Building plans come to a halt in Texico

The Texico City Council plans to contact the state's top elected officials in order to try and solve a serious problem that the state has put upon the community.

To make a long story short, the state Construction Services Division has told Texico it cannot use Clovis' building and plumbing inspectors -- but must use the state inspectors.

The problem is that the state inspectors don't come to Texico very often.

The result is a breakdown in building plans in Texico. Projects have come to a halt.

Councilman Rick Queener, whose planned bus company building is affected by this mess, said he sent a letter to the council on Dec. 14 about the problem. But state officials told him by telephone that it wasn't received.

So the council plans to contact Gov. Gary Johnson and Lt. Gov. Walter Bradley and seek their help.

Along the same lines, another state decision is about to put the hurt on Texico.

Water Supt. Matt Meeks explained that if you serve water to the public from a well, you need to get periodic samples tested. In Texico's case, that's once a month.

Meeks said the testing station in Clovis is being closed by the state because one employee is retiring and the other moved away.

So instead of running to Clovis to bring the samples, the nearest next facility is Tucumcari. But Meeks said that station is city-owned and the state may not accept it, meaning the samples will have to be taken to Las Cruces or Albuquerque or wherever.

This situation affects many businesses and governmental entities in this area.

In other business, the council:

-- Plans to discuss raising the dog license fees at its next meeting. City dog warden Darrell Hampton recommended raising the annual fee from \$3 to \$5.

He said 52 dogs were licensed in 1998, with between 50 and 100 other dogs going unlicensed in Texico.

-- Received a request from Josephine Wilhite to add a mobile home to her property at 801 Hereford. The council will measure the property, then discuss it again at its next meeting.

-- Heard some good news on the street repair project which had had a deadline of Dec. 31, 1998, for completion. About a \$45,000 state grant is involved.

The council learned that the deadline has been extended to April 30 for these funds to be used.

-- Had councilman Eddie Dunsworth ask about a complaint he had received of a woman living on Wheeler Avenue had starved a dog to death.

Hampton said he checked it out and was told by the dog's owner that the death was due to "having worms."

Hampton said he found food at the location.

Farwell's Raquel Cantu earned a spot on the All-State Band.

Phil Warren resigned as Lazbuddie school superintendent to become the Olton superintendent.

Problems within the Farwell fire department became public, resulting in a split later in the year between the firefighters and the ambulance service.

Paul Castillo, a Texico 14 year old, was seriously injured in a cycle accident.

Texico junior livestock champions were Zane Drager, Shayna Lewis and Braeden Hadley.

March

Marie Christian was elected Texico mayor.

Farwell student Ben Oppliger opened a web site on the Internet.

A new boll weevil eradication zone, including Parmer County, is recommended.

Parmer County Sheriff Rex Williams resigned.

Farwell High School Principal Larry Gregory is hired as the new Farwell Schools' superintendent.

Texico city clerk-treasurer Rebecca Gear resigned.

Texico's Richard Ortiz was sentenced to prison on drug charges.

Lazbuddie High School Principal Hardy Carlyle is hired as the new Lazbuddie Schools' superintendent.

April

Ralph Franse was re-elected as Farwell Chamber of Commerce president.

Cherinell Riley was named as the new Parmer County entomologist, replacing Mark Logan, who took a job with Farwell Spraying Service.

A marker honoring Joe Helton was dedicated at Lions Park in Texico.

Freda Neie was named Texico Chamber of Commerce president.

Shari Swenson was named Texico city clerk treasurer.

Gary Robbins announced he would seek the state representative's post, representing Texico, in the GOP primary against incumbent Earlene Roberts.

