Sart Offers Newest Cash Crop Possibility

Sarta, a 12-foot high ensilage-type crop that normally is grown east of the Mississippi, may have cash crop possibilities for the thousands of irrigation farmers of the High Plains who are searching for new crops to raise. At least, so believes James "Pat" Patrick of Farwell, who is employed by Roberts Seed Company. Patrick recently brought in a bundle of the tall cane from a farm he visited three miles east of Morton, in Cochran County.

The grower of the big crop is J. D. Hawthorne, reports Patrick, and he had 35 acres in sarta this

year. So far as Patrick knows, this is the only sarta production on the High Plains.

Hawthorne grew the sarta for seed this year, and cut 75,000 pounds from the 35 acres. If harvested for ensilage, the sarta will make 30 tons per acre.

At the conservative bid of \$4 per ton for silage, this kind of yield could mean a gross income that would "certainly beat grain sorghum," believes Patrick.

The price which sarta will bring as seed is not known by the Farwell man, but some indication of what the grower may anticipate is revealed in the price he paid: \$47.50 a hundred.

Patrick, who is not sure of production details, does not know how much water the crop required, but does recall that commercial fertilizer was used.

Sarta is an ideal ensilage crop, believes Patrick, and is highly palatable. The stalk is sweet.

What's more, the tall crop seems to have no tendency to fall over even with its unusual height. Rain and wind that hit the Hawthorne crop this year did no damage.

Remodeling Program Set For Paint Store

A remodeling and modernization program involving an expenditure of \$8,000 has been announced for The Paint Store in Farwell, according to Mr. and Mrs. Bill Liles, owners.

Plans call for construction on the present building located east of Sikes Motor Company to begin in the near future, and completion date is set "sometime before December 1."

A modern glass front will be installed, a new roof will be added, and the length of the building will be extended from 36 to 66½ feet. An acoustical ceiling will be installed, and the plate glass front will be trimmed in redwood. An ornamental pylon also will be of redwood.

Mr. and Mrs. Liles say they will add a new line of paints and increase their stock in all lines when the improvements are completed.

Tuesday Vote To Determine Fate of New County Office

Qualified voters of Parmer County will determine on Tuesday, November 1, whether they desire to separate the duties of tax assessor-collector from the duties of sheriff, and thereby create a new county office.

The state legislature last year

provided the means of allowing counties having population of fewer than 10,000 persons to determine through such an election as to whether the offices should be split. When the population goes over 10,000 the law requires division of these duties, regardless of the

sentiment of the counties involved.

Commissioners and others have feared a very tight turnout for the election. One commissioner expressed the prediction that the election will cost the county "A dollar a vote." Some say it will beat that.

Still, the court feels that such an election is the only means by which can be determined the wishes of the people of the county.

Neighboring counties, including Deaf Smith, Bailey, and Cochran, have approved the measure by large percentages.

Very little momentum is being given either side of the proposition even from county officials who would be directly affected. It seems to be a "whatever the people want" situation.

The Tribune has editorially supported the proposed division of offices.

Last Year's Receipt Okay for this Vote

Tax Assessor-Collector Chas. Lovelace this week reminded Parmer County voters that the poll tax receipt they obtained last year will be valid for the special election Tuesday of next week.

There are 1665 eligible voters in the county, he says, not counting those over age and entitled to exemptions.

Poll tax payments for next year number 191 to date, Lovelace says, the total being "about average" for this time of the year.

The 1955 receipt will be good until February 1, of next year, and the 1956 receipts are on sale until that date.

County Cotton, Grain Harvest Hits Stride After Hard Freeze

Harvesting of the tremendous grain sorghum crop of over 200,000 irrigated acres in Parmer County is well under way this week, and elevators all over the county are feeling the effect of the operation.

Cotton harvest is "picking up" too, although nearly all of the cotton being harvested now is still hand pulled. Mechanical harvesting with the use of the strippers is expected to begin on a large scale in the near future.

Sunday night's hard freeze ended all growth in both feed and cotton, farmers report, and there is nothing to do now but to get the crops out of the field as soon as they dry.

Milo is going on the ground at some elevators in Bovina, Friona, Farwell and Black, and gives an indication of the size of the crop, even though Parmer County has tremendous local storage reserves.

Nearly all of the grain sorghum is going into government loan, with the support price of about

\$1.55 being above the market in most instances.

At this stage of the harvest it is difficult to tell from reports just how this year's crop will compare with last year's. The reports from the farmers are mixed. Some say they're getting the best yields ever; others say they are disappointed.

Last year's grain harvest, in which the county's average production hovered near the 3,000-pound mark, would indeed be hard to beat. Some observers have doubts about the per-acre yield being bested, but they do agree that greater acreage in 1955 will mean more grain when the total

crop is gathered.

