# Combest offers plan to help producers

An update on crop insurance reform efforts from Plains Cotton Growers:

June was a busy one for legislators ad commodity organizations as the search for both short and long-term reforms to the federal crop insurance program gathered strength.

A number of the reform plans have already been submitted as bills in the House of Representatives and the Senate. PCG has focused much its efforts for short-term relief toward finding ways to improve the problems producers face from declining APH (Actual Production History) values.

PCG is also working to develop a core set of ideas that cotton producers feel should guide the next evolution of the crop insurance program. Among the most important long-term concepts PCG has communicated is the need for higher levels of coverage at affordable premium levels.

Part of the effort being seen in Washington right now is geared around finding the best way to utilize some \$6 billion in additional funding for crop insurance secured earlier this year through the efforts of House Ag Committee Chairman Larry Combest and Ranking Ag Committee Member Charles Stenholm.

Combest's focus for the money appears to be to apply it toward additional premium subsidy in an effort to decrease

the cost to producers.

Key parts of the Combest plan include:

(1) The option for a producer with ten years of APH history to be allowed a one-time APH adjustment through the elimination of low yields that may be dragging their APH calculation down. The producer would be allowed to drop one yield occurring during the period 1990-1994 and to drop one yield during the 1995-1999 period.

(2) Subsidy levels increased beyond 30 percent discount provided by 1998 disaster legislation with producer given ability to select any combination of price election and yield coverage level.

(3) Expand Board of Directors of the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation by 3 positions, for a total of four from the federal government and six from private industry (four producers).

(4) Except in double-cropping areas, a producer who receives an indemnity for a primary crop would be limited to catastrophic coverage only on planting of a second crop.

These are only a few of the ideas included in the Combest Proposal and this is by no means the last word on the issue. Combest has scheduled a meeting for the week of July 5 during which industry feed-back on the proposal will be accepted. Combest's goal is incorporate the necessary modifications before the final legislation is crafted to avoid the need for more changes later on.

With as many as five prospective reform bills there is a lot of variety and innovation being shown in regard to how to tackle crop insurance's problems. PCG will continue to evaluate these proposals and encourage those involved to take the best ideas out there and utilize them to make the program better for the producers who rely on it.





Well, folks, this is the col- creases over the past few umn I've been dreading to years have literally forced my write for quite some time. But hand. the time has come.

On July 29, the Tribune will be raising its circulation rates.

I have avoided this for as long as I could but economics have forced the issue. We have not had a rate increase for several years but the mail costs have been climbing virtually every year.

Currently, we have been charging \$12.50 a year for our local readers. To show how far behind we have fallen, the Friona paper charges \$20 and the Muleshoe paper charges \$24.

That is quite a disparity. In fact, it has gotten to the point where it costs us more than \$12.50 in mail costs to send the Tribune to our readers in **Texico and Clovis.** 

That's right.

And I don't think anyone will argue with me about it not being very good business sense to sell a product at less than it costs to make.

So, I have to bite the bullet and raise our rates. On July 29, our annual rate will go up to \$15 for subscribers in Curry, Parmer and Bailey counties.

Elsewhere, the rate will change from \$22 a year to \$26 a year.

In conjunction with this change, the cost of newspapers sold on the newsstands will increase from 25¢ to 50¢.

For a business like a weekly newspaper, we have to keep annual subscription rates cheaper than sales of


But I do hope you feel that the Tribune provides a service to you and our community.


Cantu said that he was very disappointed at the time, but he can look back at it and laugh now.

# **Pest Management** Update

Parmer County Entomologist **Cherinell Riley** 

I received reports of fleahopper infestations about two weeks ago from area agri-businesses. However, these pests are still a problem in some fields. Populations reached threshold this week and last in many IPM program fields.

Cotton fleahoppers are about 1/8 of an inch long and pale green. Nymphs resemble adults but lack fully developed wings. Both move rapidly when disturbed. Adults move from weed host when cotton begins to square. In this area, the primary host is white weed (nightshade). Both adults and nymphs suck sap from small squares.


Lygus bugs (aka plant bugs) are being found. There are several different species that attack cotton. Lygus are about 1/4" in length and vary from green to brown, although the ones I have seen here are more yellowish than green. Like the fleahopper, lygus feeding results in the shedding of squares. However, lygus can feed on matchhead to pencil eraser sized squares.

If you are checking your cotton for fleahoppers and lygus, be sure not to shade the plant as you kneel down to check it. The fleahoppers will jump from the plant before you can properly inspect it. If you find a lygus nymph, count it as two. Nymphs are the juvenile stage of lygus without fully developed wings. If the wings do not extend to the tip of the abdomen, this is probably a nymph.

Tiffany Edwards and Candy Davis are two examples of students who are working for the summer.



While working there, Candy said that she has learned about how government and the county works.




