Three suspects in Prather killing arraigned in Clovis

Three suspects in the Dec. 11 killing of Playorama owner Red Prather were arraigned in Clovis on Dec. 23.

Not guilty pleas were entered for Michael Treadway, 18; Ronald Armstrong, who just turned 19, and Billy Joe Galvan, 17.

Treadway, who returned to Farwell in December, is charged with first degree murder, robbery with a deadly weapon and conspiracy to commit armed robbery.

Treadway is held without bond.

Armstrong, of the Lariat area, is charged with conspir-Cacy to commit armed robbery, accessory to armed robbery and harboring a felon.

Galvan, of Farwell, is charged with accessory to armed robbery, conspiracy to commit armed robbery and harboring a felon.

Do not depend on children, parents, grandparents, preachers, popes, priests, pastors, prophets, or creeds. The only sure-fire way to know the truth is to abide in the Word of Christ. "If ye abide in My word...ye shall know the truth" (John 8:31,32).

In the dawn of history, the serpent (Satan) beguiled Eve in his craftiness (2 Cor. 11:3). She was misled by guile, by artifice and craft. She was tricked!