County Agent Joe Jones reports that the cotton harvest is just hitting its stride, and he reports that the cotton is "good—but it sure needed more time than we had this year."

Late planting dates, a cool spring, and other factors have contributed to making the county's cotton crop tardy in development.

THE TRIBUNE'S EDITORIAL COMMENT

The Pork Buying Program Won't Prove Popular Hereabouts

Monday's announcement by Secretary of Agriculture Ezra T. Benson that the USDA will step into the sales ring for outright purchases of 170,000,000 pounds of pork and 30,000,000 pounds of lard valued at \$85,000,000, probably will not overjoy farmers of this area.

Taking a drastic reduction in prices for grain sorghum themselves, the farmers of this area no doubt are bewildered and disappointed that such consideration is being given the Midwest, at a time when requests for assistance with market problems here have gone unheard.

The announced program for buying hogs doesn't make sense in the first place. The government's announced intention is to keep the price of pork high. To do this, they will appropriate \$85,000,000 of the taxpayers' money, and the taxpayer will end up paying a higher price for his pork because of this act!

Many farmers of the High Plains have been patient and tolerant with the government's farm program which has aimed at reducing surpluses by reducing prices for farm products. But we can well understand their concern over acts such as those this week that tend to pass favors on to a vote-heavy part of the country, while we on the High Plains are still expected to take it like "rugged individuals."

We read in Tuesday's papers that the government sunk 4 1/2 billion dollars into an item known

NEWS FROM THE FARM BUREAU

Correction: Last week, in this column, we told you the minimum acreage cut for cotton on the county basis would be seven per cent. E. T. Ford, Commodity Chairman, tells us we should have said seven per cent would be the MAXIMUM CUT for any county. We are indeed happy to make this correction.

The preceding paragraph is an illustration of why farmers should look farther than newspaper articles for information regarding government programs and other things affecting their business of farming. Errors occur typographically, by interpretation, misunderstanding or, in some cases by a distorted effort to make a political or personal point. The above was a misunderstanding.

It is heartening to note that more and more people are beginning to see the need for something more than a government market for farm commodities. Remarks of several political aspirants indicate that they, too, are seeing the necessity for marketing effort to produce channels of disposal rather than continued political promises that end up in stored surpluses.

At the present time we feel inclined to compliment Robert G. Schrauner, Texas ASC Chairman of Dumas, on his handling of the job for which he is responsible. Every occasion your Farm Bureau officials have had for conferring with him has been very satisfactory. He is sincere, straightforward and helpful in attitude. All advance information he has provided has testified of his honesty, an attribute that is peculiarly complimentary to one in his position in these times.

If your ginner is not aware of your privilege of requesting re-examination of your cotton sample without showing the original classification, refer him to this office for the simple procedure. Farm Bureau tried to get this privilege for you last year, and succeeded for the 1955 crop. Use it.

The Land Fertility Bank farm program seemed to appeal to a large majority of the farmers at

the convention in Bovina last Thursday night. Delegates to the State Convention next month are instructed to favor it for you.

Farm Bureau Has Annual Convention

(Continued from Page 1)

Insurance programs. The biggest part of the evening was taken up in the discussion and adoption of resolutions which will govern Farm Bureau policy in the coming year. Of 18 proposals offered the delegation, by the resolutions committee, 17 were adopted. Here is the stand of the county Farm Bureau's membership on vital issues: They oppose compulsory Social Security for farmers. They favor retention of the tractor gas refund program. They would keep for the state the privilege of taxing motor fuels—in preference to this power passing to the federal government.

They request a refund of two cents per gallon for the federal tax paid on farm gasoline which is not consumed on state-and federally-built highways.

In cases where downstream dams are built, they favor a tax on the users to pay for these structures.

They believe the people should elect representatives to a state water board.

They support the Texas "right to work" law.

They ask for a law that will require certification of the contents of manufactured feed.

They want to be able to use their pickups as passenger cars, not requiring additional licensing.

They would like to see the quality of feed grain influence the support prices on these commodities. This is especially true in the case of content of noxious weed seeds.

They unanimously support the adoption of the Farm Bureau "Land Fertility Bank."

(But if this program cannot be adopted, they favor:)

90 percent supports on non-basic commodities.

A revision of the parity formula on grain sorghums.

Flexible supports, provided acreages can be increased. (This resolution carried by a majority of 12-10.)

A resolution to make grain sorghums a basic commodity was defeated 11-19.

They favor encouraging foreign trade by accepting foreign currency.

They want more patrolmen on the highways to enforce traffic laws.