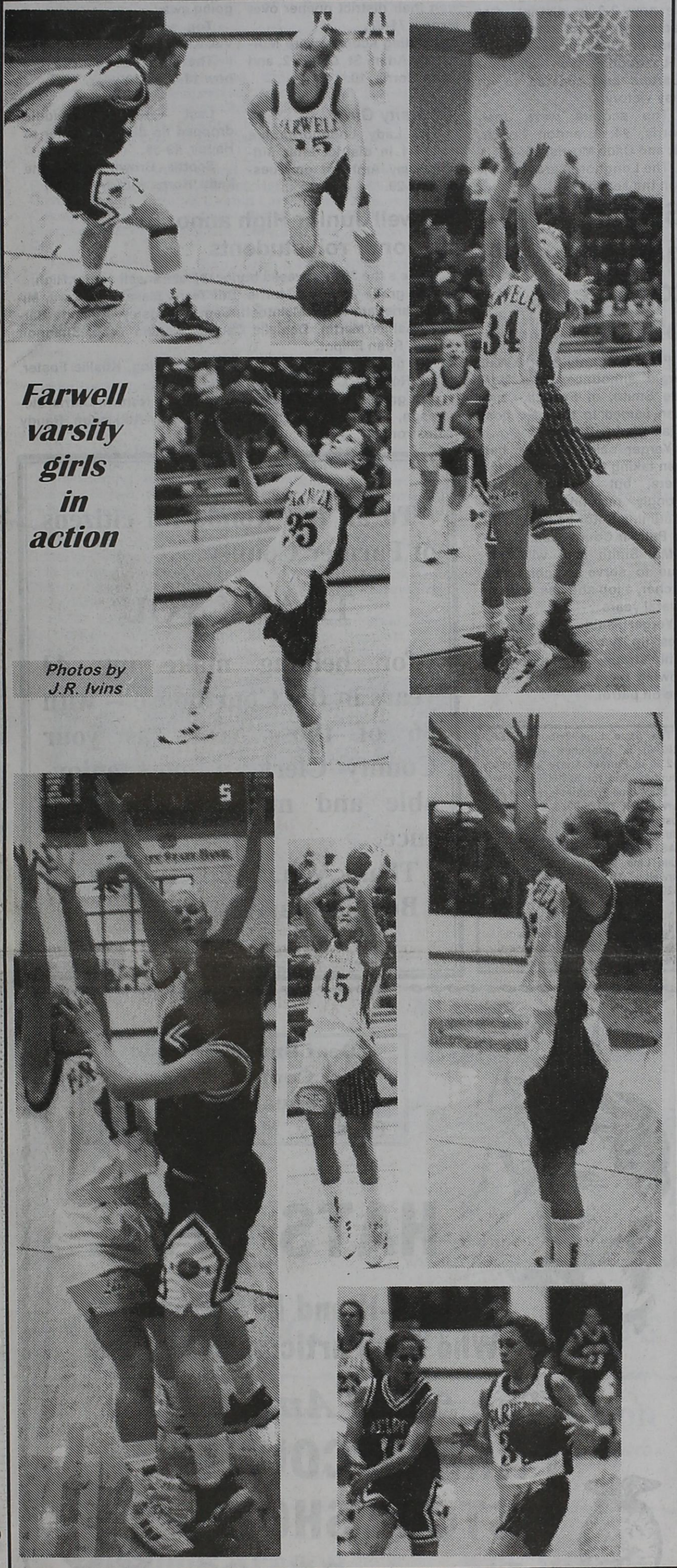
Walt Yerger was named Parmer County Sheriff by the Parmer County Commissioners.

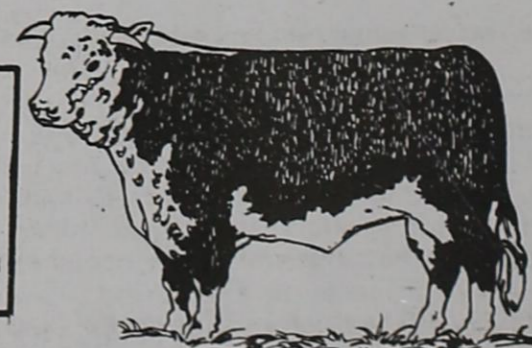



# Hancock: Are we becoming a nation of always trying to blame someone else?

(Editor's note: The Tribune asked retiring Farwell area Justice of the Peace Louise Hancock to write about what she has learned over the years in her job. Following is her report.)

Mike asked my several weeks ago to put something in writing of my feelings about the nine years I was JP. I have heard every excuse that could be thought up about why people were breaking the law.

Are we becoming a nation of always trying to blame someone or something else for the things that we do? The DPS troopers, sheriff's department and city police are there to keep us safe by enforcing the laws. If everyone feels that the rules are for others and put themselves above these laws, what kind

of a role model are we being to our children and grandchildren?

