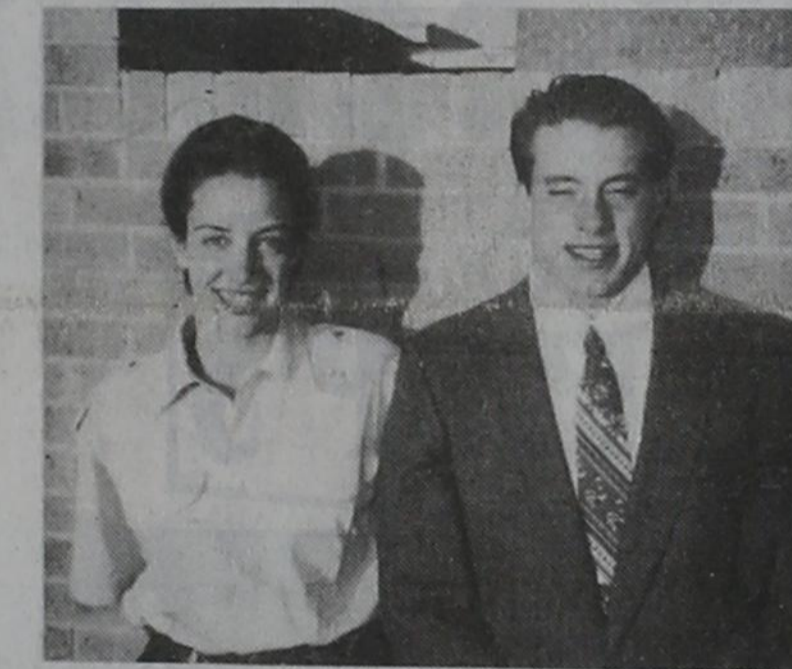

Report given on lottery benefits

At the Farwell City Council meeting Tuesday night, Gwen and Joe Hughes of Hughes True Value presented a report on how the Texas Lottery benefits Farwell and the surrounding area. It included:

- Increased employment. For 27 years, Hughes Auto employed only one or two additional people, but since the lottery has begun, they have employed 13 to 15 additional people. Four of these are fulltime employees.
- Expanded their hours of operation. This means that the people do not have to go into Clovis for supplies needed on Wednesday night or Saturday afternoon and evening.
- A major percentage of the profits stay in the Farwell area. "I estimate that the five lottery dealers in Farwell will gross a minimum of \$4.5 million in 1994. They'll

receive a 5% commission on those sales. That translates into \$225,000 that will be invested in one way or another in our local economy. At least 80% of the gross sales in lottery tickets come from the Clovis area. Isn't it nice to see some of our money coming back across the border?" Mrs. Hughes said.

- Parmer County ranks No. 2 in Texas as far as gross sales are concerned. Gaines

County is the only place that outranks Parmer County. Per capita, Farwell sells \$1,020 per person as compared to

a state average of \$297 per person. This figure outsells the Houston area. There are 15,100 lottery dealers in the state. Farwell has 5 of these dealerships and are ranked very high individually as top selling dealers.

'No U-turns' put on hold

The Farwell City Council Tuesday tabled the U-turn ordinance. Although the council approved this ordinance last month, the legal publication has not run in the newspaper yet. The ordinance doesn't go into effect until that occurs.

The council tabled it after a discussion with Joe and Gwen Hughes, of Hughes True Value, concerning the traffic problem in the 100 block of Fifth Street. Lottery tickets sold there bring a huge number of participants (see story elsewhere in today's Tribune).

To try to alleviate the situation there, Mayor Chris Gikas suggested that the street have three lanes, with the middle lane helping move the flow of traffic into the lottery booth on Hughes' property. This will be looked into.

The council had approved a U-turn ordinance for the entire city after a problem with vehicles U-turning in the 100 block was brought up.

In other business, the council:

- Was told that the youth curfew ordinance it passed last month is not in effect yet. It's pending a review by attorney Charles Aycock, who handles the city council's business.

- Approved two applications for building permits: a garage at 505 6th St. for Julian Jaime, and a fence at Capitol Foods.

- Received bids from Friona Motors and Doc Stewart Chevy for a new pickup for the water department. The low bid of Doc Stewart, \$12,25, was taken.

