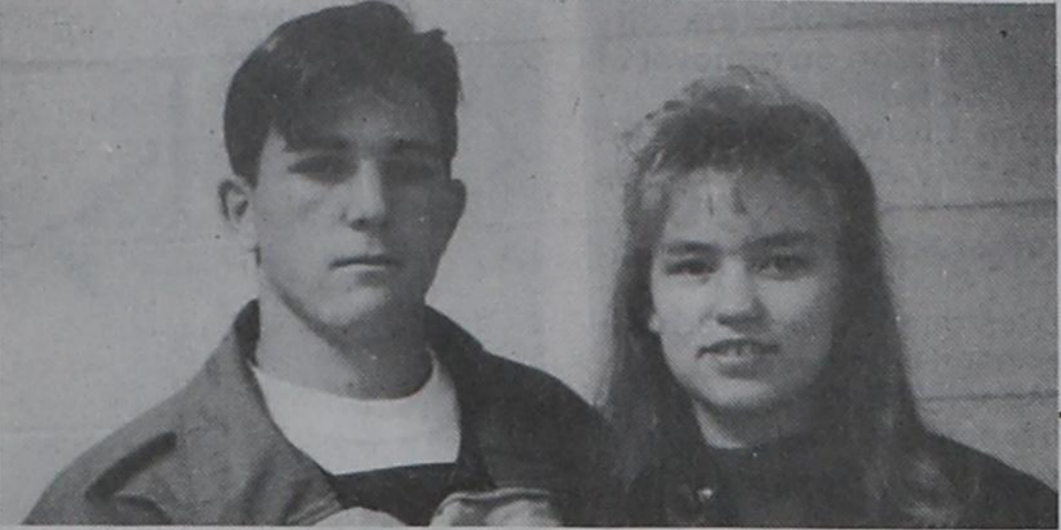
Anyway, I finally got to see how it turned out - after 20 years. Thank you, Gordon!

We received a letter Tuesday dealing with Outcome Based Education and signed "A Concerned Parent and Citizen of Texico."

