BTD planning gets under way

The Border Town Days Committee held its opening meeting of the year Monday night. Planning for the 28th annual BTD is now under way.

As always, BTD will be held the last Saturday in July. That means the Day in the Park and Parade are set for Saturday, July 30.

This year's theme will be "Once Upon a Time - Children's Stories."

Officers were elected: Mike Pomper, president; Maurine Caywood, vice president, and Ann Cooper, secretary-treasurer.

Committee assignments were made:

- * Arts and crafts - Lynne Mahaney.
- * Concessions - Cynthia Thigpen.
- * Bicycle contest - Linda Moss and Rhonda Qualls.
- * Queen's contest - Susan Scioli.
- * Buttons - Rick Sullivan.
- * Parade - Leigh Ann Woods.

Fees for the arts and crafts concessions at the park will stay the same as last year. The fee for park concessions also remains the same.

Pomper expressed appreciation to Shandra McIntosh, who headed the queen's contest the past two years, for the excellent work that she and her committee did. Mrs. McIntosh will be out of town during BTD this year and Mrs. Scioli, who helped her with last year's contest, will take over.

A new committee head for the merchants' giveaway will be needed because Tom Shumate, who ran the giveaway the past two years, will be moving from this area soon. His replacement at the Farwell Convalescent Center will be asked to handle this job, said Pomper. Willie Dannheim also helps with the giveaway.

Once again, the committee will sell BTD buttons as a giveaway. Each of the 500 BTD buttons will have a number on the back. A number will be drawn from a hat at BTD and the winner, if present, gets \$50. Last year, the buttons provided a profit of \$434.26.

Scholarship money for the queen's contest stays the same - \$300 to the winner.

Mrs. Cooper gave a detailed financial report, which was accepted. The report is open to the public. Persons interested in seeing it should contact Pomper at the State Line Tribune.

Last year's expenses totalled \$3,077.12. Income totalled \$3,497.04. Deducting the beginning bank balance of \$343.99, this means the net profit for last year's BTD was \$75.93. Pomper expressed satisfaction with the small profit. He noted that it's the committee's goal not to end up in the "red," but to be as close to zero as possible.

Pomper also discussed the possibility of buying a sound system this year. He will meet later this month with Kevin Hardage to discuss the feasibility. The committee discussed ways to save money and raise funds in order to achieve this.

The next BTD meeting will be May 2 at 7:30 p.m. at the Spur Restaurant.

Election Day is Tuesday

Tuesday is Run-Off Election Day in Texas.

There are three races: U.S. Senate - Richard Fisher and Jim Mattox; Justice of the Supreme Court, Place 1 - Raul Gonzales and Rene Haas; and Judge, Criminal Court of Appeals, Place 2 - Gene Kelly and Betty Marshall.

Republican

Residents living in county commissioner Pcts. 1 and 2 are asked to vote at the Calvary Baptist Church in Friona. Folks living in county commissioner Pcts. 3 and 4 are asked to vote at Farwell City Hall.

There are two races: Attorney General - Patricia Lykos and Don Wittig; and Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 2 - Sam Bayless and Sharon Keller.

3 sign up for council

Three Farwell folks have signed up so far as write-in candidates for the Farwell City Council's three open seats.

The deadline for filing as a write-in candidate was 5 p.m. on April 7.

Signing up so far are Jesse Cantu, Ysleta Kittrell and Jimmie Mace. If there are no other candidates, then each one will be elected if they each get at least one vote in the May election.

Incumbents Martin Kube, James Chadwick and Royce Bethel had declined to seek re-election and no one signed up at the end of the regular candidate deadline, thus necessitating the need for write-in candidates.

Other councilmen are Jerry Stover and John Carlson.

Ortiz, Harrison win scholarships

Brent Harrison and Jeremy Ortiz of Farwell were among the scholarship recipients at ENMR Telephone cooperative's annual meeting Saturday at Clovis High School.

During the business meeting, members heard an update about the company's status.

"We are moving from a phone company to a rural technology system," said general manager Robert Harris. He talked about the traditional telephone service and about providing educational television to schools.

Harris told the membership that more and more utility services are being offered to rural customers through their cooperatives. Some day the rural technology systems may offer services such as water, sewage, and garbage collection.

Harris also presented the cooperative's financial report which he characterized as "another good year."

Frank Dottle warned members about some problems concerned with long distance carriers. He cited three examples of customers who had been charged very high

telephone rates. "We've had people with \$600 phone bills without knowing it, and another with a \$900 bill."

Some long distance carriers offer programs which seem too good to be true. "If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is," Dottle warned.

Under equal access, each customer needs to analyze his calling patterns, and order the carrier services which best serves the person's needs.

"One carrier has 152 plans. Each time a carrier changes, we need to change our computer program. We have become a collection agent for the carriers," Dottle explained.

The membership then voted to amend the by-laws. In the future they will not to accept any more nominations to the board from the floor.

Walt Eastland was elected by ballot as a director of ENMR while Larry Wallin, Frank Blackburn, Kenny White and Dee Perschbacher were elected by acclamation.

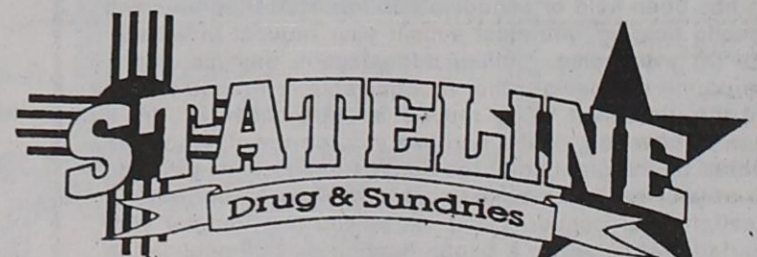

The Parmer County Commissioners on March 28 approved a safety program for county workers.