- Renewed the franchise pact with Southern Union Gas.

- Approved flu shots for city employees who want them.

- Discussed repairing the Sesquicentennial mural on the side of City Hall.

- Declined to buy a cellular phone for Police Chief Roy McGaa. He can buy his own phone and be reimbursed for any calls used for city business.

- Discussed the state grant the council accepted at its last meeting to set up a used oil collection point at Tri County Tire.

- Gikas said Helton Oil already has a used oil collection business in Farwell.

- The council still will go ahead and ask Robert White, owner of Tri County Tire, if he wants the collection point there. They noted that Helton Oil has trucks that can haul the used oil away.

- Heard water supt. Dee Hammit report that the water tower has been repaired. He said water is tested every 30 days at six sites.

- Gikas noted that an amoeba problem has occurred in some Texas communities and he wants to make sure there is no such problem in Farwell. He asked Hammit to check on this.

Is this a record? Farwell's Blaze Hardage has had 4 interceptions in two games.



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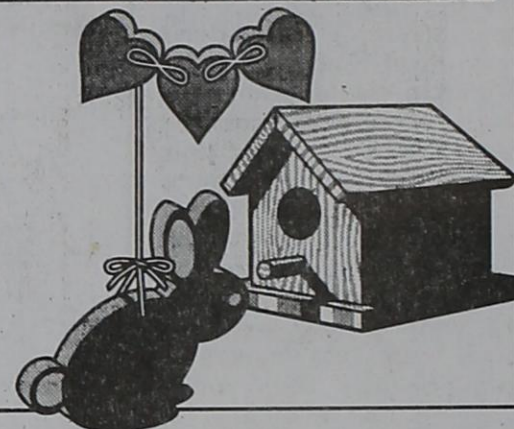
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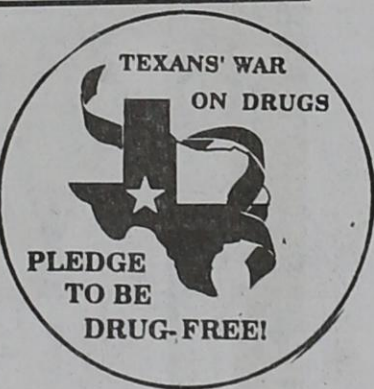

A lingerie shower was given for Angie by several of her friends at the home of Kara Camp in Portales.



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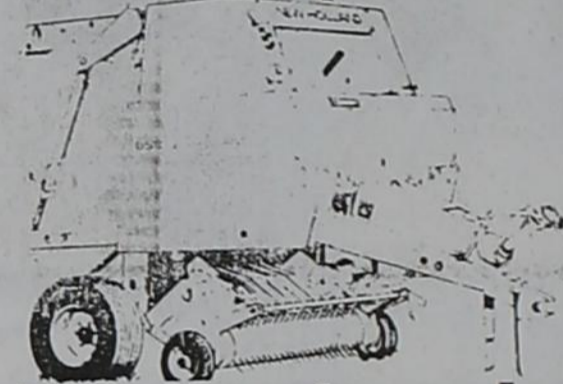

**Notice of Rate Change Request
Relating to Irrigation Interruption Credit
And Recovery of Power Costs**

Notice is hereby given that Bailey County Electric Cooperative, Inc. (the "Utility") intends to change rates for electric utility service by implementing an irrigation interruption credit applicable to irrigation customers who agree by contract that their service may be interrupted and by revising the Utility's power cost recovery factor ("PCRF"), effective November 15, 1994, or as soon thereafter as may be permitted by law. The proposed changes are not expected to have any effect on the revenues of the Utility. The changes are applicable to all electric utility service, all areas served by the Utility, all customer classes, and all customers.

Copies of the proposed revised tariffs, schedules and supporting testimony and other pertinent data may be inspected in the office of the Utility located at 305 East Avenue B, Muleshoe, Texas 79347, and at the office of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, 7800 Shoal Creek Boulevard, Austin, Texas 78757. Inquiries should be directed to Mr. Duane Lloyd (806) 272-4504.

