* Doug Cole will be getting married May 27. The wedding reception will be May 28.

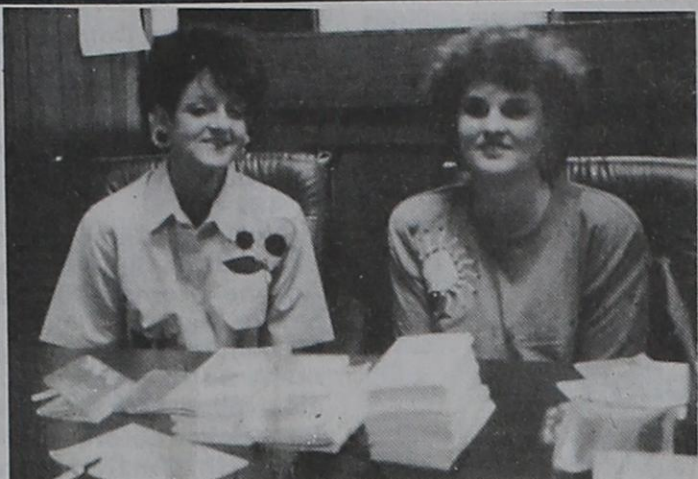

150 registered at Project KidCare

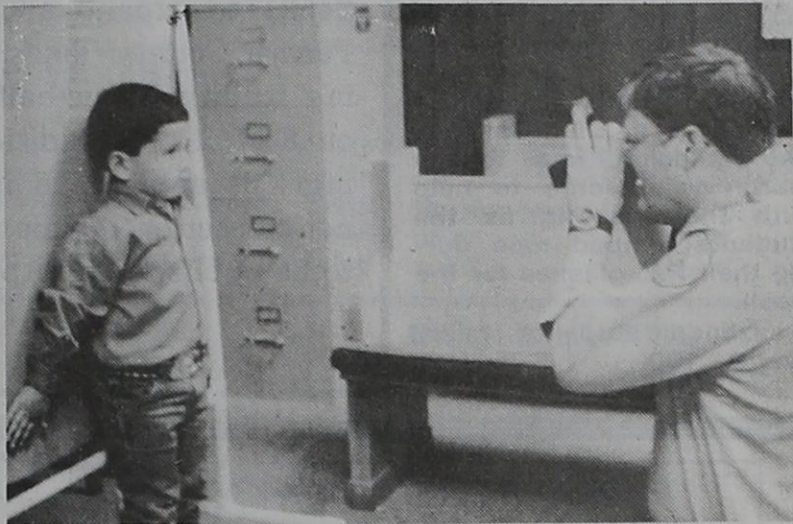
Project KidCare, where kids are finger-printed and photographed in case of child abductions, is under way in Parmer County.

Texico has two jobs open - but no applicants

The City of Texico has two jobs open - but no applicants.

Mayor Butch Tharp reported at Tuesday's City Council meeting that no one has applied for the post of animal control officer. The council increased the pay for the job, and details are listed in the classified pages elsewhere in today's Tribune.

The city is receiving lots of complaints of animals running loose.

Also, no one applied for the post of swimming pool manager. But a couple of folks were suggested and this will be discussed again at the next meeting.

In other business, the council:

- Changed its regular meeting date from April 26 to April 25 due to the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet.

- Received an offer from a resident to sell the lots at the south end of city-owned property along Griffin where the Community Center is planned. This was discussed in executive session.

- Heard Tharp say that the cost of attending meetings is becoming very expensive. In the next 30 days, meetings that need to be attended include Santa Fe, Tucumcari and Albuquerque. No action was taken.

- Heard councilman Oran Jay Autrey say that the improved street near the school (Griffin north to Craig) is in bad shape and more like a dirt road. The state highway inspector will be contacted.

- Heard fire chief Lewis Cooper compliment city employees Matt Meeks and Billy Hammit for working on their own time to help clean the fire plugs. Cooper also said a fire marshal

is coming to Texico to discuss the possibility of placing a fire sub-station on the south side of town.

- Cooper heads the committee planning the Community Center. Also on his committee are Maurine Caywood and Autrey. The city has received a \$200,000 grant but Cooper said another \$200,000 is needed, and that extra money will be sought from the state at the next legislative session.

- Heard Tharp report that the newly-painted tables for KKR Park have been vandalized, limbs pulled off park trees and one tree pulled up and destroyed. Photos will be taken of the table vandalism and attempts will be made to identify those responsible.

Texas conducts run-off election

As expected, voter turnout for Tuesday's run-off election in Texas was very low.

The main race in Texas featured Richard Fisher defeating Jim Mattox for the Democrat nomination for U.S. Senate. In Parmer County, Fisher won, 120-71.

Also, in the Democrat primary, Paul Gonzales defeated Rene Haas for Justice, Supreme Court. In Parmer County, Gonzales won 103-84. For Judge, Criminal Court of Appeals, Betty Marshall beat Gene Kelly. In Parmer County, Kelly won 89-77.

In the Republican primary, Don Wittig won the nomination for attorney general over Pat Lykos. In Parmer County, Wittig won 24-12. For Court of Criminal Appeals, Sharon Keller beat Sam Bayless. In Parmer County, Bayless won 21-16.

The Texico School Board Tuesday accepted the recommendations made by principals concerning re-hiring teachers.

Pay scale and teacher duties will be decided after the budget is approved.

The board also:

- Accepted the resignation of Rebecca Wooten, the Chapter I teacher.

- Discussed a project to move the track and football field farther north so that there will be space for future expansion of the current high school facilities at a later date. This project may start in May.

- Awarded the school transportation contract to Bill Queener.

- Voted to purchase the Saxon Math series for grades K-12.

- Discussed the possibility of conducting an in-service session of CPR training for teachers and students.

- Heard that the High School FFA team had placed 1st in Meats Judging Competition at the state competition on

Las Cruces, and will be eligible to compete in the national competition in June. Team members include Derek Dictson (who was the top high individual overall in the state), Dara Jenkins, and Chad Cochran.

The Texico FFA Land Division won 4th in the state and will be eligible to compete nationally in May. The team consists of John Stephens, Derek Dictson, Dara Jenkins, and Chad Cochran.


