

the two days and split the difference. In other words, declare Nov. 10 as Homemade Sandwich Day.


I wonder how these days are celebrated. What do you do, have a get-together where everybody eats bread? Or do you run the bread up a flagpole and see if anyone salutes?

Of course, I think it special that Congress takes the time to declare these major events. Now we know why





Back in the early 1970s, I used to watch a TV show called "The Prisoner," starring Patrick McGoohan.







Texico had an easy 15-3, 15-5, 15-3 win over Floyd. Statistics included:



The Texico Wolverines became the first team in any division in southeastern New Mexico to win a state playoff berth when they blanked Tatum last Friday, 14-0.

The Wolverines 3-4 overall and 3-0 in district, have a nondistrict game tonight (Friday) at Cloudcroft. Texico concludes the regular season by hosting district foe Ft. Sumner Oct. 29 for Homecoming.

"We played real well defensively," said coach Barry Partin. "Our goal set at the beginning of the season was to make the playoffs and we have achied it. I'm proud of the guys for never giving up during the season."

Texico started the game at its 20 after Tatum kicked into the end zone. Texico was hit quickly with a penalty when one of its players didn't have his mouth piece in. Texico was held and punted.

On defense, Joel Barba, Jonny Salinas and Kyle Stamps had tackles. Then a strong pass rush by Clyde Jenkins and Stamps forced an incomplete pass. Hadley Gilbert had a good tackle and Tatum was forced to punt.

Texico was held again and punted. Tackles were recorded by Jenkins and Salinas, and Tatum punted. Both defenses

Tatum chose to kick off to open the second half. Texico started at its 20 after Tatum kicked into the end zone. Byrum had a nifty, twisting gallop good for 39 yards. Gilbert picked up another first down. Barba hit Winkles with an 8-yard pass. Then Byrum got loose for a 20-yard TD run with 9:36 left in the third quarter. Byrum's kick made it 14-0.

Calloway Clark tackled the Tatum returner at the 35. Barba then intercepted at midfield after a pass was tipped. A holding penalty stopped Texico, despite an 11-yard run by Johnny Salinas, Byrum punted and Clint Hamilton tackled the returner.

Tatum was held and Stamps nails the punter after a bad snap for a big loss. Texico was held and Tatum took over as the third quarter ended.

Barba got his second interception, this time on a Tatum bomb. Tatum moves the ball and it looks like they will score but a good tackle by Winkles and Byrum stopped the runner short. Tatum goes for it on 4th down but Chris Salinas and Jenkins break through to sack the QB.

Texico gains a first down on runs by Gilbert. Texico tried a

field goal with 3 minutes left but it failed.