The Utility's wholesale power supplier currently allows a credit on the Utility's wholesale power bills in exchange for the ability to interrupt a portion of the Utility's irrigation load. The Utility's existing retail rates, which were established before the wholesale interruption credit became available, apply the interruption credit to all customers of the Utility regardless of whether such customers have agreed that their service may be interrupted. This occurs because the Utility's power cost is reduced by the amount of the irrigation interruption credit from the Utility's wholesale power supplier and the reduced level of power cost is flowed through to all consumers through the PCRF.

The rate revisions are proposed for the purposes of: (1) establishing a tariff authorizing payment of an interruptible credit to irrigators who agree by contract to allow their service to be interrupted, and (2) allocating the irrigation interruption credit received from the Utility's wholesale power supplier to the irrigation customers who have agreed to allow interruption of their load in the event the Utility's wholesale power supplier requires the Utility to shed load. Irrigation customers who agree to have their services interrupted should receive the benefit of the interruptible credit from the Utility's wholesale power supplier. The proposed charges will not increase or decrease the revenues of the Utility, however, the proposed changes are expected to increase the revenues derived from all customer classes other than irrigation.

Persons who wish to intervene in or comment upon these proceedings should notify the Commission as soon as possible, as an intervention deadline will be imposed. A request to intervene or for further information should be mailed to the Public Utility Commission of Texas, 7800 Shoal Creek Boulevard, Austin, Texas 78757. Further information may also be obtained by calling the Public Utility Commission's Public Information Office at (512) 458-0256, or (512) 458-0221 for text telephone. The deadline for intervention in the proceeding is 45 days after the date the application was filed with the Commission.



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Texico blanks Clovis sophs

The Texico Wolverines shut out the Clovis High sophomores, 14-0, Saturday. It was the second straight shut-out tossed by the Texico defense.

The Wolverines, 4-4, open district play tonight (Friday) against Springer.

The game opened with the Wolverines starting at their 20. The Wolverines played excellently the first half. Johnny Salinas scored the first TD, a 3-yard run in the second quarter. It capped a 63-yard drive in nine plays, with Salinas doing the major rushing. Hadley Gilbert also ran the ball at important times to gain several first downs for Texico.

Meanwhile, the defense shined. Excellent tackles were made by Salinas, Gilbert, Cody Drager and Joel Barba.

Texico scored its second TD in the third quarter. It was on a broken play, with Salinas cutting back and running for a 16-yard score. The extra point field goal made it 14-0. A 65-yard gallop by Pat Chumley helped set up this score. Again, Salinas and Gilbert did much of the rushing during this successful drive.

Defensively, Texico was even better in the second half. Bill Hutchins and Gilbert played great pass coverage. Gilbert led the defense with the most tackles - 10. And a hit by Barba stopped a potential Clovis TD. Hutchins also had some good hits in the second half.

Drager had a QB sack late in the third quarter. He followed that up with a tackle that stopped a Clovis first down.

Overall, Texico played a great game, showing excellent improvement from earlier in the season. The defense has had 11 straight quarters without allowing a TD.

Stats included: Texico allowed only 194 yards total offense. Chumley rushed for 71 yards and Gilbert gained 62. All told, Texico had 332 yards total offense.

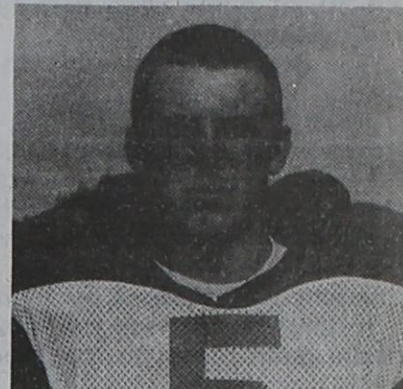

left in the half, Happy scored on an 8-yard pass. The run for extra points was good and Happy went ahead, 14-12.