The seat belt laws are for our protection. Have you ever seen a child thrown through a windshield or out of the vehicle because we don't feel it's important to keep them in a car seat or buckled up? They see the things we do and say. If we lie in their presence, what can we expect from them? We must accept the responsibility for them, too.

Legislation has been passed stating that for those under 21 years of age there is zero tolerance as far as alcohol is concerned. Possession or drinking is a violation. Driver's licenses must be suspended and a fine not to exceed \$100, plus eight hours of community service. Is the drinking worth it?

Accepting responsibility for our actions is one place I feel we are glossing over. Is it the officer's fault if he stops you for speeding? Do your children see you as you deny that you are at fault? Do you blame teachers for your child not knowing how to read, do math and gain knowledge? Or do you insist that your child gets his/her homework and you try to help them if it's necessary. Is it our responsibility to see that they are doing what is necessary to learn?

To see a change in our society, that change must first take place in us. We must be an example before we can get their attention. We must walk our talk or it means nothing.

Young people, if you think that you are responsible enough to drive, then obey the rules. Don't just get in a car and go as fast as it will go because you aren't experienced enough to handle emergencies. There are speed limits because, as I said before, they keep us safe.

I would like to see the citations go to zero -- please obey the law and save your money.

Being JP has indeed been an experience, if nothing else. I hope I have been unbiased and fair in my tenure. The people of this precinct have certainly honored me by their trust. I thank God for all of you.

# Advanced math plays an important role in police work after car accidents

If ever in your lifetime you have questioned the reasons for learning advanced mathematics, please take note of the following information.

I admit to being one of those high school students sitting in my Physics, Calculus and Trigonometry classes, muttering to myself inside of my head "Why is this necessary to know?"

Advanced mathematics play a very important role in the State of Texas, especially in the jobs of our dedicated of the troopers on the Texas State Highway Patrol.

Since 1984, State Trooper Craig Hunt of Farwell, has been a member of a six-member team from various outposts in the Panhandle, that uses such advanced mathematics to solve questions, or the mysteries around, about how auto accidents occur.

This team gets called in to work on cases in the region that encompasses the entire Panhandle, down to Lubbock, across to Wichita Falls and down to Midland.

A District Attorney or State Police Sergeant will call the team in to help prepare the evidence of exactly how an accident took place, start to finish.

"The basic laws of Physics are at work in every instance driving and maneuvering an automobile," said Hunt. "By very carefully examining the wreckage, the site, reviewing the conditions on the road, visibilities, etc., we can exactly reconstruct an accident. We can do this both on paper and through computer animation and simulation."

While all State Troopers are qualified and trained to reconstruct accidents, the six-member team and the equipment they are specially trained on allows for more thorough and auto specific reconstruction. These reconstructions are critical to court cases, insurance investigations and to various divisions within State offices.

A reconstruction begins by studying the aforementioned elements. Hunt will then make use of a "Laser Transit" to gather the coordinates of the wreck. These coordinates are put into an Auto Cad program that will automatically draw the scene out. From the positions of the vehicles, bodies, tires, metal fragments and such, a "co-efficient of friction" can be determined. All objects have Kinetic energy and this co-efficient is very important to know so that the velocity (speed) going into that friction can be plugged into the reconstruction factors.

Once the particular make and model of a vehicle is determined, the team will then turn to the "VC2000." This is a small, computerized tracker, of sorts, that mounts into a vehicle of the same make and model, that needs to be tested for speed, wheel lock-up, braking and other equipment function.

"All vehicles carry a different set of numbers when it comes to mass, volume and kinetic energy," said Hunt. "The VC2000 is just a very simple way of determining those factors as to the make, model and performance of that same-type vehicle. For instance, when testing wheel lock-ups, we know that when four wheels lock up, they will slide in different directions; (again depending on the mass, volume and kinetic energy involved in the vehicle). By using the VC2000 and testing the same type of vehicle, we can determine that direction and the velocity the vehicle went into a slide or locked-up situation."

The VC2000 is just one part of the type of equipment the team of Troopers use in their reconstructions. The computer is a major part of their team as well.

"Once we have all of the coordinates and numbers involved, we can enter them into our computer program and run a physical formula that will break the accident down into 30 frames per second. Once this breakdown is complete, Hunt will then sit down and animate the entire incident on "Total Station" software and computer equipment.

