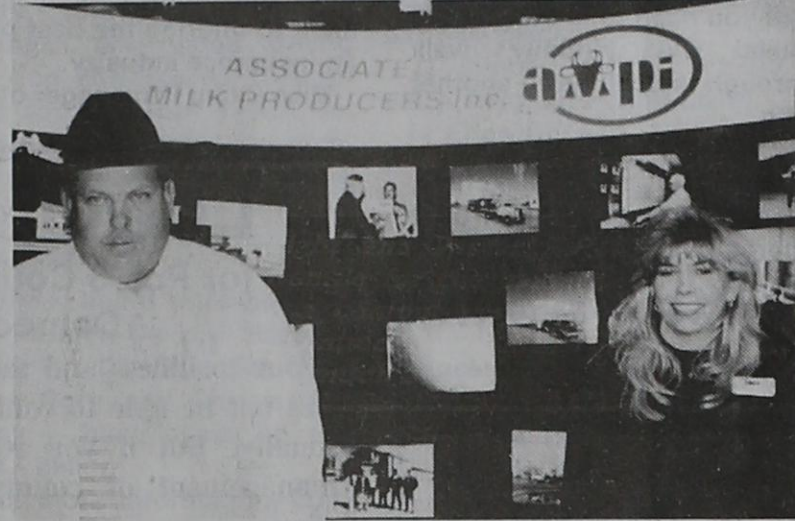

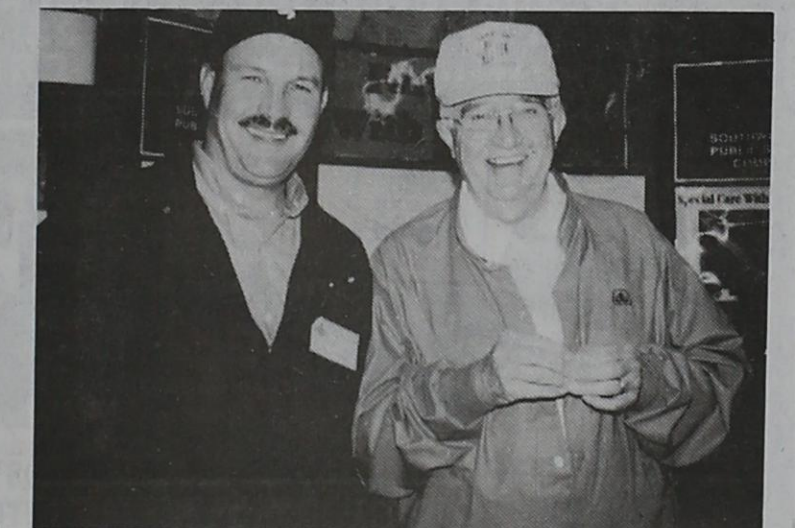

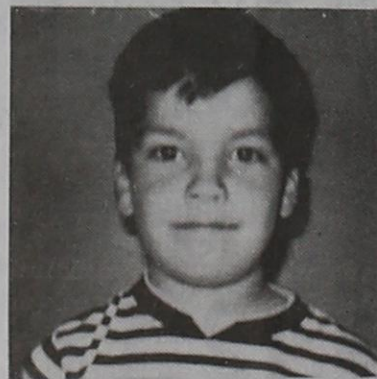
## Youngster returns lost paycheck

## Texico elects Herrington, Queener, Warmuth, Salguero

Texico held its election Tuesday, and has a new city councilman and a new city judge.

In the judge's race, former city judge George Herrington defeated incumbent Carol Snider, 82-55. Herrington had quit last year and Mrs. Snider was appointed to replace him.

Willie Ronquillo had been a write-in candidate for city judge but was found to be legally disqualified for the post. So no votes for him were counted.

In the race for the two 4-year council seats, incumbents Rick Queener and Ronnie Warmuth won. Queener received 107 votes and Warmuth got 77. Also running were Max Carter, 46 votes, and Ron Pageau, 27 votes.

In the race for the single 2-year council seat, Art Salguero Jr. defeated Dean Henning, 73-63. Ricky Qualls had been the incumbent but didn't seek re-election.

## Taylor, Smith resign

Two employee resignations were received at Tuesday's Farwell School Board meeting.

Larry Smith, the high school chemistry and physics teacher, resigned.

And Jimmy Taylor resigned as varsity girls' basketball coach. In his letter, he asked to stay on as a teacher here. There is no post available curriculum.

Friona was mentioned in the latest newsletter from the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission.

The article dealt with the tornadoes that struck Pampa and Friona in June.

The article noted that

Friona put a \$200,000 estimate on its cleanup. It received a check for \$160,000 from the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs to put its storm-damaged waste water treatment plant back into operation.

Friona provided \$40,000 to match the state grant.

City Manager Paula Wilson was quoted, "The TDHCA grant was a Godsend for Friona. There's no way we were planning to replace our treatment plant any time soon. That would have been a big chunk of our budget."

Former Farwell CPA Jim Berry, who now works in Lubbock, was listed among the Top 25 financial consultants for the Dean Witter Co. And he was No. 1 in the company's mutual funds category.

## Cop from New York comes to Texico

Talk about a change of pace -- a New York City cop becoming a police officer in Texico, N.M.!

That's exactly what happened to Tim Kelly, 25, who moved from Queens, one of New York City's boroughs, to Texico last August.

Tim had been a NYC police officer for 3 1/2 years. His father has been on the same force for 32 years.

Tim was stationed in Brooklyn. At first, he "worked patrol" -- riding in a police car while wearing a uniform, answering calls ranging from domestic violence to robberies to "man with gun." Then he moved to the anti-crime unit, where he now was in plain clothes, but basically covering the same types of crime. He also worked in the "public morals" area, trying to cut down on prostitution.

