

But vote still needed on building the jail Commissioners agree on financing method to build a new jail

The Parmer County Commissioners on Monday took strong steps toward building a new county jail.

Although a vote on approving a new jail still is pending, the commissioners voted 3-2 to use Certificate of Obligation bonds for a new jail if the commissioners go ahead with a new jail.

In favor were commissioners Tom Ware, Bovina area, and Kirk Frye, Friona area. Opposed were commissioners Ed Corn, Farwell area, and Raymond McGehee, Lazbuddie area. County Judge Bonnie Clayton-Heald broke the tie in favor of using the Certificates.

Corn and McGehee voted against the Certificates of Obligation because they preferred to have a bond election tried first.

If a bond election were called for, it would have been to be held in conjunction with a general election. The closest date would be in May 2003 if the legal work could be done in time for it; if not, such an election could be held next fall.

The county is under no obligation until the commissioners authorize <u>issuing</u> the Certificates of Obligation. This might be a few months down the road. Until that occurs, the commissioners can stop the process at any time.

The commissioners are being assisted in the financial process by First Southwest Company, of Lubbock. At the Monday meeting was Vince Viaille, a company vice president, in stating the financial options available in jail construction. There are many requirements involved. A key reason the commissioners are moving ahead now is due to low interest rates.


Also at the meeting was Kenny Burns, of Burns, Fletcher, Gill Architects, of Fort Worth. The commissioners voted unanimously to hire the firm to begin new jail plans.

Although no decision has been made yet on how large to build the jail, if indeed it is built, the architect will begin working on plans for up to a 49-bed facility. Rough estimates for the cost of a new jail have been between \$2.7 million and \$3.2 million.

Normally, when you think of building a 49-bed jail and then put in just 24 beds, the cost would be in half. That doesn't work in jail construction. The number of beds in a new jail is a major question yet to be resolved. For example, according to the architect, the difference between a 32-bed and a 48-bed jail is less than \$150,000. The cost between a 24-bed facility and a 49-bed facility are very small because the basic core costs are fixed. For example, regardless of how many beds a jail has, it still has to have room for a kitchen, a laundry, exercise area, a multipurpose room, dispatch, control, visitation area, smoke evacuation, electrical generator and administrative offices for the sheriff's department. To just give one example of what the state demands, for just the first inmate you are required to have 40 square feet. For each additional inmate in a multi-purpose cell, you are required 18 square feet per inmate.

Texico breakfast program to begin Jan. 8

Beginning Jan. 8, Texico Schools will offer breakfast to the high school, junior high and elementary students and staff, from 7:45 to 8:10 a.m., in the cafeteria.

Prices will be: Full price 75¢ for elementary students, \$1 for Jr. High and High School students, and \$1.25 for staff members.

If the student qualifies for the free or reduced lunch program, they also qualify for free or reduced breakfast. The price for the reduced breakfast will be 30¢.

The breakfast program will be evaluated based on the number of students participating, student performance in class, anticipation of higher test scores, decreased visits to the school nurse's office, nurse observation of the benefits of the program, and the cost effectiveness of the program.

Regardless of how many beds are built, the operational costs will be about the same, too, said County Sheriff Randy Geries.

Geries said five new corrections positions would have to be added. When you take into account benefits, equipment, etc., the sheriff's budget would increase about \$100,000, it was calculated by County Treasurer Anne Norton.

So in addition to looking at paying off a debt for a new jail (which would not come out of the county's general fund), the county is also looking at a fixed higher cost each year for the extra jail employees.

Corn said he had a major problem with building a 48-bed facility (the commissioners have been using the 48-bed number for the past several months. But the architect will prepare plans for 49 beds because it's easier to draw up a plan for that number of beds in a jail, he said), Corn summed it up this way: "A 48-bed facility for 13 prisoners?"

Corn noted the need to raise taxes more than the usual amount (which has been about 3 percent the past several years) for the higher jail costs.

Geries supports building the larger facility. He has pointed out that the fixed costs will be close, regardless of how many beds are involved.

Geries said that if the current jail problems are to be resolved, the staff would have to be doubled regardless.

Currently, Parmer County is housing 8 prisoners from other counties, which is caused by their jail overpopulation. This generates revenue for Parmer County -- \$32 per prisoner per day. And if any medical work is needed for these inmates, the originating county is responsible.

The current county jail does not meet state standards and the county has received seven variances over the years to keep it open, it has been stated.

Throughout this year, the commissioners have looked at other options, such as adding on to the current jail and building a separate sheriff's office. But both these ideas bombed out. A separate sheriff's office would not solve the current substandard jail. And the state historical society is opposed to adding on to the current jail (due to aesthetic reasons), which would be difficult for the county commissioners to fight.

Mrs. Norton discussed the county's general fund and its status. She said some reserves would be dipped into this year due to the large amount of money the commissioners have put into the fund for a new jail.