"Just by simply knowing the beginning and ending speeds of the vehicles involved in a wreck, I can actually pinpoint the position of the vehicles every 10 seconds leading up to the wreck, during the crash and following the impact until the vehicles come to a standstill," explained Hunt.

But do not be fooled into thinking that the art of reconstruction is quick science, achieved by entering numbers and coordinates into a computer. An animated reconstruction of a wreck can take over a month to build. This is due to the intense amount of research Hunt and his teammates put into the incident.

"It isn't just a matter of figuring acceleration and de-celeration," stated Hunt. "It's carefully measuring everything and then using the principals of physics, geometry, algebra, trigonometry...even basic addition and subtraction. There is more to all of it than meets the eye. Usually, any type case can be solved by gathering evidence by mathematical standards. It just takes some time."

Hunt was always the first to volunteer to reconstruct scenes as a rookie Trooper. He always had a head for numbers and seemed to retain the knowledge he gained in his mathematics courses throughout his schooling.

"I always knew there was a use for the advanced mathematics and I enjoyed the classes I took in them," he stated.

Hunt and the other team members have received advanced training in the applied mathematics, computer sciences and programming that go hand-in-hand with the art/science of accident reconstruction.

Hunt is also pretty handy at site-reconstruction with his specialized 35-mm camera. He can actually put the negatives of pictures taken at the scene of an accident back into his camera and put the coordinates back in place.

"Remember, in photography, the negatives are opposite the actual picture - a dark is a white, a white is a dark, so I can actually pinpoint the locations of headlights, metal fragments, skid marks, etc.," said Hunt.

Pinpointing and reconstructing the cause, or causes of an accident make for interesting days on the job for Hunt and his teammates. Hunt recalled with a laugh the time that the team was called in to reconstruct a particular accident:

"We'd been asked to animate an accident for a court case that was being disputed in a court case over in Wichita Falls," Hunt said. "This guy had been claiming he was innocent and that there was no way the accident was his fault and so on. We animated the incident and showed the entire accident, start to finish, in court. Upon seeing the whole deal, the guy plead guilty to the charges against him and the case was solved."

So, if you've ever been one to think that the applications for advanced mathematics is a great mystery in life, you just need to remember that, like Trooper Craig Hunt and his team of accident reconstructionists have witnessed, the numbers never lie and can solve some pretty great mysteries!

## The Chief's Corner

From Farwell Police Chief Roy McGaa:

If Emily Post were to write about manners during a traffic stop, she would probably write the following:

Peace officers live in a different world than we do but we can co-exist with them if we know some of the things they think about. In one form of communication or another they are briefed about each of the 150 plus deaths of fellow officers every year. They know that their brother officers are killed in large cities, small towns and rural areas. They know they are killed by hard core criminals, housewives, businessmen, professionals and children.

What they most likely don't know, is what kind of person we are. Each of us knows that we are basically a good person who wouldn't hurt a fly but we must understand that officers might not realize this. There are some things we can do to create a good impression for the officer and be polite at the same time. And they will appreciate your courtesy.

1. As soon as you see his red and blue lights, pull to the right and stop. If you are a criminal you will pretend that you don't see the officer while he is at a disadvantage, still seated and talking on his radio.

2. Remain seated in your vehicle unless the officer asks you to step out. If you are a criminal you want to get to the officer while he is at a disadvantage, still seated and talking on his radio.

3. Make no odd movements while coming to a stop. If you are a criminal you will want to reach under your seat or into your glove compartment for your pistol.

4. Keep your hands in plain sight, resting on the steering wheel is a good place. If you are a criminal you will want to have you hand on your pistol, between or under your legs or maybe between bucket seats.

5. Tell your passengers to keep quiet and remain in the vehicle. If you are a criminal you will want your passengers to distract the officer so you can get a clean shot at him.

6. After stopping, turn on your interior light at night. If you are a criminal you will want to keep the interior dark so the officer can't see your shotgun.

