Building plans come to a halt in Texico

The Texico City Council plans to contact the state's top elected officials in order to try and solve a serous problem that the state has put upon the community.

To make a long story short, the state Construction Services Division has told Texico it cannot use Clovis' building and plumbing inspectors -but must use the state inspectors.

The problem is that the state inspectors don't come to Texico very often.

The result is a breakdown in building plans in Texico. Projects have come to a halt.

Councilman Rick Queener, whose planned bus company building is affected by this mess, said he sent a letter to the state on behalf of the council on Dec. 14 about the problem. But state officials told him by telephone that it wasn't received.

So the council plans to contact Gov. Gary Johnson and Lt. Gov. Walter Bradley and seek their help.

Along the same lines, another state decision is about to put the hurt on Texico.

Water Supt. Matt Meeks explained that if you serve water to the public from a well, you need to get periodic samples tested. In Texico's case, that's once a month.

Meeks said the testing station in Clovis is being closed by the state because one employee is retiring and the other moved away.

So instead of running to Clovis to bring the samples, the nearest next facility is Tucumcari. But Meeks said that station is city-owned and the state may not accept it, meaning the samples will have to be taken to Las Cruces or Albuquerque or wher-

This situation affects many businesses and governmental entitites in this area.

In other business, the council:

-- Plans to discuss raising the dog license fees at its next meeting. City dog warden Darrell Hampton recommended raising the annual fee from \$3 to \$5.

He said 52 dogs were licensed in 1998, with between 50 and 100 other dogs going unlicensed in Texico.

-- Received a request from Josephine Wilhite to add a mobile home to her property at 801 Hereford. The council will measure the property, then discuss it again at its next meeting.

-- Heard some good news on the street repair project which had had a deadline of Dec. 31, 1998, for completion. About a \$45,000 state grant is involved.

The council learned that the deadline has been extended to April 30 for these funds to be used.

-- Had councilman Eddie Dunsworth ask about a complaint he had received of a woman living on Wheeler Avenue had starved a dog to

Hampton said he checked it out and was told by the dog's owner that the death was due to "having worms."

Hampton said he found food at the location.

Advanced math plays an important role in police work after car accidents

If ever in your lifetime you have questioned the reasons for learning advanced mathematics, please take note of the following information.

I admit to being one of those high school students sitting in my Physics, Calculus and Trigonometry classes, muttering to myself inside of my head "Why is this necessary to know?

Advanced mathematics play a very important role in the State of Texas, especially in the jobs of our dedicated of the troopers on the Texas State Highway Patrol.

Since 1984, State Trooper Craig Hunt of Farwell, has been a member of a six-member team from various outposts in the Panhandle, that uses such advanced mathematics to solve questions, or the mysteries around, about how auto accidents occur.

This team gets called in to work on cases in the region that encompasses the entire Panhandle, down to Lubbock, across to Wichita Falls and down to Midland.

A District Attorney or State Police Seargent will call the team in to help prepare the evidence of exactly how an accident took place, start to finish.

"The basic laws of Physics are at work in every instance driving and maneuvering an automobile," said Hunt. "By very carefully examining the wreckage, the site, reviewing the conditions on the road, visibilities, etc., we can exactly reconstruct an accident. We can do this both on paper and through computer animation and simulation."

While all State Troopers are qualified and trained to reconstruct accidents, the six-member team and the equipment they are specially trained on allows for more thorough and auto specific reconstruction. reconstructions are critical to court cases, insurance investigations and to various divisions within State offices.

A reconstruction begins by studying the aforementioned elements. Hunt will then make use of a "Laser Transit" to gather the coordinates of the wreck. These coordinates are put into an Auto Cad program that will automatically draw the scene out. From the positions of the vehicles, bodies, tires, metal fragments and such, a "co-efficient of friction" can be determined. All objects have Kinetic energy and this co-efficient is very important to know so that the velocity (speed) going into that friction can be plugged into the reconstruction factors.