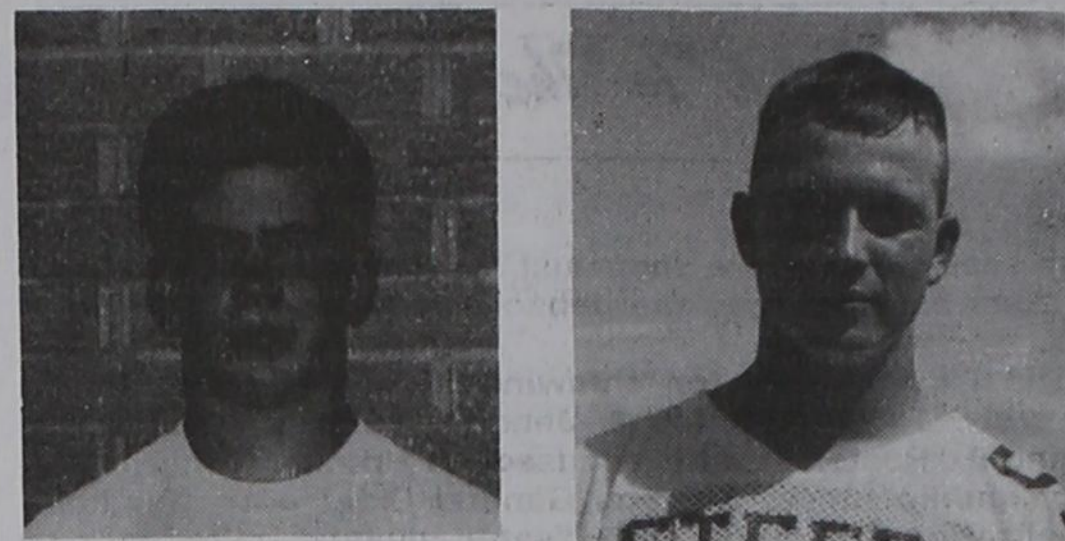

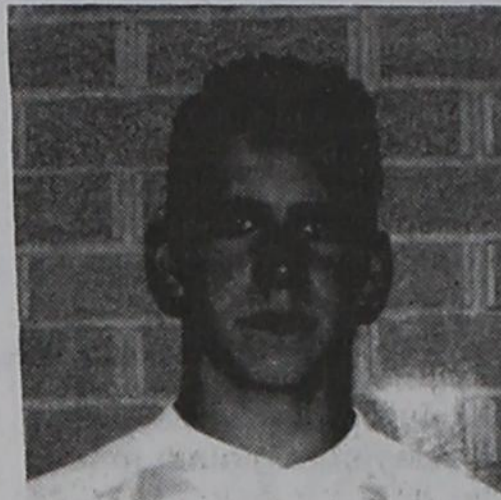

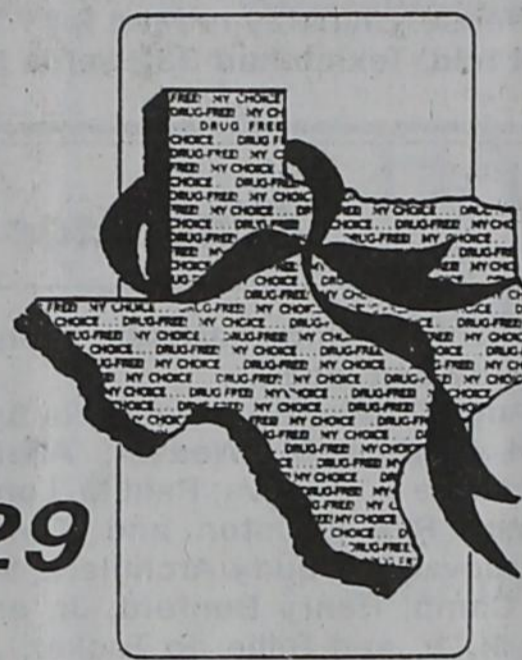

Notice of Application for Waste Disposal Permit Amendment
Caprock Industries, Inc., P.O. Box E, Bovina, Texas 79009, has applied to the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (Commission) for an amendment to Permit No. 01352 to authorize an increase in the number of head from 35,000 to 48,500 head. Stormwater will be retained in three storage ponds. Wastewater from the ponds is to be disposed of by evaporation on a 20.8-acre area. Manure/solids will be removed from the facility by a contract manure hauler. No discharge of pollutants into the waters of the State is authorized by this permit. The feedlot is on the south side of U.S. Highway 60, approximately three miles southwest of the intersection of U.S. Highway 60 and State Highway 86, in Parmer County, Texas. This location is in the drainage area of the White River Lake in Segment No. 1240 of the Brazos River Basin.

