

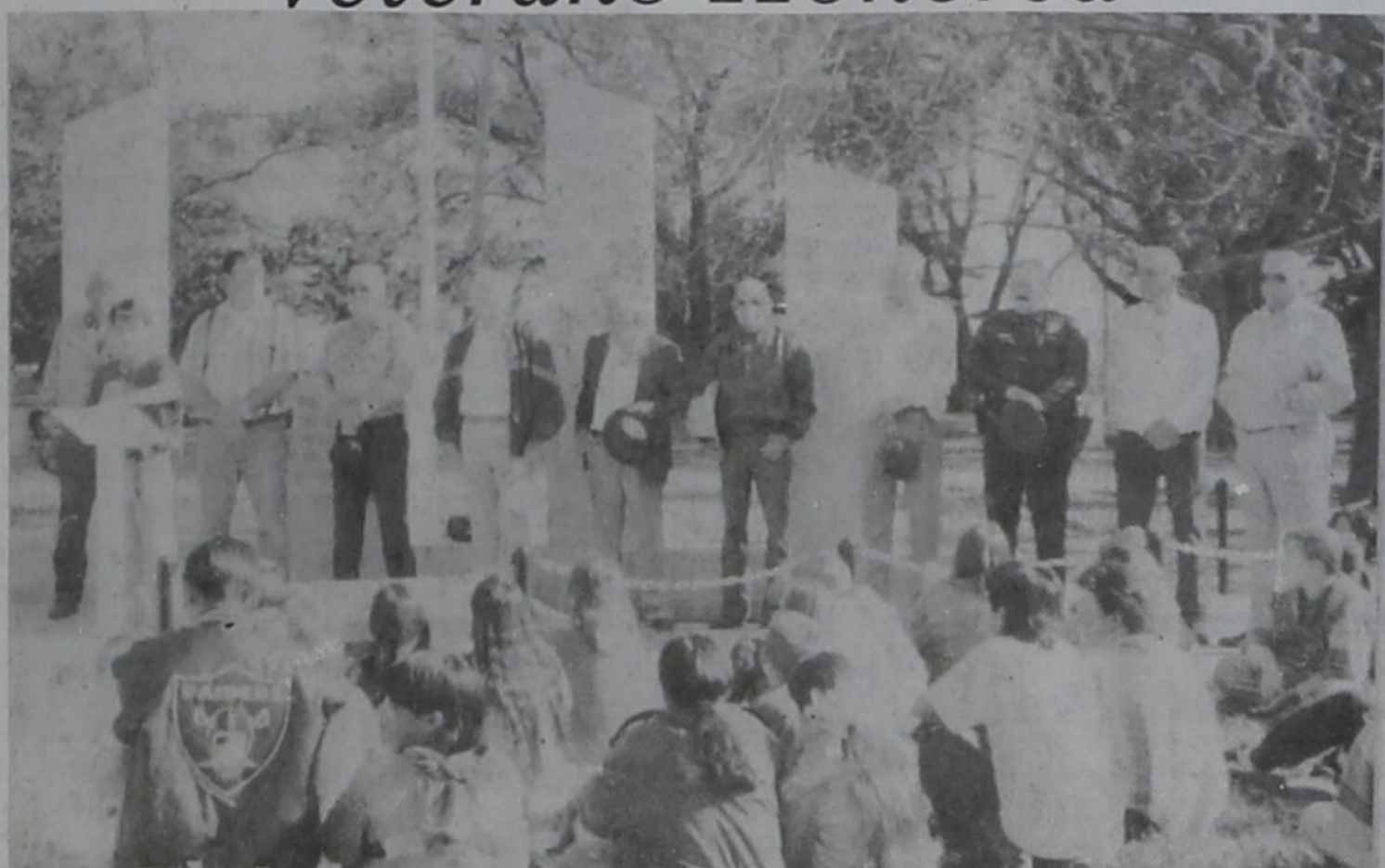

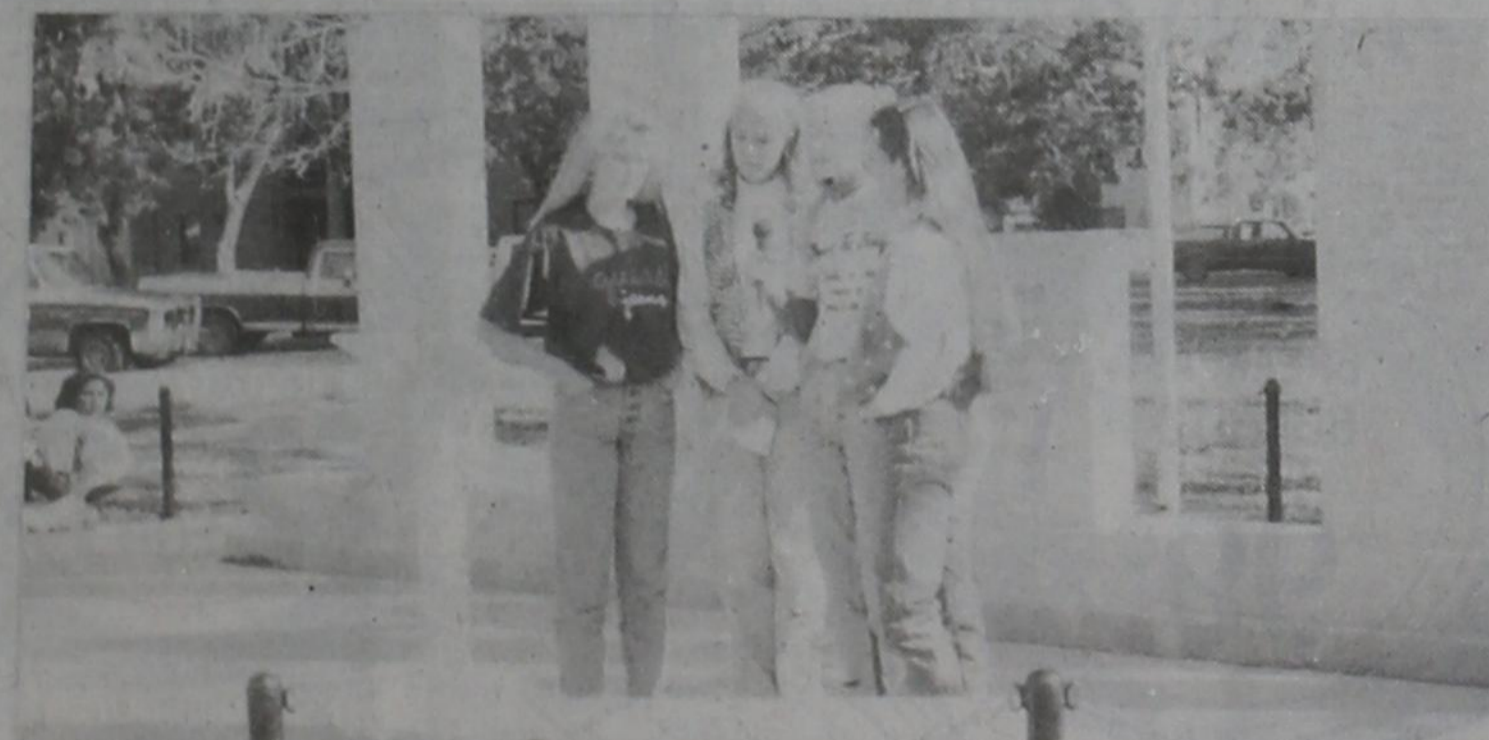

Congestion problem addressed

A possible solution to the vehicle congestion in the 100 block of Fifth Street was accepted by the Farwell City Council Tuesday.

The congestion has been due to motorists using the lottery booth at Hughes True Value.

Store owner Gwen Hughes proposed that 15 feet be knocked off the curb so a second line of traffic could go onto her property. This would double the number of motorists in line for the lottery booth. The council okayed this.

Mrs. Hughes was asked about how the upcoming New Mexico state lottery would affect the traffic flow here. She replied that Texas officials told her that the affect would be minimal, basing their prediction on what occurred after Louisiana put in a lottery.

A problem with parking by A Touch of Country vehicles in the alley alongside that business was brought up. Police Chief Roy McGaa was asked to talk with Mary Gustin, owner of A Touch of Country, about this.

In other business, the council:

- Approved the annual audit presentation. The city's in good shape.
- Denied a mobile home variance for Sue Haney at the corner of Avenue F and 4th Street after objections were received.
- Renewed its membership in the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission.
- Okayed building permits for Gaye Roberts, 406 Ave. I, and Ramon Quesada, 300 9th. Both are putting in storage sheds.
- Discussed the proposed heli-port near the Farwell Medical Clinic for hospital helicopters. The grant fund Farwell was checking into has run dry so they will check on other possible grants. Councilman Martin Kube said it's possible that a chopper could be stationed in this area.

Farwell

- Okayed the annual \$2,000 funding for the DARE anti-drug program in the schools. This is the last year for the state grant, of \$6,600 to Parmer County. Councilman Jerry Stover said Farwell needs to help keep the program going even after state funds are shut off to Parmer County.

- Will seek bids for repairing the mural on the side of City Hall. The last repairs cost \$2,000.

- Discussed the second hand stores along Avenue A, near Third Street. Councilwoman Ysleta Kittrell complained of the trashy appearance when goods are put out on the sidewalk. Stover also was concerned. The council will ask attorney Charles Aycock to check into this.