This was the first time the program was offered Parmer County. By implementing it, the county will save \$2,700 a year from its worker's comp bill.

The commissioners also signed an order to put together an Emergency Management Plan, a written plan of action in case of a disaster. Richard Bonham is the county's emergency coordinator and will draft the plan.

I've watched several games during the season, and I do enjoy excellent players like Hakeem, the Admiral, Shawn, Patrick, Scotty, the Mailman and 'Nique, but it just isn't the

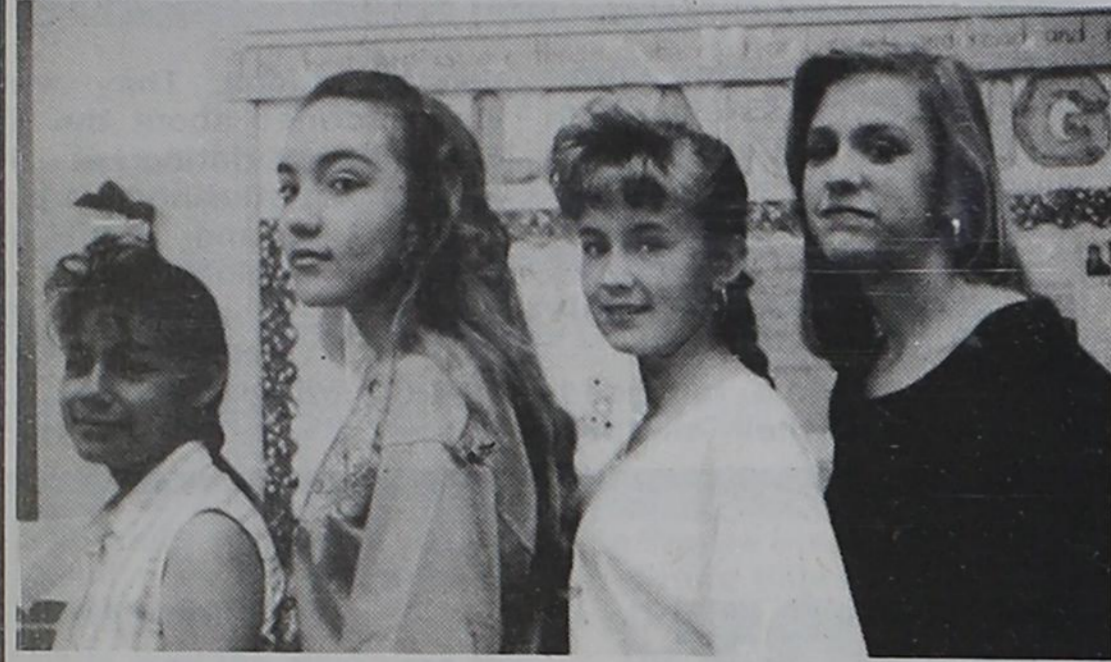

Parmer County ground water levels decline

Parmer County ground water levels declined an average of 2.66 feet in 1993 in 97 privately-owned wells in the observation well network maintained by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 in its 546,400 acre service area within the county.

This represents a decrease of 218,013 acre-feet of water

in storage in the Ogallala Aquifer last year in the portion of Parmer County within the Water District service area.

"Below-average precipitation during 1993 across most of the Water District service area caused irrigators to apply heavier and more frequent irrigations than usual to replenish soil moisture for the 1993 growing season. This significantly contributed to the decline in ground water levels," said Don McReynolds, High Plains Water District Technical Division Director.

Ground water levels within the Water District's Parmer County service area decreased 1.39 feet during the 10 year period from 1984 to 1994. An average annual decrease of 1.98 feet was recorded during the five-year period from 1989 to 1994.

Ground water levels in the Ogallala Aquifer within the 6.7 million acre Water District service area had an average decline for 1.46 feet from January 1993 to January 1994. This is a net decrease of about 1,467,300 acre-feet of ground water in storage in the Ogallala Aquifer within the Water District service area.

A zero average annual change in ground water levels was recorded for the first time in the Water District's history in 1985. Depth-to-water measurements revealed an average ground water level rise of 0.50 of a foot in 1986; an average rise of 0.90 of a foot in 1987; an average decline of 0.51 of

a foot in 1988; an average decline of one foot in 1989; an average decline of 1.06 feet in 1990; an average decline of 0.73 of a foot in 1991; and an average rise of 0.14 of a foot in 1992.


A network of 1,174 privately-owned observation water wells is used to determine the annual change in the quantity of water in storage in the Ogallala Aquifer within the High Plains Water District. The depth-to-water measurements are taken in January and February of each year in order to allow water levels to stabilize from the pumping during the previous growing season.

By comparing the current depth-to-water measurements with those taken the previous year, McReynolds says Technical Division staff members can determine what changes have occurred in the ground water levels.

Of the 15 counties or portions of counties making up the High Plains Water District, only Cochran County recorded an average rise in depth-to-water levels in 1993. The counties with average declines in depth-to-water levels in 1993 were Armstrong, Bailey, Castro, Crosby, Deaf Smith, Floyd, Hale, Hockley, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Parmer, Potter and Randall.
