 32 percent of them; Farwell, 6 percent; Friona, 37 percent; Lazbuddie, 19 percent; Rhea-Hollene, 5 percent.

Fire department officials also commented during the meeting. Rhea-Hollene's Glenn Schueler said his department would go where needed if Friona stopped its calls. The Friona fire chief supported the other Friona city officials.

Here's Friona's proposal

Here's a synopsis of the proposed Friona contract:

* Friona agrees to furnish fire fighting equipment and personnel outside . the city limits upon the following

* Parmer County agrees that the acts of any persons while fighting fires outside Friona's city limits shall be considered as the acts of agents of Parmer County in all respects, although such persons may be regular Friona city employees

or firemen. ' Parmer County agrees to indemnify and hold harmless Friona for any damages, or injuries to employees, agents, workmen or firemen of Friona, or to any person's property as a result of performing fire calls outside the city limits. If anyone files suit for damages to his person or property, the

county will defend all such claims. * If Friona's fire insurance rates are raised or jeopardized as a result of answering fire calls outside Friona, then Friona can terminate this contract in 60 days.

* There should be no liability on Friona's part if all its fire fighting equipment is in use under such circumstances as to preclude answering a fire call outside the city limits.

* The county would pay Friona a quarterly fee, to be computed this way: the cost of furnishing fire protection services for rural and non-rural fire calls during the last preceding calendar quarter shall be computed, less 20 percent, and the total number of fire calls inside the city and outside the city shall be computed. The cost of furnishing such rural fire protection shall then be determined by computing the ratio of rural fire calls to the total number of calls for the quarter excluding all accidents, rescues and



Texico to hire teacher's aide

The Texico School Board Tuesday discussed changes in the state law affecting school board meetings.

New laws require that items covered at a public meeting be placed on the agenda at least 24 hours ahead of time. Residents or parents who wish to bring an item to the school board's attention will need to have it placed on the agenda, or it cannot be considered.

Kindergarten teacher Lupe Olivas' contract was extended to full time due to the number of kindergarten students enrolled this year. The board also voted to hire a teacher's aide for the kindergarten.

Elementary School Principal Diane Cooper has secured a state grant to implement a new "Write to Read" program which will teach children in kindergarten and first grade to read using new IBM computers. The board heard about the way that the program will work.

The board also:

- Set up a payroll clearing account to allow the school to pay part of a teacher's salary from federal funds and part from state or local funds. Several teachers receive part of their pay from different accounts. It would be simpler for them to receive one pay check from the school system.

Reviewed the instructional schedules and enrollment in each class. Currently Texico schools have 233 students enrolled in elementary school; 138 enrolled in junior high, and 163 enrolled in high school.

- Reviewed student accomplishments: Kip Taylor and Cody Drager each caught calves at the New Mexico State Fair Calf Scramble. The board members were told that some Texico students also did well with their animal exhibits at the New Mexico State Fair.



Parmer County wants to be 2nd

Gary Pitner, executive director of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission, met with the Parmer County Commissioners Monday to discuss the upcoming addressing for Parmer County rural addresses in order to improve its enhanced 911 emergency service

Parmer County will be using letters and number for its rural roads. East-west roads will get letters. North-south roads will be numbered. The idea is to make it easier, and quicker, for fire departments and ambulances to find rural homes when

This fall, the PRPC will be putting in its first enhanced 911 system in Roberts County.

Parmer County officials asked Pitner to make Parmer County its next project, meaning the system would be put in here this winter.

Pitner noted that installing the enchanced 911 system takes time. For example, the post office, highway department and appraisal district would have to understand the numbering changes made.

Pitner also was asked about why the 911 dispatching center for Parmer County was installed in Friona (where it's run by the Friona police department), instead of the sheriff's office in Farwell.

He responded that when the decision was made, a survey showed that Friona was the most logical center since the largest number of calls received were from the Friona area. It also was stated that a problem with phone lines precluded using a Farwell station.

Another PRPC representative who attended with Pitner said the 911 dispatching center could be moved to Farwell, but state approval was necessary.

Problems with folks using cellular phones to call 911 were

Someone used a cellular phone to call in an accident in Parmer County, and got the dispatcher in Levelland because that was where the base was for that cellular phone!

Also, some folks mistakenly call 911 when they want the sheriff's office. And some Lazbuddie calls go to the Muleshoe 911 dispatcher.

County Judge Bonnie Clayton said she has received concerns about the enhanced 911 system, that too much private information about folks would be put on the computer
