

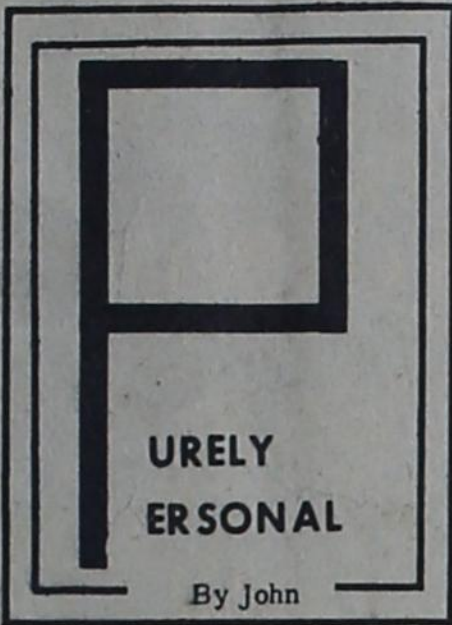

Last week we were privileged to attend a meeting in Bovina of the High Plains Water Conservation Board with the Parmer County representatives of the Board. Until this meeting, I had always considered the importation of water in large quantities as impractical from an engineering standpoint. Not so, now.

We were treated to pictures and slides of projects in California which dwarf the facilities necessary to get water to these bare baldies. Yes, Texas may brag about a lot of things, but California has done fantastic things in water distribution.

I am firmly convinced that water on a vast scale can be brought to the High Plains. Make no mistake about it, water is the economic backbone of our area of the country. We must have it in sufficient quantities or perish.

The citizens of this area will shortly be asked to approve a Master Water District for this purpose. We must approve it. In a recent speech, Joe G. Moore Jr., Executive Director, Texas Water Development Board, made the following statements:

"No construction can begin, and no water can move to West Texas, until there is a firm commitment on the part of a responsible political entity to contract for the repayment of the project costs allocated to the area. Such a contractual capability is not presently available to any political entity in the West Texas area. Ultimately, in order to make such a commitment, you must form a master district of some kind. Such a district will need broad powers including the following:

"1. Power to contract with the State or the United States for an imported water supply and to assure repayment of the costs for such a supply.

"2. Power to distribute water to users either through a surface or an underground distribution system or through a combination of both.

"3. Power to contract with local or subdistricts -- for 'retail' distribution of water.

"4. Power to borrow money and incur indebtedness, issue bonds, and take all other required responsible financial actions necessary to repay obligations for the delivery of water.

"5. Power to charge direct water tolls and charge indirect beneficiaries who obtain water from underground sources recharged as a consequence of movement of water through delivery systems.

"6. Power to levy taxes on all land, improvements, and minerals within the geographical limits of the district to meet obligations for imported water above the revenues available from direct water tolls.

"7. Power to control the use of flood and storm waters within district boundaries; to establish drainage systems where this becomes necessary; to appropriate water and water rights; to store water both on the surface and in underground reservoirs; to induce methods for the reclamation and reuse of water for all purposes;

"8. Power to construct, or finance the construction of, facilities necessary to achieve the objectives of water supply within the district.

"9. Power of eminent domain so that properties required for the construction of facilities needed by the district can be condemned or otherwise acquired through legal process.

"10. Power to control the pumpage of ground water.

"11. Power to prevent the waste of water within the district boundaries.

"12. Power to prevent contamination or pollution of surface and underground sources of water within the district.

"13. Power to engage staff to conduct investigations or to have investigations made either on its own initiative or in cooperation with the State or with the Federal government."

If this country is to be the great supplier of food and fiber that the world will need in the near future, we must assure ourselves of this water. The approval of a Master Water District is imperative to this end.

Light Rains Bring Relief To This Area

Parmer and Curry County residents were wearing broad smiles on Monday morning following the light rains of Sunday which broke the long dry spell of the past few months. The rain was general over the entire Panhandle of Texas and Eastern New Mexico, with heaviest rains reported in the Parmer County and Shamrock areas.

Although the rains were accompanied by high winds and some pea-size hail little damage was recorded. In the Hub vicinity, south of Friona, a barn was blown away by the high winds, according to Robert

Shedd, Texas Highway Patrolman for Parmer County.