They want to keep the "trend" factor in cotton allotments.

A resolution was offered from the

1. They favor continuation of the weed committee's work.
2. They commended the county, the railroad, and the state highway department on cooperation in the weed control program.
3. They favor the circulation of a petition to determine if a weed control district should not be formed.

Every day, it costs our employees more to live. By rights, they should be granted increases in pay to maintain their standards of living.

These are just a few of the problems we are facing, and we know for certain that every businessman and every farmer has a situation like ours.

We are sorry to have to predict that by the end of this year, the time for the passing of the nickel weekly newspaper will have arrived.

Couldn't help but be amused at the colors Jack Spurlin picked out for his new business. That was an expectant father's indecision if we ever saw it.

With the announcement last week that the Spurlins have a new baby girl, we are wondering how long it will be until the building is painted solid pink—instead of pink and blue as it is now.

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

Use that Stubble, Advise SCS Technicians

Some farmers may be overlooking a good method of helping sustain production on their farms—especially under irrigated conditions—according to the Parmer County Soil Conservation Service. This can be done by using the grain stubble as a soil conditioner; that is, chopping it into the top few inches of the soil, points out Walter Howard, SCS technician. Stubble handled in this manner serves two purposes, he says. It decreases wind erosion, and it increases the ability of the soil to

absorb moisture (both irrigation water and rainfall) during the fall and winter months.

In order for the stubble to be sufficiently decomposed, and to keep the soil in good condition, a high nitrogen-type fertilizer should be applied to the mulched-in stubble, advises Howard.

After making representative clippings of some of the fields of the Parmer County Soil Conservation District, SCS technicians conclude that there are about two pounds of stubble left in the field

for each pound of grain harvested.

In other words, if a farmer cuts 3,000 pounds of grain per acre, he should have around 6,000 pounds of stubble per acre left in his field.

Howard points out that by figuring that it takes about 20 pounds of high-nitrogen fertilizer to decompose a ton of stubble, a farmer can arrive at the amount of fertilizer that he needs to apply.

Also, he should have a soil analysis run to determine the amount of available nitrogen already present in the soil, suggest the SCS technicians.





Mustangs Trounce Hart 33-12 Friday

The Bovina Mustangs romped over the underdog Hart Longhorns Friday night before a smaller-than-usual crowd at Mustang Field, 33-12.

Playing without the services of star back, Neil Smith, the Mustangs racked up a 21-0 lead in the half and added two more touchdowns to that score in the second half before a substitute-filled line-up allowed the Longhorns to counter for their two touchdowns.

Larry Ezell kicked off to Hart to begin the game and the Mustangs forced the Longhorns to punt from the 11 yard line. Darrell Read gathered in the punt on the 34 and returned it to the 26. Five plays later, the locals scored their first TD, Ezell carrying thru the middle standing up from the one.

Read's placement—his fifth in a row—was good. (He kicked four consecutive points after touchdowns in the Plains game the week before.)

But in three plays they had not managed for a first down so Read punted to the Hart eight and it was returned back to the 11. Forced to punt from that point, the attempted kick was partially blocked and it went out of bounds on the Hart 30.

Billy Burnam made two to the 28, Ezell went to the 23, and from that point, Read passed to Ezell in the end zone for the third touchdown of the game. Read's kick—good, 21-0.

The locals scored one more touchdown in the first half on a Read to Ezell pass but it was called back due to a 15 yard penalty for illegal use of the hands.

The half ended with the score 21-0.

The bank's permanent building will be erected as soon as possible and will feature the latest in banking conveniences.

Warren Embree will serve the bank as the executive officer. Embree has had broad experience in banking, dating back to the early 1930's and is highly regarded in banking circles throughout the state. He has taken part and been active in civic affairs wherever

he has lived.

J. P. Macon of Bovina will serve as chairman of the board of directors. Macon has been in the elevator business in Bovina since 1943. From 1920 to '43 he was in the grain business in Texico, N. M., and prior to that time he taught school in Tennessee and Texas.

C. R. Elliott will be the bank's president. Elliott is a retired hardware and butane dealer and now owns irrigated farmland. He was formerly a banker in Oklahoma but has been a resident of Bovina for several years. Elliott has been active in civic affairs and improvements since his coming to Bovina.

Frank P. Wilson of Bovina is a member of the board of directors. He has been in the stock farming business for several years and for the last four years has been an irrigation farmer. He has ranches at Teline, Tascosa, and Amarillo in years past.

Temple, one of the out of town directors and stockholders, is a director and cashier of the Hale Center National Bank at Hale Center.

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



After a long absence, Rita Tamora came back to school last week. The enrollment now stands at 23.