For a final point about what the officer is thinking about, say to yourself "One Mississippi, Two Mississippi." That is how long the usual gunfight lasts. 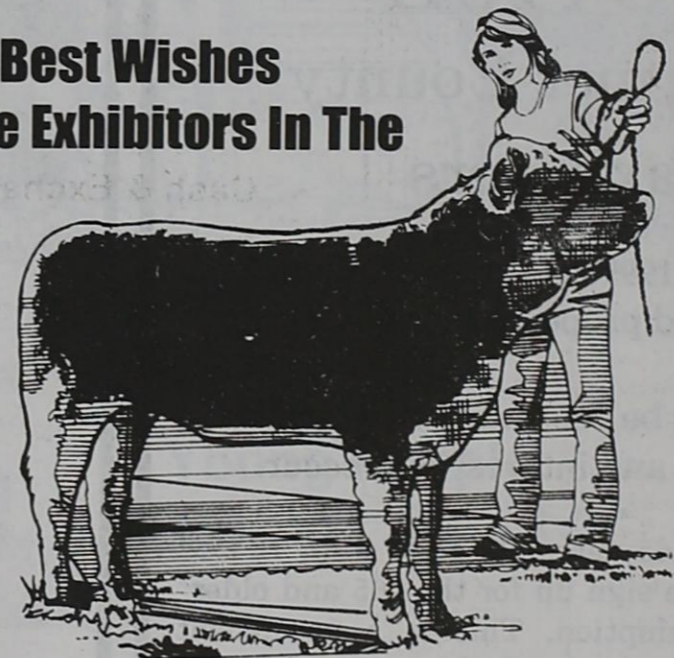

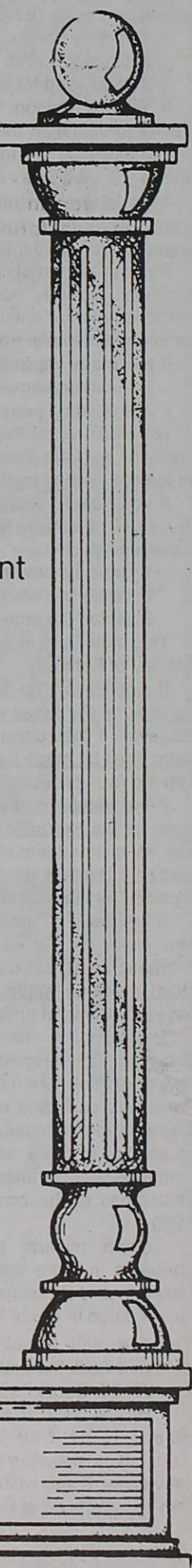
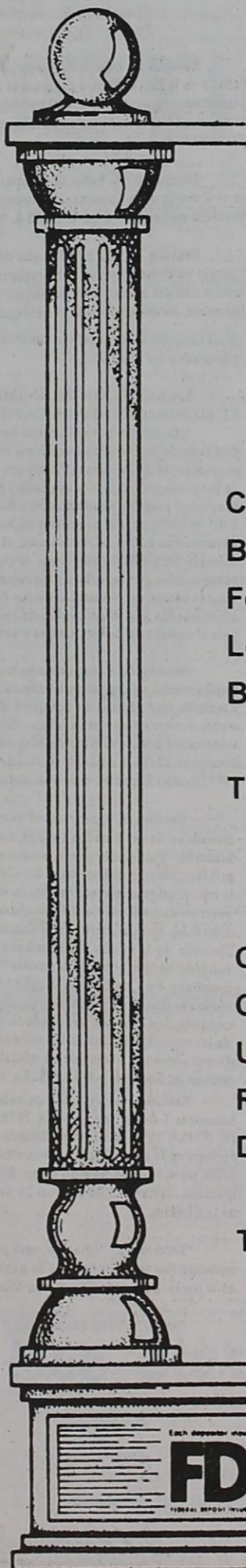

## RESOLUTION AND PROCLAMATION OF REGULAR SCHOOL DISTRICT ELECTION AND PUBLIC SCHOOL CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS TAX ELECTION

WHEREAS, the Board of Education of the Texico Municipal School District No. 2 (herein the "Board" and the "District", respectively), in the County of Curry and State of New Mexico, has determined that a Regular School District Election and Capital Improvements Tax Election, (herein, the "Election") be held on February 2, 1999, pursuant to Sections 1-22-1 through 1-22-19, NMSA 1978; and

WHEREAS, the term of office of Bruce Mayfield, Position 1; Byron Mayfield, Position 2; and Deborah Autrey, Position 3, will expire on February 28, 1999.