According to a report from Fred Chandler at Sherley-Anderson-Pitman Elevator in Farwell, rain in Farwell measured .25. Reports from Bovina and Lazbuddie indicate that the rain was slightly heavier in those areas with .35 reported. In the Lazbuddie vicinity, some pea-size hail fell accompanied by high winds. No damage resulted. Asa Smith at the Sherley-Anderson Lariat Grain Company reported no more than .2 in that vicinity while .09 was reported in the Friona area. The thunder which accom-

panied the light rains was an unusual sound for this area, especially in the winter, and gave residents hope of heavy rains. However such was not the case, but the rains which came, although light, were most welcome since this was the first measurable moisture since October when light rains fell bringing some relief to the parched earth.

Irrigated crops are in good condition; however the extreme dry weather of the past few months has done much damage to the dry land crops in the area.

Indian Crim Says --

Little More Rains, But Still Dry

"About the same as last year, but with a little more general rains," was the prediction of J. W. (Indian) Crim when he made his annual weather forecast at sunrise Wednesday morning, March 22.

The wind was blowing from the southwest (a mite more from the south) carrying smoke from the ceremonial fire to the northeast, indicating that the outlook for moisture this year is poor. "There will not be too much rain in one spot," stated Crim as he read the signals which indicated to his practiced eye that the rain will be of a more general nature than in previous years.

In May and the early part of June we may expect turbulent weather with hailstorms, says Crim who also stated that we may expect the usual number of sandstorms.

Crim has not missed a single prediction since the weather forecast became public in 1952. The last year in which he predicted a bumper dryland crop was in 1960 with his prediction holding true. In 1961 he indicated a good crop year was in store for area farmers; however since that time, his predictions have been on the "sad" side for area farmers who depend on the elements alone for moisture for their crops.

Crim's predictions are based on an old Indian legend to the effect that a fire burning at sunrise on March 22 will give signals through its smoke indicating whether the year will be a good crop year or not. Crim says that if the smoke from the fire at this time is carried west or southwest there will be a bumper crop; if the wind is from the north or northwest and carries the smoke southwest, the crop will be average; but wind from the west, south, or southwest means a "very poor" crop year.

Animals used in the game are being furnished by Godfrey's at Crescent, Okla.

