Note to O. W. Rhinehart of Bovina:

Rhiney, we didn't trust our eighth grade education in arithmetic, and so we brought in some experts to help us figure out the water-in-the-bar ditch problem.

Our trigonometry friends, using their slide rules and logarithms, reported to us that such a ditch would hold four cubic feet of water per running foot (ditch length).

A 900-gallon well would deliver two cubic feet per second. Thus, multiplying two times 3600 (the seconds in an hour) and then again by 24 for a full day's pumping, we get 172,500 cubic feet.

A little dividing will render a final figure of 8.2 miles as the length of such a ditch that would be filled in a 24-hour pumping period—not 48 miles.

Besides, here we are talking about a stainless steel ditch with a cover over the top which would eliminate seepage and evaporation losses. The average open irrigation ditch on the high dry Plains of Texas—where temperatures at much of the irrigation season approach 100 degrees in the daytime, humidity ranges as low as 10 percent, and southwest winds act like a giant blower drying everything out—would lose at least 20 percent per half-mile.

Theoretically, then, it appears that after five miles, the water from the well would just be absorbed—it wouldn't run any farther. Such isn't the case, though, because the soil reaches the point where it won't take any more water. At least, you can see that evaporation and seepage ought to enter into this type of figuring, although I don't know what estimate would be fair.

We mean all of these remarks kindly, O. W., and are not necessarily picking a fight with you. However, in this extremely water-conscious part of the country where many greedy men would only gladly subject us to state or federal control of this resource if it means more for them—we are convinced that we ought to be on our toes with the facts.

Do you agree? We'll have to repeat it: After inspecting every town within a 100-mile radius, we can't find a single community that can boast of a finer residential section than the one of South Farwell.

Bovina, Friona, Muleshoe, and many of the towns up to 5,000 in population have nice homes—but they're scattered here and there, and don't present nearly the impressiveness of Farwell's "silk stocking" district.

Our opinion is that Dimmitt comes closest to matching Farwell, but still isn't as nice over-all.

This is probably Farwell's greatest asset, and surely ought not to be overlooked by the town's boosters whenever the possibility of attracting new businesses arises.

Up until now, all of Farwell's home building has been on an individual basis. Now, however, several contractors are hard at work to supply the need for new homes, and their first offerings were shown the public just this past weekend.

The four homes shown, two of which were in the FHA-approved Hillcrest Addition, certainly are nothing of which this already beauty-conscious city should be ashamed.

We certainly are indebted to the kind persons who have been so understanding with the editor and his staff during the past three weeks. Absorption of another newspaper into his already busy shop has placed a severe strain on everyone, and we are afraid the strain has shown at times.

We especially appreciate the patience of those who have had to wait for commercial printing. Our printer, Dick Hapke, who operates his own business under the name Hi-Plains Printing Company, has really been swamped, and in spite of his brand new press, he's been running behind. Dick will soon finish this year's work at ENMU, however, and should be able to catch up with the demand for his services in a short period.

THURSDAY: 8:30-9:30 a. m., sports in gyms. 9:30-12:30, swimming at Muleshoe. 4-5 p. m. suit up and travel to game or pre-game warm up if game is at home. 5-7 p. m., Pony League.

FRIDAY: 9-10 a. m., tennis at Farwell court. 10-11:30 a. m., girl's softball, Texico field. 4-5 p. m. suit up and travel if game away. 5-7 p. m., Little League game.

On the dates that no games are scheduled, workouts will be held at Texico and Farwell. Players should be home from out-of-town games by 7:30 or 8:00 p. m.

Boys from eight to 12 years of age are eligible for play in Little League. They must not be 13 before August 1, 1956. Boys 13 and 14 years old will play in the Pony League. They must not be 15 before August 1, 1956.

Any boy or girl of school age will be admitted to the swimming pool for 25 cents. Tuesday, June 5, will be the first day for swimming.