WHEREAS, the Board has determined that 3 positions on the Board are to be filled at such election by submitting to the qualified electors of the District the names of candidates qualified to appear on the ballot for election to the positions to be filled; and

WHEREAS, the persons who desire to fill such positions on the Board shall be required to file declarations of candidacy or declarations of intent to be a write in candidate, all in accordance with Sections 1-22-1, et seq, NMSA 1978; and

- Position 1: For a four-year term starting March 1, 1999; and
- Position 2: For a four-year term starting March 1, 1999; and
- Position 3: For a four-year term starting March 1, 1999.

Section 5. A declaration of candidacy for membership on the Board to be filled at the Election shall be filed with the County Clerk of Curry, the proper filing officer, during the period commencing at 9:00 a.m., December 15, 1998, being the third Tuesday in December, and ending at 5:00 p.m. on the same day, pursuant to Section 1-22-7, NMSA 1978.

Section 6. In making the a declaration of candidacy, the candidate for membership on the Board shall submit a sworn statement of intent in substantially the form provided in Section 1-22-8, NMSA 1978.

Section 7. A person who desires to be a write in candidate for membership on the Board at such election shall file with the County Clerk of Curry County, a declaration of intent to be a write-in candidate before 5:00 p.m. on December 29, 1998, being the thirty-fifth day preceding the date of the Election.

At such Election, the following question shall also be submitted to all qualified, registered electors of the District:

### PUBLIC SCHOOL CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS TAX QUESTION

"Shall the Board of Education of the Texico Municipal School District No. 2, County of Curry, State of New Mexico, be authorized to impose a property tax of \$2.00 per each \$1000.00 of net taxable value of the property allocated to such District under the Property Tax Code for the property tax years of 1999, 2000, 2001, and 2002, for the purpose of the following capital improvements in the District, i.e., erecting, remodeling, making additions to, providing equipment for and furnishing school buildings, purchasing or improving school grounds and purchasing computer software and hardware for student use in public school classrooms, maintenance of public school buildings and public school grounds exclusive of salary expenses of employees of the District; and purchasing activity vehicles for transporting students to extracurricular school activities?"

Section 8. The tax contemplated by the capital improvements tax question shall be in addition to the tax contemplated by the bond question and to any tax imposed to pay debt service on the bonds or for any other purpose. Such capital improvements tax shall be authorized pursuant to the Public School Capital Improvements Act, i.e., Sections 22-25-1 through 22-25-10 NMSA 1978 (being Chapter 5, Laws of the New Mexico, 1975, Special Session, as amended and supplemented).

Section 9. A person is a qualified elector of the District if he or she is a citizen of the United States, at least 18 years of age on the day of the Election. In order to vote, qualified electors of the District must have previously registered with the County Clerk of Curry County or Roosevelt County. Any qualified elector of the District who is not now registered and who wishes to vote at such Election should register during regular office hours prior to 5:00 p.m. on January 5, 1999, being the twenty-eighth day immediately preceding the Election at the office of the County Clerk of Curry County, Curry County Courthouse, 7th and Main Street, Clovis, New Mexico; or at the office of the County Clerk of Roosevelt County, Roosevelt County Courthouse, Main Street, Portales, New Mexico; or at the office of any deputy registration officer appointed by the County Clerk of Curry County or Roosevelt County, (which may include the municipal clerks of all municipalities in Curry and Roosevelt Counties) or a motor vehicle deputy registration officer as provided in Section 1-4-47, NMSA 1978.

Section 10. Absentee voting will be permitted in the manner, authorized by Sections 1-6-1 et seq., NMSA 1978 and 1-6A-1, et seq.; provided, however, that pursuant to Section 1-22-19, NMSA 1978, qualified electors may also vote absentee in person at the office of the County Clerk of Curry County, during the regular hours and days of business from 8:00 a.m., January 8, 1999, being the twenty-fifth day preceding the Election, until 5:00 p.m., January 29, 1999, being the Friday immediately prior to the Election.

Section 11. Voting shall be by voting machine, except for absentee voting which shall be by paper ballot. At least one voting machine shall be used at the polling place for each Voting District.

### Notice of Property Tax Reporting Requirements

Property which was valued in 1998 in this county by the county assessor is not required to be reported or rendered for 1999 or subsequent years, EXCEPT FOR:

1. mobile homes
2. livestock, and
3. land used for agricultural purposes

If, for any reason, your property was not valued last year and it is subject to valuation this year, you are required by law to report it to the county assessor on forms provided either by mail or at the assessor's office.