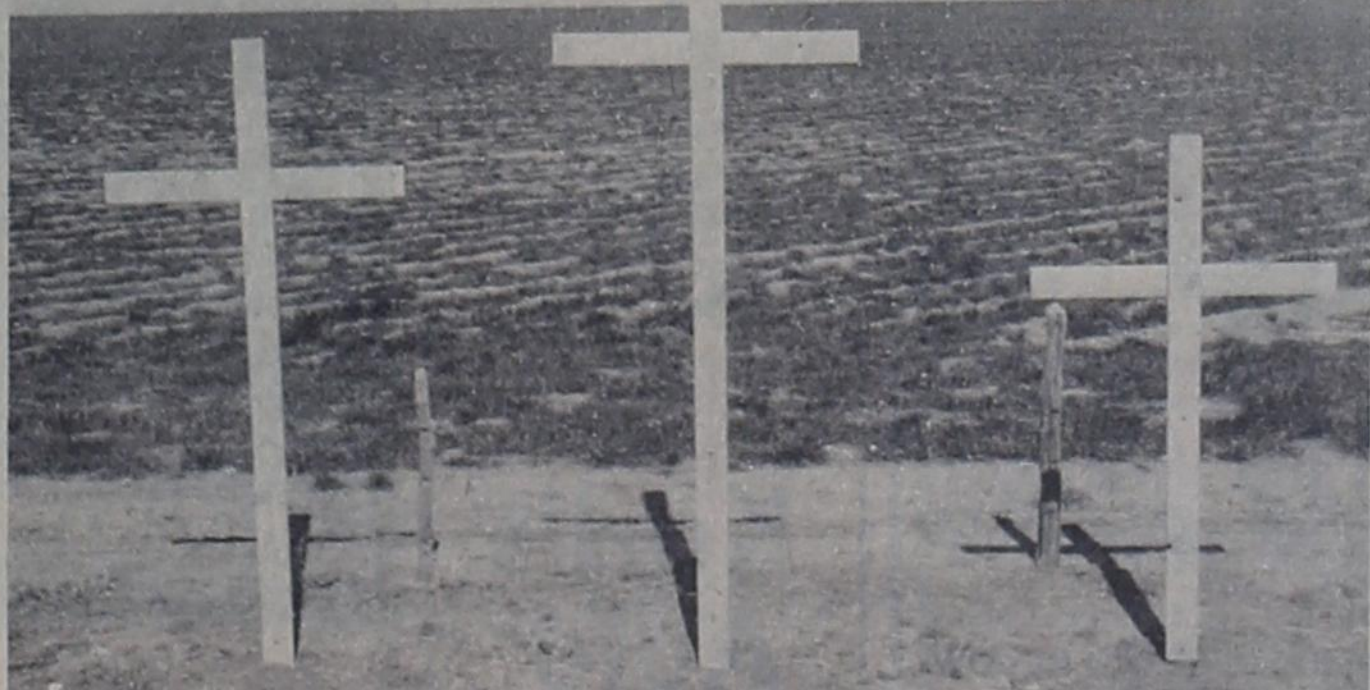

Dirkson Retreats, Another Bridge Built --

One of the most fundamental rules of politics is that you can always expect the unexpected. This was borne out last week when controversial U.S. - Soviet Consular Treaty was ratified by the Senate, 66 to 28, a margin of just three votes above the two-thirds majority required for ratification.

Senator Dirkson has in the past been one of the stalwarts against irrational action by the Senate, be it civil rights or right to work repeal. So needless to say his action concerning the Consular pact comes as somewhat of a shock.

There are several good reasons why the ratification of the treaty was a gross mistake, one being the increased opportunity for Soviet espionage in the United States.

The prime reason that the treaty should have been thrown in the garbage can however goes much deeper and could have far worse consequences than the spy angle.

How the administration can ask a man to fight and possibly die in Vietnam, then turn right around and seek closer ties with the country that is supplying the bullets that kill our men is completely beyond my comprehension.

Maybe the United States can never have the love of the world, but it could have the respect of the world. This respect, it will never have, as long as we continue to play footsie with the Soviet Union, making every effort not to "offend" the Kremlin.

Unilateral "bridge building" with Russia will only lead to distrust of the United States among our allies and the possible disintegration of our various alliances, alliances which are desperately needed if we are to effectively combat Communism.

The road to peace will not be built by well-meaning but misguided diplomats. It can only be built through a united Atlantic alliance between the United States and Europe, an alliance so powerful militarily and economically that none will dare to challenge it.

There's no use crying over spilled milk, but if we would only realize that it is the Russians, and not the Chinese, that are the greatest threat to peace in the world today, then perhaps we will not be so gullible when the next "bridge" comes along.