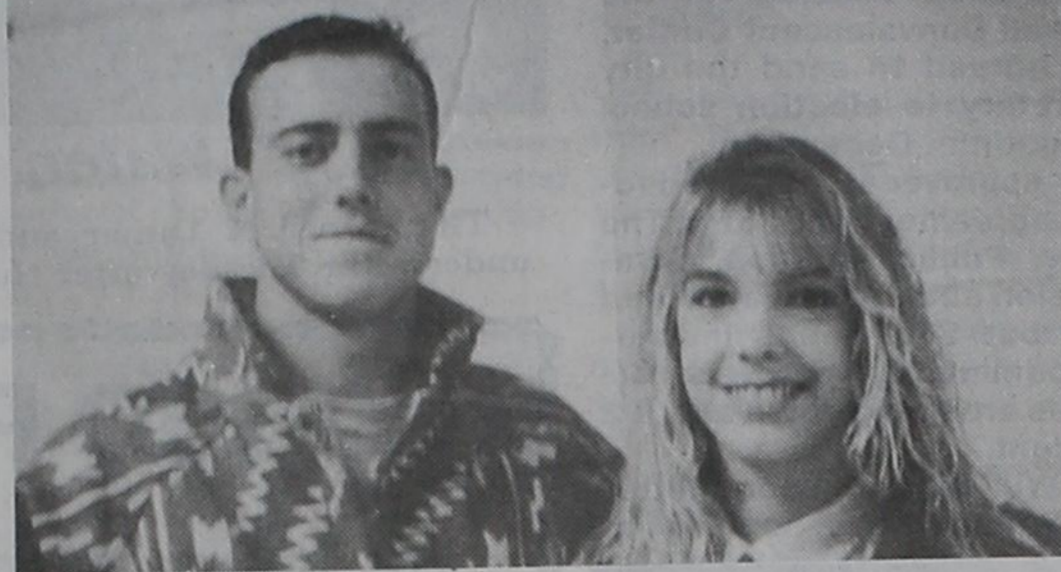

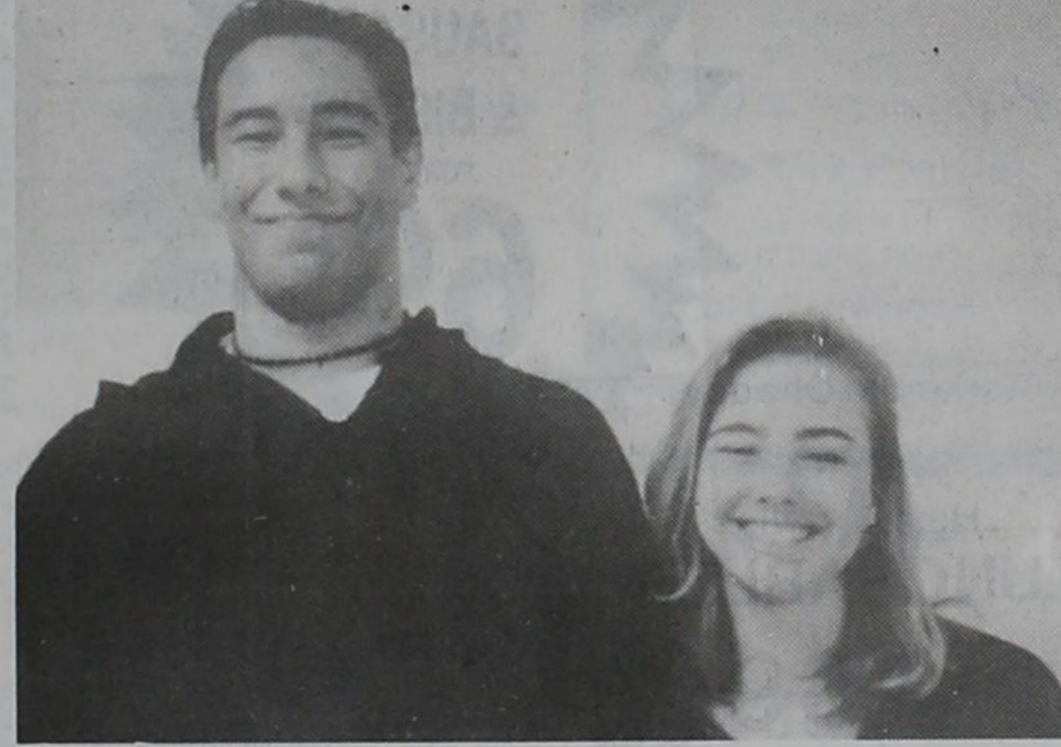

That's the word given McGaa by City Attorney Charles Aycock.

In other business, the council:

- Designated Oct. 30 for observing Halloween.

- Appointed Royce Bethel to the council, replacing Pat Howard, who resigned last month.

- Okayed a building permit for a shop building for the Farwell Convalescent Center.

- Agreed to send the city secretary to election school in Austin in December.

- Approved a rate reduction agreement with SPS. The state Public Utilities Commission already had approved this but SPS needs individual community approvals, too. Rates are going down about 2 percent.

- Will send a second letter to Pudge Rose, owner of

the former Rose Pharmacy building, asking him to take action on the building, which is deteriorating. It's next to City Hall.

The City Council is expected to approve a new building condemnation ordinance within a couple of months.