All nongovernmental entities (property owners) which claim to be exempt from the property tax must report their property and claim their exemption for 1999 if the exemption was not claimed in 1998.

Reports for mobile homes, livestock, land use for agricultural purposes, property not valued last year and claims for exemptions by nongovernmental entities must be completed and mailed or delivered to the county assessor not later than the last day of February.

If you made improvements to your real property and:

1. the improvements cost more than \$1,000 and
  2. a building permit for the improvements was not issued;
- you must report the nature of the improvements and their cost to the assessor not later than the last day of February. These reports must be on forms provided by the county assessor.

If you believe property decreased in value during the preceding year, you must report on forms provided by the county assessor, a signed statement which:

1. describes the property affected,
2. states the cause and nature of decrease in value, and
3. states the amount you contend the value has decreased.

This statement must be filed with the county assessor no later than the last day of February.

If application for the Special Method of Value for Land used for Agricultural Purposes was allowed in 1998 no new application is required. However, if that claim was not granted in 1998 and it is now claimed, claim must be made by the last day of February by filing with the assessor with the form provided by the assessor.

If the veterans exemption was claimed and allowed in 1998 no new claim for the exemption is required to be filed. However, if the exemption was not claimed and allowed in 1998 and it is now claimed, claim must be made by the last day of February by filing with the assessor the form provided by the assessor.

If the head-of-family exemption was claimed and allowed in 1998, no new claim for the exemption is required to be filed. However, if that exemption was not claimed and allowed in 1998 and it is now claimed, claim must be made by the last day of February by filing with the assessor the form provided by the assessor.

Beginning in the 1982 tax year, taxpayers are responsible for declaring their property classification to the assessor, as residential or nonresidential. When the declaration is accepted by the assessor, it shall remain as such and need not be made in subsequent years unless the classification changes. If a taxpayer has not declared their property to be residential in 1998 and desires that classification for 1999, they must complete a declaration of residential classification and return the signed declaration to the county assessor's office by the last day of February 1999.

Certain mineral property and personal property of contractors operating in more than one county are required to be reported to the Taxation and Revenue Department, Property Tax Division of the State of New Mexico in Santa Fe. Information about property to be reported to the Taxation and Revenue Department, Property Tax Division, can be obtained from the county assessor or the Central Assessment Unit, P.O. Box 25126, Santa Fe, New Mexico 87504-5126. Phone: (505) 827-0893.

## Hospital districts to get some extra \$\$

Texas State Comptroller Carole Rylander announced last week that checks totaling \$300 million were put into the mail to Texas cities, counties and hospital districts to help them recoup some of the costs of providing health care to the indigent patients with tobacco related illnesses.

"The funds being distributed amount to 'found money' for Texas cities, counties and hospital districts. The money is the result of a clause in the Texas tobacco settlement increasing payments from the tobacco companies as a result of the 'Most Favored Nation' provision. When the State of Minnesota and the tobacco industry reached an agreement, the clause kicked in the extra revenue for Texas," said Comptroller Rylander.

The Parmer County Hospital District received a check for \$125,517.25 and the Farwell Hospital District received a check for \$37,264.86.

"Texas cities, counties and hospital districts that provide care to indigent patients will receive just under \$2.3 billion over the next five years. The checks that were mailed out are the first down payment," said Comptroller Rylander.

The money from the settlement is in addition to the \$15 billion amount negotiated by the State of Texas with the tobacco industry and is for the benefit of cities, counties and hospital districts. While the legislature must determine how to spend the \$15 billion state share, they have no control over the distribution and spending of the money designated for the local entities.

The amounts each entity received was based upon several factors, including 1990 U.S. Census data and the providers' legal responsibility for indigent health care.

Under the terms of the agreement, the Comptroller's of-

rice will distribute another \$100 million in April 2000 and \$50 million in April 2001, using a formula based on unreimbursed health care expenditures.

An additional 1.85 billion to be received from the settlement over the next four years will be deposited to a Permanent Trust Account. The income from this permanent fund will be distributed pro-rata to the cities, counties and hospital districts providing indigent health care in proportion to their amount of unreimbursed health care expenditures.

Farwell Hospital District Board President Jack Allen Kirkland said Monday the money hasn't been received yet, and the board has no plans yet on how to use it.
