The American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) has become involved in the Gustin case.
On Jan. 27, Donnie and Mary Gustin, of Farwell, on behalf of their son, Charlie, filed a lawsuit in federal court in Amarillo against the Farwell School Board.
Charlie, a Farwell High senior, has refused to go along with the school district's new drug testing policy for students participating in extra-curricular activities. His father said, basically, the suit asks the board to reinstate his son in extra-curricular activities. Charlie has lost a role in the oneact play, his place on the computer science team and UIL math
Carrie Sperling, an attorney with the ACLU office in Austin, told the Tribune that the state group's legal panel took up the matter Jan. 31 and decided to investigate more into it and research it further. Then they will decide whether to take The case
The attorney said the state chapter can move ahead on this without national office approval. She said this is the first lawsuit she is aware of involving drug testing for students in extra-curricular activities. The U.S. Supreme Court has ruled in favor of drug testing for athletes.
The Farwell School Board will have its regular February meeting on Monday instead of the normal Tuesday, because of the possibility of a Farwoll basketball team being in the state playoffs (see story elsewhere in today's paper). The Gustins had said they wanted the board to hold a specia meeting earlier on their situation but this wasn't done.
The board meeting will be at 7 p.m. in the superinten dent's office. School Supt. Richard Boothby said the board will meet in executive session (due to pending litigation) with Jeff Rogers, of the Houston legal firm of Seldman and Rogers. This law firm was assigned to Farwell by the schoo district's casualty company.
The Gustin case is not on the open agenda. School officials said no hearing was requested. Donnie Gustin told the Tribune he had other plans for Monday.

Parmer County was created on Aug. 26, 1876, after the Texas Committee on State Affairs had recommended that a capital reservation tract be established for the purpose of
providing a state capital at Austin.
Most know the century old story that the Capitol in Austin was built in exchange for 3 million acres that became the XIT Ranch.
Parmer County was named for Martin Parmer, who was born and raised in Virginia. He came to Texas in 1825 and located at Mount Prairie in Cherokee County. In 1836, he represented San Augustine at the Constitutional Convention. He was one of the signers of the Texas Constitution.
The first courthouse of Parmer County was located at Parmerton. The Parmerton Townsite Company owned a frame $28 \times 30$ foot building that the county used for several years. The frame building was built by Henry Sloan and C.M. Clark for han $\$ 360$, This ado wault was built from adobe bricks that han $\$ 360$, thi were made of soil dug from nearby draws and playa lakes. Commissioners Court calling for a county seat election. The election was held on Dec. 10, 1907, and Farwell received 99 votes out of 126 cast, and Farwell was declared the county votes

The county records were removed from the temporary courthouse in Parmerton to the building known as the Hamin Brourthouse until it was razed by fire on May 19 1913. After the fire, remaining records and furniture were moved to a building on 3rd Street. This building served as the

The courthouse and a new county jail were erected in 191 by W.M. Rice Construction, of Amarillo. The architect for the project was C. Risner, of Amarillo.
The courthouse monies came from a bond election of $\$ 50,000$ held on Aug. 9, 1913. The cost of the new 3 -story courthouse, without its furnishings, was $\$ 43,243$. The cost of the new jail was not to exceed $\$ 3,000$.
County officials moved into the new building in 1917. The 3 rd floor contained offices and a balcony for observing court proceedings in the county courtroom.
The original jail constructed at the time the courthouse was built was a single-story building. A second story was added to the jail in 1927 after the trial of mass murderer George J . Has sell. Hassell was found guily of murder and was sentenced Court felt that a second story to the jail would help prevent Court felt that a second prisoners from escaping
The courthouse was remodeled in 1930 and 1940. In 1974, an anf's department. An elevator was constructed in 1990 in the courthouse, and the 3rd floor remodeling was completed in 1991. Renovation on the 2nd floor began in 1992.