Once the particular make and model of a vehicle is determined, the team will then turn to the "VC2000." This is a small, computerized tracker, of sorts, that mounts into a vehicle of the same make and model, that needs to be tested for speed, wheel lock-up, braking and other equipment

"All vehicles carry a different set of numbers when it comes to mass, volume and kinetic energy." said Hunt. "The VC2000 is just a very simple way of determining those factors as to the make, model and performance of that same-type vehicle. For instance, when testing wheel lock-ups, we know that when four wheels lock up, they will slide in different directions; (again depending on the mass, volume and kinetic energy involved in the vehicle). By using the VC2000 and testing the same type of vehicle, we can determine that direction and the velocity the vehicle went into a slide or locked-up situation."

The VC2000 is just one part of the type of equipment the team of Troopers use in their reconstructions. The computer is a major part of their team as well.

"Once we have all of the coordinates and numbers involved, we can enter them into our computer program and run a physical formula that will break the accident down into 30 frames per second. Once this breakdown is complete, Hunt will then sit down and animate the entire incident on "Total Station" software and computer equipment.

"Just by simply knowing the beginning and ending speeds of the vehicles involved in a wreck, I can actually pinpoint the position of the vehicles every 10 seconds leading up to the wreck, during the crash and following the impact until the vehicles come to a standstill," explained Hunt.

But do not be fooled into thinking that the art of reconstruction is quick science, achieved by entering numbers and coordinates into a computer. An animated reconstruction of a wreck can take over a month to build. This is due to the intense amount of research Hunt and his teammates put into the incident.

"It isn't just a matter of figuring acceleration and de-celeration," stated Hunt. "It's carefully measuring everything and then using the principals of physics, geometry, algebra, trigonometry...even basic addition and subtraction. There is more to all of it than meets the eye. Usually, any type case can be solved by gathering evidence by mathematical standards. It just takes some time."

Hunt was always the first to volunteer to reconstruct scenes as a rookie Trooper. He always had a head for numbers and seemed to retain the knowledge he gained in his mathematics courses throughout his schooling.

"I always knew there was a use for the advanced mathematics and I enjoyed the classes I took in them," he

Hunt and the other team members have received advanced training in the applied mathematics, computer sciences and programming that go hand-in-hand with the art/science of accident reconstruction.

Hunt is also pretty handy at site-reconstruction with his specialized 35-mm camera. He can actually put the negatives of pictures taken at the scene of an accident back into his camera and put the coordinates back in place.

"Remember, in photography, the negatives are opposite the actual picture - a dark is a white, a white is a dark, so I can actually pinpoint the locations of headlights, metal fragments, skid marks, etc." said Hunt.

Pinpointing and reconstructing the cause, or causes of an accident make for interesting days on the job for Hunt and his teammates. Hunt recalled with a laugh the time that the team was called in to reconstruct a particular accident:

"We'd been asked to animate an accident for a court case that was being disputed in a court case over in Wichita Falls," Hunt said. "This guy had been claiming he was innocent and that there was no way the accident was his fault and so on. We animated the incident and showed the entire accident, start to finish, in court. Upon seeing the whole deal, the guy plead guilty to the charges against him and the case was solved."

So, if you've ever been one to think that the applications for advanced mathematics is a great mystery in life, you just need to remember that, like Trooper Craig Hunt and his team of accident reconstructionists have witnessed, the numbers never lie and can solve some pretty great mysteries!

The Chief's Corner

From Farwell Police Chief Roy McGaa:

If Emily Post were to write about manners during a traffic stop, she would probably write the following:

Peace officers live in a different world than we do but we can co-exist with them if we know some of the things they think about. In one form of communication or another they are briefed about each of the 150 plus deaths of fellow officers every year. They know that their brother officers are killed in large cities, small towns and rural areas. They know they are killed by hard core criminals, housewives, businessmen, professionals and children.

What they most likely don't know, is what kind of person we are. Each of us knows that we are basically a good person who wouldn't hurt a fly but we must understand that officers might not realize this. There are some things we can do to create a good impression for the officer and be polite at the same time. And they will appreciate your courtesy.

1. As soon as you see his red and blue lights, pull to the right and stop. If you are a criminal you will pretend that you don't see the officer while he is at a disadvantage, still seated and talking on his radio.

