## No big surprises

The 1993 Texas primary election is history and there weren't a lot of surprises.

Parmer County voters didn't exactly flock to the polls with only about 500 making the trip. The snowy weather didn't help, but even if the weather had been good the turnout would have been lackluster due to the lack of excitement.

The only statistic that really stood out to my way of thinking was the race for gubernatorial candidate on the Democrat ticket.

Incumbent Ann Richards won statewide in a walk over a relatively unknown challenger named Espinoza. But in Parmer County, Gov. Richards only won by a 168-102 margin.

In fact, Espinoza won two precincts: Pct. 203, Rhea Community Center, 12-6; and Pct. 302, Oklahoma Lane Methodist Church, 11-3.

That shows that the typical conservative Democrat voter in Parmer County isn't exactly thrilled by Gov. Richards.

I enjoy how statistics can be used. In Pct. 303, Ridgelea School in Bovina, only three - that's right, three - voters cast ballots in the Democrat primary. The election judge and who else?

Anyway, Gov. Richards got 2 of the votes and Espinoza got 1. That means that Gov. Richards won two-thirds of the votes cast in that precinct - 67 percent.

Now, doesn't "67 percent" and winning by a "2-1 margin" sound a whole lot better than just saying Gov. Richards got 2 votes to Espinoza's 1? Statistics can be fun the way they are used.

The only real Democrat race of interest was for U.S. Senate, with Jim Mattox getting 116 votes here to Richard Fisher's 93.

Otherwise, the Democrat primary was kind of blah. The five Parmer County office holders were unopposed.

In the Republican primary, there wasn't any excitement at all. U.S. Rep. Larry Combest not only was unopposed in the primary but he won't have any Democrat opponent in the fall. Same goes for state Sen. Teel Bivins.

Same goes for state Rep. Pete Laney, a Democrat who's unopposed in the fall.

On the Republican side, there was a tie for top vote getter. Both U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison and gubernatorial candidate George Bush got 184 votes.

On the Democrat side, the top vote getter was Parmer County Clerk Bonnie Warren, with 253 votes. She edged County Judge Bonnie Clayton by 1.

I'm looking forward to the fall election. I think the fight between Gov. Richards and Mr. Bush will be nifty. And the race for U.S. Senator could be bang-up, too. And we'll even have a race at the county level - for district clerk between incumbent Marge Watkins and Sandra Warren.

Stay tuned.

## Texico gets center grant

Texico got some wonderful news Monday.

City Clerk-Treasurer Marie Christian was informed by the state of New Mexico that Gov. King has signed the bill authorizing \$200,000 to build a Texico Community Center.

The money will come from the state's general fund and be given in a lump sum to Texico.

The bill seeking the funds was sponsored by state Rep. Earlene Roberts, R-Lovington. Texico is within her district.

In late 1992, plans were presented by the Texico Community Activities Organization for a metal building to house a community center, including a senior citizens center.

The building would be placed on a city-owned site directly east of KKR Park. This area was purchased by the city last year.

The initial plans called for two floors. One above ground would be 100 ft. by 100 ft.; the one below ground would be 100 ft. by 50 ft. The plans were drawn up by Texico student Brandon Schauf.

## Farwell councilmen want your views

The Farwell City Council discussed a situation Tuesday in which they want residents to give them their views. Here's the problem:

Farwell recently accepted donation of the former Rose Drugs building adjacent to City Hall. Plans call for the building to be used for city storage or fixed up and used for small group meetings.

The problem is the roof needs replacing. It has three holes (about 4 ft. by ft. each) and rain coming into the building has caused some wood to rot.

The council doesn't have all the estimates it wants yet on repairing the roof, but it could run from \$2,000 to \$7,000. Then extensive work would be needed to repair the inside of the building.

The alternative would be to tear the building down. But because of its wall structure adjoining City Hall and the Lee's Electric building, this would be a costly expense also. And this also would leave an ugly gap between the two buildings still standing.

Mayor Chris Gikas supports repairing the building gradually.

The council was unable to reach a decision and tabled the

 - Okayed a building permit for John Nigreville to add a deck to his house. Water Supt. Dee Hammit already had given him the go-ahead.  
 - Appointed Edwina Owen as election judge in May. She will name her two assistants.  
 - Approved \$2,000 for the DARE drug education program in the Farwell Schools. It was up from \$1,500 last year.  
 - Denied a tax abatement request from Allsup's (see explanation in Parmer County Commissioners' story elsewhere in today's paper).  
 - Hear Hammit report that the water tower on 3rd Street will be sand blasted.