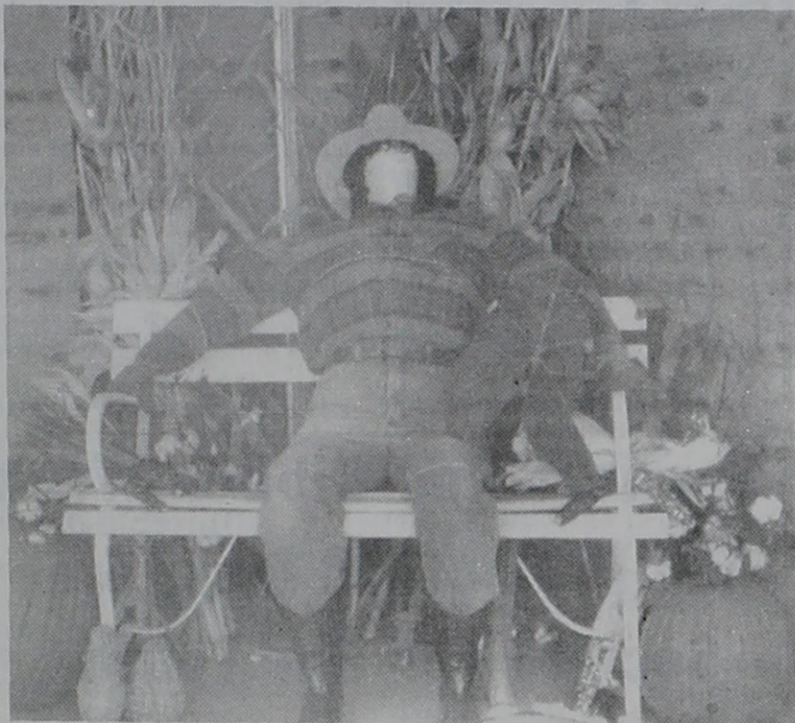

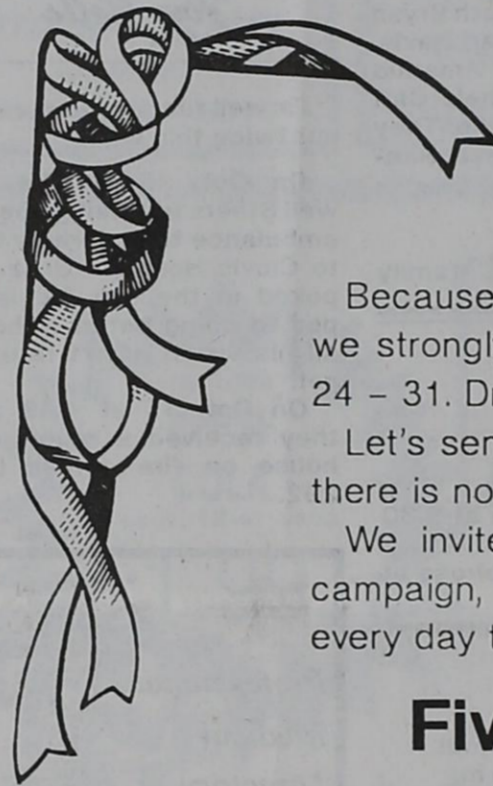
Receiving - McBroom, 3 catches for 44 yards and 1 TD; Jody Copp, 4 for 56 yards; Miller, 3 for 40 yards.

Texico gains a first down on runs by Gilbert. Texico tried a

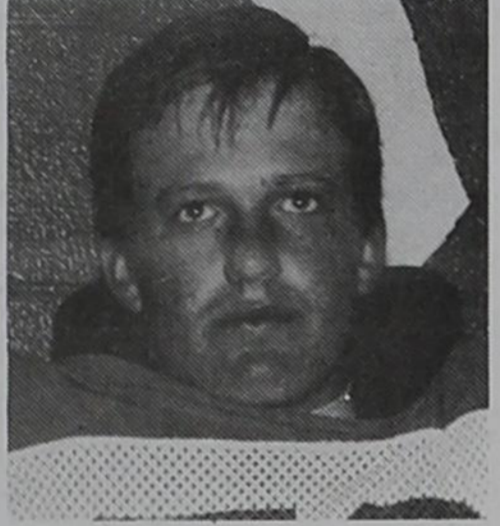
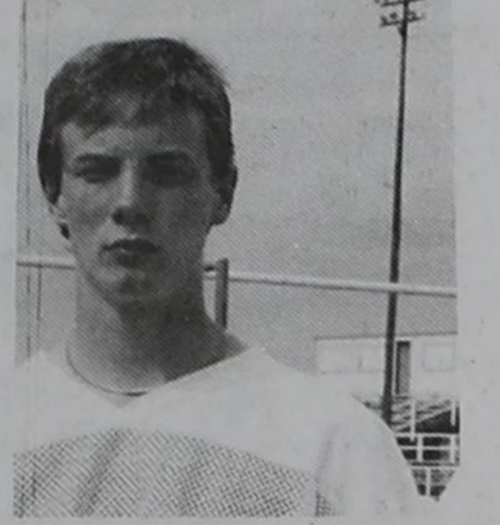
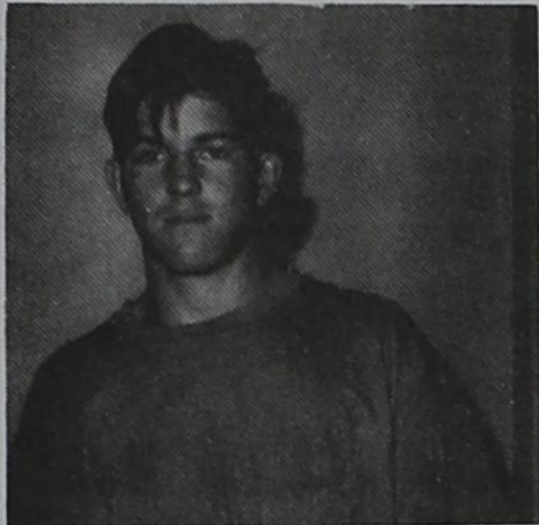
field goal with 3 minutes left but it failed.
