## Commissioners deny Friona request

The Parmer County Commissioners Monday unanimously rejected a request by the Friona City Council to look at an alternative solution dealing with how county funds are to be divvied up for rural fire protection.

First, some background:  
On Sept. 13, the county commissioners voted to split up its \$50,000 budget this way - Rhea-Hollene Fire Department would get a flat \$5,000. The remaining \$45,000 would be pro-rated to the other four departments - Friona, Farwell, Bovina and Lazbuddie, based on the percent of total rural calls made in 1994.

Also, Johnny Mars, the Friona area's representative, pledged some funds from his county account toward Friona's fire department.

At its Sept. 27 meeting, the county commissioners received a request from Friona asking that the county's payments to the fire departments begin sooner than December 1994.

So the county commissioners voted Sept. 27 to give each fire department a \$5,000 advance in January 1994.

These fund allocations came about after Friona gave the county commissioners a deadline of Oct. 1 for the county to sign Friona's proposed contract dealing with fire protection, or Friona would not make rural calls after that date. The county commissioners rejected that contract in August.

Now to the present:  
Monday, the county commissioners received the following letter signed by Friona Mayor Clarence Monroe:

"The City of Friona is in receipt of your letter, dated Sept. 28, concerning rural fire protection and in particular, the disbursement of the allotted funds.

"This new disbursement schedule seems to be completely different from the original proposal that the City Council agreed to. According to the original proposal, each department, with the exception of Rhea-Hollene, would receive a pro-rata share of \$45,000. Under the newest plan, each department would receive a pro-rata share of only \$25,000. The \$5,000 advancement seems to be the problem.

"It could be possible for a department not to be entitled to even the \$5,000 advancement which, under the new plan, they would keep no matter that their pro-rata share would be. For example, in 1992, Farwell fought 6 percent of the county fires, therefore their pro-rata share of \$45,000 would be \$2,700. In order for a department to reach the \$5,000 amount, it would have to fight at least 11 percent of the fires.

"The City Council would like for the Commissioners to look at an alternative solution which would be more in keeping with the original agreement. The City Council will meet in regular session at 7:30 p.m. on Oct. 11, 1993. Please let us know of your decision so it can be discussed at our meeting."

Apparently, there's a question on how to view the \$5,000 advancements. In the Friona letter, it notes that if 1992 statistics are used, Farwell would only be entitled to \$2,700. County Judge Bonnie Clayton noted that if statistics for the past three years are used, Farwell would be entitled to just about \$5,000.

And Judge Clayton noted that since the \$45,000 will be divided according to 1994 fire calls, there's no way of telling what the statistics will be for next year.

Also in question is Friona's statement that "under the newest plan, each department would receive a pro rata share of only \$25,000." It can also be viewed that each department would receive a pro rata share of \$45,000 - but with a \$5,000 "floor" for each of the four fire departments - Farwell, Bovina, Lazbuddie and Friona.