Kittrell Takes Over Texaco Station

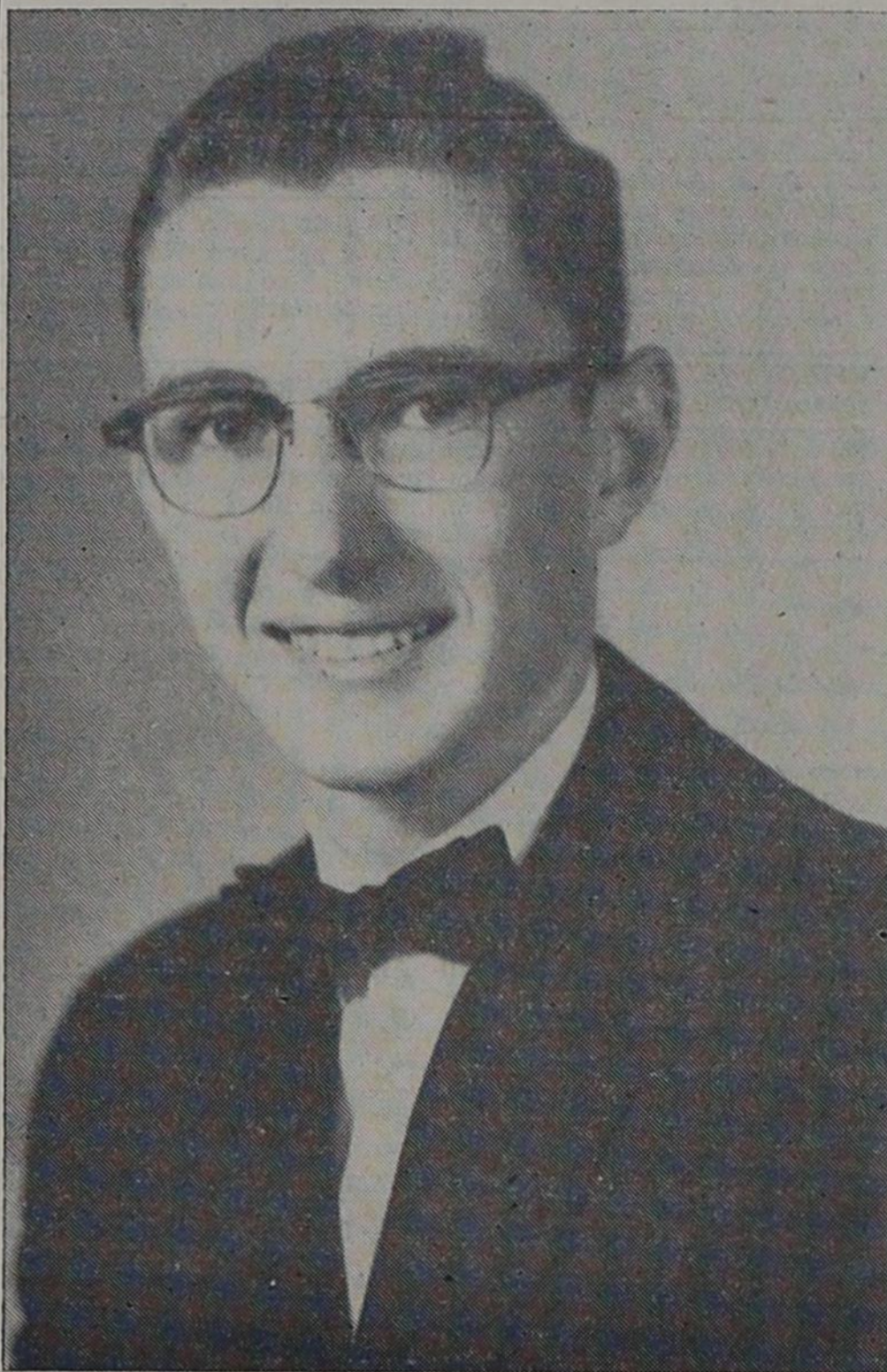

Bindweed Control Program Mapped

"The amount of bindweed in Farmer County isn't alarming, but the weed is scattered throughout the county and it spreads rapidly under irrigation," Bruce Parr, chairman of the Farmer County Farm Bureau weed committee, said of the weed, that leaves the land almost useless when it gets a hold, at a meeting of the committee Tuesday night at Lawlis and Ely Gin in Bovina.

In an effort to control bindweed, the committee divided the four precincts in the county into small parts on a map. A farmer and an FFA boy or a 4-H boy will work as an identification team and locate all the bindweed in the small part of the precinct they are to work. The location of all bindweed will be shown on maps in County Agent Joe Jones' office in Farwell and in the Farm Bureau office in Friona.

When the maps are complete, all affected farmers will be notified and an explanation will be made to them as to how to obtain soil sterilants that will aid in the control of the weed.

ON COUNTY RIGHTS-OF WAY Where there is bindweed on a farmer's land and on the county right-of-way adjoining the land, the farmer should fill out an application form for soil sterilants at the county agent's office. An order

will be given to the farmer that will enable him to get the sterilant at his regular trading place free of charge. All the farmer has to do is apply the sterilant.

FARMERS who have the weed on their farms should apply for prior approval for ASC assistance in the purchase of soil sterilants at the county ASC office in Farwell.

ASC assistance is nine cents per pound for sodium chlorate and a comparable amount for other sterilants. The total price of sodium chlorate per pound is 12.25 cents. The farmer is required to pay only three and a half cents per pound.

ON STATE ROADS Where bindweed is on a state highway or farm-to-market road that adjoins a farmer's land, the farmer should notify Agent Jones or the Farm Bureau office. The information will be turned over to the district highway superintendent who will cooperate with the farmer in the control of the weed.

Jones says the highway department will control bindweed where it is only in the right-of-way and where it is on a farm and the right-of-way. He said, however, that the department didn't want to use control measures unless the farmer whose land adjoined the right-of-way was willing to cooperate.