2. Remain seated in your vehicle unless the officer asks you to step out. If you are a criminal you want to get to the officer while he is at a disadvantage, still seated and talking on his radio.

3. Make no odd movements while coming to a stop. If you are a criminal you will want to reach under your seat or into your glove compartment for your pistol.

4. Keep your hands in plain sight, resting on the steering wheel is a good place. If you are a criminal you will want to have you hand on your pistol, between or under your legs or maybe between bucket seats.

5. Tell your passengers to keep quiet and remain in the vehicle. If you are a criminal you will want your passengers to distract the officer so you can get a clean shot at him.

6. After stopping, turn on your interior light at night. If you are a criminal you will want to keep the interior dark so the officer can't see your shotgun.

For a final point about what the officer is thinking about, say to yourself "One Mississippi, Two Mississippi." That is how long the usual gunfight lasts. The officer knows there is no time to be polite when something doesn't look right. If he snaps at you it is because he knows that the second place award in a gunfight goes to the dead one. After the stop most officers will be glad to explain whey they acted why they did, if asked politely.







assessor is not required to be reported or rendered for 1999 or subsequent years, EXCEPT FOR:

- 1. mobile homes
- 2. livestock, and

3. land used for agricultural purposes

If, for any reason, your property was not valued last year and it is subject to valuation this year, you are required by law to report it to the county assessor on forms provided either by mail or at the assessor's office.

All nongovernmental entities (property owners) which claim to be exempt from the property tax must report their property and claim their exemption for 1999 if the exemption was not claimed in 1998.

Reports for mobile homes, livestock, land use for agricultural purposes, property not valued last year and claims for exemptions by nongovernmental entities must be completed and mailed or delivered to the county assessor not later than the last day of February.

If you made improvements to your real property and

1. the improvements cost more than \$1,000 and

2. a building permit for the improvements was not issued

you must report the nature of the improvements and their cost to the assessor not later than the last day of February. These reports must be on forms provided by the county assessor.

If you believe property decreased in-value during the preceding year you must report on forms provided by the county assessor, a signed statement which

1 describes the property affected,

2. states the cause and nature of decrease in value, and 3. states the amount you contend the value has decreased.

This statement must be filed with the county assessor no later than the

last day of February. If application for the Special Method of Value for Land used for Agricultural Purposes was allowed in 1998 no new application is required.

Hospital districts to get some extra \$\$

Texas State Comptroller Carole Rylander anounced last week that checks totaling \$300 million were put into the mail to Texas cities, counties and hospital districts to help them recoup some of the costs of providing health care to the indigent patients with tobacco related illnesses.

"The funds being distributed amount to 'found money' for Texas cities, counties and hospital districts. The money is the result of a clause in the Texas tobacco settlement increasing payments from the tobacco companies as a result of the 'Most Favored Nation' provision. When the State of Minnesota and the tobacco industry reached an agreement, the clause kicked in the extra revenue for Texas," said Comptroller Rylander.

The Parmer County Hospital District received a check for \$125.517.25 and the Farwell Hospital District received a check for \$37,264.86.

"Texas cities, counties and hospital districts that provide care to indigent patients will receive just under \$2.3 billion over the next five years. The checks that were mailed out are the first down payment," said Comptroller

The money from the settlement is in addition to the \$15 billion amount negotiated by the State of Texas with the tobacco industry and is for the benefit of cities, counties and hospital districts. While the legislature must determine how to spend the \$15 billion state share, they have no control over the distribution and spending of the money designated for the local entities.

The amounts each entity received was based upon several factors, including 1990 U.S. Census data and the providers' legal responsibility for indigent health care.

Under the terms of the agreement, the Comptroller's of-

fice will distribute another \$100 million in April 2000 and \$50 million in April 2001, using a formula based on unreimbursed health care expenditures.

An additional 1.85 billion to be received from the settlement over the next four years will be deposited to a Permanent Trust Account. The income from this permanent fund will be distributed pro-rata to the cities, counties and hospital districts providing indigent health care in proportion to their amount of unreimbursed health care expenditures.

Farwell Hospital District Board President Jack Allen Kirkland said Monday the money hasn't been received yet, and the board has no plans yet on how to use it.