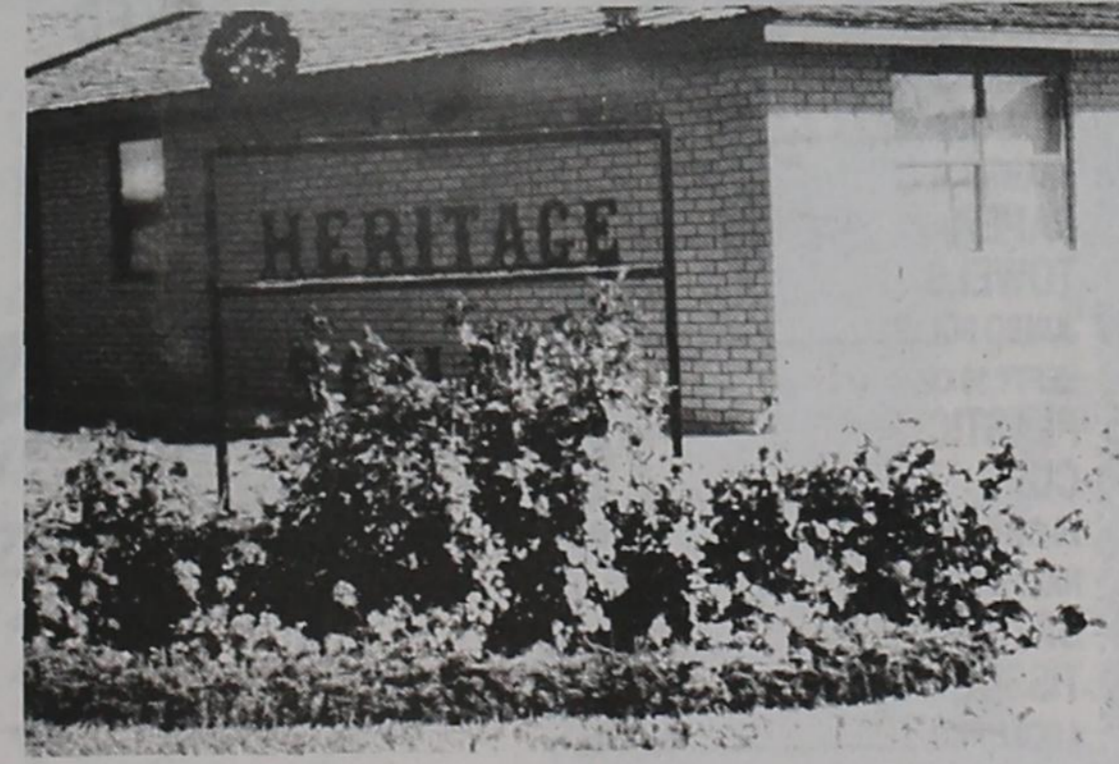
In other business, the commissioners:  
- Approved \$4,500 seed money to start a county Crime Stoppers program, headed by deputy sheriff Don Hatley. It was too late in the year to seek a grant so the county went ahead with its funding, said Judge Clayton.

- Approved buying a motor grader for the Bovina precinct from West Texas Caterpillar.

- Renewed its contract with BFI refuse pickup service. A new rate has been set up and it appears the county will save a bit of money under it. The old rate called for a flat \$300 charge per pickup. The new rate is divided into two parts: \$195 per pickup for each open top roll-off container, and \$12.50 per ton disposal rate at the landfill.

The county has three containers - two at Friona and one at Bovina.

Judge Clayton believes that the new rate will cost more if you dump heavy items into the containers. But since what is usually placed in the county containers is light, some funds will be saved.

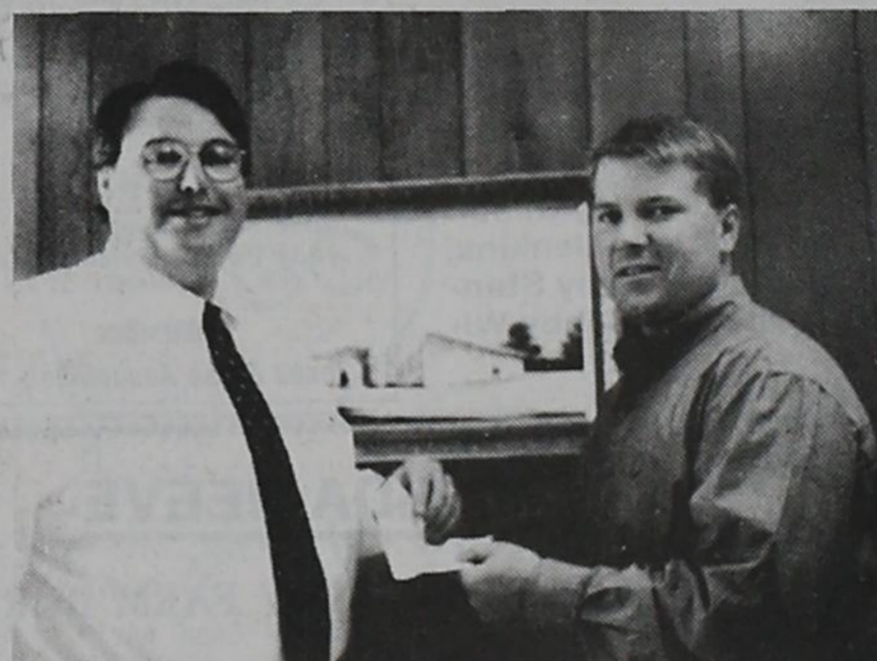

### Reading program kept - for some students

About 20 concerned citizens attended the Farwell School Board Tuesday to air their views about the elementary school reading program.