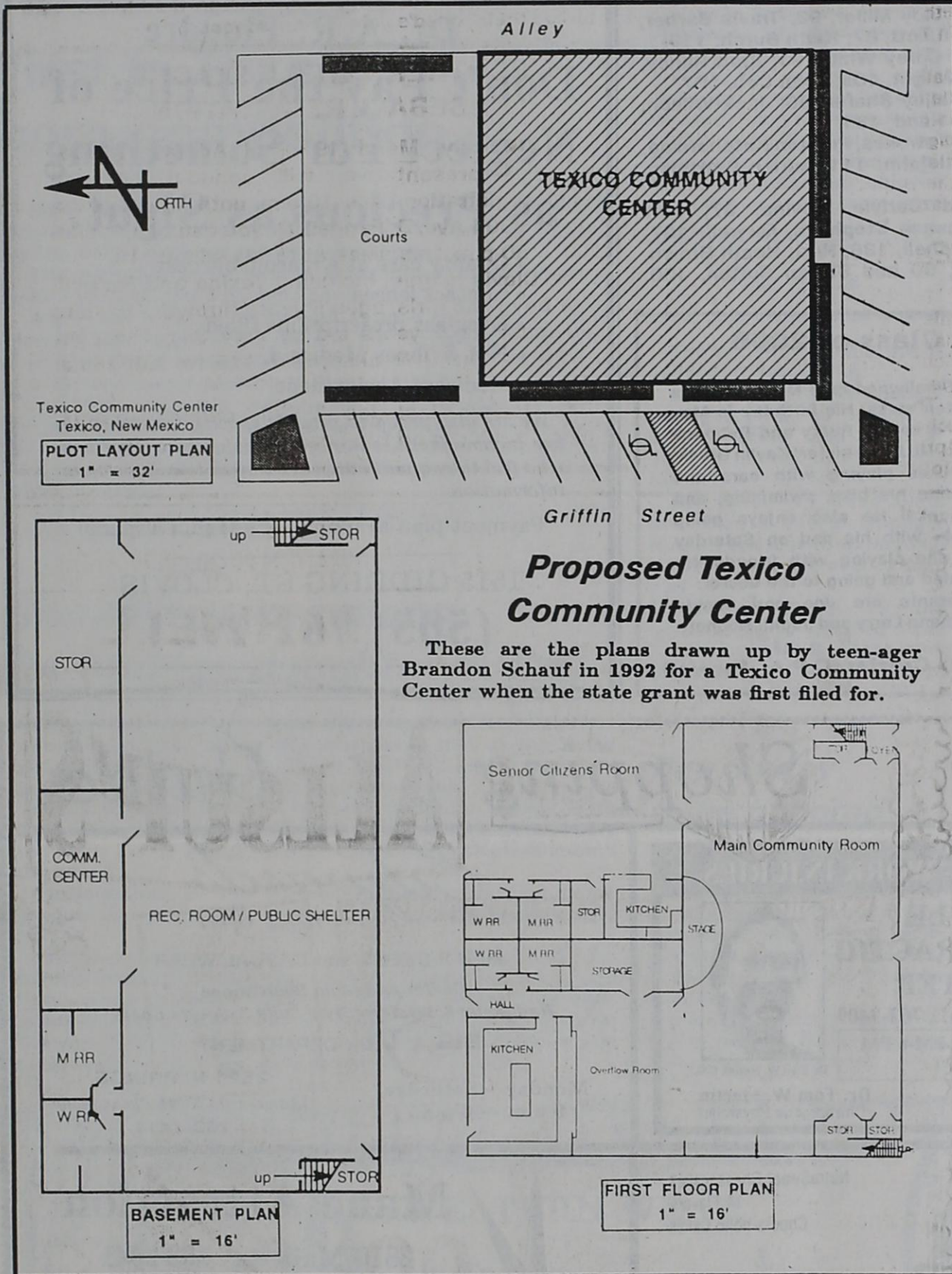

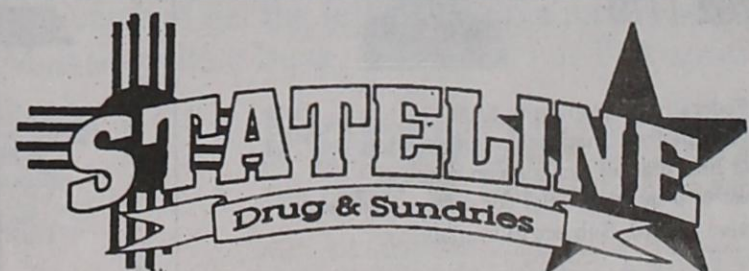
Adults may jokingly comment that children can more easily open "child-resistant" containers than they can. However, the Consumer Product Safety Commission's act requiring child-resistant packaging on aspirin products reduced the number of deaths in children attributed to aspirin from 46 in 1972 to only 1 in 1990.

Child-resistant packaging should always be used properly. Products, such as over the counter and prescription medications, required to be in special packaging should never be transferred to other containers.

If you have trouble opening child-resistant containers, and have no small children in your home, just ask for "easy open" closures from your pharmacist.

## Letter To The Editor

Dear Mike,

The Texico Fire Department has received its annual statistical report from the New Mexico Health and Environment Department Health Services Division Emergency Medical Services Bureau.

These statistics are compiled from service reports completed by the Fire Department and pertain to the annual ambulance calls made during 1993.

The Texico ambulance responded to 76 calls for help during the year. Of these calls, 49 were medical problems, 8 were vehicular accidents, 8 were falls, 2 were violence related, 1 was employment related and 8 were classified as miscellaneous.

The statistic that Texico and surrounding area residents can be most proud of is the fast response time. Response time is the time duration when a call is received by the dispatcher until the ambulance arrives at the scene to provide medical care. Texico's average response time is 3.9 minutes.

Seventy-four of the 76 calls were staffed by EMT-IV technicians. This allows for a high level of care to be given to patients as soon as possible. These personnel administer IV's, dextrose (D50), and the drug Narcan. Cardiac defibrillation and monitoring is in the near future.

The members of the Texico Fire Department thank everyone for all of the support that has been shown during the past year. We will continue to give the best possible service available.
