Darned if you do, darned if you don't

Out in the Rhea Community, there has been a complaint about the condition of County Road C for quite some time. The complaint was brought to Precinct 2 County Commissioner Tom Ware by Curtis Drager.

Drager lives and farms land that is located on CR C. The complaint is that the sides of the road are too soft and the ditches are too steep. Drager feels the road is unsafe to drive on and that someone is going to get hurt. "It wouldn't take anything for a vehicle to slide off the road in the soft dirt and flip over in those ditches," Drager commented.

He was especially concerned about the road conditions during the winter snow and rains.

The complaint is valid, but the situation of how to best handle this particular road is one that presents a dilemma for Ware.

Last fall, the road was in the reverse condition of being very flat and the ditches were almost even with the road. It needed to be built up and ditches needed to be restructured.

"I admit that after building up the road, the ditches are pretty deep and the road is narrow," said Ware. "However, this particular road is critical to a section of 5 or 6 mile drag that carries the water runoff from snow melt and rains. From all the information we received, this region was due to get quite a bit of snow and winter rains this year, so we felt it was necessary to build C.R. C up and to dig out the ditches to an extreme."

The road will broaden out as it is travelled and the soft sides of the road will pack back in. Ware also commented that the road is built to resist washout from the spring and early summer rains.

C.R. C intersects with FM 1013, which is the main highway through the Rhea Community. The intersection should not have any standing water or dirt buildup because of the slope of the ditches and the running water capacity that they should now handle.

Rotary Club sponsors youth employment project

Sheriff Rex Williams announced last month his resignation, effective April 30.

The Parmer County Commissioners are receiving applications for the post, with a deadline of April 9.

Besides Bonham and Armstrong, four other persons have applied:

-- Farwell Police Chief Roy McGaa.

-- Parmer County sheriff's chief deputy Bryan Thurmond.

-- Parmer County sheriff's deputy Gary Blair.

-- Retired Bovina police officer Mel Clark.

Bonham is a former Parmer County sheriff's deputy.

Armstrong has been a deputy sheriff in Arkansas and Louisiana. He also has run a security agency in the Cayman Islands.

His family's history goes back in Parmer County quite a ways -- his grandparents were married in Bovina in 1900.

Several people had approached Friona Police Chief Randy Geris about the post but it would have meant a much lower salary so he has told them he wouldn't seek the sheriff's job. Also, his wife is a Friona native and their children attend Friona Schools.

Friona police officer Walt Yarger had applied for the sheriff's job, but has withdrawn his application.

After the April 9 deadline, the county commissioners will review the applicants and interview the ones they choose to. Then a selection will be made.

The new sheriff will hold office until the votes are canvassed after the Nov. 3 general election.

Sept. 4 is the deadline for the Parmer County Democrat and Republican executive committees to place candidates' names on the November ballot. See story elsewhere in today's Tribune for further information on this.

Also, write-in candidates will be accepted.

Parmer County Judge Bonnie Clayton asked that the Tribune clarify statements attributed to her in last week's issue.

Morning is just another word for burden when your heart is breaking. The sun broke with hues but Mary's eyes were dimmed with tears. The events of the last hours played like a mournful song over and over in her soul. She struggled to make her aching arms reach for kindling to start the morning fire and prayed that its heat would blanket her shivering spirit.

Dread and duty make passes across her mind as she gathered spices and fragrant oils to anoint the lifeless form of the Giver of life. Her steps to the tomb were certainly slow and heavy.

We don't know much about the journey but we do know about its end. We know that resurrection power changed a benediction into a glorious invocation. We do know that Christ rose with such force that giant boulder across His tomb rolled from its place and crushed the demonic dreams of a Roman government. Love that only moments before was bound to another's cross, now burst forth from another's grave.

John the Apostle records a tender moment from the hallowed history of the resurrection (John 20:1-18). A single word pierces the awkward silence of a Lord's Day visit to the garden tomb. "Mary." Mary of Magdala heard the Savior speak her name.

She was among the few who ministered to Jesus temporarily during His earthly pilgrimage. Evil hearts have conjured an immoral relationship out of sacrilege to the sinless Lamb of God. Having been delivered from seven demons by the authority of the Galilean, she was there as a freed slave paying her loving respects to her benefactor.

"Mary." It was such a personal word in that impersonal setting. It was as if Jesus was saying, "I know who you are. I am not someone far removed, as you first thought. I am alive, not dead. I am here with you, not gone away."

The resurrection of the Lord Jesus Christ is a personal work to all of us. Easter is a calendar date marking the wonderful moment when the miracle of life over death walked from the pages of antiquity onto the pavements of our life.

As a hundred hearts rejoice over the voice of a survivor buried beneath the rubble of an earthquake-decimated building, our hearts rejoice to hear Christ's resurrection voice. The seeming rubble of His earthly plans could not keep Him buried. The scribes and Pharisees of His time would have shuddered to hear the songwriter, "He speaks, and the sound of His voice is so sweet that the birds hush their singing; and the melody that He gave to me within my heart is ringing."

"Mary." That was surely a purposeful word. The Scripture says she came to the tomb while it was still dark but the stone was "already taken away." Heaven had prepared a miracle for her misery even before she arrived on the scene. The resurrection is a veritable banquet prepared and set before every seeking heart, thirsting and hungering for righteousness.

During the Persian Gulf war a family received the dreaded knock at the door. An officer notified them that their son was killed in action. But days later, their grief turned to jubilation when they learned the message was in error. Soon a plane touched down and their son, very much alive, descended the steps to the joyous celebration of his family.

"He spoke Mary's name that day. He speaks ours on this day."

Jesus was killed in action. There's no doubt about it. "Christ died for our sins...and was buried" (1 Cor. 15:3,4). But all of our grief turned to jubilation on the day when the devil's chief device was forever demolished. He spoke Mary's name that day. He speaks ours on this day: "I am the resurrection and the life. He that believes on Me, though he were dead, yet shall he live."

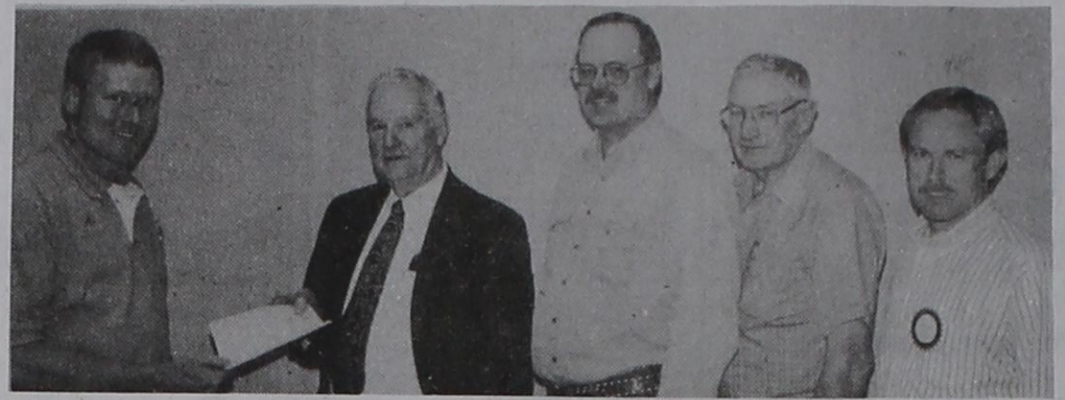
Savings for the 1996-97 school year totalled \$29,634. This made Farwell ISD a Gold Award recipient.