After hearing many concerns voiced by the parents, the board voted to remove the reading program from regular mainstream classes but keep it in special education classes, chapter reading programs, English as Second Language programs and where parents request it.

The vote was 4-3. Steven Kaltwasser, Ronald Byrd, Tom Nichols and David Norton voted for the change. Charles Christian, Teresa Ancira and Katherine White voted against.

The reason stated by Christian for his negative vote is that he felt that school boards should not handle curriculum decisions, the administrators should.

Parents also asked if the elementary school faculty would remain split for teacher's meetings. They were advised that this is an administrative decision.

In other business, the board:  
- Cast its votes to elect Mark Schwertner to the County Appraisal District.

- Heard Supt. Richard Boothby report that he had applied to the state for a waiver to allow the first and the fourth grades to have larger enrollments than state mandates allow.

- Heard a proposal by Rick Holder of S & R Benefits about a possible health insurance program.

- Heard Joe Stanton report that transportation is running smoothly except for a minor traffic problem behind the schools on Friday afternoons. Some students are boarding buses, other schools are leaving the pep rallies, and parents

### Texico seeks Clovis' aid to handle dog problem

The Texico City Council took steps Tuesday to try and alleviate the problem of dogs running loose in the community.

City councilmen Ronnie Warmuth and Evelyn Burrows, and city marshal Gil Holguin, had met earlier with Clovis' animal control officer.

After a lengthy discussion, the council voted to present a proposal to the Clovis City Council seeking a joint powers agreement whereby Texico could use the Clovis animal detention facility.

Texico proposes to pay Clovis \$150 a month, plus another \$25 per animal picked up starting with No. 7. Also, Texico will pay a one-time fee, up to \$3,000, to pay half the cost of a euthanizer. And after Aug. 1, 1994, Texico would pay a flat fee of \$25. Also, Clovis would keep any administrative fees charged.

And Texico will look into hiring a part-time animal control officer.

During the discussion, the following points were made:

- It wouldn't be a good idea, for several reasons, to use Texico's cops as dog catchers.

- Clovis' animal detention facility is "overbooked"; it was built for 30 dogs and currently houses 93. Between 200 and 300 strays are picked up each month in Clovis.

- Earlier reports that Clovis would charge Texico \$50 an animal were erroneous, Texico officials were told. It's more likely to be between \$20 and \$25, if Clovis approves.

In other business, the council:

- Administered the oath of office to new councilman Max Winkles.

- Named Warmuth mayor pro tem.

- Okayed buying a new video camera for the police at \$1,500. The old one, a year old, was a demo model with a 90-day warranty, the council was told, and had broken.

The board also heard Toni Trujillo of the New Mexico Department of Education discuss the State Department of Education's monitoring which took place at Texico Schools this week. 1 1/4 c butter (2 1/2 sticks) cut into 8-10 pieces  
1 egg  
2 1/2 c. all purpose flour  
Preheat oven to 275 degrees. Beat butter and sugar together until it is smooth and the sugar granules disappear. Add egg. Add flour. Knead lightly until dough holds together. Place dough in a plastic bag and refrigerate for about 1/2 hour.  
Roll 1/4" thick. Cut into small squares. Place on unbuttered cookie sheet 2" apart. Bake 45 minutes to 1 hour or until pale golden. Remove from cookie sheets, cool on a wire rack.  
Makes about 4 doz. cookies.

The Sudan coach did not try to run up the score. In the second half, he had his team try field goals on first down when they were deep in Steer territory.

The Steers are 0-6 overall and 0-1 in district. They host another top-ranked team, the Nazareth Swifts, tonight (Friday) at 7:30 p.m.

The Steers, beset by injuries, played several JV players throughout the game against Sudan.

Farwell received the kickoff but lost a fumble on its third play at its 27. Derrick Haseloff had 2 good tackles on defense. At 7:37, Sudan punched over from the 1 for a 6-0 lead. The kick made it 7-0.

Farwell was held and punted short to its own 33. Blaze Hardage intercepted a Sudan pass at the 1. Farwell was held again. The Sudan punt returner lost a fumble and Farwell recovered at its 33.

