

A hardened criminal

It was awful what I saw. And it's a good thing I'm part of the Neighborhood Watch program.

There she was. I estimate the lady was about 70 years old, driving a fairly new car in Farwell.

And right before my eyes, she did it - made a U-turn.

I didn't have a cellular phone to immediately call the city police but I took down her license plate number. It's important not to allow crime to occur in Farwell - who knows what it might lead to. For all I know, she might be a serial U-turner, wanted in other states.

But then I had second thoughts. I thought back to Communist Russia and Nazi Germany, where kids were encouraged to turn in their parents to the authorities. No, the lady may have broken the law, but...

Then my mind got changed. Now I understood why she had broken the law. She drove up to her house to park and her vehicle was facing the wrong way on the street. Another crime. Now it was obvious. This was a hardened criminal I was dealing with.

As I watched her use a walker to get to her home, I knew what my course of action must be. The training I had received through the Neighborhood Watch program would serve me well. We can't allow law-breakers in Farwell. An example must be made for our young people.

As I drove to City Hall to do my public duty, I thought back to the reasons why Farwell now had a city police officer and a Neighborhood Watch program.

I recalled the citizens coming to the City Council meetings asking for a police department because of crimes such as burglaries. And I remember attending the Neighborhood Watch meeting where similar topics were discussed.

Heck, those are minor compared to what that 70-yearold lady did.


Obviously, the above made-

But I sincerely hope that city officials keep in mind the main purpose of having a police department.

Golden Spread plans new plant

Golden Spread Cooperative has filed with the Texas Public Utility Commission a notice of intent to apply for a certificate of convenience and necessity for construction of a new 400 megawatt generating plant.

Scheduled for initial operation in early 1988, the plant would consist of four 100 megawatt, simple cycle turbine powered generating units. Natural gas would be used as the primary fuel.

A final site selection has not been made, but two preferred sites are currently under consideration. One site is in Moore County south of Sunray. The other site involves properties in Yoakum and Gaines counties east of Denver City.

Golden Spread's member systems are Bailey County Electric Cooperative, Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative, Greenbelt Electric Cooperative, Lamb County Electric Cooperative, Lighthouse Electric Cooperative, Midwest Electric Cooperative, North Plains Electric Cooperative, Rita Blanca Electric Cooperative, South Plains Electric Cooperative, Swisher Electric Cooperative and Tri-County Electric Cooperative. Golden Spread's member systems serve 90,000 retail consumers in the Panhandle and on the South Plains of Texas and the Panhandle of Oklahoma.

Approval by the Texas Public Utility Commission of the notice of intent will only give Golden Spread the right to file an application for a certificate of convenience and necessity, which is the authorization needed before the project could

In its filing, Golden Spread advised the Commission that it also intends to solicit proposals from other utilities and independent power suppliers for both new capacity and demand side control options. The solicitation will be made in about three months and will include a request for purchased power or other supply options.

Golden Spread currently purchases wholesale power from Southwestern Public Service Co. and from West Texas Utility Co. SPS' 1993 load and capacity resource forecast, which includes the Golden Spread loads, show a need to construct 486 megawatts of new gas turbine generating capacity to serve area loads.

Golden Spread President Robert W. Bryant said, "Our proposal does not duplicate any existing generating station. It simply means that SPS can defer the construction of additional generating plants on its system, and that will benefit SPS retail customers."

Recipe of Week

8 c. sliced unpeeled cucumbers

2 c. sliced onions

1 c. julienne red bell pepper strips

1 Tbs. salt

2 c. granulated sugar

1 1/2 c. white vinegar

2 tsp. celery seed 2 tsp. mustard

In a large bowl, combine cucumbers, onion and red pepper. Sprinkle with salt and mix well. Let stand 1 hour. Dain.

In a medium bowl, combine sugar, vinegar, celery seed and mustard seed; stir until sugar is dissolved. Place cucumber mixture in a non metallic container. Pour vinegar mixture over cucumbers. Cover and chill for at least 24 hours to blend flavors. Makes about 8 cups.