Awards were presented to several students by various

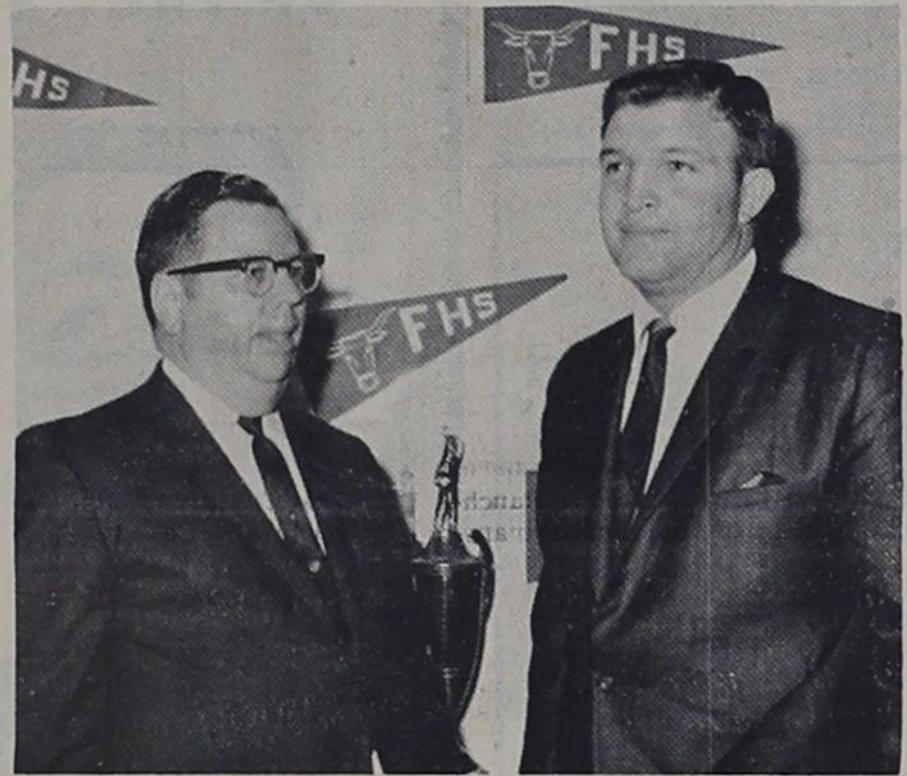

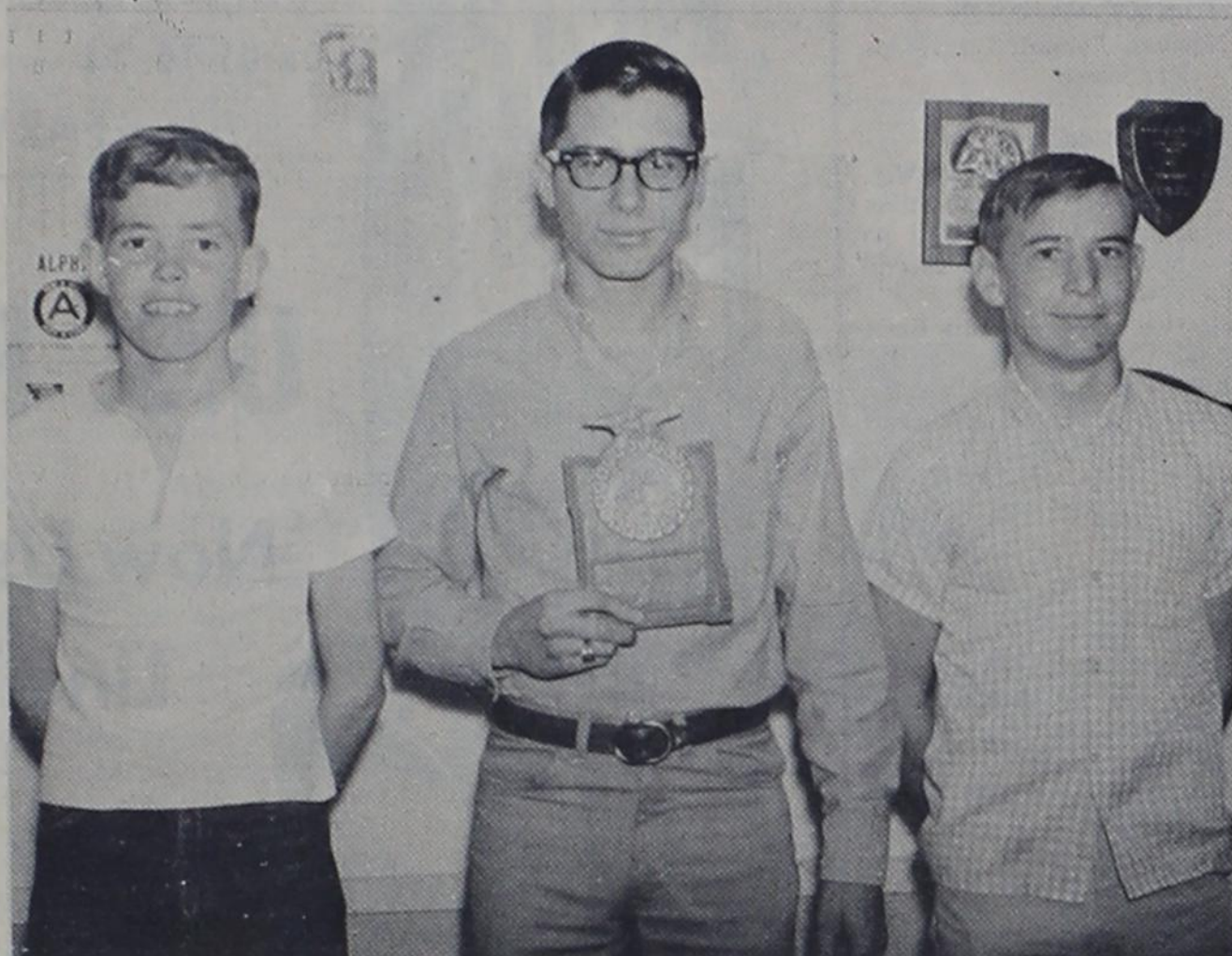
Placing sixth was the poultry judging team, Johnny Autrey, Arturo Ortiz and Delford Martin.