- Noted they are still waiting to hear from Aycock on the proposed city curfew ordinance for youths. The council wants the legality checked before it goes into effect. Councilman Jimmie Mace said problems are increasing with Farwell, Texico and Clovis youths here.

- Re-set the December meeting for the 13th.

- Received the October report from McGaa. It included 15 warnings, 7 citations and 0 arrests. Calls included 3 accidents, 1 vehicle burglary, 2 domestic, 1 theft, 1 vandalism, 1 assault and 7 traffic violations.

McGaa added two comments:

"Two individuals, identified as gang members, have been visiting regularly in Farwell."

They will be kept under surveillance and a record is being maintained of their contacts in Farwell.

"Gang graffiti (spray paint) is present in and on the old Sharp Pipe Plant on Highway

60. Note: an upper structure on the roof has fallen halfway through the roof and is a danger to anyone playing inside the building. The property is owned by Johnny Autrey, of Ruidoso Downs, N.M."

105th birthday!

Mary Lee Lawson Ellison celebrated her 105th birthday on Nov. 15. She is a resident of the Farwell Convalescent Center and most assuredly, keeps the staff on their toes!

Mary celebrated with her daughter Mary Melugin of Clovis and one of her grand-daughters, Mary Lee Mitzelfelt of Farwell.

Mary was born on Nov. 15, 1889 in Wise County, Texas, near Agnes, Texas. At the age of 11, her family moved to Seymour, Texas.

Mary describes herself as an old woman who lived back in the lambsquarter and baregrass days. She said that they didn't have things in the stores to eat and make pies, so they had to use what they had. They made vinegar, buttermilk and sorghum pies and butter rolls. There were wild plums on the river and creek bottoms. They would take picnic trips to these places to go plum hunting.

They made soap and shampoo out of the baregrass. In fact, she still wishes that she had a few bars of baregrass soap. They used back draught, salts and calomel for medication. Babies were born at home with the doctor coming out to deliver them for \$10 each. Every person helped out one another with their work.

Her family would eat mush and sweet milk for supper and they'd fry the mush up for breakfast. They had wild mustard greens, poke salad and lambsquarter. For a real treat they had wild berries, black haws and possum grapes.

It was a hard way to live. Mary is glad that people don't live like they did in the old days.

On Jan. 6, 1907 she married Trigg Lawson. In Dec. 1909 they moved to Mobeetie. They farmed there until 1912. They then homesteaded to Clovis. New Mexico was still a territory and it took them four days to travel in their covered wagon with all their belongings.

Their first home in Clovis was a dugout on 160 acres that her husband had purchased for \$100. One hundred dollars was a huge amount of money for someone to possess. Not many people in the territory had this kind of money. Mary said that she and Trigg could have bought more land "bargains" but they just didn't have the \$100. "Everyone was just like us ... poor," she said.

Their family sold their farm and moved to a two story house on Wallace Street in Clovis. Trigg worked for Barry Hardware.

They moved to Aubrey, Texas in 1920. "I didn't like the move, I liked it in Clovis," Mary said. "Aubrey had sand so thick on Main Street that the cars would get stuck."

They lived through the Depression in the 30's by milking cows, raising chickens and farming. They eventually came back to New Mexico in 1948.

Trigg died in 1954. Mary has outlived two other husbands: Luther Lee and Capp Ellison. She had three children, two sons (deceased) and a daughter. She has nine grandchildren, 19 great-grandchildren and seven great-great grandchildren.