The Executive Director of the Commission has prepared a draft permit based on the application submitted by the applicant and other information presently available.

Legal Authority: Section 26.028 of the "Texas Water Code" and 30 TAC Chapter 305 of the "Rules of the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission."

This application is subject to a Commission resolution adopted August 18, 1993, which directs the Commission's Executive Director to act on behalf of the Commission and issue final approval of certain permit matters. The Executive Director will issue this permit unless one or more persons file written protests and/or a request for a hearing within 30 days after publication of this notice.

If you wish to request a public hearing, you must submit your request in writing. You must state (1) your name, mailing address and daytime phone number; (2) the permit number of other recognizable reference to this application; (3) the statement "I/we request a public hearing"; (4) a brief description of how you, or the persons you represent, would be adversely affected by the granting of the application; (5) a description of the location of your property relative to the applicant's operations; and (6) your proposed adjustment to the application/permit which would satisfy your concerns and cause you to withdraw your request for hearing. If one or more protests and/or requests for hearing are filed, the Executive Director will not issue the permit and will forward the application to the Office of Hearings Examiners where a hearing may be held. Commission public hearings are evidentiary legal proceedings similar to civil court non-jury trials. Although general comments from the public may be submitted either in writing prior to the hearing, or orally at the start of the hearing, the law requires that the Commission's decision about whether to approve or deny the application be based on evidence and testimony submitted during the public hearing, presented under oath and subject to cross-examination by the other parties. Public comments are not evidence and cannot be the basis for the Commission's ultimate decision. In the event a hearing is held, the Office of Hearings Examiners will submit a recommendation to the Commission for final decision.

If no protests or requests for hearing are filed, the Executive Director will sign the permit 30 days after the publication of this notice or thereafter. If you wish to appeal a permit issued by the Executive Director, you may do so by filing a written Motion for Reconsideration with the Chief Clerk of the Commission no later than 20 days after the date the Executive Director signs the permit.

But it's not just a week to wear red ribbons and say that you're involved in the campaign. The Farwell and Texico schools will be actively participating in the week with a slate full of events to educate the public, as well as the students. The students will learn to reinforce the positive aspects in their lives and to be better prepared to face the negatives. For example, on Oct. 28, the Farwell Jr. High and High School won't be holding regular classes. Instead, the students will be attending workshops dealing with topics ranging from "Self-Esteem," "Conflict Resolution" to "The Importance of Staying Fit and Healthy." This day is called "Pay Day." It stands for "preparing America's youth" and it will be the second year for the school to hold it.

It's very easy for us, living in a small community to believe that drug abuse is something that only happens to people in the big cities. We also tend to believe that our children would never get caught up in this type of activity. But it does happen, with more incidence than we would care to admit. This is why the red ribbon campaign is so vital to our community.

As Farwell police chief Roy McGaa says, "Small communities are likely targets for drug distribution because of the lack of awareness. But, when something like the red ribbon campaign brings awareness, that same small community is better able to slam the door on drugs than a large city. An example of that is the Farwell teenager who was responsible for a drug arrest and conviction. He did something to protect his community, he got involved."

Here is the schedule of the events planned for the week:

Farwell

Oct. 24 - Decoration Day - Students will draw and paint pictures on grocery sacks depicting topics for drug prevention. They will be judged by community members and then recycled back through the local grocery stores for regular use.

Oct. 26 - Wear Red and Rally Day - the day will be highlighted by the Red Ribbon Walk at 2:45 p.m. All parents and members of the community are invited to participate in this walk. It begins at the east end of the elementary school.

Oct. 27 - Recognition Day - the Clovis Police Department K-9 Unit will be presenting a program at the elementary school.

The junior high and high school students will be out decorating the community and school campuses with red ribbons.

Oct 28 - Pay Day - High school and junior high students will be attending breakout workshops with speakers on various topics. Students will select 5 workshops from approximately 15 topics. The PTA and Churches will provide donuts and juice for the morning and the civic organizations will provide a hamburger lunch.

Elementary students will be watching videos in their classes on drug prevention.

Recent events in Texas and the U.S. have focused the debate over the impact of government regulations and their affects on the use of private property. 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

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
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
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