During his tenure in Brooklyn, Tim has lots of stories to tell. At various times, he was threatened with an ice pick, had a couch dropped from the fifth floor of an apartment building onto his squad car, been attacked by a man wielding a 4-foot sword (his bullet-proof vest saved his life), and been shot at numerous times. Fortunately, he was never hit by a bullet.

One of his partners in NYC, Lawrence Plotkin, had married an Air Force girl, and moved to Clovis. Plotkin got a job on the Curry County sheriff's department and began urging Kelley to give up all the stress of the big city and move out this way.

So when Tim visited Plotkin to see New Mexico's wide-open spaces, he applied at the Clovis and Texico police departments. Both wanted him, and he chose Texico.

Why did he leave the Big Apple? In a word, stress. Tim explained there was job stress from people, bosses, the whole situation. "And it's a dangerous job that no one seems to appreciate," he added.

Recalling the man who attacked him with a sword, Tim said he had to fend him off with his night stick. Tim couldn't draw his gun because if he took the night stick out of his right hand to go for his gun, the man could have killed him while he tried.

It's a whole new ball game in Texico. Tim works 4 days a week and is on call another 25 hours. He works most weekends, which is what he wanted because it allowed him to sign up for courses at Eastern New Mexico University. He is scheduled to get his bachelor's degree in criminal justice next January.

This was another important reason for leaving NYC -- he

now has the time to pursue his education. And down the road he plans to go after a master's degree.

Asked the obvious question of the differences between New York and Texico, Tim responded, "The people are a lot nicer here. Back in New York, people have become desensitized; they don't seem to care about anyone else."

As an example, he told about a murder scene at a supermarket where some folks crossed over the body to get eggs from a counter.

The work he does here also is a lot different. The key is the lack of stress. His patrols in Texico include traffic enforcement, some domestic squabbles, a bit of vandalism and an occasional burglary.

Does he miss the New York scene? Not hardly. He cited one damning statistic: 18 New York City cops commit suicide every year -- with stress the overwhelming cause. He had one friend kill himself just last month.

Meanwhile, some of his old friends in New York keep in touch -- and consider coming out here themselves. Another buddy is now working in Tucumcari and Tim expects several others to follow, also.

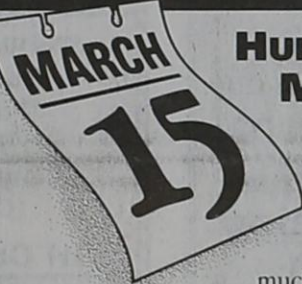





# 'Compassionate friends' organized

A chapter of "The Compassionate Friends" has been established in Lazbuddie to serve our area.

Membership is open to all parents and siblings who have experienced the death of a child.

The group meets the second Thursday of each month at 7:30 p.m. at the Lazbuddie Methodist Church fellowship hall.

Group facilitator is Jan Thompson, from Levelland. She is assisted by Glenda Jennings, of Lazbuddie. For more information, persons may call Mrs. Thompson, 894-6138, or Mrs. Jennings, 96502483.

The following information was provided by the group:

"The death of a child is one of the most devastating life experiences, regardless of the child's age. There is no way to prepare parents and surviving children on how to cope with such a tragedy.

"The Compassionate Friends is an international support group for bereaved parents and siblings. It offers friendship and understanding. Group members have learned that the death of a child has caused pain that can best be understood fully by other bereaved parents.

"Knowing that all need love and support, we reach out as our own grief subsides to those who still feel alone and abandoned. We believe that bereaved parents can help each other toward a positive resolution

of their grief. We also understand that each parent much find his or her own way through the grief experience.

"Expressing thoughts and feelings are part of the healing process. This realization was discovered by Rev. Simon Stephens in England in 1969. He was a hospital chaplain who was called upon to comfort two bereaved families in the hospital. He discovered that they had far more to say and share with each other than he could ever say to comfort them.

"He later began working with families which set up The Society of Compassionate Friends. In the U.S., the group was incorporated in 1978 and a national headquarters set up near Chicago. The group has grown to over 700 chapters organized by bereaved parents who volunteer their time and effort in their communities.

"Research studies document that grief from the death of a child is more severe, when compared to grief over any other loss."

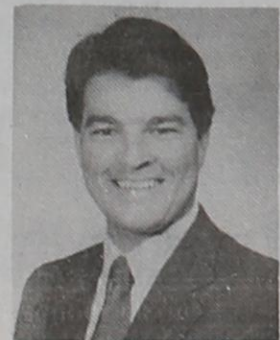

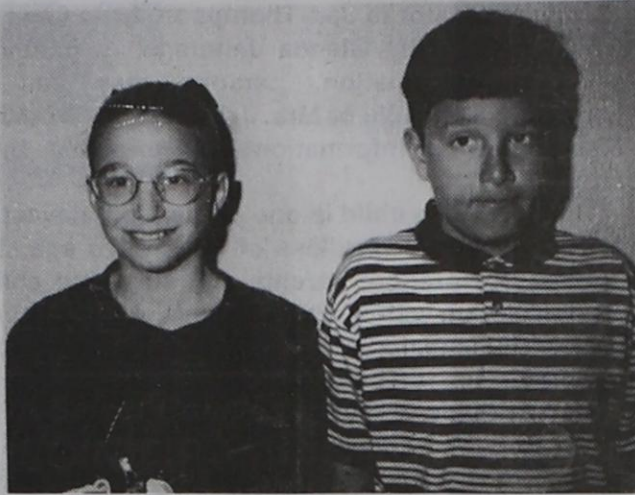