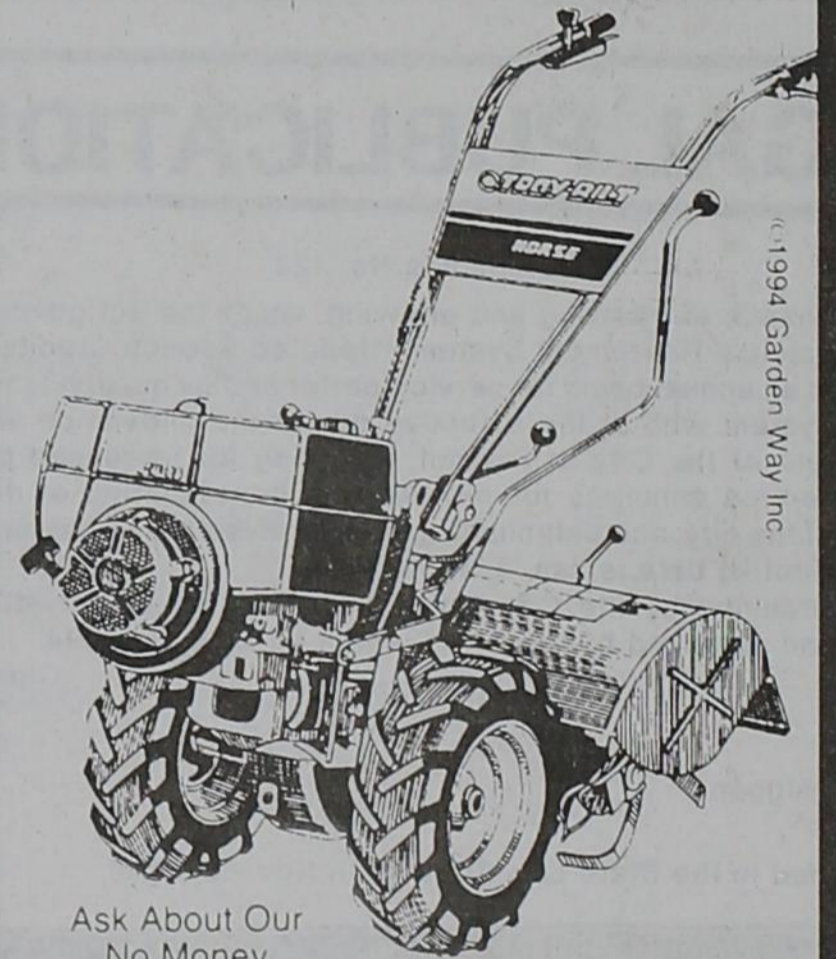

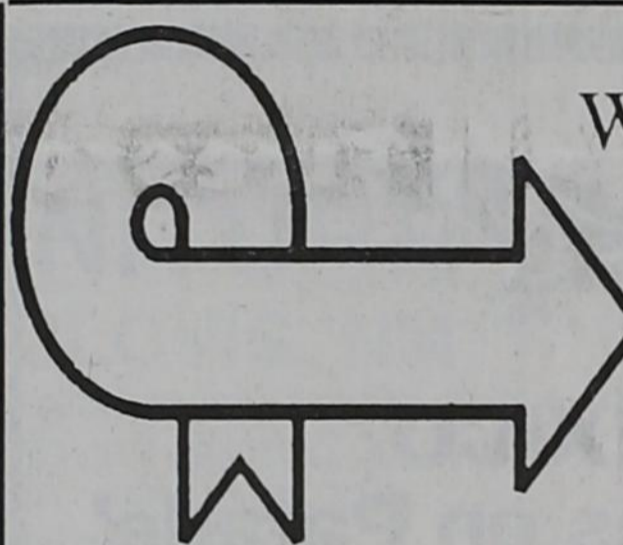

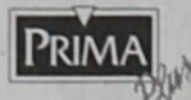

Election postscripts

Some election postscripts from a columnist who had to eat crow this year:

I don't consider the vote as anti-incumbent, because a lot of incumbents won, and won handily.

I don't view it as how folks viewed Clinton, because I think it was deeper than that.

What I see is a more conservative electorate letting the folks in Washington know that.

Then how come Clinton, a leading liberal, was elected merely two years back?

For two reasons, I believe. One is that we're in the midst of a conservative trend, which is stronger today than it was two years back. And, also, this year's vote shows that if Ross Perot hadn't

run, George Bush would have creamed Clinton in 1992. And that's even with Bush's yukky campaign tactics.

Clinton may talk all he wants about how the American people elected him in 1992, but the fact is that Perot split the majority vote with Bush, causing the weak sister to sneak in.

It will be interesting to see how successful the Republicans are, now that they control both houses of Congress for the first time since the early 1950s.

I'm always optimistic, of course, that some reforms can be achieved. But knowing that Clinton wields veto power, and that recent actions in the Senate show that filibustering is the order of the day - with a minimum 60 votes needed to over-ride certain points of order - I just don't know.

On the local scene, the major contest involved Sandra Warren defeating veteran incumbent Marjorie Watkins for the post of Parmer County District Clerk.

Mrs. Warren was the first Republican elected in a county race since the 1970s.

When Mrs. Warren first told me last spring that she planned to run as a Republican, I told her the outlook was negative for her trying to

win. I recalled campaigns by other Republicans, John Getz and Randy Gerles, in the past few years that ended in their losses.

But I was wrong here, too. Parmer County voters split their tickets to a degree some may never have thought possible. Republican at the top state level, Democrat at the lower state level, and a mix of both the rest of the way down the ballot.

And Mrs. Warren worked very hard for a long time, including a lot of door to door work throughout the county. It showed in the final tally.

Now the only question is what happens when Mrs. Warren and her mother-in-law, Parmer County Clerk Bonnie Warren - a Democrat, talk politics? (Just joking, ladies...)

So who emerges as the GOP front-runner to capture the presidential nomination in 1996 and take on Clinton?

Sen. Gramm? Sen. Dole? Newt Gingrich? Jack Kemp? I still say that former VP Dan Quayle is leading the pack.

For example, he has the full support of the potato lobby...