Farwell's one big play of the game then came when Brent Harrison raced around end for a 55-yard gain to the Sudan 12. Lupe Garza tried a 27-yard field goal try but it went wide.

On defense, Reace Bennett and Brock Anderson had good tackles. Sudan scored on a 43-yard pass just before the end of the first quarter, taking a 14-0 lead.

In the second quarter, Farwell was held. On 4th down, the snap was bad and Sudan recovered about the Steer 2 and ran in for a TD. The kick failed and it was 20-0.

Farwell started on its 19. Harrison ran for 9 but Farwell was stopped and punted to the Sudan 38. Cody Branch got

off a nice punt, good for 34 yards. Sudan scored on a 62-yard run, moving the score to 27-0.

Farwell started at its 31 after a good Harrison return. Jason Taylor threw a short pass to Michael Phillips. But Farwell couldn't get a first down and punted to the Sudan 45. On defense, Hardage, Branch and Steven Miller had good tackles. Sudan scored on an 8-yard run, making it 34-0.

Harrison returned the kick to the Steer 35. Harrison ran around end for 21 yards, and Haseloff ran up the middle for 15 more. With 4th and 10 at the Sudan 20, the QB was sacked. Just before halftime, Sudan scored on a 72-yard run, making it 40-0.

Sudan opened the third quarter with a 70-yard kickoff return for a TD, making it 47-0. Farwell was held and Garza got off a 47-yard punt. Tackles were recorded by Hardage, Haseloff and Harrison. Sudan kicked a 34-yard field goal,

making it 50-0.

Farwell was held again and a bad snap gave Sudan the ball at the Steer 1. A 16-yard field goal try was blocked. Sudan got the ball back and scored on a long run, making it 56-0.

In the fourth quarter, Sudan tallied on a 56-yard run, making it 62-0.

On offense, Miller gained 8 yards on 2 carries. Harrison got a first down on a 4th and 2 play. But Farwell was held at midfield on a QB sack. Sudan ended the scoring with an 18-yard field goal.

Top rushers were Harrison 96 yards; Miller, 9; and Haseloff, 35. Farwell gained 125 yards rushing and 12 through the air. Sudan totalled 583 yards - 524 on the ground and 59 via passes. Taylor completed 1 of 7 passes for 4 yards. Nash Armstrong completed 1 of 2 passes for 8 yards.

It was apparent that Wolverine quarterback Joel Barba knew what to do with the ball once the defense got it back for him. He ran the option almost to perfection as the Wolverines ended up with 354 yards rushing.

It must be said, however, that 90 of those yards came in the second quarter on one of the most confusing plays of the year. After numerous penalties set up a 4th down and 57 - that's right, 57 - Byrum tried to attempt a punt out of his own end zone. The ball was hiked over his head. What easily could have been a safety or touchdown for Hagerman turned into a 90-yard mad dash by Byrum that literally took the spirit away from the Hagerman players.

Excdpt for the opening kickoff return by Hagerman for a TD, this was a complete game for Texico as all three aspects of the Wolverines were near perfect - offense, defense and special teams.

As for the scoring, Texico tied the game in the first quarter when Gilbert plunged over from the 1. The Byrum kick made it 7-7. In the second quarter, Texico scored twice, first on that weird 90-yard play, then on a 3-yard keeper by Barba. The half ended with Texico up 19-7.

After a scoreless third quarter, Texico tacked on three TDs - on a 20-yard gallop by Byrum, a 3-yard run by Barba and a 14-yard run by Gilbert.

Individual statistics included: rushing - Gilbert, 9 carries for 27 yards; Salinas, 9 for 60; Barba, 13 for 133; Bobby Winegeart, 2 for 5; Byrum, 4 for 129; and Joey Winkles, 1 for 6.

Team statistics were: first downs - Texico 14, Hagerman,

5; rushing - Texico, 350 yards, Hagerman 102; passing - Texico 0 for 1, Hagerman, 2 for 6 for 1 yard; punts - Texico, 1 for 51 yards; Hagerman, 4 for 32 yard average; penalties - Texico 15 for 155 yards, Hagerman 4 for 20.

Coach Barry Partain commented: "We got off to a slow start, and then the guys came back and played real well.

"It's real important to get off to 2-0 in district; we've got some real tough games ahead."






