We firmly believe that were a qualified "minority" teacher to apply at the Farwell ISD for a job and it was open in the normal course of teacher turnover, said applicant would be hired the same as any "non-minority" teacher.

We apparently have good teaching jobs in Farwell. If a person wants a job in Farwell, let them come and ask for it We do not believe in chasing anybody down and handing them a free ticket.

We think that our little school has, on a per capita basis, turned out as many advanced degree holders in all phases of life as have Amarillo, Lubbock or Austin. 55 MPH - -

New Speed Limit * Effective Sunday

Parmer County Texas Department of Safety Officers Jim Bishop and Glenn Fant who are stationed in Farwell, have been notified there will be no "period of grace" when the new 55 mph speed limit goes into effect at 12:01 a.m.

Sunday, Jan. 20. They, along with all other Texas Highway patrolmen, city and county officers, have been notified that on the effective date and time, tickets are to be issued for speed violations.

The speed limit action, limiting the maximum speed to 55 mph on all state, federal, city and county highways and roads was taken in keeping with the law passed by the recent special session of the Texas Legislature, empowering the Texas Highway Commission to set lower speed limits to comply with federal energy saving actions.

Under the terms of the Emergency Highway Energy Conservation Act signed by the President January 2, a state not establishing a 55 mph maximum speed limit would not receive its share of federal highway construction funds.

Federal taxes on items related to the operation of motor vehicles -- notably a four-cents-per-gallon levy on gasoline -- go into the Federal Highway Trust Fund. These funds are apportioned back to the state for the federal law enforcement agencies.

some \$240 million annually which would be withheld if the lower speed limit was not set by early March.

This action is subject to review within eight days by Texas Governor Dolph Briscoe. The lower speed limits will apply to all highways in the state, including highways under the control of the Texas Turnpike Authority, cities and counties.

New speed limit signs replacing the old 70 mph maximum speed limit on the state's major highways, will be in place by the effective date. Most of the signs have been placed in Parmer County at this time. The Texas Highway Department is making and posting the new signs.

The commission also directed the Highway Department to monitor and document circumstances "wnich might relate to the establishment of speed limits and to report to the Commission on a monthly basis." This is in order that the Commission may make findings as to whether the 55 mph speed limit should continue in effect.

Many motorists in Texas already have voluntarily reduced their driving speeds to below 55 according to Highway Department spokesmen and

The livestock and livestock products, however, was down one per cent from last month, but is 17 per cent above a year ago. Beef cattle prices have declined 30 per cent from August levels. However, retail meat prices have declined less than 10 per cent.

For Texas, hog prices as of Dec. 15 averaged \$38.30, down \$1.60 from November. Beef cattle averaged \$38.20, down 90 cents from a month ago. Hog prices are 10 cents above beef prices for the month. Calf prices at \$47 were down \$2.90 from a month ago. Sheep prices at \$16.30 per hundred- prices.





Reward Increased For Dog Poisoners

Last week, Parmer County Justice of the Peace and Mrs. Ray Mears lost a pet dog to a poisoner. Judge Mears said he let the family nine-month-old Daschund outside briefly at 10 p.m. just before retiring for the night. He continued that the small dog was ready to come back into the house within five minutes. Within an hour and a half, the Daschund was in convulsions and the Mears started to a veterinarian in Clovis, however failed to reach the veterinarian before the small dog died.

Tests on the dog showed it had been fed strychnine. The Mearses' son, Fred Curtis, initially offered a reward of \$100 for apprehension of the poisoner, but this week upped the reward to \$300.

Curtis expressed a fear that some small child would get some of the poison accidentally while playing outside. He also commented on persons who would poison dogs, especially

family pets. The Mearses' dog poisoning apparently is not an isolated incident in Farwell as several persons have reported recently of dog poisonings. It was reported that the John McFarlands had lost a dog to poisoners, and that Earl Roberts had lost at least one dog

Roberts said his dogs were always penned up except for rare occasions when one of the dogs would ride in his pickup with him. There have also been other reportings of dogs being fed poison in the Texico area during recent weeks.
