
Finagle's Law: Once a job is fouled up, anything done to improve it makes it worse. Crane's Law: There is no such thing as a free lunch.



### **Foster Named Texico Marshal**

Buford Franklin "Butch" Foster, 34, a former Texico City Marshal, was chosen by Texico's Board of Trustees during a special called meeting last Friday night, to replace former City Marshal Willie Ronquillo, who had resigned to go to the Clovis Police Depart-

Although Foster said he was taking a \$400 monthly cut in pay to go back into law enforcement, he accepted the \$575 per month offered by the trustees. He, his wife, Linda, and three children are expected to move to Texico from Clovis in the near future. The Foster children are two sons, Bill, 13, and Chris, seven, and a daughter, Judy Lynn, age five.

Foster had worked for a few months previously as Texico City Marshal and left that position to move to Muleshoe as a City patrolman. He also formerly worked as a radio dispatcher for a short time for the New Mexico State Police at Clovis. During the past few years he has worked as a car salesman in Clovis.

In other action during the more than three-hour meeting, it was reported by City Clerk Clara Wiehl that Texico received no gas allotment for rebruary to operate the city tractor, although there was an allotment for the emergency vehicles.

Texico City Attorney Harry Patton showed the trustees one of the junk car stickers presently being used by the City of Clovis, and gave suggestions for adaption for use in the City of Texico. He also explained to the trustees the procedure to enforce the junk car ordinance.




Three Farwell Steers were named All-District for District 3-A basketball during the past week.


park somewhere.