Mrs. Norton said there will be a large carryover, however, and estimated it in excess of \$1 million. She said the general fund is in excellent shape.

In addition to hiring an architect, the commissioners unanimously voted to use the "construction manager at risk" method -- again, only if a new jail is authorized. It still would be up to the commissioners to accept or reject the final bid for a new jail.

The question on this procedure was:

1) Construction manager agent -- whereby the county employs the manager agent, but the county contracts with bonded sub-contractors.

2) Construction manager at risk -- whereby the county employs a bonded person who would stand the risk and hire the sub-contractors himself. County Attorney Charles Aycock recommended this method.

Bids for a construction manager at risk employee tentatively will be opened in January.

Parmer County Jail -

It must be stressed that the commissioners have <u>not</u> yet voted to issue the Certificates; they merely agreed to use that method in the event a new jail is constructed.

A public notice would be published and several public hearings would be required. If 5 percent of the persons who voted in the last general election in Parmer County signed a petition against it, it would stop this particular process.

Commissioner Ed Corn asked that his views be published concerning the new jail:

"Our jail is almost 30 years old with a lot of problems, i.e., plumbing, heating, air conditioning, etc.

"The existing jail was built before new jail standard laws were in place so we are out of compliance in seven different areas. If we did a renovation, it would not fix all the problems.

"Adding on to our existing jail is not an option because the Texas Historical Society would not approve adding to the existing structure and could put the county

- 3. Parmer County has no long term debt.

4. The Commissioners Court has anticipated the need to do something about the jail and sheriff's offices. Parmer County has placed \$500,000 over several years in a fund designated to address our problems with the jail.

"The Commissioners Court is not getting ahead of itself by hiring an architect and choosing a method of finance. We have to have a complete plan to know what it costs and if Texas Jail Standards would approve it. There are certain rules to follow with the way you choose to finance.

"When we look at a real plan, we will determine if it suits our needs and if we can afford it at all. I am sure with input from the public, the Commissioners Court will come to an agreement about the best to do for Parmer County."



Texico discusses adding fee to aid cemetery upkeep

The Texico City Council discussed adding a voluntary \$1 cemetery fee to the water bill in order to help raise funds for cemetery maintenance.

The idea was suggested by Mayor Jerry Cunningham.

A question arose from City Attorney Marion Ty Rutter, however, as to the legality of having folks pay a higher water bill, when some of the funds are used for a non-water item.

But it was pointed out that such a \$1 fee on the water bill now goes to the city's fireman recreation fund. The way this works is if a resident doesn't want to contribute to the fire fund, they tell city hall, and the fee is not imposed. Also, residents can give increments to the fire fund on their water bill -- 25 cents, 50 cents or 75 cents, also.

City Clerk Teresa Harth will check with the state on whether a voluntary cemetery maintenance fee, akin to the firemen's recreation fund fee, can be added to the water bill so users (about 400) can voluntarily contribute.

There's about \$8,000 in the city cemetery fund and another \$5,000 in the cemetery association fund.

In other business, the council:

-- Heard Fire Chief Lewis Cooper endorse the concept of raising the city's sales tax to collect funds for the proposed Ute Lake water project. Rutter supported this, also.

-- Called an executive session at Mrs. Harth's request to discuss litigation.

-- Discussed Mesquite Village access and dumpster problems. It was stated that only 3 dumpsters have been placed there for the 20 units, although 6 dumpsters were in the plans. A couple of families have moved in so far.

Cooper said it was his understanding that there would be better access for trucks and vehicles to the development. Also, there's a problem with the dumpster pads too close to the fence, causing the dump trucks problems.

Cooper said the approved plans were changed by the architect this year without telling the city about it.

Cooper planned to meet this week with a development construction official.

- Okayed the fire department spending about \$800 for uniforms and gear bags.


-- Okayed running electricity to the new cemetery well.

-- Still was unable to approve the new cemetery board of Margie Crooks, Laurie Goforth, Lynn McDaniel, Oran Jay Autrey and Marcia Leavell because not enough councilmen were present.

Absent were Sharon Askew and Doug Scioli. Since councilman Autrey would have to abstain on a vote (because he is proposed for the cemetery board), that left only one council person, Monnie Cunningham. So it was put on the next council agenda for Jan. 14.

Also, Mrs. Harth said McDaniel indicated he would be glad to help the cemetery board but didn't want to serve on it. So another person is needed.

-- Heard Mrs. Harth report on possible state funds to help build the new city hall. She said some funds are available at zero percent interest because of Texico's low-income status. The council had about \$115,000 on hand to build the new city hall, which is estimated to cost about \$300,000.

The rule of good sportsmanship is to accept and abide by decisions by officials. This value is critical for students to learn for later application in life.


-- Recognize and appreciate skilled performances regardless of affiliation.