PCG: Cotton deficiency payments remain unchanged

According to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers (PCG) decreases in both the average price received by growers and monthly marketings left the estimated 1994 upland cotton deficiency payment unchanged through July.

The projected cotton deficiency payment settled at 7.77 cents per pound through July leaving a 1.32 cent final payment rate after subtracting the 6.45 cent advance payment. Earlier in the season producers were able to apply for and receive the 6.45 cent advance on the 1994 deficiency

Through July, 1994's cumulative marketings totaled 5.28 million bales. Marketings during the same 7 - month period in 1993 were slightly higher at 5.69 million bales.

Preliminary calculations through July project the final payment around 7 cents. However, significant changes in either marketings or prices received could still effect the final payment rate. The maximum deficiency payment possible in 1994 is 22.9 cents, the difference between the upland cotton loan rate of 50 cents and the 72.9 cent target price established in the 1990 Farm Bill.

Deficiency payments are calculated as the lesser of the difference between the target price and either the Commodity Credit Corporation Loan Rate or the average price received by growers weighted by total marketings for the preceding calendar year.

Kater Hake, cotton Specialist with the Texas Ag. Extension Service, says producers who see regrowth in their dryland and irrigated cotton may be close to missing a prime opportunity to get the 1994 crop out of the field.

According to PCG, Hake is still encouraging producers to take action to terminate their crops, including dryland fields with only marginal yield potential, in order to take advantage of the crop's earliness and maintain the highest quality possible.

He notes that plants have started to show signs of regrowth are no long sending any resources to developing bolls, instead they are putting all their efforts towards growing new stems, leaves and squares that will not contribute anything to yield. An added benefit of terminating the crop early is the ability to prepare fields to store as much moisture as possible for the 1994 season.



Kubin Air will provide 7 turbine powered aircraft for the program, each equipped with satellite-based guidance system from Satloc, Inc., of Casa Grande, Ariz. Satloc's satellite -based global positioning system was specified as a requirement for the 1994 contract to provide parallel tracking and record-keeping for program operations.

"The 1994 program will kick off Sept. 27" says Roger Haldenby, PCG Boll Weevil Program Coordinator, "Weevil pressure has been high again this year following yet another mild winter. However, the dry, hot summer conditions have helped some."

Trap catches show weevil numbers are currently below levels seen in 1993. This is good news for the 1994 program but not much comfort for some producers who have seen more boll weevil activity in the past two years than they remember seeing before.

"Weather records were shattered in July with temperatures soaring to as much as 119 degrees." adds Haldenby, "Boll weevil numbers in 1993 similarly broke records across our area bringing home to us the desperate need for a cold winter to aid us in the fight against this terrible pest."

The Chief's Corner

Here's how police view gun control

by Farwell Police Chief Roy McGaa

Cops and Gun Control: Some time back I wrote that most cops are against gun control, that was based on my own experience and feeling. I have since discovered a survey conducted by the 11,000 member Southern States Police Benevolent Association in June 1993. I think you will find the results interesting.

Southern States PBA President Jack Roberts said of the reason for the survey, "We simply had enough of every special interest group, including a number of national police organizations, claiming they spoke for the rank-and-file officers on the subject of gun control. The only way to find out how law enforcement feels about gun control is to ask them. That is exactly what we did."

The following, are some of the results:

(3b) Other than for police or military, all guns should be outlawed. (95.8% of the officers disagreed.)

(3b) The U.S. Constitution guarantees every law-abiding citizen the right to own a gun. (90.1% of the officers agreed). (3e) People should have the right to own a gun for self protection. (96.4% of the officers agreed).

(3f) A waiting period to purchase handguns will only affect a law abiding citizens, criminals will still be able to obtain hand guns illegally whenever they want. (86.5% of the officers agreed).
